Splendid Program Prepared for Commencing Week

Commencement week begins tomorrow and the exercises continue until Wednesday evening. The usual large number of visitors and alumni are present and more are arriving constantly. A brief description of the events of the week is given below:

Sunday.

The exercises of Commencement week begin tomorrow morning with the Baccalaureate Sermon by Dr. Crawford in the Stone church. In previous years Dr. Crawford has always been at his best on this occasion and the message this year will be just as inspiring and helpful.

One of the most revered traditions of commencement is the College Love Feast which will be led by the venerable Dr. Hammett. Dr. Hammett has led this service for many years and has always made it a memorable event. The annual address before the two Christian Associations will be delivered in the evening by Dr. A. M. Courtenay. As an able platform speaker with a special message to young people, Dr. Courtenay is pre-eminent.

Monday.

Monday morning at ten o'clock, the alumni interest will be focused on the preliminaries of the Alumni Tennis Tournament. For a number of years this has proved one of the most enjoyable events of the week. Not only is the rivalry among the "old boys" keen and exciting but an informal reunion takes place and many old friendships are renewed. The finals will be played Tuesday morning at nine.

The Phi Beta Kappa Society will hold its ninth annual meeting at 4 o'clock, when the newly elected members will be initiated. One of the most notable features of the entire week will be the Phi Beta Kappa anniversary address to be delivered in the chapel at 7:45 by Professor J. Lawrence Laughlin, of the University of Chicago. Professor Laughlin was Roosevelt Exchange Professor at the University of Berlin in 1903, and was accorded the unusual privilege of an extended interview with the Emperor. His subject will deal with the industrial expansion of Germany. He is a pleasing speaker who has become famous in educational circles.

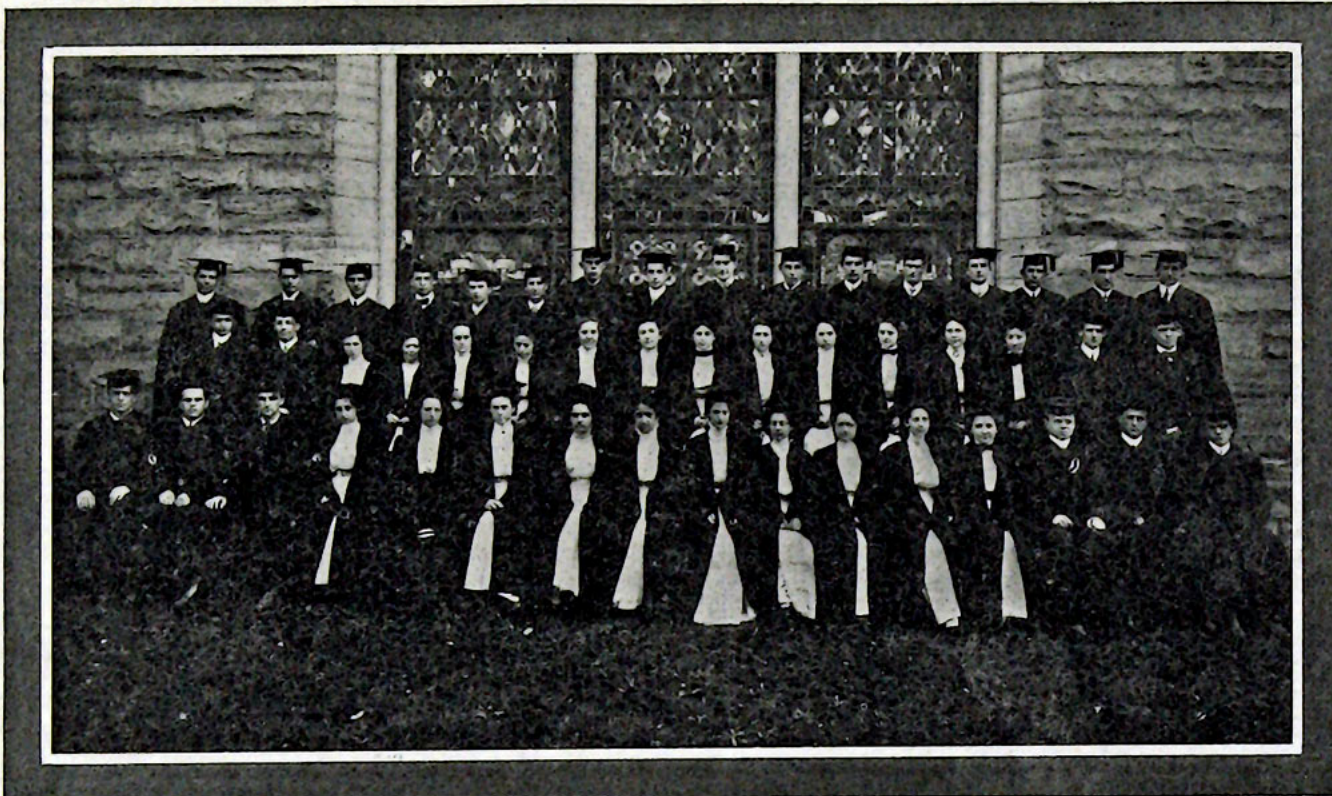
President Crawford's reception at Cochran Hall will follow the address. This is an annual affair which is given to the alumni, college officers, graduates and especially invited friends of the college.

