

LECTURE SERIES OPENS NOVEMBER 9

**BORGLUM, ADAMIC,
WOOD SCHEDULED AS
COLLEGE ORATORS**

Gutzon Borglum, noted sculptor, will speak here in chapel November 9, as the first feature of the Allegheny College Lecture series this year. Other scheduled speakers in the series are Grant Wood, noted artist, and Louis Adamic, popular author.

Mr. Borglum is most famous for his massive figures of Washington, Jefferson, Lincoln, and Theodore Roosevelt, chiselled out of the rock of Mount Rushmore in the Black Hills of South Dakota.

Grant Wood to Speak.

The next presentation in the series will bring Grant Wood, "brilliant painter of the midwestern scene", here January 8. Mr. Wood, a conspicuous figure in contemporary American art, whose paintings became the sensation of the Chicago Century of Progress art exhibition, will present a talk on art, illustrated by slides.

At present, Wood, connected with the University of Iowa, where he teaches painting and directs groups in mural work, is waging a fight in which he insists that "the creative art student shall have a chance to develop in the broad cultural background of a university without having to sacrifice his creative zeal in the by-ways of academic stupidity".

Adamic Final Speaker.

The final speaker, Louis Adamic, will speak February 15. Mr. Adamic has to his credit several successful novels, among them the Book of the Month Club's selection, *The Native's Return*, and *My America*, a best seller months after its publication.

Adamic, a native of Yugoslavia, came to the United States early in his life and worked his way around the country in mills, restaurants, and factories. He served in the war, and is well qualified as a lecturer.

Students will be admitted to these programs on presentation of their activities tickets.

PAN-HELLENIC TO SPONSOR DANCE

ALLEGHENY ALUMNI FETED BY COLLEGE

**Homecoming Features
Bonfire, Soccer, Football
Games and Alumni Dance**

Hundreds of alumni from Pennsylvania, New York, Ohio and adjoining states invaded the Allegheny campus last week-end to celebrate the Annual Homecoming program which had the 125th anniversary as its theme.

Student activities began Friday with a pep meeting at noon and were followed by the Allegheny-Carnegie Tech soccer game which ended in a 1-1 tie. In the evening the students rallied around the traditional Homecoming bonfire built by the class of '43, and afterwards snake-danced downtown to crash the Park and Academy theatres.

Afternoon Events.

Alumni festivities began with the alumni luncheon in Hulings at noon Saturday. Each guest was presented with a yellow rose tied with ribbons of the school colors, blue and gold. A huge placard picturing Bentley Hall and commemorating the 125th Anniversary was hung over the mantle to denote the theme of events.

Although the weather was threatening, the grandstands were filled to capacity, as Allegheny bowed to Oberlin in the game in which the invading gridders won with a score of 27-0.

As a special entertainment feature between halves, each of the freshman houses and each section of Caflisch presented a stunt. Beebe House burned an effigy of the class of '42; Hammett house girls spelled out their house name with beaver board cards and gave a rousing cheer for their abode; Hulings followed with a style revue in which each girl wore coed customs; Tarbell House presented a mock football game; Mr. Benjamin's section proceeded to bury the corpse of '42. Due to the lack of time, not all of the scheduled skits were presented.

Following the football contest, the alumni were entertained at the various fraternity and sorority dinners. Dr. W. P. Tolley spoke at the Annual Homecoming dinner in Cochran.

Original \$2000 Goal**

Students of the college soared substantially over their goal with a total of \$2378.50 for the 125th anniversary fund drive.

A two-week period marked the intense campaign for a student contribution to this nation-wide drive. Under the auspices of the Allegheny Undergraduate council, headed by President Charles Miller, the on-campus donation exceeded its original \$2000 goal.

Student representatives concentrated on contributions from members of their own class. Marjorie Wible, '41, and Dave Robertson, '41, contacting freshmen, report that they have led with the highest donation, \$710.

Other committeemen included Betty Spring, '40, George Evert, '41, and Ruth Ellen Blake, '41.

The full amount of pledges was presented to President William P. Tolley by Charles Miller in student chapel last Friday. This money will be reserved exclusively for the erection of a new women's dormitory.

Allegheny Institute Of Opinion Reports

**450 Ballot in First
Poll On Vital Topics;
Dr. Giddens Directs**

That a large majority of Allegheny students favor the establishment here of a regular course in military training, was revealed last night in the final tabulation of the first poll conducted by the Allegheny Institute of Opinion.

Four hundred and fifty students balloted in Friday's chapel on questions relating to policies the United States should follow with reference to the European war. Sponsored by the History and Political Science club, in connection with the *Campus*, the Institute is headed by Dr. Paul H. Giddens.

