Herb McCracken is to be Allegheny's Grid Coach

STARRED FOUR YEARS FOR PITT

Is Considered All Around Athlete in Collegiate Sport Circles

The selection of Herbert McCracken, University of Pittsburgh halfback and four year football star on the Pitt team, to coach football here next season, has been the source of much favorable comment about the campus and among the supporters of Allegheny in general.

McCracken, who succeeds Coach C. O. Applegran, comes from Sewickley, where he starred on various athletic teams before entering Pitt. Under Pop Warner, Herb developed into one of the Pitt eleven's strongest men and has played all the backfield positions and at end. He weighs about 165 pounds and is considered an all around athlete. During the season just closed he was captain of the Pitt basketball team, holding down a guard position.

McCracken is a very likeable chap as is evidenced by the fact that he was chosen President of his class by a unanimous vote. This in itself should speak for him as a coach.

CLUB PRODUCES MUSICAL PAGEANT

MUSIC AND DRAMA COMBINE TO MAKE PRESENTATION A SUCCESS.

Undoubtedly the greatest musical success in Allegheny since the presentation of Princess Chrysanthemum, was the pageant of Indian folk-lore and tradition, "Nawadaha and His Tribe," enacted in the chapel last night by members of St. Cecilia Club, under the direction of Miss Elma Daw.

The story is that of a tribe of Indians in the far West, whose chieftain has been slain by the ever-advancing pale-face. The pageant begins when Nawadaha, a medicine-man, interpreted, by Mildred Ellis, tells of the woe of his people, and vows vengeance on the pale-face. As the medicine-man finishes his prologue, the audience is startled by a sudden burst of music—music so vivid that no words are needed to tell one that it is the story of the tragic fate of a great people. The audience feels first the smoldering hate of the redskin, the bitter struggle for existence, and finally, the utter despair.

At this point, Indian braves bear in the dead chieftain, wrapped in funeral clothes; the tribe offers baskets of fruit and game to the gods, then gather at the side of their chieftain's bier; Nawadaha, the medicine-man, chants a funeral dirge. But in the face of these sorrows, the Indian has not forgotten to love, nor to invoke the protection of the Sun-God for the protection of his squaw and her papoose.

Culminating the production is the war dance, a colorful and realistic scene, where the Indian goes to battle, to avenge his fallen chieftain.

The words were written and music arranged by members of St. Cecilia Club.

Particularly striking were the scenes depicting Indian camp life. A smoldering fire and a lone tepee silhouetted against a dense pine forest were sufficient atmosphere in themselves. But when a war-whoop broke the forest silence, and stealthy redskins in all their native war paints and regalia began to appear on the stage, the spectators instinctively felt to see if their scalps were still there.

Mildred Ellis enacted the role of the medicine man with a remarkable display of acting and interpretative ability. Alta Postance attained that final dramatic achievement of losing herself in her part. Solo parts by Dorothea Kerr, Genevieve Hovis, Ruth Spoberg, and Josephine Hovis, constituted a large part of the program, and were well received. Violin selec-

COMMITTEE REPORTS GREAT PROGRESS

PUBLICITY WORK OF ENDOWMENT CAMPAIGN FAVORED BY AGE OF COLLEGE.

Preparation for the launching of the great drive for the Second Century Endowment Campaign on May 8, as announced in the College Bulletin of April 12, is rapidly taking on a formidable countenance. Arthur W. Thompson, president of the Board of Trustees, and Frank P. Miller, president of the Alumni Association, have sent out letters to the alumni body during the week, keeping them posted as to the course of events and encouraging them to keep up their splendid work.

Publicity for the campaign is being handled by a corps of experts who have engineered 60 similar campaigns. Their chairman reports that the publicity work in Allegheny is further advanced than in any of the other 60 campaigns at a similar period of the game, due to the unparalleled background offered by Allegheny College.

Few other educational institutions in America, for instance, have been intimately linked with the history and development of the nation for so long a period. Rarely is an American college found whose campus has witnessed historical events or formed the background for tradition dating back a hundred and six years. Four great American wars have leveled soldiers from the student body. Captains of industry and commerce have traced their success back to their student days on our picturesque campus. Great men and women of the Arts and Letters have developed the rudiment of a career in the historic halls of Old Bentley. And once the National Government recruited its Chief Executive from the body of Allegheny Alumni.

