Frosh Finals In Playshop

Eight freshmen will compete for cash prizes at the Freshman Speech contest tonight at 8 p.m. in the Playshop. Finalists from the elimination events last week are Barbara Bounds, Mark Funk, Jeff Hopper, Al Krall, Charleen Lindsley, John Robinson, Janet Schulmeister, and Todd Taylor.

First prize in the contest is an award of \$15; second prize, \$10; and third prize, \$5. Judges for the speaking contest, which is sponsored by the Philo-Franklin Union, will be Miss Adelaide DeMaison, English instructor in the Meadville High School, Mr. John Bair, psychology instructor at Allegheny, and Dr. Frederick Seeley, instructor of English at Allegheny.

A wide variety of subjects has been chosen by the competitors, including such topics as sex education, voting, Communism, civil rights, religion, and the American college system.

Lin, Dietsch Appear In Concert Monday

Jun-Ching Lin, pianist, and Robert Dietsch, tenor, are the featured artists in the student recital, Monday, May 24, at 8:15 p.m. in Ford Memorial chapel. This is the second in a series of concerts given by music students. A third recital will be given Tuesday, May 25.

Miss Lin, born in Shanghai, China, began her piano study at the age of seven at the college campus at Foochow where she was raised. Aside from interruptions by the evacuation of Foochow during the war, she has continued her study of piano, accompaniment, and ensemble work. In 1946, Miss Lin came to the United States and entered Allegheny, where she has studied piano and voice.

Her program for the 24th is highlighted by the Beethoven "Pathétique Sonata," "Berceuse" by Chopin, and "Arabesque" by Debussy.

Sharing the program with Miss Lin will be Robert Dietsch, tenor, from Warren, Pa. Mr. Dietsch has been active in a cappella choirs, church choirs, quartets, and solo work during high school and college. While attending Allegheny, he has been a member of the Singers, the college band, and former student recitals.

His program includes selections by Arne, Handel, Scarlatti, in addition to "Wohin" by Schubert, "An die Nachtigall" by Brahms, and an old English carol, "Searching for Lambs," arranged by Goossens.

The third recital of the series, May 25, includes a group of solos by senior music student, Phoebe Nelms, and madrigals of the sixteenth century by the Music 6B class.

Participants from the music class are Richard Hartung, organist; Peter Albright, baritone; Joanne Fuerniss, mezzo soprano; Alma Alt, soprano; Frank Bakewell, baritone; Carol Hunt, mezzo soprano; and Lewis Hastings, baritone.

Navy Team Here For Air Recruits

A three man team of navy officers will meet Thursday, May 27, with senior men interested in the navy's plan of offering commissions as ensigns in naval aviation to a limited number of college graduates. The meeting will be in Bentley at 9:30 a.m.

This is a career program in which college men with degrees who are between the ages of 18 and 25 will be taken into the navy as commissioned officers. Flight training will be this spring at Pensacola, Florida. This will take from 18 to 24 months, after which the officer-pilots will join regular naval aviation units, shore based and carriers. Minimum starting pay is \$290 a month.

More details will be given by the team, who will also answer questions and help men fill out applications. Pamphlets and further information regarding this opportunity for commissions may be obtained at Dean Bostwick's office.

Hungerford Recalls Trip, Early Work as Cartoonist

"No one knows what I'm going to draw next and sometimes I don't even know myself", chuckled Mr. "Cy" Hungerford, discussing his daily task of cartooning for the Pittsburgh Post-Gazette, in a talk at Ford Memorial chapel last Friday, May 14.

He went on to say that every day he was faced with an empty square blocked out on a piece of white paper.

"I have all day to draw the cartoon, but it seems I never get started until an hour before the deadline".

Mr. Hungerford started cartooning at the age of fourteen when he began making chalkplates for a small newspaper in Parkersburg, West Virginia. During the 1920's, he was amusing the funny-paper fans with a comic-strip called "Snoodles" which was published in the Chicago Post-Gazette.

