At 5:30 Tuesday morning, April 7, fourteen freshman women were tapped as Cwens.

New Cwens are Barb Barclay, Lynne Carrington, Fran Egbert, Nancy Fahnestock, Marian Frame, Sue Graham, Sue Johnson, Marla Lunden, Ellen McKee, Maya Monsour, Gale Scholes, Carol Soars, Beth Sutherland, and Barb Sweeney. These girls were chosen by an election board from nominations by freshman women, present Cwens, and a committee of faculty members and student leaders who have contact with freshman women.

The National Society of Cwens was founded at the University of

Pittsburgh in 1922 and now includes 14 active chapters. The Epsilon Chapter was founded here at Allegheny on May 10, 1927. The purpose is to "... foster leadership, fellowship, and scholarship among women of the sophomore class, to promote leadership among freshmen women, and to serve or promote the interests of the college or university in every way possible." Susan Dougall, president of the Allegheny Chapter in 1952, is now National Editor of the Cwen magazine.

After being tapped, the Cwens ran through the halls of Brooks and then serenaded the sleepy inmates of Cafilisch.

Greek Week Closes With Eli's Chosen Six

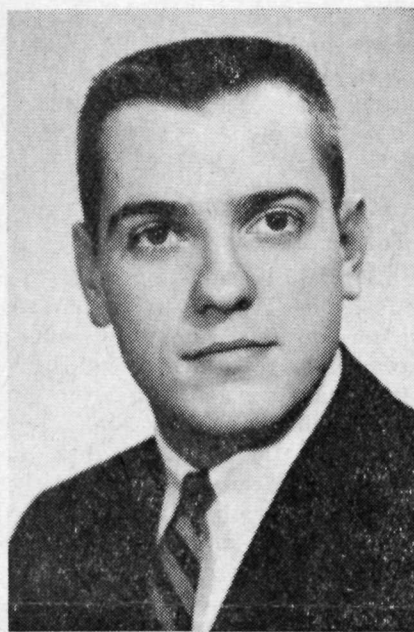

Well-Known Newspaperman To Speak At Coffee Hours

On April 13 and 14, Dwight E. Sargent, Editorial Page Director of the Portland, Maine newspapers—the **Press Herald**, the **Evening Express**, and the **Sunday Telegram**—will speak during coffee hours at the College Union.

On April 13, at 3:30 p.m. in the North Lounge, the theme will be "A Newspaper Man Speaks on his Profession", and on April 14 at 4:00 p.m., the topic will be "A Newspaper Man Speaks as a World Observer." Each of the sessions will involve opening remarks of 15-20 minutes, followed by 35-40 minutes of questions and answers.

A former Associated Press reporter, Sargent worked for several New England newspapers before entering military service in World War II.

In 1957 Sargent made a trip around the world. "My mission was simply to do a job of reporting and interpreting for my newspapers, and to gain background for future use," he says of that trip. "I wrote seven columns a week; visited about 20 countries. The journey included

Barb Meddock, the new executive secretary, is a psychology major from Oil City, Pennsylvania.

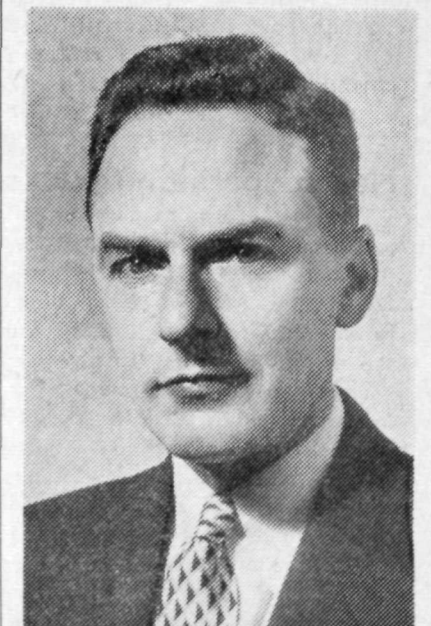

- Editorials -

The recent concert by the Pittsburgh Symphony Orchestra had one absentee — the apathetic Allegheny student. The reception given to the orchestra showed an eagerness and enthusiasm rarely apparent in responses to concerts.

