ALLEGHENY DEFEATED.

4-3 TELLS THE TALE.

A Close and Exciting Game With Westminster.

Tuesday afternoon our base ball team played Westminster on the home grounds and was defeated in a close and exciting game. A large crowd was in attendance and displayed more enthusiasm than had been shown in any of the previous games. That it was a hard luck game the score will show.

First inning—Westminster was first at the bat. Edmundson was hit by a pitched ball and stole second. McKim was hit by a pitched ball. Cameron was out on a fly to pitcher. Edmundson tried to steal third but overran the base and was out. Fitzgerald making a pretty catch of Cota's high throw. Kuhn singled to center. Porter was out on a foul fly to third.

Baker was first at bat for Allegheny and was hit by a pitched ball. Borland drove a hot grounder at the pitcher who fumbled and then threw to second to catch Baker, but the umpire declared him safe.

The visitors made a vigorous kick at the decision at second. Cota grounded to third. Fitzgerald made a beautiful catch of Baker's fly. Borland drove a single through third, and took second. Cota hit an easy one to pitcher who caught En Dean at the plate.

Eighth inning—McKim was out on a fly to short. Cameron hit a grounder to third and was safe on a wild throw to first. Kuhn walked. Porter smashed a two bagger to left center, scoring Cameron and Kuhn, but was caught trying to reach third on the hit. Grim hit a grounder to third and was safe on the wild throw to first. Moorhead made a great catch of Breaden's long foul to left.

Porter made a phenomenal one hand catch of Fitzgerald's fly over first. Dunn was out, third to first. Moorhead was out on a fly to third. Score, Allegheny 1; Westminster 4.

Ninth inning—Grier walked. Yoltan reached first on a muffed third strike. Dunn made a nice catch of Edmundson's long fly to center. McKim drove a hot one to Baker who threw to Finnegan, forcing Yoltan, and Finnegan threw to first catching McKim and completing a double play.

Taylor was put in to bat for Finnegan, and was out, short to first. En Dean was out on a fly to third. Hammon singled to right. At this point the game was called for ten minutes on account of a heavy shower. When play was resumed Baker singled to center. Borland smashed a terrific three bagger to left center, scoring Hammon and Baker. Cota struck out retiring the side and ending the game. The final score was Allegheny 3, Westminster 4.

Fourth inning—Kuhn got his base on balls. Porter struck out. Kuhn took second on a wild pitch, but was caught off the base a moment later and was out, catcher to second. Grim hit one to pitcher who fumbled and he was safe. Breaden struck out.

Dunn was out on a fly to center. Moorhead singled to left-center, and made a pretty steal of second on the first ball pitched. Finnegan struck out. En Dean singled to center, scoring Moorhead, and stole second.

Hammon struck out. Score, Allegheny 1; Westminster 4.

Fifth inning—Grier walked. Yoltan struck out. Edmundson was out on a fly to pitcher. McKim struck out.

Baker was out, second to first. Borland hit one to pitcher and died at first. Cota was out, second to first.

Sixth inning—Baker made a phenomenal catch of Cameron's line drive. Kuhn struck out. Porter singled to right, and stole second. Cota's throw to catch him was wild, but Baker got the ball and threw to second to hold Porter there. The ball hit the runner and bounded off, Porter reaching third before it could be recovered. He scored on a passed ball. Grim was out on a foul fly to catcher.

Fitzgerald drove a hot liner between second and first of which the second baseman made a wonderful stop and threw him out at first. Dunn was out, third to first. Moorhead singled to center, and stole second, Finnegan was out on a muffed third strike, catcher to first. Score, Allegheny 1; Westminster 2.

Seventh inning—Breaden struck out. Grier drew a base on balls. Yoltan struck out. Edmundson was out on a foul fly to third.

En Dean was hit by a pitched ball and stole second. Moorhead was out on a fly to first. Yoltan made a beautiful catch of Baker's fly. Borland drove a single through third, and took second. Cota hit an easy one to pitcher who caught En Dean at the plate.

The Harvard catalogue, which was issued a few days ago, contains 715 pages. The corrected enrollment shows 448 instructors, and 4,947 students, including the Summer School. The attendance at Radcliffe has dropped from 411 to 393.

Under the will of the late Samuel Seibert, Elkhorn, Md., the Lutheran theological seminary at Gettysburg will receive \$8,000; Pennsylvania college at the same place, \$4,000; the residue, about \$10,000, goes to Susquehanna university, Selinsgrove, Penn'a.

The World's Almanac records four hundred and eighteen universities and colleges in the United States, one hundred and forty of which are non-sectarian and the remainder under the direct supervision of some religious body. Of those having reported, forty-eight have as their college color, one color; one hundred and thirty-seven have two, and six have three. Heidelberg is one of the six.

WE LOSE.

GROVE CITY WINS

The Second Game of the Series—13-4.

The college team played Grove City on the home grounds last Saturday and was defeated by the score of 15-4. The heavy rains of the previous day and of the morning had left the grounds in a miserable state, rendering fast fielding and base running impossible. A large crowd was in attendance, but did not show any signs of wild excitement during the game. The score by innings follows:

First Inning—Grove City was first at bat. Kennedy walked. O'Hara singled, scoring Kennedy, and stole second. Berry reached first on a fly to the outfield. He took second and O'Hara scored on a passed ball. Brown reached first on an error. Thompson was out on a fly to pitcher. Bonette was hit by a pitched ball. McElhoes was out on a fly to second. McClelland singled, scoring Berry and Brown, and took second on the throw to the plate. Cambell was out on a fly to second.

