

Browdie, Borrison Elected By Frosh As Class Leaders

Freshman Dave Browdie was elected president of his class in an election held Friday, November 8. Richard Borrison and Samuel Marcus were elected vice-president and treasurer, respectively.

A run-off election will be held Friday, November 15 for the office of secretary as a tie occurred between two candidates, Kay Naylor and Evelyn Vough. These results climaxed two weeks of work and campaigning on the part of the freshmen.

Election Planning

Dave Browdie began the planning in Freshman Cabinet by appointing a Freshman Elections Committee, which included Carol Hansen, Ron Steiner and Jerry Nichtern, chairman. This committee took charge of the regular elections, as well as the primaries in which freshmen chose candidates for the four offices.

The candidates then met together to draw up the rules for campaigning. They also gave speeches on Monday, November 4 in the Chapel, with each candidate speaking for three minutes on what their different offices involved and answering questions as to how they would fulfill the duties.

Officers Comment

The newly-elected officers intend to carry out their promises. President Dave Browdie remarked, "I will do my best to justify the confidence placed in me." (Continued on page 3)

College Foundation Meeting Attended By Pelletier, Sherman

President Lawrence L. Pelletier and Mr. Robert Sherman, assistant to the president, attended a meeting of the Foundation for Independent Colleges, Inc., in Philadelphia last week.

The Foundation was established to obtain financial assistance from business and industry for private colleges which receive no state or federal aid. Representatives of the colleges attending visited 18 firms seeking financial aid for 42 participating colleges in Pennsylvania including Allegheny.

The money which is collected each year is distributed among the colleges, sixty per cent being divided equally and forty per cent given in proportion to the full-time enrollment. (Continued on page 3)

Dean Of Law School To Speak Here Soon

Dean of the University of Pennsylvania Law School, Jefferson B. Fordham will speak to pre-law students in Quigley 124 Wednesday, November 20 at 3:00 p.m.

Beside answering law students' questions, Dean Fordham will discuss the Penn Law School Bulletin. Copies of the bulletin which contains pertinent information for all beginning law students will be available.

Dean Fordham was graduated from the University of North Carolina in 1926 and received his J.S.D. from Yale University. He is considered well-qualified in the field of law due to his position as Special Assistant to United States Secretary of Labor and as Counsel and Chief Bond Attorney for the Federal Public Works Administration.

He has been the Dean at Penn Law School since 1951 and teaches Legislation and Local Government Law. At present he is editor of the Municipal Law Service Letter. He has published a leading case book in the field of local government law.

"There isn't very much college-wide interest in debating because too much time and work are involved," said Sandy Benton, Debate Club president. "Most of our debaters are English, speech, or pre-law majors. However, anyone and everyone is welcome."

Meeting every other Tuesday with Mr. Nels Juleus, advisor, and Miss Lila Villa, assistant advisor, the Debate Club members discuss the current topic, problems related to it and various methods of debating. Those in the organization are Carl Bundy, Ron Olson, Mike Colera and Pierce Harper, freshmen; Dave Laughery, Sam Morneweck, Dick Butcher, Ken Berkman, John Ellis and Sandy Benton, sophomores; Sandy Romick, junior; and Jack Mandel, senior.

Playshop To Present Miller's "The Crucible"

"The Crucible" by Arthur Miller, Allegheny Playshop's second production of the 1957-1958 season, opens November 21, and runs through November 22 and 23, with the opening curtain at 8:20 p.m.

One of the most controversial plays of our time "The Crucible" is a melodramatic re-telling of the historic witchcraft trials in Salem, Mass., in 1692.

Miller has declared that every one of the play's 22 characters played a similar role in Salem when 19 persons were hanged as witches on hearsay, while others saved themselves only by "confessing" their having made pacts with the Devil.

Most of the play's attention is on the fate of a young farmer's wife, played by Marge Smock. She is irresponsibly accused of witchcraft by a wanton girl, portrayed by Norma Flinchbaugh, who hopes, with the wife out of the way, that she can have the farmer's affections.

The leading role in "The Crucible" will be played by Dave Bray. He plays the role of a colonial. (Continued on page 6)

Panhellenic Can Drive Planned For Next Sat.

Saturday, November 23, marks the date of the annual Panhellenic Can Drive. Sorority women will conduct a house-to-house canvass of Meadville, beginning at 1:00 p.m., in order to collect canned goods to be distributed to needy families by the Associated Charities.