An appreciation of fine music was shown by the large attendance of Alleghenians. There was also the personal benefit of attending — that of having a culturally rewarding experience and realizing the high attainment of others.

Because of the wholehearted response we suggest that another program of similar calibre be scheduled for next year for the student body.

We extend a sincere "thank you," not only to the people who made this concert possible, but also to the students who were, in great part, responsible for its success.

* * * * *

Recent ASG elections have created a greater awareness among students that the student government on our campus is not accomplishing all that it could or should. This is not a healthy situation when it is realized that government serves an important function on a college campus.

It must be a leader toward which all students can look and on which they can depend. It must also serve as an important link between faculty, administration and students. In short, it is a unifying and administrative organization for the entire community.

The complacent attitude of students toward ASG has manifested itself in many ways. It is not unusual for the elected ASG representative's job to be considered as "getting stuck." In turn, this attitude is reflected in meetings by dull acceptance of many matters which should be thought out and discussed more thoroughly and intelligently. When ASG business finally gets back to groups it is often passed over as a mere matter of formality. There is a sad lack of active discussion and new ideas brought forth by students.

The spirit exhibited at elections is unhappily noted. There was a reluctance, not only toward running for offices, but toward the whole election in general. For the few who attended the campaign speeches, it was almost more bother than it was worth for candidates to present their platforms. The slow trickle of applications for offices also deserves mention as a manifestation of lack of interest.

Is the government being truly representative of the students? Is it taking responsibility for matters falling within its jurisdiction? Is it creating an awareness of significant matters through a well-informed student body? In light of the aforementioned situations, apparently not—at least, not nearly to the degree possible.

We feel that the core of the problem is the lack of understanding of students' needs and interests, coupled with the failure to meet these needs. At present, there is a glaring gap between the government and the students, to the detriment of both.

What can be done? Generally, several basic factors need to be incorporated to a greater degree in student government and several other goals need to be achieved:

- a more realistic outlook and approach;
- understanding of campus situations and of people;
- down-to-earth practicality;
- cooperation between all facets of the community;
- concrete and constructive actions;
- acceptance of responsibilities and carrying them out;
- evaluation of the present system;
- exploring the possibilities of each office, committee and part of the government;
- more specific delegation of duties to avoid inconsistencies.

The platforms presented by the newly elected ASG officers stated many ideas and goals which could lead to more effective and dynamic government, if they are carried out. They have a great responsibility now to bring the government and student body closer together, for the mutual benefits that can be realized.

We wish them luck as they endeavor to achieve their goals.

Letters . . .

To the Editor:

Several recent issues of The Meadville Tribune have contained letters to the editor and editorial comment on the question of the introduction of a kindergarten into the Meadville public school system. Basically, the discussion has centered on Meadville's "progressiveness" in light of the School Board's rejection of a kindergarten program for the coming year.

One argument which has been advanced in support of the School Board's action is particularly significant for Alleghenians. This argument cites local support of the current Allegheny fund drive as evidence of Meadville's progressiveness and, inferentially, as proof that Meadville need not institute a kindergarten to justify that progressiveness.

It seems extremely unfortunate to me that Allegheny's fund raising campaign should be used in an argument opposing the establishment of a public kindergarten for Meadville children. The effect of this situation is to attribute a certain amount of blame to the College for the city's failure to institute a kindergarten. In other words, the impression is given that Meadville has exhausted its "progressive" resources on the College and, as a result, does not have the capacity to begin a kindergarten program at present.

Certainly Allegheny is not opposed to the formation of a kindergarten in Meadville. Several members of our faculty have given strong, vocal support to public kindergarten movement. It seems likely that few, if any, of the faculty and administration are opposed to such an innovation. So far as the student body is concerned, that matter has not been of particular interest, perhaps due to the fact that few of our students have children who might be involved. Discounting this lack of student interest, however, the consensus on campus seems to favor a public kindergarten. This is why it is singularly absurd that the college's name has been used in a justification for not having a kindergarten.