The executive committee and several members of the History club comprise the tabulating division of the Institute. Assistant Editor Howard Gibbs, '41, represents the *Campus*.

Military Training.

Voting on the question "Should Allegheny college offer a regular course in military training in preparation for an officer's commission?", 59.3 per cent of the votes were cast in the affirmative. Only 38.4 per cent were against the proposal. The faculty voted fifteen to four against the establishment of the program.

Asserted Director Giddens, "The result of this question is amazing; certainly it was not what one would expect. The freshman and sophomore classes rolled up a huge majority in favor of it. Every class, except the juniors, voted in favor of it."

It is significant to note that Amherst College in a similar poll last week voted 79 per cent against the poll as compared to Allegheny's 38 per cent.

Vote on Policy.

On the question of our policy in the war, only 7.7 per cent of the students favored entering the war on the side of England and France if those countries were losing. This would indicate that college students believe the United States can take care of itself no matter what happens. In the Amherst poll, however, 49 per cent favored helping those countries if they were hard pressed.

About one-fourth of the student body reflects an isolationist policy by advocating refusal of aid to either side and selling nothing to warring countries. More important is the overwhelming 55.5 per cent in favor of taking no sides and offering to sell to any one on a cash and carry basis. The faculty concurred with students in favoring the repeal of the embargo and selling war supplies on a cash and carry basis.

Comparison With Fortune.

In the national poll conducted by *Fortune* magazine, the sentiment for entering the war at once is 50 per (continued on page 4)

Athletes and Beauties Passe-- Now it Takes a Man With Brains

All-around students, especially those who worked their way through college, have a better chance of getting a job after graduation than the campus hero or the college "grind", according to King Merritt, vice-president of Investors Syndicate, of Minneapolis.

Athletes and beauties, unlike a few years ago, are not being sought unless they can offer to their prospective employers some substantial qualities, such as character, scholarship, adaptability, leadership or personality, a survey of 186 American colleges and universities reveals.

Although the job outlook for college graduates is brighter than in either 1938 or 1937, American employers are exacting in their requirements, preferring employes capable of being developed into executives within the next decade over those who seem to have decided limitations.

"Character is a prime qualification for a job," explained Mr. Merritt in reporting on total replies, "was mentioned by 103 schools, scholarship by 29, personality by 18, adaptability by 12 and leadership by 6.

The student who today works his way through college and thus earns his education expenses in whole or part can be counted on to solve difficulties after graduation, several officials emphasized.

The "book worm" and the "human encyclopedia" with their brilliant and superlative scholarship are being sharply differentiated from job candidates who had average or above-average grades plus ability, all round training, adaptability, co-operativeness, dependability, enthusiasm, initiative, imagination, loyalty, and reliability.

Scholarship is less demanded, wrote one placement officer, except in large organizations carrying on research work. Another replied, scholarship usually is placed last except in the teaching profession. A dean of a teachers' college after stressing scholarship and stating there was no demand for teachers who were the least bit wild added that demand was less for teachers who do not dance, play cards, or engage in social affairs.

Most employers enjoy sports and admire good sportsmanship, but athletic (continued on page 4)

The Bookworm Reviews And Gives His Candid Opinion

When the present war crisis was first realized, we tore madly to our bookshelves, and with a guilty feeling that the pages were still uncut, we ambitiously began *Inside Europe* by John Gunther.

In his book Mr. Gunther takes the European countries one by one and tells of their principal assets and chief problems. In minute detail, he describes likes and dislikes; in fact, he gives a short biography of himself.

Naturally, we turned to the chapters on Germany and Hitler. Ironically enough, we had only to turn to the first chapter, to find our subject. Perhaps Mr. Gunther foresaw the coming events to know what information his readers would most want. As we reviewed the life of the "second Julius Caesar", we hated and pitied Hitler by degrees. When we discovered that he has known, according to the author, only one Jew in his life and yet hates the entire race, we felt we had found a kindred spirit when we read that Mussolini dislikes all vegetables and will eat none.

For a valuable reference book, you will find *Inside Europe* unsurpassable.

Both its information and its style are interesting.

A lighter book for tunes when you want to rest from textbooks and studying, is Vincent Shean's *Not Peace But a Sword*. It is the story of Mr. Shean's travels in Europe. It is almost inconceivable that a man could have been on the spot at every important moment as the author was. You begin to think of him somewhat as a Roman oracle foreseeing future events. Three months before the Munich conference, he had his bookings there! Mr. Shean but you find your opinions run parallel to Mr. Shean's more often than not.