This drive is part of Pan-Hell's program of altruistic projects in which all sororities can participate. It will be conducted on a competitive basis, the winning sorority being determined on the basis of the number of girls participating and the number of cans collected.

In 1955, the collection yielded 2,000 cans. In 1956, the number fell to 1,300. This year's goal has been set at 3,000.

Discrimination Policy Tabled Second Time

The policy statement on discrimination in campus organizations was tabled for the second week in succession at the regular meeting of the AUC Tuesday night. Reasons expressed for again tabling the statement were that further explanation and clarification of several of the sections were desired as well as more time for consideration of the matter among the various campus groups.

After discussion as to what action groups would be committing themselves if the resolution were passed, AUC President Tom Jones pointed out that neither the Board of Trustees nor Faculty could "take license" from this policy statement to take action concerning discrimination.

Prior to the retabling of the statement, the Council passed motions to delete the phrase "socio-economic" from both the statement itself and the accompanying mandates, which were also tabled. It was felt that there is no apparent discrimination on a socio-economic basis on the Allegheny campus, making the inclusion of this term unnecessary.

Discussion concerning the tabling of the mandates centered around the second mandate which directs the Human Relations Committee to study the current campus situation regarding discrimination. Linda Wilson, who assisted in formulating the policy statement, spoke in defense of the mandate. She said that the Human Relations Committee had been suggested to conduct this study as it was felt that the problem lay in their area of concern. However, no specific plan of study had been outlined for the committee.

Other business at the meeting included the approval of a Housing and Development Committee made up of Jim Mellinger, Chairman, John Arcuri, Marilyn Gittings, Ted Linn, Dorothy Squires and Karen Erickson. This committee is to meet with President Pelletier to discuss new campus housing developments.

Tom Jones also announced that the Erie Railroad was again offering reduced rates to 25 or more students traveling to the New York area for Thanksgiving vacation.

Discussion followed, during which NSA Coordinator Linda Wilson presented some of the benefits which she felt the Allegheny community derived from membership in NSA. She cited the extensive use of the NSA information files which are available to all students, as well as the Leadership Training Program held this fall, which had been set up through ideas obtained at the NSA national convention.

Miss Wilson also pointed out that the National Student Association is the largest student organization in the world and that foreign students Yukihome Hashizume and Paul Semogere are here at Allegheny. (Continued on page 3)

DEMOCRATIC PROCESS

The AUC has again tabled the policy statement on discrimination in campus organizations. Although approval by the AUC would have been desirable, an accomplishment which is just as important emerged from Tuesday's meeting—that being the use of the democratic process.

We believe that the representatives acted efficiently and democratically in taking the policy back to their respective organizations for discussion and approval. Because of the significance of the issue, the AUC rightly felt that a more thorough discussion should take place before the final vote.

The various groups, after their discussion, found that further discussion would be necessary before they could vote. Certain parts of the statement were questioned, and additional explanation of what the policy entailed was desired.

It must be pointed out, however, that the democratic process, if carried too far, can result in a chaos from which nothing will be accomplished. The AUC should also be conscious of this consequence. With too many amendments and an abundance of objections over a long period of time what may finally happen will be that the purpose of the entire discussion will be lost and the desired consequences will not be achieved. May we strongly suggest that the representatives keep in mind the goal of formulating a desirable policy so that discussion will not be unending and fruitless. Only from such intelligent discussion will a worthwhile policy evolve.

Doubtless, no statement will be formed with which everyone will be entirely agree, but a general agreement of a majority can be reached and should be strived for as long as no one is violently opposed.

When everyone feels that the policy statement has been thorough-

ly discussed and amended, then a vote should be taken. The final statement would be one that the student body would back as a satisfactory representation of their opinions.

Another point that needs to be brought out is that a policy statement of this type need not commit the groups in any way but merely states the students' policy on discrimination.

Finally—the use of democratic process as exhibited by the representatives is an accomplishment not always achieved. How much more could AUC achieve if this process were employed more often?

NOT IN VAIN

We have not come to hallow this editorial but to dedicate it to the graduating seniors on the 1957 football squad. Yet, in a sense, we cannot dedicate it; their efforts on the field have done a far better job of edifying than our poor powers to add or detract. It is altogether fitting and proper that we should allow at least this inadequate article as tribute to those who gave so much that sports might be engendered at Allegheny.