"The field of cartooning is a tough one to crack at this time", said Mr. Hungerford in warning to young perspective cartoonists. "Of course if one has talent, originality and stick-to-itiveness, he may be recognized in no time".

In a recent three-month trip to Europe with Paul Block, Jr., Pittsburgh-Post Gazette publisher, Mr. Hungerford described one of his in-

Rev. Dunlop New Religious Director

Reverend Ralph G. Dunlop, of the Methodist Church in Belleville, Michigan, has been appointed director of religious activities on the Allegheny campus by a student-faculty committee on religious life. He will assume his duties in September. Mr. Dunlop will act as a chaplain at Allegheny and will do some teaching work.

The new director received his B.A. degree from the University of Illinois in 1939 and earned his bachelor of divinity degree at Yale Divinity School in 1942.

Following this, he acted as associate minister and director of Christian education at the First Methodist church of Ann Arbor, Michigan. He then served as civilian chaplain with the army units at the University of Michigan for two years and as director of youth work in the Ann Arbor district of the Methodist church for three years.

Mr. Dunlop is married and has two young sons.

The committee, headed by Dr. Chester A. Darling, chose Mr. Dunlop from among six applicants. Dr. Irwin Beiler, Dr. John Cavelti, Dean J. L. Bostwick, and Dr. Frederick Steen represented the faculty on this committee. Student members were Virginia Claxton, Anne Hershey, Tom Fort, Frank Pollard, and Jonathan Sandburg.

Riding Show Set to go Sat.

The second annual riding exhibition will be held by the combined Boots and Saddles and Stirrup and Bit riding clubs on Saturday, May 22, at two o'clock at the stables on North Park street extension. Mr. Marlin Nicely will judge the show. Tickets are ten cents and may be purchased from any member of the two clubs.

Seven classes will be featured in the exhibition and first, second, and third place ribbons will be awarded in each group. The first event will be a novice class for those who have had one quarter of riding, followed by the Stirrup and Bit club class and a men's competition event.

Next events are the intermediate group and the open class. The open section is for both men and women who are not taking riding at the present time. A walk, trot, and canter will be required. Sign-up sheets have been posted on the bulletin boards in Brooks Hall and Montgomery gymnasium for those interested in the poen competition. Following the Boots and Saddles event is the championship class, made up of the first place winners from all divisions except the novice. The winner of this contest will be the champion of the riding show.

Two exhibition drill teams will complete the riding show. The first, a team of four, consists of June Iben, Nelda Tolley, Roberta Stewart, and Sylvia Thomas. Performing in the team of six are Zelma Pitt, Marcia Woodburn, Marilyn Ulman, Virginia Hawkey, Ellen O'Brien, and Jean Gillis.

Miss Hope Ayrault, of the women's physical education department, is the instructor of the two clubs, with Barbara Laffer assisting. Others responsible for the program are: general manager, Marcia Woodburn; grounds manager, Zelma Pitt; horses and tack, June Iben; tickets, Louise Church; numbers, Marilyn Ulman; and publicity, Virginia Hawkey.

Among other things this week, we have found one of the profoundest sentences in usage today. We garnered this gem from a book entitled, "Monetary Theory", by one George Halm. It goes like this:

Payment systems which imply the temporary or permanent stabilization of the exchange rate without restricting the free market **confine** the equilibrating function of the exchange rate to that moderate range which is permitted between the gold points and, beyond that, **replace** the equilibrating function of the exchange rate by the mechanism of varying the volume of monetary circulation in the process of sales and purchases of foreign exchange or gold monetary authority, the sales being limited by the potential exhaustion of the reserves.

This sentence is interesting, not only for its off-tangent thought but for its construction. Majors in Banking Economics take note.

Berner, Main Strong Contenders; Wernermen Absorb 98-38 Defeat

The annual Tri-State District Track Meet will be held Saturday, May 22, at Slippery Rock. Coach Al Werner is priming his athletes for the meet, which should present conclusive evidence as to whether Allegheny's track team is as bad as its record indicates.

