SUZANNE KEENER SINGS TO DELIGHTED AUDIENCE

WELL CHOSEN PROGRAM GIVEN BY
METROPOLITAN COLORATURA

Entrancing her audience by her charming personality, enrapturing it with the nuances of her splendid voice, and delighting it with her whimsical mannerism, Suzanne Keener rendered the final number of the Allegheny concert series last evening in Ford Memorial Chapel. Supporting Miss Keener, as pianist, Mr. Earl Truxell, appeared for the second time at Allegheny.

The program for the evening was divided into five sections, Mr. Truxell alternating with Miss Keener. The opening number, "Voci di Primavera," by Strauss, won immediately for the artist the heart and interest of the audience.

Three pieces of varied beauty and charm made up the second number of Miss Keener's program. "Wind's in the South," by Scott, sung with fanciful loveliness, was the first of these. The second, "When Chloris Sleeps," by Homer Samuels, seemed to bring that peculiar charm of contented happiness, and its pensive-like redidion contrasted delightfully with the first number. With bursts of brilliant staccato, Miss Keener brought out the true coloratura qualities of her voice, and sang with exquisite perfectness, the "Nightingale and the Rose," by Saint-Saens.

Consummating her art with her skill, technique and talent, Miss Keener culminated her program with an interpretation of the "Mad Scene" from "Lucia." Singing with rare ability that portrayed the most intrinsic of her vocal qualities, she convinced her admirers that she is a virtual prima donna.

To each number the artist sang encores of scintillating melody, with archness of demeanor and demure coyness.

As toll to Miss Keener Mr. Truxell played two numbers. Among those of the first group was one of his own compositions, "Chantee Valse," which he rendered with a remarkable display of technique. Chopin, Rachmaninoff and Scott also featured in his program, which was produced with artistic ability and interpretation.

FACULTY CONTRIBUTE TO RELIGIOUS JOURNAL

"CHRISTIAN EDUCATION" CONTAINS TWO ARTICLES OF INTEREST TO ALLEGHENIANS

"Christian Education" for April 1923, includes among its contents two articles that are of special interest to Allegheny readers.

"The Biblical Material on Political Problems," by Dr. Irwin R. Beiler, present head of the Departments of Bible and of the Philosophy of Religion, is a treatise on the relation of religion to politics. It sets forth briefly the social aim of religion as revealed in the prophets and the life of Christ, and shows how observance of or failure to observe these truths resulted in political prosperity or else in unhappiness.

The other item, "Fundamentalism," was written by Dr. W. H. Wood, who was an active member of the faculty in 1914.

PRE-REGISTRATION OF STUDENTS IS REQUIRED

NEW PLAN WILL ELIMINATE US-
UAL CONGESTION AT FALL
REGISTRATION

In order that registration next fall may be completed as expeditiously as possible, the Registrar's office is requiring a preliminary enrollment of all students who expect to return.

All students, except seniors, are requested to consult their respective advisors concerning the courses which they wish to take next year. After consultation with his adviser, every student will be called into the office for a similar conference with the Dean after which the initial steps of enrollment will be made.

Conferences for juniors were completed last week; sophomores this week, and freshmen will be called in next week. This plan is being tried for two purposes. The primary reason is that in this way, the schedule of each student can be carefully supervised, and choice of courses will be made in accordance with requirements. A second reason is that, by completing preliminary registration now, the confusion and congestion which has heretofore accompanied enrollment in the fall can be largely eliminated. Anything that will improve the system of registration hitherto employed will be welcomed by both students and faculty.

GLEE CLUB TO GIVE DOWN TOWN CONCERT

FULL PROGRAM TO BE PRESENTED AT ACADEMY THEATRE

Another step towards the closer linking of the town and college will be taken, when the Allegheny College Glee Club will present their full program in the Academy theatre on May 24.

The Men's Glee Club is inaugurating this year a new custom in their appearance in a down-town concert. This will give those who failed to hear the organization at the home concert, a chance to hear an even more complete program. The price will be fifty cents. The same program as presented in Pittsburgh and Warren will be used at this concert which will include ensemble singing, solo selections, and orchestra numbers.

Preliminary to the concert, which will begin at 8:15, there will be a short motion picture program. The combination will make a varied and high class program of entertainment for the evening.