Is it any wonder, then, that the publicity managers have found rich material in the history and tradition of Allegheny? What things are not possible with such a background! It is only proper, then, that Old Bentley, the oldest and most picturesque of the college group, should be the headquarters for this campaign for a million and a quarter dollars increased endowment. The executive office is in room 7, while room 8 and the Treasurer's office are being used for general campaign purposes. Over thirty students are assisting the campaign officials, and there is room for more.

Were the Committee of One Hundred and Five to issue an official report of the campaign up to date, that report would consist of one word—PROGRESS!

ALLEGHENY REPRESENTED AT VOLUNTEER CONCLAVE

MANY NOTED MEN SPEAK AT CONFERENCE HELD AT GROVE CITY.

Representatives from Allegheny have returned from the Student Volunteer Conference held at Grove City, April 15, 16, and 17, bringing enthusiastic reports of the meeting there. There were present at the conference delegates from all the colleges of Western Pennsylvania, including over thirty Student Volunteers, and about one hundred others sent by the Y. M. and Y. W. C. A.'s of the different schools.

The speakers included Dr. Dekker, of the Baptist Board; Dr. Isaac T. Headland, noted lecturer and author; Dr. Leslie, medical missionary from the Congo; Dr. Tinker, international

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Missionary Speaks At Chapel Service

TALKS BEFORE STUDENTS OF VAST RESOURCES OF SOUTH AMERICA.

With a plea for the support of Foreign Missions, Dr. Taylor, of the Foreign Missions Board, spoke before the students on Thursday morning. With a traveling experience of over a half-million miles outside of this country, he felt perfectly qualified to speak for a half hour on South America. At a similar talk in the courthouse in the evening, he used Mexico as his topic.

He referred to our southern neighbor as the most undeveloped continent, yet the richest land, in the world. He mentioned only the extreme variability of the climate to emphasize this latter point. Chilean nitrate deposits, and the vast pastures of the Argentine, are practically limitless resources.

The greatest stock farm in the world, he stated, is in Argentina, with a milking group of twelve thousand. Bolivia, he called, a pot of gold on legs of silver, so rich are its mines.

The ancient Inca civilization of Peru entered into the discussion. The speaker told of architecture, which to him, is superior to any other in the world, not excepting even the Ro-

Arthur L. Bates Speaks to Club

ADDRESSES STUDENTS ON SUBJECT OF "THE HOUSE IN ACTION."

The Hon. Arthur L. Bates, former member of the House of Representatives from this legislative district, informally addressed the History and Political Science Club in their room in the Library on the evening of April 12, taking for his subject, "The House in Action."

In developing his theme, Mr. Bates followed several bills from the time they were introduced into the House until they finally became laws. He gave an especially interesting and instructive account of the Pearl Harbor Bill, of which he himself was sponsor, and in which his interest was more than superficial since at that time he was a member of the Committee on Naval Affairs, and chairman of one of the sub-committees on Naval Affairs.

Members of the club are convinced that the next best thing to visiting Congress is to listen to a member of Congress, the only difference being that in the latter case the student may learn a great deal about the inner workings of the National Legislative body otherwise unavailable.

Dr. Beiler preached in the Congregational Church last Sunday.

Journalists Form New Greek Letter Society

Delta Kappa Takes Place Among Honorary Fraternities Here

Under the name of Delta Kappa, Allegheny College has another new member to the Greek Letter family. The new fraternity will be honorary and journalistic in its scope.

The need for the promotion of journalistic endeavor among students has been largely responsible for the establishing of fraternities of this kind in almost every college of note. Long recognition of this need locally has prompted the formation of Delta Kappa, by a group of students of literary intent.

Those who are familiar with the columns of The Campus and the Literary Monthly realize that there is

an occasional difference among the Allegheny journalists, but ink has always been their medium, and ink is thicker than water.

