ALLEGHENY WINS FIRST FOOTBALL GAME OF THE SEASON==SCORE, 15-7

Geneva is Defeated at Beaver Falls by Gold and Blue Eleven==Entire Team Plays Well in Spite of Many Injuries

Two touch-downs and a field goal gave Allegheny victory in her first game of the season over Geneva College, at Beaver Falls, last Saturday. The game was hotly contested from start to finish and many spectacular plays were made on both sides. Geneva put up a great fight and it required all that Allegheny had to win out. Score 15-7.

Geneva's team this year is far ahead of that which represented her last year. Several new men have been added and these have greatly strengthened their line-up. The line is heavy and but few long gains were made through it. Perhaps the individual star of the team is Hicks at right end, but Parks at quarter, Dodds at right half, and Clyde at left half are also valuable men. Clyde proved especially good in his running the ends and in his dodging when carrying the ball. Nevertheless, with all of her good men, Geneva was unable to make many big gains. Most of her ground was made in running back punts and in occasionally circling the ends. Allegheny's line held at all points and the defensive work of the Gold and Blue was so clever that Geneva was able to make only four forward passes count.

Allegheny in a large measure was without the usual "snap" and "pep" which helped so materially last year. This was probably due in large part to the fact that as a whole the team was not in the best of condition and many of the men were badly crippled. Some of the men deserve special credit for their work. Arnold, '15, intercepted one forward pass and by an unusually clever run through a broken field carried the ball 70 yards for a touch-down. Kramer, '16, made his first appearance on the 'varsity and acquitted himself in a very creditable manner. He did the punting for the Gold and Blue and far out-kicked the Geneva punter. All of his punts were for good distances and most of them were placed well beyond the reach of his opponents. On the defensive Brooks, '15, was easily the star. He was in every play and not a gain was made through his position. Cox, '16, played a brilliant game at end. He broke up all plays around his end, blocked a kick, and himself made a field goal, all of which is, as Coach Hammett put it, "a pretty good day's work for an end who has never played at that position before." Pierson, '16, at the other end, played in his old time form.

In the first quarter Geneva kicked off. Arnold caught the ball and returned it 10 yards. On the very first play Arnold carried the ball 35 yards through tackle and it began to look as if Allegheny had an easy victory in store for her, but Geneva steadied immediately and put up stiff resistance. Allegheny relied on straight football and by bucking center and running the tackles she carried the ball steadily down the field to the goal-line. Only once was a forward pass tried. Ricker passed the ball to Baker who carried it for 10 yards. At the goal-line the ball was given to Munhall and he carried it over for the first touch-down of the game. His attempt at the goal failed. Allegheny then kicked off and the ball exchanged hands several times before the end of the quarter found it in Allegheny's possession in the middle of the field.

The second quarter saw a change in the style of Geneva's play. Allegheny continued her straight line-bucking for a time and brought the ball to Geneva's 10-yard line. Here a forward pass was tried, but Dodds intercepted the pass and carried the ball the entire length of the field for what looked like a touch-down, but it was found that in endeavoring to escape

a tackle, he had run out of bounds on his own 30-yard line so that the score did not count and the ball was put in play at that place. Geneva then changed her tactics and tried open work but she lost more than she gained by her forward passes, for Allegheny's defense was sharp and covered every point. The half ended with the ball in about the middle of the field.

In many ways the third quarter was the most interesting of the entire game. Geneva kicked off and Munhall returned the ball about 25 yards. Allegheny lost the ball on a fumble and Geneva immediately went back to her open work and forward passes, but this system proved a boomerang, for Arnold intercepted one of the passes and carried the ball 75 yards through a broken field for a touch-down. The attempt at goal failed. After the next kick-off there was an exchange of punts of which by reason of Kramer's fine work Allegheny had the better. Play ended in about the middle of the field.