The management feels that the presentation of a down-town concert at popular prices will create a better spirit between the town and college as well as give the townspeople a chance to hear the finest collegiate musical organization that has existed in Meadville in many years.

A more definite announcement concerning the program will appear in next week's Campus.

R. P. LANE TO SPEAK HERE THURSDAY, MAY 24

HISTORY AND POLITICAL SCIENCE CLUB BRINGS NOTED SOCIAL SCIENTIST HERE

Mr. R. P. Lane, formerly European Director of the Junior American Red Cross and also a former professor of political science in the University of Michigan, will address an open meeting of the Allegheny College History and Political Science Club in Alden Hall on Thursday evening, May 24.

Mr. Lane comes to Allegheny under the auspices of the Institute of International Education. The subject of his lecture will be a discussion of some phase of the present complicated situation in European politics. The speaker has, by personal experience, gathered a great deal of information about international relationships in the course of several trips to Europe. The lecture will be free and open to the public.

ERIE ACADEMY HIGH WINS IN INTERSCHOLASTIC MEET

Nineteen High Schools Compete in Eighth Annual Field Day

The drenching rain, that fell continuously during the afternoon, and general inclement weather, reduced the gate attendance far below that expected. The team representing Academy High School of Erie splashed their way through the muck and mud covering Montgomery Field to the top of the large entry list and won the Allegheny College Plaque in the Eighth Annual Interscholastic Track and Field Meet held Saturday. Each event was thrillingly contested; the large entry list was fairly jammed with high school stars, so much so that no individual was able to canter easily and pluck from Benny Beisel one of the medals that he guarded closely. Medals were awarded to the winners of first, second and third positions. Academy, forced to its limit to garner 22 points, was closely pursued by South High of Youngstown, last year's victors, whose performers battled persistently throughout the program for the 21 counts credited to them. East High, Erie, and Rayn of Youngstown, harassed the leaders constantly, and finished third and fourth with 20 and 18 points respectively.

No records were established, due to the condition of the track more than anything else, but this must not detract from credit of the performers, for undoubtedly Allegheny has never witnessed more qualified high school athletes. Thomas, of Rayn High, copped the opening event when he stretched the tape after leading the race over the high hurdles. The mile, with its large list of entries, furnished the spectators with plenty of excitement, but it was the 600 yard novice race that took honors as the big hit of the day. Finkler, Academy star, won

the medal in this event after a thrilling dash down the home stretch to the tape. The 220, the last race on the program, vied with the novice affair as the piece de resistance of the fray. Stapel, who played a lone, yet conspicuous hand, in carrying Avalon's colors to the tape, added the first place ribbon of this event to the one he captured in the 100 earlier in the afternoon. McCoy, Wilkinsburg, Bell, the light-haired whirlwind from Erie Central, and McCracken, Coach Herb's brother, from Sewickley, all hounded the Avalon sprinter to the finish. Big Art Skelley assured Academy the plaque when he tossed the hammer for a first place and the appreciated five points.

Thomas, the Rayn wonder, took away the cup awarded high individual point man, on the merit of his 11 well earned counts. Stapel, Avalon, with firsts in the two dashes, hung up 10 points on his personal honors column.

Allegheny Chapter of Pi Delta Epsilon the National honorary journalistic fraternity, held its annual initiation banquet in the private dining room of Saegertown Inn last Wednesday evening, May 9, W. Melville Jones acting as toastmaster. At the initiation ceremony preceding the banquet the following six men were admitted to the Fraternity: Ralph H. Demmler, Clifton T. Little, Lloyd M. Shaffer, Merrill W. Doolittle, William J. Dale, and William A. Risher. President F. W. Hixson was the guest of honor and made the principle address of the evening. The other speakers were Dr. S. S. President Hixson spoke of the influence of Pi Delta Epsilon at Allegheny and the importance of journalism throughout the entire world at the present time. Mothers' Day was the theme of an inspiring talk given at chapel exercises by the Reverend H. H. Hough on Saturday, May 12. Mothers' Day was introduced in Philadelphia some seventeen years ago. A young woman having lost her mother chose a certain day in which to think of the one who had been so dear to her. The idea spread, and soon there was set aside one day in the year devoted to the appreciation of mothers. This is now generally known as Mothers' Day throughout the land.