Once you have started this book, it will be hard not to cut all your classes and finish it. The story is so interesting and so like a novel, you will find yourself surprised to know already some of the story from having read the papers of that time. Now that it is so hard to find unpropagandized (to coin a word) news, it is fun to go back and reread certain parts before you accept all you hear as "cross my heart, hope to die," truth.

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"WHEN JOHNNY COMES MARCHING HOME"

Elsewhere in today's "Campus", you will find results of the college opinion poll conducted by the History and Political Science Club at the close of a recent chapel program. It is interesting to note that a majority of the Allegheny student body favors the establishment of collegiate military training on this campus. However, upon closer examination, we find that the majority is determined by the underclass voters who not only outnumbered the upperclassmen participating in the poll, but were also overwhelmingly in favor of the adoption of such a measure.

We account for this in the realization that to the rather naive mind of the underclassmen, military training offers an escape from the humdrum life of a private, by affording him a commission in the event of war. The plan offers no such attraction to the upperclassman, who sees graduation looming large on his horizon, for time is needed to put such a plan into operation, and this automatically eliminates the possibility of his reaping many of its benefits.

As to the feminine support of the proposal, we say only that the old slogan, "Give me a man in a uniform every time" holds true now as ever. We can't deny the glamour of the military man, but have these affirmative voters considered the grimness of war? Have they thought that the jaunty figure who goes off to war may return a hopeless cripple? Our argument is that preparedness does not guard against war, but makes its possibility more probable.

If this same poll had been taken two years ago, would the results have favored so much of the militaristic attitude? We think not. The same people who, last week, approved of the student training project, would have thrown up their hands in horror at the mere mention of any proposal which might hasten the advent of war. Yet, now, because war is imminent, they can visualize only the fanfare and "glory" of it, and none of its gruesomeness.

We believe that the American people will be influential in determining our participation or non-participation in the present war; they are at liberty to make their own decisions. This is the land where every man is entitled to "life, liberty, and the pursuit of happiness". But let us be wary lest in exercising that liberty, we destroy the possibility of achieving that happiness.

SING YOU SINNERS

The evening vesper service sponsored by the Allegheny Christian Council is destined to become a permanent function on the campus. The leaders have worked hard to present religion to the student body in a modern, interesting, and streamlined style. We believe they have succeeded.

The attendance at these Sunday afternoon affairs has been satisfactory, but not as good as possible. Those who gathered for the first outdoor meeting, constituted what in our mind is a good-sized crowd. Since then the attendance has fallen.

We encourage all the students to support the A.C.C. in its attempt to institute the vesper service. After 125 years of growth Allegheny still has need of pioneers. In asking for pioneers today we are not asking you to undergo hardships or inconveniences. We are merely asking you to use that half-hour before lunch Sunday for your own good. It will be interesting as well as profitable.

During this autumn the vesper services are using the equipment available in the oratory for reproducing great religious music. Last Sunday the music of Albert Schweitzer was played along with a discussion of the man and his work. Other programs are intended to bring music and discussion under the same theme. This is something different from the old style of singing "Come into the Promised Land" before a sermon on "The Devil's Invitation". Here is a program with the listener, not the preacher, as its prime objective.

May we suggest to the leaders of A.C.C. that they use more of their originality in publicizing these meetings. The speakers and subjects themselves offer much to attract a large group. Many of us, however, are forgetful and need constant reminders such as posters or notices. Advertising is a means to an end. Albert Schweitzer as well as "Babes in Arms" needs publicity plugs to put it across. We also know of one student who attended because he was personally contacted.

The evening vespers are a desirable part of Allegheny College. The Allegheny Christian Council deserves your best efforts. See you Sunday at the Oratory.

NEUTRALITY ACT TOPIC OF SPEECH

At chapel last Monday, Dr. Paul Giddens, professor of history and political science, spoke about the controversy now going on in the special session of congress over the repeal of the present neutrality act.

Dr. Giddens stated that this was not a party issue, since senators of both parties favor the president's suggestion of replacing the act. The question which congress must decide is which course will be safest for the United States to pursue—whether to forbid exports of any weapons of war or whether to sell to any nation on a cash-and-carry basis.

The group favoring repeal of the embargo feel that in keeping to this course we are helping Germany in her fight against the democracies, since it is obvious that only Great Britain and France would be able to purchase munitions here, if we were to throw open our resources.

The other faction contends that if we were to sell arms to the so-called allies, Great Britain and France, we would be endangering our position of strict neutrality by arousing the antagonism of Germany.