In spirit, the new fraternity has always existed, and the present organization is the inevitable outcome of this spirit. The membership is limited to those who have been actively engaged in collegiate journalism for at least two years, and not more than one-third of the membership may be drawn from the managerial staffs. The charter members of the honorary society are: J. O. Russell, '21; F. W. McCluer, '21; H. J. Ruse, '21; S. E. Plumb, '21; R. C. Limber, '21; J. C. Bird, '22, and G. L. Bird, '22.

WAS FORMER PROFESSOR HERE 114 YEARS OLD?

An interesting controversy has arisen over the age of the late Dr. Ami B. Hyde, who 45 years ago was a member of the faculty of this college. This prominent educator came to the end of his life of service on March 23 as noted in the college bulletin issued a short time ago. This bulletin places the date of Dr. Hyde's birth in 1824 but there are those who think differently. The following item is reprinted from the Cleveland Press of March 1:

"Then there's Rev. Ammi B. Hyde, of University Park, Col., who's 97.

"When he was only 22 he began to help others, as professor of languages at the Casenovia (N. Y.) Seminary. His life since has been devoted to furthering the cause of religion.

"Since 1909 he has been professor of philology at the University of Denver.

"I'm still able to deliver a lecture or preach a sermon when called upon," he says.

A reader of the Press, however, disagrees with the paper as to the age of the former Allegheny professor and wrote to the editor the letter which follows. It was published but a few days before Dr. Hyde's death:

"To the Editor of The Press:

"In a recent issue you list among a galaxy of noted very old people, with their portraits, the name of Dr. Ammi B. Hyde, now living in a suburb of Denver, Col., giving his age as 97

years and stating he has been a professor in the University of Denver since 1909.

"In both these items there must surely be some mistake, for it was my privilege to call upon this revered old friend on Jan. 1, 1885, in Denver, to renew our acquaintance, first begun in 1875, at Allegheny College, Meadville, Pa., when it was commonly understood among the students that the doctor's age was 69 years.

"This was brought out by a short 'run-and-jump' from the end of a plank which the old gentleman made when he may have thought no one was looking, and the astonished, full-grown men of our class attempted to out-jump his mark and could not.

"Several of the surprised students then asserted that he was reputed to be 69, and that was 45 years ago, which would now give him 114 years. The writer received a letter and card photo of him, in response to a social letter sent him a few weeks ago, in which he was charged with being 114 years old, and he did not deny it.

"Answering my inquiry, in 1877, as to how many languages he understood, he modestly said: 'Twenty-two, and several Indian dialects.' At that time he was an old man, clear enough, but well preserved; and he was indeed a useful and ever helpful, friendly man. He published 'The Story of Methodism,' and several other books."

Pastor of Ashbury M. E. Church of Pittsburgh Will Speak In Chapel

ERIE PASTOR IS SUNDAY SPEAKER

EVENTS IN LIFE OF PAUL GIVE TEXT FOR SERMON BY ALUMNUS.

Rev. Arthur Staples, pastor of First M. E. Church, Erie, preached at the Chapel Sunday morning. Miss Genevieve Hovis, '21, sang a solo.

"I was not disobedient unto the heavenly vision," was Paul's only defense before King Agrippa. True to his mission, Paul made no attempt to free himself. The vision which had appeared to him on the road to Damascus had settled his faith in Jesus; it had settled his belief in the resurrection of Christ, the divine Son of God; and had resulted in a complete change in his character. Following Paul's example, if man but leaned upon Jesus for support he will find all doubts and questions settled.

A poor fisherman once sat meditating before the masterpiece "Christ Before Pilot." At last when he rose to leave he was heard to say, "The man who painted that picture believed it. I believe it. Now I'm going home to be a different man."

Some one has said that Mr. Hoffman, a great artist, once painted a wonderful picture of the face of the Christ. When asked if the picture was for sale, he answered, "Well, hardly. When I began to paint that picture I was painting at random, having no particular idea in mind but I soon realized that my picture was the face of the Christ."

Man by worship becomes assimilated into the moral character of the object which he worships. Men who have carefully studied the life and spirit of the Master live lives of unselfish service for others.

Obedience unto the vision which God gives us to see our duty makes each task of life seem easier. Our vision is imperfect, since a veil lies between us and His Glory. Some day when his eyes have been opened man shall see Him as He is. At that time if man has done his best, Jesus, the Master painter, will touch up the picture of man's earthly life until in some way it will look like the Christ.