The story was told of the angel who was sent to find the three most beautiful things on earth. The angel returned with what she considered to represent these three most beautiful things. They were a bunch of American beauty roses, a baby's smile, and a mother's love. Thus it was shown the place that is held by the love of a mother.

"College students," said Rev. Hough "should not forget in the enthusiasm, hurry, and bustle of the college life that back home is a mother who is exceedingly interested in them and their work. They should let this mother love and mother spirit be with them at all times and especially now due to the proximity of Mothers' Day."

COLLEGE SENDS DELEGATE TO I. N. A. CONVENTION

MR. M. W. JONES WILL REPRESENT ALLEGHENY AT HAVERTFORD GATHERING

Allegheny will be represented by Mr. M. W. Jones at the annual convention of the Intercollegiate Newspaper Association to be held at Haverford College, Friday and Saturday of this week.

The association is an active and influential organization which is of direct aid to the papers concerned. It includes the publications of the higher ranking institutions of the State, and it is a distinct means of recognition to be a member of the association. Allegheny was admitted last year, and since that time, has received many valuable suggestions from the I. N. A. The conventions are an important feature. The one this year will enact some special measures as to changes of organization and policy.

Y. M. C. A. HEARS MESSAGE FROM POPULAR ALUMNUS

JAMES O. RUSSELL, '21, SPEAKS ON "VISION OF VALUE"

With sincere and forceful words Mr. James O. Russell '21 gave an impressive talk on the "Two Vs" or the "Vision of Value" in the final meeting of the Y. M. C. A. held in the oratory of the chapel last Wednesday evening.

After the opening exercises, Mr. F. W. Mason, one of the delegates who attended the State Officers' Convention, presented a report of the sessions of the association. The most striking point, as observed by Mr. Mason, was the great similarity in the troubles and problems of the delegates. The same difficulties seemed to exist in all the institutions. Several speeches were delivered in the convention and plans were discussed for the coming year.

Following a solo by Mr. T. S. Baker, the speaker of the evening was introduced. His speech included the vision of value in ourselves, in others, and in God. In speaking of vision, we generally think of sight, and in mentioning value, we think of things worth while. In talking of the value of self we may seem to be egotistical, but it is only right and natural for us to be interested in our own welfare and progress. Every good and helpful act which we do for ourselves helps others just as every harmful deed injures every one to a certain extent. In doing ourselves injury we are pulling the rest down as in the case of the notorious family of "Jukes." In many cases the innocent must suffer for the guilty. Mr. Russell gave several vivid examples of people who were considered absolutely worthless as far as ever accomplishing any good in the world but who saw a vision of their value and entirely changed their course so as to be of some use to humanity. As a result he is a strong believer and supporter of conversion and thinks that it is more than a mere emotional reaction.

In discussing the vision of value in others, the speaker emphasized the lack of interest and feeling we have for our fellow men and stated that we should see the potential values in others. When there is no vision, people perish. In connection with this point, he told of an incident which had taken place between two captains of industry, one of them having offered scholarships in a university for the exploration of natural resources but had offered nothing in the way of human interest to his employees in the factory. When questioned by his friend, he did not know the name of one man among a large number of employees. This peculiar example shows our lack of the vision of value in others.

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A WORD IN TRIBUTE

WHAT OUR POLICY MUST BE

A college paper is confronted with the question of policy perhaps more definitely than any other journal. It cannot afford to be radical; but again, it cannot afford to be over-ridden with conservatism. And yet it certainly cannot afford to straddle the fence.

The policy of the Campus must be definite. If it can't have a mind of its own, it can't expect to wield much influence over its readers. In a college such as Allegheny where both radicalism and conservatism are each apt to be in the extreme, its publication must at all times seek to be a steady power between the two.

There are commendations to be expressed, evils to be denounced, suggestions to be made; all of these the Campus must take into consideration, regardless of the personal element involved. Its policy cannot be partisan. It cannot be compromised to the interests of a few.