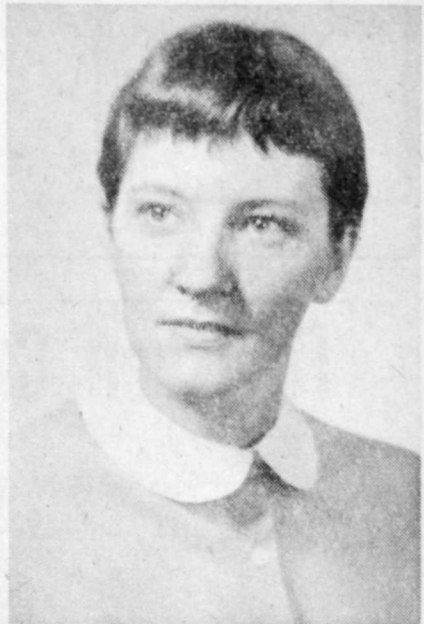
The situation is even further complicated by the fact that important people who have opposed the immediate establishment of a kindergarten are the very people upon whom the success of the Allegheny fund drive depends. This circumstance leads one to ask: has Allegheny been compromised? Has Allegheny's name been used to support a position that the college, on the

Comedy, "No Time For Sergeants" To Be Presented By Playshop

An uproarious tale of how two draftees disrupt an entire Air Force Base by being insufferably dutiful and obedient, will be the Allegheny Playshop's next production, the famous Broadway hit, "No Time for Sergeants." This hilarious comedy by Ira Levin, adapted from the best-selling novel of the same name by Mac Human, will be presented April 22 through 25.

The comedy about a guileless southern hillbilly, whose induction into the Air Force almost wrecks that revered institution, has been recognized as one of the outstanding comedy successes of the mid-twentieth century American stage since it opened on Broadway in the fall of 1955. It drew throngs to this performance for an even hundred weeks, and broke box office records in 118 other cities up and down America when it toured by professional companies.

Will Stockdale, played by David Ottey, and his buddy, played by Rod Anderson, are assigned to the Air Force and then shipped off to a training camp under the leadership of a mean ROTC graduate. The core of the play lies in the irresistible idea of the conflict between the two recruits who possess the qualities of good will, non-violent resistance and a heartfelt desire to obey all orders literally to sergeants who have never heard of anything but perverse, cunning recruits whose main interest is to evade orders and resist authority. The two inductees, who might be right from Al Capp's Dogpatch and who have the willingness to treat officers and sergeants as life friends, shake military life to the fourth and fifth echelons. The Air Force goes rapidly to pieces, but of course Will and his friend remain undestructible and completely flabbergasted. One of the most risible episodes in his brush with the post's psychiatrist, in which his ingenious answer to

the stock questions are almost the cause for the dementia on the part of the skull specialist.

In the second act the well-meaning hillbilly recruit is found in a roistering scene on a training flight that comes afoul of an atomic bomb test through the burlesque behavior of the slumbering pilots, unheeded navigator, and amateur radio control men aboard. But even this doesn't rid the Air Force of Will and his buddy. However, it does nearly ruin a general who awards the pair Air Medals posthumously, only to find them turning up at the ceremony, like Tom Sawyer at his own funeral. The general has to resort to a anti-regulation trade of the two recruits to the Infantry in a ceremony on a dark night deep in the forest, to the accompaniment of "The Stars and Stripes Forever."

The warmth and humanity of Will Stockdale in "No Time for Sergeants" have already elevated him to a position of being nearly as classic a figure as Tom Sawyer himself. On his tour of military duty, Will maintains a sturdy confidence in his government, pours a molasses-thick southern accent over a crisply organized society, slowing it down and snarling it up, and he becomes a character of appalling splendor.

In the thirty character cast, Nels Julius will have the central role of the sergeant who is the victim of the young inductees, played by Ottey and Anderson. Douglas Pickering and John Seybold are cast as two generals vanquished by the pair, and Lt. Maurice Stack will portray the ROTC graduate. Settings, which range from the exterior and interior of an airplane to a parachute jump and an assortment of barracks-rooms, are under the direction of Graham Gloster Bird. Over-all direction is in the hands of John Hulbert.

whole, would not itself support, simply because the college is in no position to speak up? I should certainly hope that this is not the case.