HONORARY FRATERNITY ELECTS NEW MEMBERS

FIVE NEW MEN ARE CHOSEN WHO WILL WEAR DELTA SIGMA RHO KEY.

A meeting of Delta Sigma Rho was held in the Delta Tau Delta House Monday afternoon, April 8. The business of electing members was taken up. Only those men who have taken part in some inter-collegiate debate are eligible for election. The following new members were elected: Fleming, '23; Ross, '23; Bozic, '23; Meicher, '21, and Russell, '21.

Additional members will probably be selected as soon as the next inter-collegiate debate makes new men eligible. There are at present only three members of this fraternity in the college. The fact that these men are all Seniors makes it imperative that new members be chosen who are in a position to carry on the life of the fraternity. The initiation ceremonies will be postponed until later in the spring.

April 24 has been fixed as Founders' Day by the College to commemorate the coming of Timothy Alden to Meadville in 1815. This year, the day falling on Sunday, the exercises will be held in connection with the college church services at eleven o'clock. Doctor T. W. Fessenden, pastor of the Ashbury Methodist Episcopal Church of Pittsburgh, will conduct the services. Allegheny College extends to the citizens of Meadville a cordial invitation to attend the Chapel on this day.

Since 1908 Founders' Day has been observed regularly without a break, in recognition of the prime movers, Timothy Alden, Rodger Alden, and Mr. Reynolds, grandfather of John E. Reynolds, former mayor and still a resident of Meadville, in founding Allegheny College in the little old log cabin Court House. This historic Court House was located on the west

SENIOR HOP IS WELL ATTENDED

ONE HUNDRED COUPLES CROWD GYM AT FIRST DANCE ON NEW FLOOR.

About one hundred couples attended the "Senior Hop" which was held last Thursday evening in the college gymnasium under the auspices of the Senior Class. The dance was informal and was the third all college dance given on the Hill during the year. Decorations were used in the auditorium of white and yellow, which are the class colors. Music for the occasion was furnished by Gage's Collegians, an orchestra composed entirely of students which has been gaining wide popularity this season for its novelty entertainment. The dance was well chaperoned, inasmuch as many members of the faculty and their wives were in attendance as well as a large number of alumni who returned to enjoy a dance in the new gymnasium.

While everyone seemed to thoroughly enjoy themselves to the utmost there was considerable comment afterwards concerning the poor condition of the new floor which was recently installed. It was the opinion of many of the students that the surface was too rough for dancing purposes. A member of the committee in charge of the program stated that he had endeavored to use a wax compound on the floor but this was forbidden by the Coach who stated that the application of polishing materials would render the floor impracticable for indoor athletics.

However, polishing or no polishing, all reports indicate that the dance was a decided success both in the enjoyment of the evening and financially.

COLLEGE CATALOGUE FOR 1920-21 APPEARS.

The newest edition of the College Bulletin and Catalogue made its appearance during the past week. A new feature of interest is that it includes the Meadville addresses of students and faculty. It is interesting to note that the total number of students is the same as last year—536, and also that the freshman class has had 199 members two years in succession. The minimum expense estimate has suffered no revision, nor has the so-called liberal estimate.

side of the Diamond on the site of the first house south of the new Armory. A bronze tablet now marks the spot where these men met, one hundred six years ago and founded this institution.

In 1907 a Senior, Mr. F. L. La Bounty, spoke at Commencement on Timothy Alden, advocating proper recognition of the founder of the College and urging that his remains be rescued from neglect. A little later the trustees of the College obtained authority to bring the body of Timothy Alden from the Presbyterian Cemetery at Pine Creek to Meadville. With much ceremony this was accomplished on the 8th of April, 1908. All business was suspended in the town for the day, the funeral cortege passed through the campus, exercises were held in Ford Memorial Chapel, the officers of the city, the Masonic Fraternity, and the trustees, faculty and students participated in the impressive ceremonies. A memorable address was given on this occasion by Professor Dutton, then instructor in Mathematics and Surveying in the College.