Dr. Giddens concluded by stating that it is generally conceded that the present neutrality act will be replaced and that we will soon be helping the allies in their fight against Hitlerism.

Oberlin Scores in

A still fighting though badly outplayed Allegheny team emerged at the short end of a 27-0 score in her battle with Oberlin at Montgomery field Saturday.

The air had just enough snap for perfect football weather, the Homecoming crowd was large and enthusiastic, the Allegheny band made its first appearance, and our classy cheerleading corps put in plenty of time. All that was needed to make the day perfect was a victory. The boys tried hard, but they just couldn't do it.

The story of our defeat is a story of superior line play. The big Oberlin line which had a five-pound weight advantage continually outplayed our forward wall. They opened gaping holes in our line for the plunges and repeatedly cut down our ends and backs in their sweeps. This made it easy for Ken Briggs and his company of backs to chop off big chunks of yardage. Things would have been much worse for the 'Gators if Scarpitti hadn't been in the lineup. He was in on almost every tackle. Evidence of Oberlin's superiority was the 333 yardage gain they piled up as compared with our 116. Allegheny could put on only one drive all afternoon when, in the second quarter, they moved the ball on straight line plays from their 30 to Oberlin's 24. The rest of the time it was all Oberlin.

It is likely that the 'Gators will have a much easier time of it Saturday when they journey to Grove City to battle with their annual rivals. Grove City has lost three games; one to Clarion 7-0, one to Hiram 21-0, and one to Geneva 13 to 6 last week.

Only five Grover lettermen have returned from a team which defeated us last year, 13-0, in our Homecoming. Coach Lawrence and his warriors are out for revenge this year and even with his team's unimpressive showing Saturday, they should have enough stuff to win next Saturday.

With only three minutes of game time elapsed Allegheny was in a hole. They might have stopped right there, because, as time went on, things only got worse.

Oberlin's first touchdown was made quickly. Hartwell's kickoff was returned by Oberlin to their own 34. On the next play Briggs found a hole in the middle of the line and went all the way to the 'Gator 16. There, our resistance stiffened somewhat, but on the fourth down, they took it once on a fake reverse.

In the second quarter the 'Gators made a thrilling stand on their three-yard line to take the ball away from Oberlin. However, Cook's kick from the end zone was short, and in a few minutes Oberlin had scored on a faked reverse and Wilson converted to make it 14 to 0 at the half.

More gruesome details are unnecessary. Ken Briggs, little Oberlin back, gained 104 yards as compared with Allegheny's total of 116, sparked the two long drives which produced scores in the third quarter, and it ended at 27-0.

cent stronger than at Allegheny. This is true also with regard to helping England and France if they should be losing.

The sentiment of the nation and the college is about the same with regard to the isolationist policy and supplying England and France but not Germany. The sentiment for repeal of the embargo and the substitution of a cash and carry provision is about 50 per cent stronger at Allegheny than in the nations.

Helping Canada.

Of utmost significance is the 66.4 31.30 per cent affirmative vote for aiding Canada in case that country is invaded. This is in keeping with the national poll and with President Roosevelt's assertion in Kingston, Ontario, recently that the U. S. would not stand idly by were Canada attacked. The faculty voted affirmatively 15 to 4 on this question.

Constitutional Amendment.

The college divides fairly even on the question of a constitutional amendment regarding a favorable vote of the people before a Congressional declaration of war. 52.8 per cent voted affirmatively while 44.8 per cent disagreed.

On the question of one year of compulsory military service for all able bodied men twenty years of age, the college voted in the negative 68 per cent as against 31.3 per cent.

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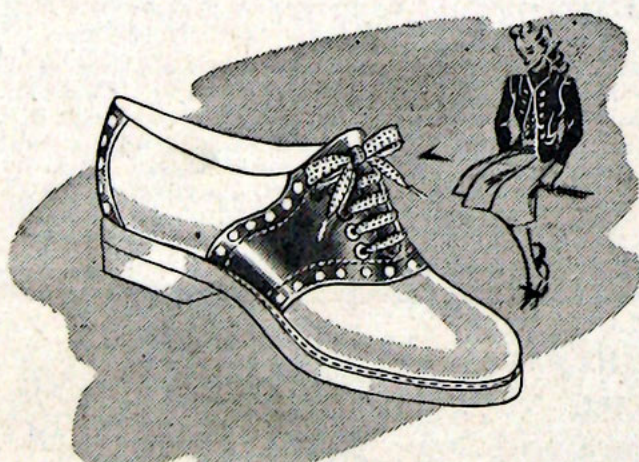
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