To the editor:

The Human Relations Commission as presently set up is the 1957-58 version of the former Citizenship and Human Relations Committees. In the second mandate accompanying the proposed A.U.C. Resolution concerning discrimination, this Commission was directed "to carefully study the current campus situation with regard to discrimination based on reasons of race and religion." At 11 p.m. last Tuesday evening in the A.U.C. meeting, the Committee's Chairman could not give any indication to that body, as to the methods by which the current study would be implemented. It was also pointed up at this time, that the Commission should not be made to start under the handicap of being called an investigating body which connoted a muckraking organization. Nevertheless, some 16 hours later, I, as President of Phi Iota of Alpha Chi Rho, was asked by a member of the Commission:

(1) What does your National Constitution state in regard to clauses involving possible discrimination?

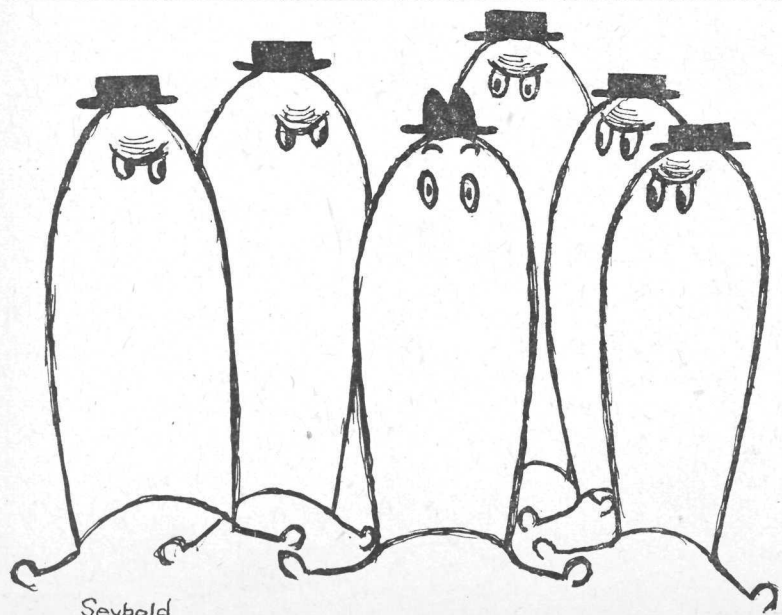
(2) State the local house policy concerning discrimination.

This hasty commencement of a broad program which could deeply affect the ties of all the local chapters with their National Fraternities, can hardly be labelled anything other than an investigation.

The right to conduct an investigation of this nature by this Commission is never in question. However, moral issue can be made concerning the sageness of starting this move without the mandate. This mandate if passed would give the plan an expression of confidence and would more likely further the goals of the Commission in gaining the fullest cooperation of the persons most concerned. The reason stated for the rapid commencement of this controversial probing without the mandate's passage was that it was assumed that the mandate would pass. In view of the fact that the mandate was tabled for two consecutive weeks pending further discussion (Continued on page 5)

Blood Donors Sought For Plasma Donations

The Red Cross Bloodmobile is scheduled to be on campus Tuesday, November 19. Blood donations may be given between 10:00 a.m. and 4:00 p.m. in the Pine Room of Brooks Hall.

Pan-Hell is sponsoring the Bloodmobile visit. Service A Club, under the direction of Sykes Reed, will help set up equipment, and sorority girls will help with registration and the food canteen.

The American Red Cross advises donors not to eat fats (cream or butter) meat, fried foods or eggs for at least four hours before their appointment.

Those who have had malaria but have not had an attack for six months may give blood, said the Red Cross. Also, those who have had jaundice but have not had a reoccurrence for two years may donate. This blood will be used for plasma.

dergraduate enrollment. In the five years since the movement was organized, 361 corporations, foundations, and individuals have invested \$945,007, less the cost of operating the Foundation.

According to the colleges these donations are investments in the future welfare and progress of the donor's company and the national economy. In the words of one of the college presidents, "The funds received from the Foundation . . . are critical to the operating budget of the college. Every cent has gone toward increases in faculty salaries—therefore, into the very heart of the college's educational program."

The objective of the movement, as set forth in the Foundation's charter, is "to present, in general, the place of the independent college in the economy, culture and progress of our state and national life, to increase the financial means available to these institutions for the betterment of their educational services and facilities, and, in particular, to present a joint appeal to business and industry for such support."

To become a participant in this movement the college must be fully accredited and receive no state aid. At present, eighty per cent of the eligible institutions in Pennsylvania are members.