The body of Timothy Alden now rests in the Greendale Cemetery in Meadville in the plot of ground owned by the College.

In June of the year of 1908 the Senior Class placed the bronze memorial tablet in Bentley in recognition of Timothy Alden's services as one of the founders and first President of Allegheny College.

MEMBERS TALK ON "WHAT IS THE MATTER WITH OUR CHAPEL SERVICE?"

"What is the matter with our chapel service?" was very fully discussed at the Y. M. C. A. meeting last Wednesday evening. It was the opinion of those present that there is something lamentably lacking in the daily-chapel service; interest in this service is becoming more and more wanting. There were numerous suggestions offered for its improvement. It was suggested that the apparent monotony of the service could be relieved by introducing more men who are not directly connected with the college. It was stated that, while the students appreciate the addresses made by the various faculty members, yet they naturally would be more interested in hearing a person who they did not hear every day. To bring more out-of-town and non-faculty speakers on the platform would not mean that the religious standard of the speeches would be lowered. It was suggested that successful professional and business men might tell how Christianity and high moral life affected them in their work.

Another speaker mentioned that the fixed and somewhat monotonous form of opening chapel might be changed or at times dispensed with. A further suggestion was made that the speaker for the following day might be announced the day previous; this would no doubt arouse more interest and automatically increase the attendance. A Senior compared the attendance and interest at chapel of today with that of his first year, and the comparison was much in favor of his Freshman year. He mentioned the fact that at that time there were many more non-faculty speakers, and that the students did not know what to expect from day to day as they entered chapel. At the conclusion of the discussion each member present agreed to do his part in improving the only compulsory religious meeting of Allegheny.

man and Greek types. Their method of irrigation demonstrated the height to which the development reached.

The climax of the talk was reached in his discussion of Brazil's possibilities. Large enough to absorb the world's population, were it distributed as thickly as in Belgium prior to the recent war, he spoke of this country as the greatest field of opportunity. All the products of the world are found in this nation, and deep in the Amazon forests, civilization has had no progression. The speaker has made several trips up the river, and he was able to portray very realistically the pitiable conditions there existing. The food of the natives is commonly composed of the meat of such animals, as an American would scorn, lizards, monkeys, snakes and similar reptiles.

A large field is open for educated men and women. Europe is at present drained of its manhood, as a result of the World War, and aid can be expected only from the United States. No matter what occupation, whether surveyor, sanitation expert, doctor, or educator, he is of equal importance. 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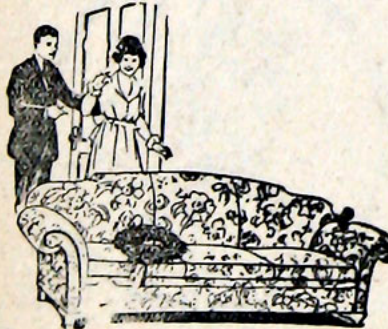
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Allegheny Men Will Compete at Penn Relays

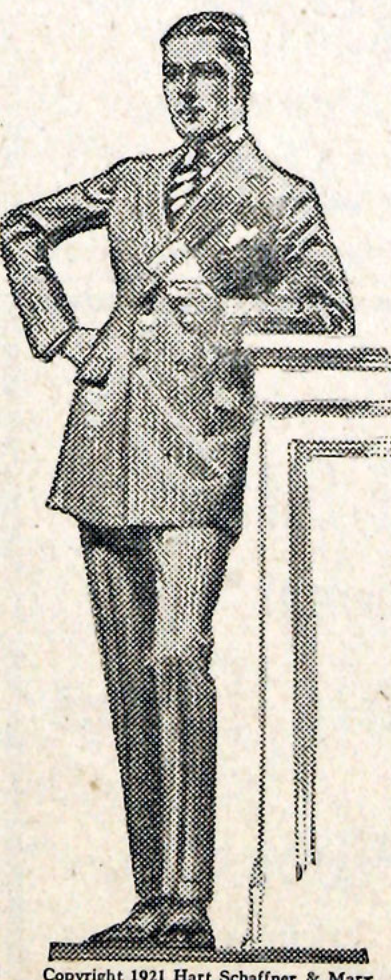