The scope of Allegheny's involvement in this local issue seems to require certain official actions. First, it should be made known that Allegheny will attempt to resolve any economic barriers to the formation of a Meadville kindergarten resulting from the fund drive. This will serve two functions: 1. It will absolve Allegheny from any false responsibility for the rejection of a kindergarten program. 2. It will place the kindergarten issue in such a position as to enable the people of Meadville to decide on the actual merits and disadvantages of a kindergarten.

The second thing which ought to be done is the preparation of professional opinions on the kindergarten question, pro and con, by our faculty and administrators. The interests of the College would be concretely served by a clear-cut definition of the positions taken by the faculty and administration, mainly because no misinterpretations would be possible. The interests of Meadville would be served through the provision of a body of sound and informed judgment to which the City might refer.

Naturally a student opinion would be desirable if there is sufficient interest to warrant it.

The actions outlined above would serve to extricate Allegheny from what is at present a rather delicate issue of intellectual honesty. As a student, parent and prospective teacher, I urge that something along these lines be done.

Pine Room Exhibit Features Woodcuts Of Antonio Frasconi

Lending to the Pine Room this month their warmth and vitality are the woodcuts of the Uruguayan artist, Antonio Frasconi. These prints are both colorful and poetic. He treats familiar scenes with imagination and feeling.

In the May, 1957, issue of *Americas* is an article which treats the development of Frasconi's work and his influence with great detail. His early interest in art began and developed in Montevideo, capitol of Uruguay. At the Fine Arts Club he learned the techniques of wood-engraving, but the orientation of his work came years later. In 1945, he studied under Yasuo Kuniyoshi at the Art Students League, and later at the New Work School for Social Research.

He was influenced by the little-known woodcuts of Gauguin, printed in the Noa-Noa book which is in the Treasury Room of our library, and by the theories of Torres Garcia, also a Uruguayan artist.

In his early work was a violent reaction to social injustice. With its crowded composition and heavy line, it related very closely to Ger-

Peterson Named Undergrad Head Of Development Program

W. Peterson, '59 pre-med, will head the undergraduate phase of the current "Dimensions of Greatness" development fund drive, according to an announcement early this week by the ASG.

Peterson, who expects to organize the campaign on a class basis, has already met with the IFC and a group of potential chairmen and vice-chairmen, and organizational work leading to enlistment of solicitors is proceeding.

The undergraduate division will be a unit of the over-all effort that includes an alumni division headed by Dr. Paul A. Siple, '32, the antarctic scientist; the Meadville "hometown" campaign; regional groups that will cover the United States; a Faculty-Administration drive directed by Dr. Richard L. Brown; and special presentations to corporations and foundations.

Peterson says that the response in Meadville, where approximately \$450,000 was raised in a whirlwind campaign in late February and early March, should be an inspiration to undergraduate workers. He also cites the more than \$21,000 in faculty and administration gifts as indicative of the sincere support the College is receiving.

Undergraduate chairmen and vice-chairmen held a briefing session yesterday afternoon at which sample workers' kits were explained and discussed.

The projects about which Miss Jallie will be speaking may be divided into four categories: Work Camps, Community Service in the United States and Latin America, Institutional Service, and Internes in Industry. 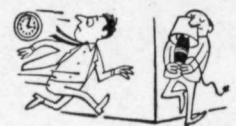

With a comeback by Van Handel and some steady hitting by the freshmen, the team could improve on its 1958 record of 3 wins, 6 losses.

Allegheny 2nd In PAC; Has 31 Coming Events

Allegheny College, currently in second place to Case Institute of Technology in the Presidents' Athletic Conference all-sports competition, opens a 49-event spring sports schedule Tuesday, April 14, when Slippery Rock's baseball team appears in Meadville in a non-conference encounter.