This year the Foundation is active in thirty-nine states and regional organizations in forty-one states. Its directors are businessmen whose corporations are interested in and are solicitors to the Foundation.

In the future the Foundation is hopeful that business's interests in the movement will grow. As President Pelletier stated in an interview, "We look forward to the time when

I move the adoption of the following resolution:

Preamble

Whereas, I consider that there is an inability to justify membership in the National Student Association solely for the use of its Student Government Information Service and conventions; and

Whereas, the National Student Association has been subjected to constant criticism on this campus; and

Whereas, it is not felt that the college community is realizing sufficient return for an expenditure of \$760.00; and

Whereas, the principle advantage of affiliation with the National Student Association is alleged to be leadership training, it is an indictment of the college that we cannot train leaders without the help of said National Student Association; and

Whereas, the fact that more than two-thirds of the accredited colleges and universities in the United States do not see fit to affiliate with the National Student Association further raises a doubt as to its worth; therefore,

Resolved, That the Allegheny Undergraduate Council sever all existing ties with the National Student Association; and

Be it further resolved, that the Allegheny Undergraduate Council initiate immediate action to amend its by-laws as follows:

Eliminate Item G, Section I, article 3 of said by-laws, said item being that which establishes the National Student Association Committee as a standing committee of the Allegheny Undergraduate Council.

cation. Here at Allegheny, student government is constantly faced with the problem of relating student activities to the educational and democratic ideals of the college. As students, we can ask ourselves these questions: In what ways are we contributing to the growth of the college? In what ways are our activities contributing to our growth as students and citizens? What contribution is our college community making to higher education? In what ways can we, as students, assume responsible roles in the national community?

These are not easy questions to answer, but it is my firm belief that our membership in USNSA can contribute greatly toward the attainment of our educational goals and toward the solution of many student problems.

As members of USNSA, we belong to the largest union of students in the world — over 400 colleges and universities representing nearly one million students. This constitutes a powerful voice in this country, and this voice is recognized as the representative student opinion by sixty other national student unions of the free world. USNSA is the only student organization with a permanent seat on the National Education Association, the American Council on Education and UNESCO; and the organization continually supplies the U.S. government with information on student affairs. Through the USNSA we have our ear to the ground of the national student movement; and we are hearing things because more than ever before the student is being asked to assume a responsible position in the national community. It matters what we say about discrimination; it matters what we say about academic freedom or more scholarship assistance for students.

As contributing members of this organization, we of Allegheny College have two primary responsibilities: (1) We must take full advantage of USNSA services. (2) We must be willing to contribute information concerning accomplishments on our own campus.

Our dues of \$75 a year, \$35 to the Region, \$40 to national, (about 7½

cents per student) cover only 30% of the services offered yet we are free to take advantage of all of them. Rather than enumerate these services, let me cite what has already been accomplished here at Allegheny this year through NSA:

(1) In August, five members of the AUC Executive Committee attended the 10th National Student Congress at the University of Michigan where ideas were exchanged and invaluable leadership training was obtained.

(2) Through a Ford Foundation grant to USNSA, Paul Ssemogerere and Yukihome Hashizumi are able to spend a year with us on the Foreign Student Leadership Program.

(3) The Leadership Training Program held on campus during orientation week was set up with NSA material and NSA working papers were utilized. Training that the Executive Committee had received at the Congress was also helpful here.

(4) Jack Shea, as Chairman of the Constitution Revision committee, and Dick Powers, as Chairman of the Leadership Training Program Committee, will receive supplementary information through the Student Government Information Service.

(5) The Panhellenic Council used NSA material on discrimination as source material for discussion.

(6) The NSA information file, located in the AUC office, is being revised and copies of the available material will be forwarded to each social group.

(7) The campus was informed of a conference at Chatham College sponsored by the Institute of International Relations. NSA has available funds to send any interested student, expense free, to the conference.

We more than welcome criticism, for this is one means by which we determine the effectiveness of NSA.

If we wish, we can broaden our educational scope through USNSA. If we so wish, we can improve our student government through USNSA. If we wish, we can better contribute to our own college community and to the national community . . . if we so wish.