Moving Up Day

Splendid Program Makes the Day a Memorable One

On Friday, June 10th, all Allegheny classes were excused for the celebration of Moving Up Day, when each class took the seats of the class ahead. The chapel services were held at nine o'clock, instead of the regular time, and following the ritual service, the spring athletic teams were given their A's. Professor Dutton spoke briefly to each team. Track A's were presented to the following men: Hilborn, Hines, Croasmun, Stidger, Van Horn, Kulp, Ball, Ballinger, Gibbs, Barstow, Hofelt, Brigham, Kennedy, Dotterrer, Whitney, Winn, De Young, Cole. Grant, Lore and Manager David. Another feature of the morning was the presentation of the cups to the Freshman class and to Mr. Stidger for work in the interclass meet.

At Chapel

The usual Moving Up Day exercises were then in order. Professor Dutton addressed the Seniors and, in a fine address, dismissed them from further chapel attendance. He gave them some good advice regarding their work in the world.

As soon as the Seniors had taken their places in the balcony, J. F. Sayre, '11, petitioned the Seniors for the seats just vacated by them. It was a clever little speech in which he reminded the Seniors of the many defeats suffered at the hands of their contemporaries, the Juniors, and showed how, with the stars in their class they were competent to fill the seats. J. R. Gahan, '10, replied to the request of the Juniors. He said that his class was not like Halley's comet; that they would hit the world in less than seventy-five years and hit it hard. He said the Juniors might have the seats since they were through with them.

As soon as the Juniors had taken the Senior seats, W. A. Hill, '12, petitioned for the Junior seats. The request was granted by Miss Una Duffy, '11. The Freshman request was made by S. T. Perley and responded to by Miss Marian Thomas, '12.

Following the chapel exercises the parade formed at once. Much originality was seen in the "stunts." The Senior girls led the parade, riding in a carriage, followed by the men of the class. The Juniors, dressed in their white caps and gowns were next with the girls riding in automobiles. The Sophomore girls rode in a tallyho decorated in the class colors, while a float similarly decorated accommodated the Freshmen girls. The individual costumes were attractive. Nearly every Sophomore and Freshman was ornamented. The one attracting the most attention, perhaps, was the characterization of Adam and Eve, by two Freshmen.

W. Pa. Victory

Allegheny Champions in Track Event at Washington, Pa.

Every loyal Alleghenian rejoiced Saturday evening, June 4th, when the Bentley bell rang out the news that Allegheny had won the big intercollegiate meet at Washington. The news had been telegraphed to Dr. Ling by Ray Drum, ex-'10, that Allegheny had taken first place, having defeated Washington-Jefferson by 5 1-2 points. Captain Hines a little later received a telegram of congratulation from the team.

This meet closed the track season for the year, a season which has brought nothing but victory to Allegheny. On May 14 the first meet of the year was held in Athletic Park with Grove City. Allegheny easily won 88 to 29, the visitors taking but one first place, that in the two mile run. On May 21 Rochester came here with the expectation of repeating their victory of two years ago, but they returned disappointed, the points being 66 to 46 in favor of Allegheny. It was feared for a time, however, that the team would be unable to take the trip to Washington because of lack of money, but through the unceasing efforts of Captain Hines and Manager Cole, the necessary amount was raised and the team was given the trip which their consistent work this spring merited.

The twelve members of the team with Manager Cole, Coach Stewart, and Sam Rossiter left Meadville at 2:30 o'clock for Pittsburg via Linesville. Pittsburg was reached at 5:50 and after a few minutes' wait the train was boarded for Washington, which was reached at 7:25 that evening. The Westminster team got on at New Castle and finished the journey with the Allegheny team.

Before the meet began Captain Chalfant of Washington-Jefferson protested Stidger and Hilborn in the high jump, claiming that a man could take part only in the events in which he had been entered. Referee Boren decided to allow them to enter and at 2:30 the meet began.