THE INTERSCHOLASTIC MEET

Entertaining over one hundred and fifty students from almost twenty different high schools, Allegheny has had an unusual opportunity to do some advertising of the right sort. The interscholastic meet held here last Saturday has a potential value which cannot be measured in specific terms, but there is every reason to believe that the event represents a step forward for Allegheny.

Unfortunately some little dissatisfaction has been expressed by the chapter houses who assisted in caring for the guests. Some agreeable adjustment should be made to insure perfect cooperation between the college and fraternities in this instance.

UNIVERSITY OFFERS POLITICAL TRAINING

NEW YORK UNIVERSITY PREPARES MEN FOR GOVERNMENT OFFICES

American young men who look forward to careers as ambassadors, foreign ministers or other representatives of their government abroad may now be trained for such a career the same as for the law, medicine or any other profession, according to an announcement today by New York University. The announcement makes public the fact that scholarships established at New York University by the late Ambassador Frederick Courtland Penfield are now operative and will be awarded to candidates whose qualifications best indicate a fitness for careers in the foreign service.

Frederick Courtland Penfield died last summer after a long career in the diplomatic service which began in the consul general's office in Cairo and ended in Vienna as United States ambassador, where, through the trying period of the World War, he handled the interests, not only of his own country, but of half a dozen other powers at war with Austria. His experiences taught him that, while what is known as "shirt sleeves diplomacy" may serve very well on occasion, there is also need for the trained diplomat. This realization found expression in his will in a bequest of \$80,000 to New York University for the founding of what should be known as "Penfield Scholarships" for training American youth "in diplomacy, international affairs and belles-lettres."

OLD ALUMNUS WRITES LETTER TO CAMPUS

DR. J. N. PIERCE '57, STILL ACTIVE AS METHODIST PREACHER

Last week the Campus had the pleasure of receiving from Dr. J. N. Pierce, last living member of the class of '57, and one of the oldest living alumni, a letter in which he relates some of his personal history and achievements.

Dr. Pierce entered the ministry of the Methodist Church in 1859. He now resides at Clinton, Missouri, and is Dean of the St. Louis Conference, which he helped to organize fifty years ago. He built the Grand Avenue M. E. Church in Kansas City, and preached the first and last sermons in it with a period of forty-two years intervening. This church is famous for having produced Bishops.

Although crippled with rheumatism afflicted with impaired vision and hearing, this doughty veteran still preaches and takes an active interest in his people. Accompanying the letter was a copy of a high school paper which reported a speech made by Dr. Pierce before the students recently.

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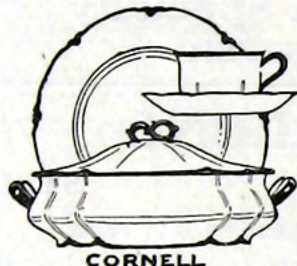
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QUILL CLUB

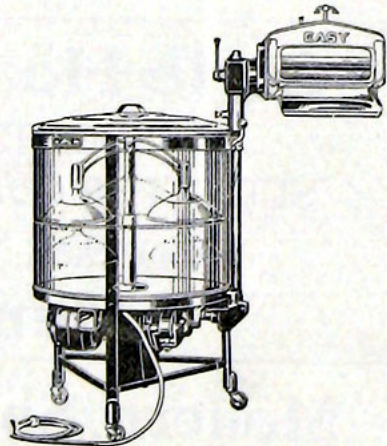

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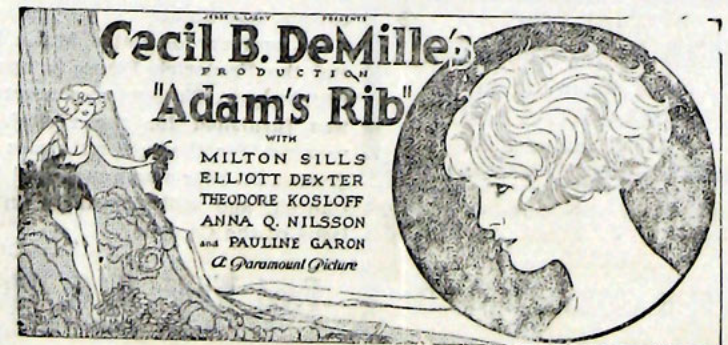
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TRACK SQUAD TO MEET GENEVA HERE SATURDAY