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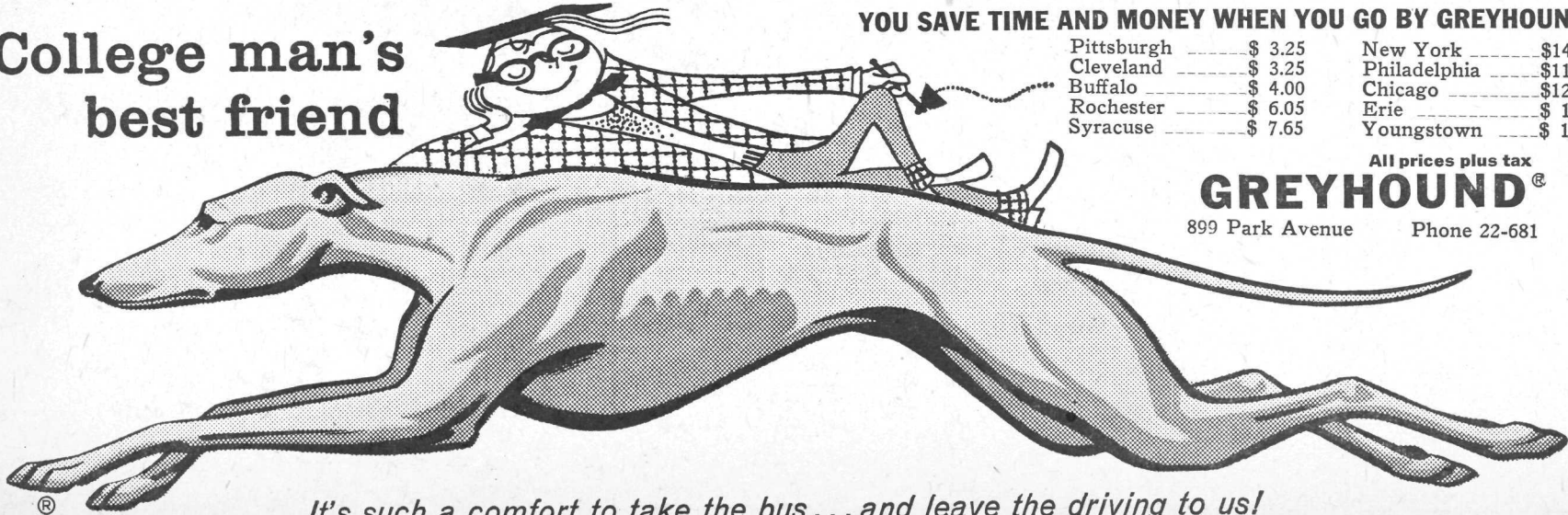
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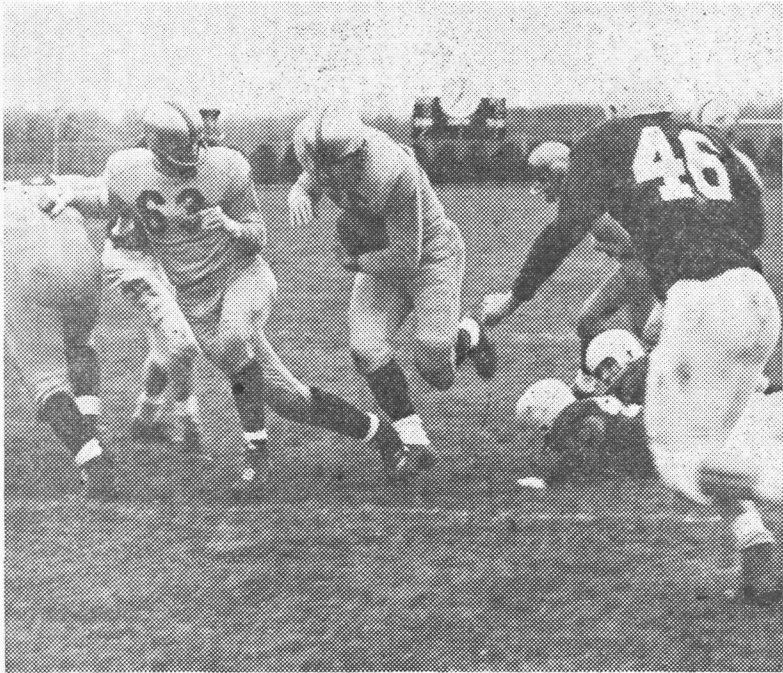
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Big Game Hunters After 3rd Straight In Finale

Coach Red Moore will take his big game hunters into the season's finale tomorrow in an attempt to win his third straight and bring back his second winning season in two years. The Tomcats will be countering with a strong, experienced line and a running attack centered around fullback Scafuri from the straight and winged T formations. McClimans will be at the quarterback slot with a good passing game and ability at deception. Thiel will be after their fifth straight from the Gators who have not beaten Thiel since 1949 when we broke off the series until 1953.