Thirty-one of the contests will be with PAC opponents. Three of these are championship tournaments in track, golf, and tennis.

The slate lists 18 baseball games, 13 tennis matches, 7 track meets, and 8 golf dates. Three of the track meets and four golf outings are triangular affairs.

The tennis team, coached by athletic director H. P. Way, 10-1 last year and winner of 57 out of 63 team matches over a seven year span, lost only the number 2 singles player, but picked up Howie Borokove, undefeated two years ago, who returns following Army service and David Macky of Paget, Bermuda, who both add considerable power. The golf team, winner of the 11-team Allegheny Invitational Tournament last spring, has also added strength.

man Expressionism. His later work is more spacious, serene, and fanciful. This change began when living in Vermont. He found that the farmers' life there is quite easy and ordered as compared to that of the Uruguayan field worker.

He later moved to New York, where he has found many subjects closely related to his expressive interests, as seen in the series of the Fulton Fish Market: "Night Work," "Monterey Pier," "Unloading the Fish," and "Trawling," which reflect his interest in the waterfront.

Woodblock printing is a difficult and often limiting medium, but Frasconi has, with remarkable inventiveness and imagination, produced prints that are rich, colorful, and varied. He uses the grain and knots of the wood, and screen and saw marks to create rich textures. In "The Storm is Coming," an exciting print with intense color, he has used wire mesh imbedded in the wood to achieve a linear pattern throughout. He does all his work by hand, using oils instead of printing inks, transferring the colors from block to print with the back of a spoon.

Many people will find an honesty and a human warmth about his work. It is his belief that, "Man, the landscape, and the machine surround us; in representing them, I think it best not just to reproduce the forms, but to show them as they really are, functioning, expressing their capacities — which is where their beauty lies. This beauty should be respected and observed from all angles without formation of judgments on it . . . Art has to be a reflection of our life . . . the most important thing is that the artist should know himself and know how to use the medium he has chosen."

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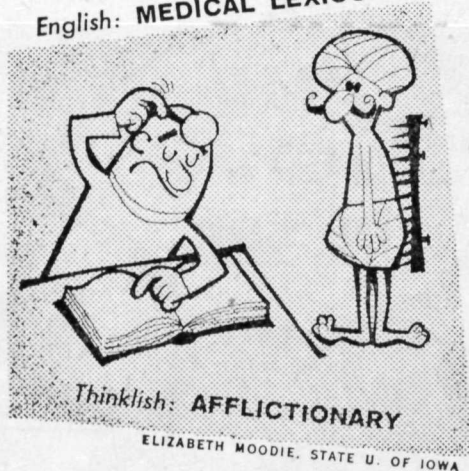
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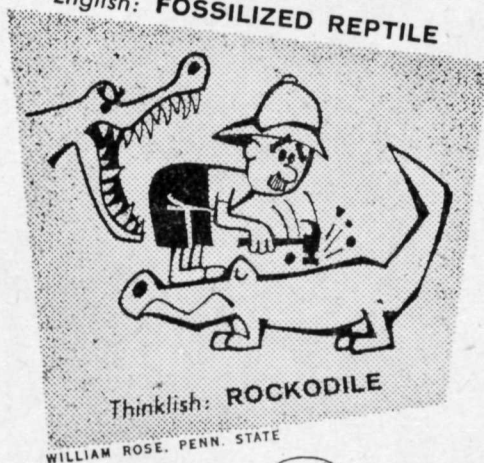

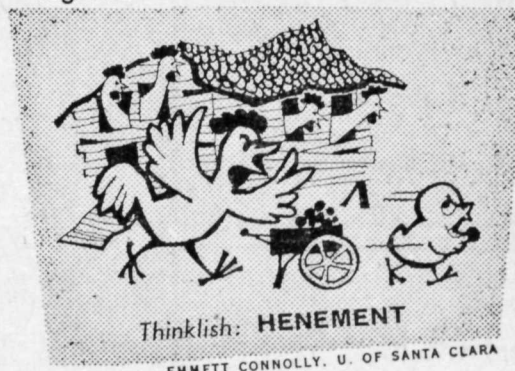
