

TICKET SALE TO START SOON FOR DRAMATIST'S CLUB PLAY

Final Preparations Being Made For Showing of "The Youngest"

As the first dramatic performance of the College to be given this year by students, the Duzer Du and Klee-O-Kleet dramatic club will present the play, "The Youngest," in the High School auditorium on Tuesday evening, April 26, at 8:15.

"The Youngest" is a three act comedy and is of a type that cannot fail to please. It is the most popular of Phillip Barry's three latest productions and was highly received by New York audiences last season. Adequate preparations have been made by the dramatic club for the staging of the production, and an evening of real entertainment is in store for those who attend.

CHEM LECTURER EXPLAINS LIQUID AIR TO STUDENTS

DOCTOR JAMES DEMONSTRATES
PROPERTIES AND LIQUEFACTION PROCESS

Last Thursday morning, March 31, Doctor James, a noted lecturer and demonstrator of the properties of liquid air who is visiting a large number of the educational institutions throughout the country, spoke before the students of Chemistry I. His demonstration took the place of the regular lecture in that course by Dr. R. E. Lee.

Doctor James opened his talk by a discussion of air stating that the properties and manifestations of liquid air prove to be exceedingly peculiar. At present, due to the liquefactive process of air, tons and tons of oxygen and nitrogen are separated and used for commercial purposes. Dr. James began his demonstration by boiling some liquid air in a tea kettle over a cake of ice. His next demonstration was of a lead bell which under ordinary conditions will not ring, but when subjected to the cooling process of liquid air its sound resembled a small silver bell. This is explained by the fact that molecules have a tendency to huddle or become more compact when cooled.

The speaker also demonstrated the locomotive force of liquid air with a small engine, but explained that the difficulty in commercializing this force is with attempts to lubricate the engine, since the cooling process of liquid air will solidify the ordinary lubricants used in motors and machines. Liquid air does have, however, a practical value in blasting, especially in coal mines where dangerous gases are so often present.

Among his later demonstrations Doctor James solidified mercury, cooled a rubber doll until it became brittle, fried a steak in a frying pan over a cake of ice, and also solidified kerosene and alcohol.

Thus far five men have signified their intention of entering the Philo-Franklin Oration Contest which will be held on Thursday evening, April 21, in Ford Memorial Chapel. These men are Messrs. S. According to the rules of the contest, six men are allowed to speak and it is hoped that several more students will present their orations to the committee for approval. Three prizes of twenty-five, fifteen and ten dollars will be awarded to the men taking first, second and third places respectively in the contest. All those interested in entering should see Dr. S. S. Swartley at once. The contest is open only to members of the Philo-Franklin Forum.

The chairman and judges for this year's contest have not yet been chosen, but they will be capable, unbiased professional or business men.

The rules for the contest are as follows:

1. The Philo-Franklin Contest will be held on the evening of April 21.
2. The orations are to be the original work of the students entering the contest.
3. The orations should not require at the most more than ten minutes for delivery.
4. Three typed copies of each oration must be in the hands of the committee not later than Saturday, April 16.
5. If more than six orations are submitted, the committee reserves the right to eliminate all but six, the basis of choice to be the quality of the written oration.
6. A man who has won a second or third prize is not thereby deprived of the opportunity of competing again.
7. The contest is open only to members of the Philo-Franklin Forum.

The prizes for the oration contest have heretofore been twenty-five, ten and five dollars, but through the gift of Dr. H. K. Stoner '82, the second and third prizes have been increased to fifteen and ten dollars respectively. The Forum hopes to make a permanent addition to their endowment fund in order that the above prizes may be given to the winners every year.

NON-FRATERNITY WINS VOLLEY BALL TOURNAMENT

NOSE OUT PHI DELTA THETA
IN FINALS LAST
THURSDAY

The best exhibition of volley ball that has been seen in the Allegheny gymnasium this season was staged last Thursday night when the Non-Fraternity team defeated the Phi Delta Theta representatives in three out of five games for the inter-fraternity championship. Those who saw the match declare that two more competent or more evenly matched teams could not have been selected. So close were the teams that only six points separated the losers from the winners. The scores of the games were 14-21, 19-21, 21-13, 21-18, 21-18.

The Phi Deltas got off to a good start in the first game and were never headed. Corbett and Pringle played smoothly, and the Phi Deltas took the game 21-14. Both teams were well warmed up when the second game began, and from the first the points were bitterly contested. Practically every point was distinguished by a long rally or a sensational recovery. It was only through the greatest effort that he Phi Deltas pulled out a 21-19 victory. Thompson and Gibson starred in this game; both made numerous apparently impossible shots.

If any game could be called "the least interesting," it would be the third game. The Phi Deltas appeared to let down a little after their two victories, and the Non-Frats were fighting hard to stave off defeat. The result was inevitable, and the Phi Deltas went down to a 21-13 defeat. Captain Cibula of the Non-Frats played a marvelous game in both this and the two following encounters. He was the best man on the floor, the mainstay of the Non-Frat team, and the chief reason for the Phi Delt's defeat. The last two games both resulted in 21-18 victories for Non-Fraternity. The games were as close as the scores indicate, and both produced championship volley ball.