The fourth quarter opened with the ball in Allegheny's possession. By straight football Allegheny worked the ball down to Geneva's 15-yard line where Geneva held for the first three downs. Cox kicked a field goal, giving the Gold and Blue her last points. Geneva kicked off and Arnold ran the ball back about 15 yards. From here the ball was advanced to Geneva's 40-yard line where on account of alleged slugging Kramer was removed from the game, Allegheny was penalized half the distance to her goal, and the ball was given to Geneva. They ran the ball down to the 25-yard line on a forward pass, but when they tried another, Ricker intercepted the pass and advanced it about five yards. He then tried a kick, but his punt was short and Dodds ran it back to the 3-yard line from where Geneva bucked the ball over the line for a touch-down just as the whistle blew.

In this quarter Allegheny nearly made another touch-down. The Geneva quarter, Parks, threw a forward pass to Hicks at end. He was tackled and in falling the ball slipped from his hands. Arnold picked up the fumble and carried it over the goal-line, but the umpire ruled that the score did not count as the whistle for the end of the play had already blown before Arnold recovered the ball.

PHI BETA KAPPA MEMBERS ELECTED FROM SENIOR CLASS

Miss Alice Chapin and R. H. Downing Are Made Members This Fall.

A notice appeared on last Saturday morning on the bulletin board in Bentley Hall, stating that the local chapter of the honorary scholastic fraternity, Phi Beta Kappa, had elected R. H. Downing, '15, and Miss Alice E. Chapin, '15, to membership. This election was made possible under the new ruling adopted at the last meeting of this fraternity in June which made provision for the choosing of a limited number of the graduating class as members of Phi Beta Kappa at the beginning of the Senior year. As entered in the constitution of the fraternity, this rule reads as follows:

"The executive committee may elect at the beginning of the Senior year not to exceed one-fourth of the total number to be elected from the men's list and one-fourth from the women's list, providing the average grade of the candidate up to this time shall be 'A.' Such election shall be announced during the second week of the fall term."

To R. H. Downing and Miss Alice Chapin goes the honor of being the first two elected under this new ruling. A meeting of the Executive Committee was called for last Friday, the second of October, and at that time these two members of the Centennial class were elected. The action of Phi Beta Kappa in choosing these two to membership stamps Mr. Downing as the best student among the men of the Senior class and Miss Chapin as the best among the women.

ANNUAL RECEPTION IS HELD FOR NEW STUDENTS

Y. M. and Y. W. C. A. Hold Social Function in the Gymnasium.

Few receptions that have ever been held here at Allegheny could rival that which was given by the Y. M. and Y. W. C. A. in the Gymnasium on last Friday evening. In every way this reception set a new mark for functions of that nature in the future; from every standpoint it was an unqualified success. The members of the committees in charge worked hard and long and their efforts were more than repaid by the splendid results which they brought forth. Practically the entire student body and faculty were in attendance and all felt fully rewarded by the excellent entertainment which they received.

R. J. Koehler, '15, and Miss Margaret Simpson, '15, were in charge of the reception and a large part of the credit for its success is due them. Under their direction the interior of the Gymnasium was beautifully decorated with banners and pennants. At the back and the side there were arranged tables for the punch and wafers which were served to the guests. The college orchestra under the leadership of C. W. Dunlap, '15, played several selections, which were heartily applauded.

Last year some complaint was made that the affair was too formal and that not enough opportunity was given in which to get acquainted. With the end in view of correcting this fault it was arranged this year to do away with the speeches which have hitherto been one of the features of the reception and to devote the whole evening to a social time. If one is to judge from results, this arrangement was a vast improvement over the former custom.

DR. CRAWFORD DELEGATE TO ANNUAL CONFERENCES

Represented the Educational Board of the Methodist Church.

President Crawford was absent from the college the latter part of last week and is to be absent the greater part of the present week. Last Thursday he was the guest of the Central New York Methodist Conference at their annual meeting held in Geneva. He attended the Conference as the representative of the board of Education of the Methodist Church and spoke for the Board before the Conference body in the morning, and in the evening delivered an address at the educational anniversary. While in Geneva, Dr. Crawford was the guest of Dr. and Mrs. Robert S. Breed, both formerly connected with Allegheny.