George Main has an excellent chance of earning five points for the Gators by copping a first in the Discus Throw. Paul Berner, in the Broad Jump event, should at least be able to equal the third place he took last year. Other hopes are Zack Taylor in the 120-yard low hurdles, Virgil "Nature Boy" Sayre in the Javelin Throw, John Kelley in the dashes, and George Mulfinger in the Mile Run.

Last year, West Virginia University netted enough counters to lead the field of seven in the District Meet. Allegheny was an ignoble sixth with only two thirds for four points.

Awards for win, place, and show in each event will be gold, silver and bronze medals respectively.

GROVERS JOLT THINCLADS, 98 TO 38

On Saturday, the Gator thinclads travelled to Grove City, where they sustained their third defeat of the year, a 98-38 runaway. It was the eighth consecutive time that Al Werner's athletes have been beaten, including last year's oh-five record. The Grovers swept 12 firsts out of 15 events.

George Main triumphed for the third straight time in his specialty, the Discus Throw, with a heave of 125 feet, 8 inches. This was one of three dominations in the field events, since Allegheny was entirely unsuccessful in the Track Events. Paul Berner, sensational movie star of "Arabesque", won the broad jump with a 20 feet, 2 inch leap.

Berner, Christopherson, and Sullivan proved themselves superior to all opposing high jumpers by soaring five feet, ten inches to tie for first place.

Besides these three firsts, the Wernermen could cop only four seconds and seven thirds. John "Always-a-bridesmaid-never-a-bride" Kelley, the man who runs on 10% speed and 90% spirit, added to his total of second places with one in the 100-yard dash and another in the 220-yard dash. Zack Taylor came just that close in the 120-yard high hurdles, as did Mulfinger in the mile run.

Another unsuccessful pair of scores was recorded in the annals of Allegheny baseball, as Bob Garbark's hitless, fieldless wonders received their fourth setback of the season and their eleventh in twelve games since the sport was reinstated last year.

The baseball team faces a rigorous schedule this week, clashing five times in eight days, barring rain, which is impossible to do in Western Pennsylvania. Yesterday the Gators met Oberlin, where Bill "Zeke" Porterfield was slated to pitch. Thursday they tangle with unbeaten Slippery Rock, and Saturday they are hosts to a strong Geneva team at Athletic Park.

Monday, the 24th, the home of the Pittsburgh (sometimes correctly mispronounced "Pathetic") Pirates will be swarming with Gators and Duquesne Dukes. Let's hope we can change "Greenberg Gardens" into "Porterfield Paradise" or "Garbark Graveyard".

Western Reserve combined seven Gator errors with ten solid hits to score twelve runs and a decisive victory on Tuesday. Doug Benson, Dave McMahon, and Ralph Ketcham toiled for Allegheny. Of these three, only Ketcham was reasonably effective. He relieved McMahon, who had walked four successive men, and held the Ohioans to three unearned runs for three and one-third innings.

The Hilltoppers showed signs of recovery in the fifth frame when, trailing 6-2, they bunched a single, a hit batsman, a base on balls, an error, and a ground out for three tallies. In the previous inning, Frank Fuhrer had doubled off the right fielder's leg to score Bob Betz. After the fifth, however, McMahon's splurge of wildness brought in the deciding runs of the contest.

Four days later it was the same story, except with intensification. Sixteen hits, including a double and triple, were the product of Rochester's offensive efforts. Coupled with six Allegheny misplays and eight bases on balls, the Western New Yorkers meted out a 17-8 punishment.

contained the news that I had an
audience with Pope Pious, XII. At

Vatican. I was finally seated in an
impressive chamber. Soon the door
opened and an elderly man dressed
in white robes entered. It was the
Pope. I genuflected. Then he began
talking. The Pope asked me if I was
married (he always asks that ques-
tion) and I replied, 'Yes'. Then he
asked if there were any children and
I replied, 'No, but I have a dog'.
The audience ended shortly after
that and I might add that I got lost
in the Vatican on my way out".