Spring Recess To Begin at Noon On Friday, April 8th

Friday, April 8, marks the opening of the annual ten-day Spring Recess at Allegheny. Classes will be brought to a close at twelve o'clock that day, and will be resumed Tuesday morning, April 19, at eight o'clock. The regular morning Chapel services will be omitted Friday in order to enable the four morning classes of customary length to be completed by noon.

All books are to be returned to the College Library before the beginning of the vacation, although the opportunity to hold books out over the ten-day period will be granted to students in good standing after they have made suitable arrangements with the College Librarian. Those to whom books are issued for use over the ten-day recess will be expected to return such books promptly at the beginning of classes.

The customary ruling concerning absences from classes on either the two days immediately preceding or following the vacation will be enforced by the administration of the College. Such cuts, when unaccompanied by valid excuses from the offending students, will be considered as double cuts and will be recorded as such.

The liberal recess granted by the College at this time suffices to bridge the huge gap between the Christmas holidays and the close of the school year in June.

He was graduated from Allegheny with the class of 1893 and was a member of the Phi Kappa Psi fraternity.

The deceased will be remembered by many residents of Meadville where he grew to young manhood and attended the public schools as well as Allegheny.

GYMNASIUM TO BE "BIG TENT"

AT NOON

Under the direction of James Meadowcroft and Miss Mina French, the representatives of the two organizations, the large staff in charge of the event are at work in order to have all arrangements completed before the Easter vacation.

The committee wishes to give everyone in school an opportunity to take a part in the circus and request that anyone interested in this event report to the students in charge. Among the many positions to be filled are ringmaster, construction director, side-show director, parade manager and publicity agent.

The general plan of the circus will be the same as last year, and many of the attractions that scored such a hit then will be again presented on a larger scale, together with several entirely new attractions. There will be the usual circus attractions, sideshows, freaks, fortune tellers, games of chance, peanuts and lemonade, all of them present in copious quantities and guaranteed to give everyone an evening full of fun and frolic.

New Catalogue Shows Several Changes In Many Departments

The new edition of the College Catalogue was distributed to the students for first time last Monday. In size and content the catalogue is practically the same as last year's issue; however, a number of departments have been reorganized and enlarged. Among the departments which have been reorganized, the Bible, Biology, and Spanish departments show the greatest renovation, while the Geology and Surveying departments have been altered somewhat in the nature of their work.

In the Bible department several important changes have been made. Old Testament History which was formerly given the first term only will be given throughout the year three hours a week; Course IV which was formerly Social Institutions and Ideals of the Bible has been dropped while Jesus' Ideals and Modern Problems, a one term three hour course will be substituted.

COLLEGE WOMEN GRANTED ATHLETIC PRIVILEGES

After much agitation and many failures, the women of the college have at last secured the privilege of athletic competition with other schools. Women's athletics at Allegheny, in the past a minus quantity, have after a period of steady progress under the leadership of Miss Georgia B. Herald, secured the recognition they deserve.

During the past three years dissatisfaction with the college ruling prohibiting inter-collegiate athletics for women and a desire for girls' varsity teams have increased rapidly. Two weeks ago a committee was appointed by the Women's Athletic Board to consult with President Beebe concerning the "Why" of the offending rule and the possibility of its removal, and after several conferences the necessary permission was granted. Plans are already being made for swimming meets and tennis matches with other schools this Spring. The women's teams will be governed by the same restrictions that apply to other varsity teams and will enjoy the same privileges. The long pent-up enthusiasm for athletics among the women of the college now has an opportunity to express itself, and it is hoped that it will not die a natural death as have so many Allegheny aspirations.

Miss Georgia B. Herald and Miss Helen Taggart will represent Allegheny at the fifth national meeting of the Athletic Conference of American College Women to be held at Cornell University, April 21-23. The membership of A. C. A. C. W. consists of Women's Athletic Boards of one hundred and fifty colleges in the United States. The purpose of the organization is to further athletic interest and activities in American colleges.

DEBATERS WIN AND LOSE IN DUAL MEET WITH MOUNT UNION

Forensic Season Closed Last Wednesday With Negative
Team Victors Over Opponent

Closing the Allegheny forensic season, the debate teams registered both a victory and a defeat against the Mount Union College debaters last Wednesday evening, March 30.

Upholding the negative side of the question: That the United States Should Cancel Its Inter-Allied War Debts, the Allegheny team defeated the Mount Union affirmative team before the First M. E. Church open forum, while the Allegheny affirmative team traveled to Alliance, Ohio, where they met and were defeated by the Mount Union negative team on the same question. Both decisions were made by an audience vote.

Old Stone Church Rebuilding Fund Reaches New Mark

An announcement was made during the services of the First M. E. Church last Sunday morning by Dr. G. S. Lackland that nearly \$175,000.00 has already been subscribed toward the rebuilding of Old Stone Church. This amount includes all contributions and pledges as well as the amount given by the Meadville Community Chest. Doctor Lackland, however, announced that \$40,000.00 would still be needed to complete the building program as outlined by the committee.