Dr. Crawford returned to Meadville Friday and remained over for the Y. M.-Y. W. C. A. reception Friday evening, leaving Saturday morning to visit two other annual conferences, the Pittsburgh as the representative of the college to the patronizing conference of the church; and the West Virginia Conference at Fairmount, W. Va., as the representative of the Board of Education. This is Dr. Crawford's first visit to the West Virginia Conference since the patron relations between that conference and Allegheny were severed four years ago.

Early this week Dr. Crawford leaves for Brown University, at Providence, R. I., where he is to be the guest of the university at the celebration of their one hundred and fiftieth anniversary. He will remain there two days before returning to Meadville. At this place he will, no doubt, receive many valuable suggestions for the Centennial Celebration at Allegheny. It is primarily for that purpose that he makes this visit to Brown University.

CLASS OFFICERS ELECTED

H. K. Brooks Elected President of the Senior Class on Wednesday.

The most crucial moment in the existence of Allegheny's Honor System was not the moment when its fate hung upon the vote of the students, for the college body wished to step forward; it was not the occasion of its first trial at the spring examinations, for the enthusiasm of its beginning carried the spirit of honor throughout the college. Rather the critical period is just now, when the momentum of enthusiastic adoption has died down and the steady strength of long-established tradition has not yet been achieved. The responsibility for the successful perpetuation of the Honor System in examinations is in the hands of the present generation of Allegheny students.

The members of the three upper classes must maintain such a strong sense of the high principles of honor involved, must show such unvarying appreciation of the trust imposed in them, that the newer students may come speedily to a full and understanding acceptance of the spirit of the Honor System. It is to be hoped that the members of the Honor System Committee will be chosen with regard to their ability to efficiently conduct the workings of the system, and that in all cases the Committee may be sustained and upheld by the student body and by the administrative powers that be. The Honor System is worth the keeping, the responsibility and the opportunity are with the college body today.

By voting favorably last year on the project to make the athletic fee a part of the tuition, the student body has helped the college and athletic authorities solve some of the vexing problems that have confronted the Athletic Board in the past. Now that this plan has been adopted, we may expect to see Allegheny's success in athletics greater than ever. Many other colleges of this country have adopted this plan of financing athletics and they have been able to forge ahead since its successful operation and achieve greater results than ever before.

The election of H. K. Brooks as Senior President is a choice fulfilling all the conditions named in The Campus last week. His address to the Freshman Class on Thursday night on the Honor System was excellent and most impressive.

A high standard for executive office is set before the Juniors and Sophomores if they will elect this week men of the same sterling leadership as the Senior President. It seems curious that with all the talk of college precedents and traditions, the College Council should not have provided last week that the election of presidents should follow in the order formally adopted for the classes and observed in previous years.

ATHLETIC PROSPECTS

Coach Hammett Has Planned a Busy Season in Athletics This Fall.

If the student body of Allegheny carries out the program which Coach Hammett has mapped out, this will be one of the best years that athletics ever enjoyed here. Ample arrangements have been made so that no sport will be left out which could possibly find a place in the athletic life of the school.

Soccer football has always been one of Coach Hammett's favorite sports for this school and he has determined to push it this year as never before. Last year some feeble effort was made to introduce this sport but the movement died out before any enthusiasm could be aroused. It is always hard to get a new branch of athletics started, but it is to be hoped that all will take an interest in this new game and help to put it on a firm basis here at Allegheny.

As was the case last year, a soccer game will be one of the contests between the Sophomores and Freshmen for supremacy on class day when these two classes meet to settle their various points of difference. This action has been taken in order that the students may again have the opportunity to see this game, with the hope that it may arouse enough interest to make a college soccer team one of the athletic teams of this school. An endeavor will be made to organize a Junior soccer team to challenge the winners of the Sophomore-Freshman game. If this is found possible, arrangements will be made to schedule this game for the championship of the school some time before Thanksgiving. In addition, Coach Hammett is planning to make soccer one of the regular courses in Gymnasium this year so that those who desire may elect it for their required Gymnasium work. The idea is to get enough interested this year and to get enough to learn the game to permit of its being made a minor sport next year with the end in view of having Allegheny represented by teams in this field of athletics as well as in other fields.