A Case fourth down punt attempt failed early in the first quarter and the Gators fell on the ball inside the five. Villa scored his first of the afternoon on the second play from scrimmage.

Late in the third quarter Villa got into the clear from the Gator 33 and sprinted the 67 yards for his second score. In the fourth quarter Pancho treated the shivering Theta and Phi Gam fathers to his third touchdown when he capped a Gator scoring effort with a five-yard plunge.

Championship Team Lost To Graduation; Hanson Faces Major Rebuilding Now

Two years ago Allegheny had possibly its greatest swimming team in a long history of good swimming teams. As many of the swimming fans remember, there were nine swimmers of championship caliber who formed this 1955-56 swimming squad. Seniors Britt Poulson, Frank Brand, Dick Fisher and Carter White; juniors Alex Hill and John Perreca; sophomores Ray Cox and Ed Sergi, and freshman John Grant combined to win the Penn-Ohio Conference championship and break every Gator record.

Britt Poulson was a sprinter of exceptional talent and for the 100-yard the finest butterfly man in western Pennsylvania. Dick Fisher was a less talented sprinter, but he was one of the hardest working men on the squad captaining the team his junior year. As a diver without a board, he took the first first place ever accorded an Allegheny diver in the dual meet at W. & J. Frank Brand, now in medical school at the University of Pennsylvania, was a sprinter and middle distance man who reached his full potential during his senior year. He still holds his place in the records for being part of two record breaking relay teams. The fourth senior was Carter White. Whitey, the team captain, was an unusual swimmer. He would surprise his opponents and spectators by diving in and sprinting the 22 laps of his distance event. His remarkable stamina enabled him to break both the 220 and 440-yard free style records. He was also conference champion in his events.

Hill And Perreca Strong

Alex Hill, the previous year as a sophomore, swimming the breast stroke for the first time, set a new Conference record. John Perreca, two years previously as a freshman backstroke, lost only three races and finished third in the Conference championship.

Ed Sergi developed under Bill Hanson's coaching and the perpetually frustrating task of trying to catch Carter White made him a dependable second distance man. John Grant, although only a fresh-

man, went into the record books with seniors Poulson, Fisher and Brand as part of the record-setting free-style relay team.

The team had a 7-3 record that year, losing only to Niagara University, defending eastern NCAA champion, the University of Rochester and Grove City.

Many Records Set

Other records left by this team include a three-man medley relay record of under three minutes, which may never be broken. Ray Cox swam the backstroke, Britt Poulson the butterfly, and Frank Brand swam the free style leg. Ray Cox broke the backstroke record in every pool in which he has swum. Britt Poulson set new records in the 60-yard and the 100-yard free-style. The record in the 100 had lasted 18 years before Britt broke it in his last meet.

After graduation the combination was broken with the loss of four senior stars. Last June, Alex Hill and John Perreca along with Warren Billings graduated. Only Ed Sergi, John Grant and Ray Cox remain of that championship team of two years ago. In Coach Hanson's season-opening talk he said, "This is the start of a new era." From this year's freshmen must come the men to fill the big gaps left by the graduates.

In the very near future Coach Garbark plans to have volleyball competition, basketball and bowling in that order. Volleyball starts right after Thanksgiving vacation.

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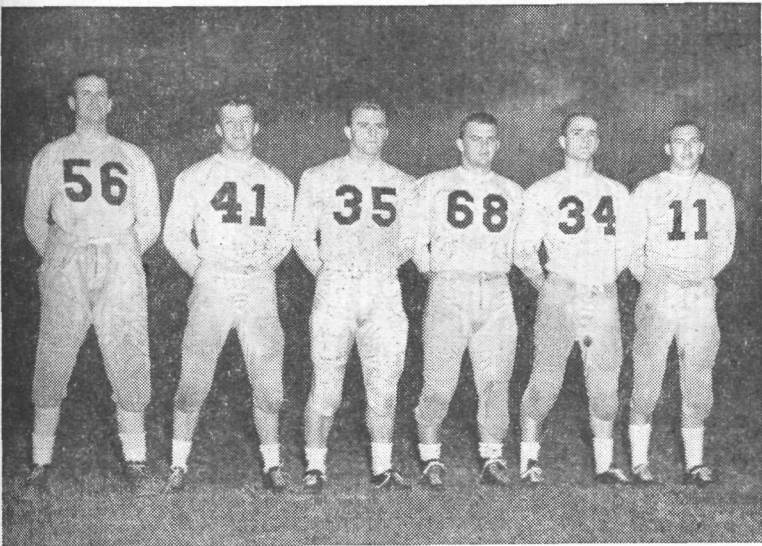
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Six Seniors End Grid Career

sion, this assumption seems rather unwarranted.