It is estimated that it will cost \$215,000.00 to rebuild the church. The rebuilding of the main auditorium will cost approximately \$150,000.00 alone. In addition to this, it will take at least \$35,000.00 to replace the windows and the pipe organ as well as many other furnishings. It is also estimated that it will cost \$30,000.00 to repair Thornburn Chapel. The roof of the old section of the chapel was completely destroyed by fire, and at least two-thirds of the roof of the new part. Thus practically all of the fourth floor of the new chapel was destroyed by the fire as well as several rooms on the second and third floors.

The building committee composed of Dr. W. A. Elliott, Dr. C. F. Ross, B. F. Miller, Jr., Arthur Leberman and Dr. G. S. Lackland, pastor of the church, met with the architects last Monday to discuss plans for the new building. The walls of the old structure have been examined and declared to be perfectly sound, hence the decision that the church is to be built on the old walls.

It is expected that complete plans for the new building will be finished by June 1, and the contracts will be let about June 15. The best workmen possible will be secured, and it is expected that the new church will be finally completed by the first of next year.

BOWLING CHAMPIONSHIP WON BY NON-FRAT TEAM

By winning three out of four games from Phi Gamma Delta in the final round of the inter-fraternity bowling league, the Non-Fraternity group won its second championship within a week. The volley ball title was captured Thursday and the bowling title was garnered Monday. Phi Gamma Delta won its way into the final round by defeating Phi Kappa Psi in four hard-fought contests. The Non-Fraternity representatives competed in the finals by virtue of the nine-point defeat of Phi Delta Theta in the semi-final round.

The first game of the Phi Gam-Non-Frat championship match brought forth the best bowling of the afternoon. Non-Fraternity rolled a score of 600 against 532 for Phi Gamma Delta. The winners were unable to keep up the pace, however, and dropped the second game by five pins, 525 to 520. Individual honors in these games went to Rehm of the Non-Frats with a score of 141 and Tornatore, also of the Non-Frats, with 139. The Phi Gams slumped in the third game and were defeated by nearly 60 pins. The score was 549 to 492. The last game was close throughout. The outcome of the game was in doubt until the very end of the last round when Munnell of the Non-Frats spared, giving his team a ten-point advantage with a score of 500 to 490.

This debate marked the only appearance of the Allegheny negative team before a home audience this season, the team being composed of J. Hicks Baldwin, Edgar J. Deissler and Robert Corbett, with John S. Lindsey, alternate. In bringing forth their contention the members of this team showed conclusively that the European nations can and should pay, in the opinion of the majority present.

The Mount Union debaters advancing the argument that this country, having signed the treaty of 1907 whereby the nations agreed to protect the neutrality of Belgium, should have immediately gone to war against Germany with the other nations rather than wait for three years. Thus the United States owes Europe a moral obligation, and in addition the world needs such an example. They cited numerous economic authorities to prove that the cancellation of foreign debts is a sound economic principle, and advanced the additional argument that European nations which have made payments are borrowing the money for the purpose, and therefore are no more able to pay than before.

Allegheny's team declared cancellation to be wrong, morally and economically, and that the foreign countries owing the United States money would be paying but a small part of their annual revenue were they to pay off their indebtedness. Territorial accessions following the war have placed those countries in position to collect a vast amount of revenue from that source

FOUR RECORDS BROKEN IN INTER-CLASS MEET

REA, TORNATORE AND BENTLEY
SET NEW MARKS—OTHERS
SHOW GOOD FORM

Four new college indoor records were established in the events of the Inter-Class track meet staged in the gymnasium last Saturday afternoon. John Rea had a field day setting new marks in the quarter and half mile, while Tornatore bettered the pole vault record by ten inches, and Bentley clipped almost eleven seconds from the old two mile record.

Owing to inclement weather the meet was held inside. As a result the weight events, hurdles, and the 55 yard dash were postponed until this week. The final outcome of the meet will not be known until then, although at present the Freshmen are in the lead with twenty-one points, with the Seniors at their heels with twenty points.

John Rea was the outstanding performer of the afternoon with his two new records. He clipped 1/5 of a second from the old record of 53 4/5 seconds in the 440, and in the 880, the last event of the afternoon, he established a new mark of 2 minutes, 7 3/5 seconds, bettering his own record of 2 minutes, 10 2/5 seconds by almost three seconds. Will Schade equalled the old record of 2 minutes 10 2/5 seconds as he finished second to Rea. Bentley clipped almost eleven seconds from the old two mile record, setting a new mark of 10 minutes, 20 7/10 seconds. Bentley was in fine condition, finishing the race in a great sprint of nearly 150 yards, and he did not appear to be much the worse for wear at the end of the gruelling race.

Tornatore broke his own record of 11 feet, 1/2 inch in the pole vault, pushing the new record up to 11 feet, 10 1/2 inches. He was in A-1 form and should offer some strong competition in the outdoor meets this season.

Wycoff took the mile in the credible time of four minutes, 50 seconds. His closest competitor was Minnis who ran the race in five minutes, four seconds. Sample took the high jump with a leap of five feet, 6 1/4 inches. Long, who took second place, gave Sample some stiff opposition.