W. and J. has too good a standing in Western Pennsylvania to risk adding the term "bad losers" to its record. As a contrast, we refer to the Rochester and Grove City letters published in the last Campus.

CHANGED HIS MIND

When the Campus secured the news regarding Dr. Buttrick's visit, he had not seen either the Library or the Museum, but only the figures giving their valuation. It was at this time that he was "amused" by the seemingly too high estimates, as stated in a previous issue of the Campus. THOSE ATHLETIC ELECTIONS.

During the past school year there have been two significant advances in bettering college politics. One is the new Kaldron constitution; the other the "Campus" and "Lit" managership changes. Common sense has done what red fire and knocking could not and did not do. There is here a suggestion as to the proper method to use next year.

An attempt has been made to show the student body that our present athletic elections are not conducted in the right way. But a change must be desired before a change can come.

An athletic manager should unquestionably be the best man in school for the place. If that man happens to be in a fraternity, that fraternity has a right to claim the honor. Otherwise, no fraternity should want it or be willing to accept it. An athletic managership ought to indicate ability on the part of the man so honored, and if ability is not the test in election, that which makes a managership an honor is not present.

We hope that the athletic association will be ready to make the change next fall. We are still looking for the "man with the workable plan."

THE NEW RUSTIC BRIDGE

The dream of many friends of the college is being realized in the building of the rustic bridge over the campus ravine. Work is under way, and the structure will be completed before commencement.

The bridge is the gift of Mrs. Cochran, who has done so much for Allegheny. It grows out of a desire to make the lower half of the campus as beautiful as the upper half. The bridge is located between two large trees and is built through the branches. It is almost in a direct line with Wilcox and the Observatory. Its location makes it both useful and artistic.

There are four bents and five spans, the total length being ninety-nine feet two inches. The logs used in the construction are unhewn, giving the desired rustic effect. The braces are worked in harmoniously. The floor is to be built of two inch plank. The railing is made of poles, crossed at intervals. It is twenty feet above the level of the stream.

The handling of the timbers was rather difficult because of the steep sides of the ravine, and was watched with interest by the students.

Has Been in Northern Europe for Several Weeks

President Crawford arrived in Meadville Wednesday and immediately took charge of the arrangements for commencement. He has been much benefitted by his rest and is ready for the strenuous work of raising the \$400,000 required to secure the \$100,000 gift and complete the million dollar endowment. The excellent condition of the college affairs was very gratifying to Dr. Crawford and he expressed himself as particularly delighted with the outcome of spring athletics. The record of the track team he characterized as "wonderful."

Since the first of May, Dr. Crawford and Mrs. Crawford have been touring northern Europe. Leaving Italy, they spent some little time in the Tyrol enjoying the grandeur of the Austrian Alps. From there they went to Innsbruck and on to Munich. They reached Oberammergau in time to see the first performance of the Passion Play. While there they were entertained in the home of the famous Antoine Lang, who plays the part of Christ.

Switzerland was next visited, brief stops being made at Bern and Geneva. A visit of a week was made at Paris before Dr. and Mrs. Crawford crossed over to London. During the ten days spent in London, Bishop Thoburn, President Arter, of the Trustees, and Dr. Lockwood were all met. On June 4th, the return ocean trip began on the liner Minneapolis.

An ovation was tendered Dr. Crawford by the men of Cochran Hall at dinner time yesterday. In response to insistent calls for a speech, he expressed his pleasure at being able to enjoy the fellowship of the men once more.

"I WILL" CLUB

Croasmun, Stidger and Hilborn First Members of New Organization

Allegheny's newest organization, one which is destined to play an important part in athletics, is the "I Will" Club. This club came as a result of the Washington track meet, and three men were chosen immediately. The idea was Coach Stewart's, and to him belongs the credit for the suggestion which promises to mean so much.

The "I Will" Club is formed for the purpose of encouraging athletes to put every ounce of effort in the work they are doing. When it has become evident that a man has done this, when beyond question he has done his utmost, membership is offered him. The idea is not to honor men so much for the number of points they make or for sensational playing but to prefer those who have done their best, even if the result has not been so sensational. So membership is probably the greatest honor which can come to an athlete at Allegheny.

The three members who now compose the club are D. F. Croasmun, '10, C. E. Hilborn, '11, and I. R. Stidger, '11. All these men were chosen for their record in track. Croasmun has been a member of the team for four years and was captain for two years. During this time he has won a score of medals for himself and many points for Allegheny. The Washington meet was his last college meet, and in it he won two firsts and ran in the relay. That he was entitled to membership and the presidency of the "I Will" Club was not questioned.