Basketball has already started. The first practice was called for by Captain Graham on last Thursday. There is special interest in this sport this year as three places are open to competition and as a result it is expected that an unusually large number of candidates will put in their appearance. Practice is scheduled for every evening from four to six. Coach Hammett has made arrangements in accordance with which Captain Graham will be with the new men every Thursday and Friday afternoons to coach and instruct them.

Another innovation which Coach Hammett has made in athletics this year is the Freshman class track meet. It is his plan to run two events in this track meet every Friday beginning with next Friday night and continuing for four weeks. Practice will be held regularly under the supervision of some of the older track men. H. F. Brownell, '15, will have charge of the sprinters, Ling, '16, of the distance men, McKinney, '17, of the middle-distance men, and M. A. Dotterer, '15, of the weight men. The purpose of this track meet, as of the early basketball practice, is to find what talent there is in the class of 1918.

Cross country work will begin soon, probably about the middle of October. The man who will have charge of the squad has not yet been announced but he probably will be appointed in the near future. As an incentive to interest in this branch of athletics a race will be run shortly before Thanksgiving and as prizes for the winners there will be gold, silver and bronze medals. Cross country running should be one of the big athletic interests of the school inasmuch as it is the chief source of distance men for the track in the spring. The distance that will be run in the championship race this year will be three miles instead of four and a quarter as was the case last year.

Regular gym work will start on or about the nineteenth of October. A large field of electives will be open to students in cross country running, soccer and basket ball. Credit will be given for all work done in any one of these departments. Later in the winter a course will be given by Coach Hammett in gymnastics. The hours for gym work will be announced later.

MODERN PROBLEMS CLUB

Initial Meeting Held in the Oratory.
Address by M. O. Brown, Esq.

The first meeting of the Modern Problems Club for this year was held in the Oratory of the Chapel at seven o'clock last Tuesday evening. C. L. Mulfinger, '15, prepared the way for the speaker of the evening with a short resume of the work of the convention of the League of Third Class Cities of Pennsylvania, held in Meadville, August 28, 29, 30.

The object of the convention of these cities was to clear up by comparison certain problems that confront municipal management of cities of the commission form of government. There was an address by Mayor Stern, of Erie, on the place of the mayor in the city's affairs, an account of the taking over by the city of Jamestown, N. Y., of its milk supply, addresses pertaining to various planning committees of the city on street extension, shade trees, and other city problems, with the object of beautifying the city. Municipal garbage disposal plants were discussed and an illustrated lecture given by Professor McGregor, of the University of Wisconsin. Methods in larger cities were discussed with the object that each city's representative present might have some ideas to take back with them for the cheaper and more efficient disposal of garbage in their cities.

The speaker of the evening was Hon. Manley O. Brown, '91, of Meadville. Mr. Brown outlined in a short and concise manner the history of the commission form of government and the way in which it was introduced into Pennsylvania. Mr. Brown gave Mr. A. M. Fuller, of Meadville, the credit for bringing this form of government into use in Pennsylvania, saying that while he himself had done the legal side of the work, Mr. Fuller had done the educational side of the work in preparing the people for the new idea.

After the Galveston flood in 1905 municipal affairs were in such a state that the mayor and councils resigned and asked the governor of the state to appoint a commission to run the city. This was objected to, and it was argued that the people should elect such a commission. Finally a compromise was agreed on and a commission was selected partly by the governor and partly by the people. Thus commission government is not exactly appointed by the governor but is spoken of now as a limited council government.

ATHLETIC ELECTION.

Notice has been posted on the bulletin board in Bentley Hall of the fall athletic election. This election, according to the constitution of the Athletic Association, is to be held the Saturday of the third week of each term, which is Saturday, October 19, this year. The offices to be filled by election are secretary-treasurer of the Association, assistant manager of basketball and assistant manager of baseball.