The ultimate goals of removing all traces of discrimination lies within each individual. Discrimination on this campus is an individual and not a group problem. If this is not the nature of discrimination, is this the method by which these problems should be studied? A practical example is the blackball system existing in either the single or multiple form in every fraternity here at Allegheny. Can a house policy towards rushing be started by any fraternity when the by-laws specifically call it a problem to be left to each individual? Can a house give this Commission a full, honest answer to the proposed questions, when such an answer would further jeopardize it with its national group? Would the Commission rather commit some of the fraternities to statements which would have to be hazy and broad enough to be construed by the national organizations as being unbinding and possibly meaningless?

Already steps have been taken internally in the attempt to alleviate the same problems this Commission is investigating by the fraternities. The I.F.C. issued a statement affirming the Faculty and Trustee statements regarding this problem a week ago in the Campus. At National Convention, most of our

chapters have been considered left wing by attempting to alleviate racial and religious friction. Two chapters here on campus were the chapters instrumental in the removal of all of their National's restrictive clauses.

The Greek social groups on this campus have attempted to act rationally in their efforts to bring forth less discrimination on the Allegheny scene. As far as I can see, the Human Relations Commission has not started this way in instrumenting its study. The problem exists here undoubtedly and is one which deserves looking into. The course on which it has been hastily launched is the question in point here. If for nothing else, the Human Relations Commission should be complimented for its sincerity and its willingness to start the ball rolling. It is hoped that in the future the Commission will review its error in impatience and lack of planning and will look before it leaps.

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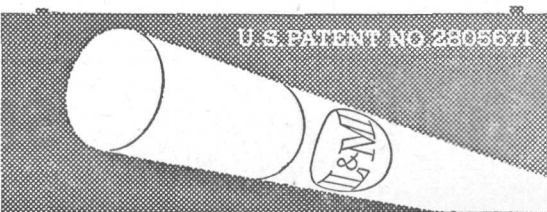
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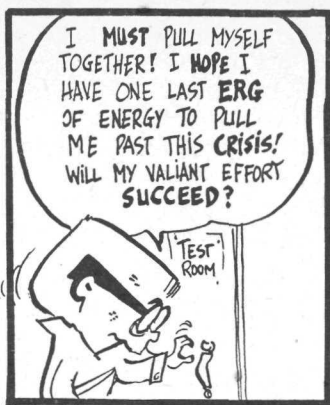
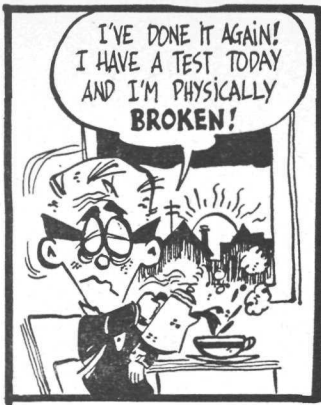

Judging each round is a professor of speech or English provided by the competing colleges. Late in the year, a cross-examination tournament will be held at Pitt.

At the end of the season, Philo-Franklin will give a dinner for the debaters. At this time new members will be accepted into the group.

Library Announces New Policy

The collection of government documents in Reis Library is now available for general circulation, Assistant Librarian Dorothy Smith recently announced.

This is a new policy; heretofore, these documents had been considered non-circulating material, with borrowing privileges available only

by special permission.

The document stacks will remain closed. "This is a very small disadvantage," Miss Smith pointed out, "since the nature of this material makes access to it through indexes much more reliable than by means of the browsing approach."

Miss Smith also announced a new policy concerning circulation. All books available for circulation will be for 14 days, subject to one renewal without special permission. Request for longer periods of use than a month should be made of the Librarian, Mr. Benjamin.

A certain few new books may carry a temporary label of 7-days so that they will be available to many who may have an immediate desire for them.

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