Baker walked. Borland hit to short, and was out at second. Fitzgerald batted a two-bagger to left and Borland took third. Borland scored and Fitzgerald took third on a passed ball. Cota hit to pitcher and died at first. Taylor met the same fate on an easy grounder to pitcher.

Second Inning—Kennedy struck out. O'Hara was out on a pop fly to pitcher. Berry knocked a grounder to pitcher and was out at first.

Moorhead drew a base on balls. En Dean struck out. Moorhead stole second. Hammon struck out. Finnegan waited for four wide ones. Moorhead stole third in safety, although the visitors raised a kick at the decision. Baker walked, filling the bases. Borland was hit by a pitched ball, forcing in Moorhead. Fitzgerald was out, pitcher to first. Score, Allegheny 2; Grove City, 4.

Third Inning—Grove City was retired in order. Cota came to bat for Allegheny and struck out. Taylor was out on a foul to catcher. Moorhead dumped one down toward first and beat it out. En Dean was out, pitcher to first.

Fourth Inning—McElhoes drove a two-bagger to right, and took third on a passed ball. McClelland was out on a fly to right. Cambell singled to left, scoring McElhoes. Kennedy singled to right. O'Hara hit a grounder to Baker, who fumbled and everybody was safe. Berry singled to left, scoring Cambell and Kennedy. O'Hara was caught off second, and was out, Cota to Baker. Brown singled to left. Thompson was out, pitcher to first.

After the last two disasters on the home grounds, even the most ardent supporters of the team are filled with gloomy forebodings. The outlook for a large number of victories is assuredly not bright; but no one can prophesy with certainty. The fact that they are away from home may be an added incentive to the boys to do effective work. The team is well managed and skillfully coached and if the fellows but keep their heads, there is a chance to retrieve these tottering fortunes. One victory would go far toward winning others. Meanwhile the old wishes of every loyal student with them.

The suspense which the Seniors been in for the past six weeks is over. The Senior Twelve have been chosen, and the matter is settled for all, satisfactorily or otherwise. As Juniors the present class has taken a valiant stand against the action of the institution; and they were aided and abetted by the class of '99 and the other classes. They urged that the Senior Twelve is an obsolete one, and that the Commencement Day is a dead weight, hardly to be endured, and that it causes a feeling of alienation among those who are affected. These arguments, of very evident validity, were supported by those other arguments which the Twelve attracts a

larger number of interested alumni, friend and relatives, than some distinguished speaker, and that it gives the public a better idea of the work done by the students. And so the petitions from the classes were tabled by the trustees and the Senior Twelve took a new lease of life. Now, until there is some decided change in sentiment, or until new conditions arise, making the inaccessibility of the institution still more apparent, it will probably continue a bugbear to the Seniors, a source of dread to those composing it, and more or less a bore to the audience.

The fact remains, however, that it is an honor to those chosen and the CAMPUS extends its congratulations to the fortunate dozen.

INTERCOLLEGIATE CONTESTS.

Allegheny College Takes Third Place in the Oratorical Competition.

John E. Roberts returned last evening from Bethany, W. Va., where he represented Allegheny college in the annual contest of the Intercollegiate Oratorical Association of Western Pennsylvania and West Virginia. The contest was held Wednesday evening in the chapel hall of Bethany college. Representatives from all the colleges comprising the association were present. The contest was pronounced one of high order, each speaker having individual excellencies.

The master of ceremonies was Hon. O. S. Marshall of New Cumberland, ex-Speaker of the West Virginia State Senate. The judges for the occasion were Dr. Jesse Johnson, president of Muskingum college; Dr. Theodore B. Moss, principal of the California State Normal, and Rev. G. E. Hawes, pastor of the First United Presbyterian church, Braddock, Pa.

The honors of the contest were won in the following order:

First, by Valentine T. Tustin, of the University of West Virginia. Subject of oration, "The Advantages of International Arbitration."

Second, by William E. Brooks, of Westminster college. Subject of oration, "The Song of Undine or Angel."

Third, by John E. Roberts, of Allegheny college. Subject of oration, "The East and the West—An American Problem."

Fourth, by W. A. Silvens, of Waynesburg college. Subject of oration, "Superlative Man Triumphant."

Fifth, by George A. Waddle, of Bethany college. Subject of oration, "The Consent of the Governed."

Sixth, by Benno J. Uhl, of Thiel college. Subject of oration, "Individualism."

Seventh, by J. Brad Craig, of Geneva college. Subject of oration, "The Last Trek."

On Wednesday afternoon the annual business meeting of the association was held at Bethany. As Allegheny had sent no delegate her contest representative acted in that capacity. By request of West Virginia university her name was removed from the list of colleges composing the association. Upon application Muskingum college was admitted to membership in the association. The name of the association was then changed to that of "The Tri-State Intercollegiate Oratorical Association."

In the election of officers for the ensuing year Allegheny secured one of the most important offices, E. G. Royce, president of the local association, being chosen as secretary and treasurer of the Intercollegiate Association. A revision of the constitution was arranged for.

The next contest will probably be at Geneva college.

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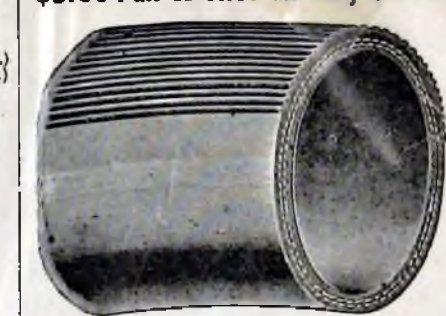