The first office must be filled by a Junior or Senior, the other two candidates may be either Juniors or Sophomores. All candidates must be members of the Athletic Association.

All persons who have been members of the Association forty-eight hours previous to the election are entitled to vote. Any member may nominate a candidate for any office. The nomination must be in the hands of a member of the Athletic Board not later than the Tuesday preceding the election. The Board may eliminate any person nominated for an office if considered ineligible under the constitution of the Association. The person shall be notified of the action of the board and nominations will then be received for twenty-four hours. The names of the official candidates must be posted not later than Thursday preceding the election.

Although not officially announced, it is very probable that next Saturday will be Class Day, when the Freshmen and Sophomores will meet in a series of contests for the supremacy of the two classes. The events will be the same as last year—tug-of-war, rope-tying contest, soccer game and obstacle relay race. A fuller announcement will be made later in the week.

UNIVERSITY of PITTSBRGH

THE SCHOOL OF MEDICINE

The School of Medicine of the University of Pittsburgh offers two courses of instruction—one the regular four-year all medical course leading to the degree of M. D., for which the entrance requirements are two years of recognized college work, including courses in Chemistry (Inorganic and Organic), Physics, Biology, and German or French, in addition to the four-year high school course; the other the six-year combined medical and college course leading to the degrees of B. S. and M. D., for which the entrance requirements are the four-year high school course or its equivalent.

The School now occupies a thoroughly-equipped laboratory building on the University campus. The Medical School is in affiliation with two general and five special hospitals representing a combined bed capacity of over fourteen hundred beds. Clinical work is given to small sections of the class in these affiliated hospitals. The required work including residence in a Maternity Hospital with board and room furnished.

Bishop James M. Thoburn, '57, spoke in Chapel last Wednesday morning.

An executive meeting of the Oratorical Association was held Saturday afternoon in the Oratory, at which time it was decided to hold the initial meeting of the Philo-Franklin Forum debating society in the Oratory at 4 o'clock on Thursday afternoon. President Crawford announced in Chapel Friday morning that the custom of the last two years of setting apart the Friday Chapel service as Assembly morning would be continued. The extraordinary number of Seniors has made this change necessary. After the seating arrangements were completed, Mr. McClelland, the traveling secretary of the Student Volunteer Movement, gave a brief talk on the need of all classes of college men and women in the foreign field.

LOCKWOOD CAMPAIGN
CLUB IS ORGANIZED

Following the meeting of the Modern Problems Club, held last Tuesday night in the Oratory, a campaign club was organized, which is known as the Lockwood Club of Allegheny College. The new club started off with over 50 members among the faculty and students and that membership has been increased considerably since. H. H. FAHR, '15, RETURNS FROM EUROPEAN TRIP

Allegheny's Track Captain Returns After a Summer Spent Abroad.

Herman H. Fahr, '15, Allegheny's track captain for 1915, arrived at his home in Meadville last Saturday morning after spending an eventful summer in Europe. Immediately after the June examinations he sailed from New York City for Germany, to spend the summer with his brother, Dr. George Fahr, ex-'05, who is professor of Physiology in the University of Giessen, Giessen, Germany.

In company with his brother, Mr. Fahr spent the early part of the summer in sight-seeing in Germany, Austria and Holland and they were in the Tyrol Mountains on the border of Austria, when the present war broke out. They experienced some difficulty in getting back to Giessen, for the mobilization of the troops took place at this time, but after this was over the condition of the country again reached a normal state.

At Giessen, Dr. Fahr, who volunteered as a surgeon in the German army, has charge of a military hospital which has in its care over 2,000 French wounded, while other hospitals in the same city have thousands of German wounded in their wards.

At one time, while traveling in Germany, Mr. Fahr was taken for a Russian spy but after an explanation was released. Needless to say he has many interesting experiences to relate and since he was close to where the real fighting has taken place, he has seen more than the ordinary tourist.

Mr. Fahr experienced no difficulty in leaving Germany, leaving that country by way of Holland and sailing to New York on the Holland-American line.
