LOCAL MINISTER SPEAKS AT CHAPEL

IMPORTANCE OF COLLEGE EDUCATION IS BROUGHT OUT IN INTERESTING TALK.

"The Open Door" was the subject of the talk by the Rev. H. H. Hough, of the Stone church, at Chapel on last Wednesday morning. In opening his remarks, he stated that the problem to be faced by most people, and by himself personally, is the ability to distinguish between what is good enough and what is best. The man who "gets by" may yet be with his class, but will never be able to be near the head. We must always do our very best, not just do enough to get through, if we wish to become a vital force in this world.

"All that a college or community can do is to give one an opportunity," said the Rev. Mr. Hough. The greatest equality in all the world is the equality of an equal chance. God has set before each one of us the open door to success and happiness; it is for us to choose whether we shall enter it. This is what the college is endeavoring to do for us: to make us see the open door, and to make us understand that it is best for our interests to enter it. The rest depends on us; we may enter or stay out, as we please. So it is with life. There is no compulsion to be educated, to be clean, or to be a Christian. These things we must take upon ourselves. They are always waiting close at hand for us.

In closing, the speaker said that there is a great deal of flabbiness in religion and education today. He emphasized the fact that the greatest need of mankind today is a stiffer moral background.

That the students and faculty were very much interested and concerned in what the Rev. Mr. Hough said was evidenced by the close attention they gave him during his speech.

"Tuss" McLaughry Goes to Amherst

ATHLETIC DIRECTOR AT WESTMINSTER IS CHOSEN FOOTBALL COACH AT AMHERST COLLEGE.

De Ormond (Tuss) McLaughry head coach of football and director of athletics at Westminster College, New Wilmington, Pa., has been appointed football coach at Amherst (Mass.) College. Announcement to this effect was made at Amherst by Prof. Paul C. Phillips, chairman of the faculty committee on student activities.

McLaughry was chosen unanimously by the Amherst committee out of a field of more than twenty candidates, including several of the best known coaches in the country. He will succeed Wesley Englehorn, former Dartmouth star, who retired from coaching last fall.

McLaughry goes to Amherst after making an enviable record as a football player and coach in this district. The son of Judge J. A. McLaughry, of Sharon, he gained his first football experience on the Sharon High School team. In 1911 he began his college football career, playing tackle and fullback on the varsity of the Michigan Aggies, although only a freshman. At the end of that season he was chosen all-western tackle by six newspapers of the section.

Star at Westminster.

In 1912 Tuss entered Westminster College, from which his father had been graduated, and played three years, being captain of the 1913 team. During this period he gained the reputation of being one of the greatest fullbacks that ever raced down a western Pennsylvania gridiron. He was the bulwark of the 1914 team, one of the best in Westminster's history, and played what observers considered the greatest game of his career against the University of Pittsburgh, the Panthers winning only 21 to 10, after (Continued on page 2)

NATIONAL QUARTET CLOSURES Y. M. C. A. COURSE

QUARTET COMPRISES BOTH MUSICAL AND ENTERTAINING TALENTS.

After having successfully entertained critical audiences in many of our largest cities, the National Male Quartet will give their program in the Chapel Wednesday evening, March 15th, at 8 o'clock.

The National Male Quartet is presented by the Redpath Bureau as an organization of the same high standards and attainments as the Chicago Glee Club and the Whitney Brothers Male Quartet. The members of this quartet are, first of all, musicians of rare ability, and they present the highest type of quartet music. But, in addition to their musical talent, they are excellent entertainers. The Redpath Bureau very heartily recommends this number, and is proud to guarantee it fully and unreservedly.

Charles Cox, basso, is director of the quartet. He has a voice with the remarkable range from F above to pedal C below. Mr. Cox is also a capital character comedian, and his sketches form an unusually entertaining feature of the program. This talented musician and entertainer was captain in charge of an entertainment division in the A. E. F. during the recent World War, serving immediately under General Pershing.

Lawrence Wickland is first tenor. As a soloist, he is known for his rendition of sacred numbers from leading oratorios.

Stanley Graham is second tenor and pianist. His piano solos from such composers as Grieg, MacDowell and Debussy are a never failing source of pleasure to the audience.

Melvin Newquist, baritone, features with solo numbers in which his very rich voice is demonstrated in a remarkable manner. His repertoire includes the best selections written for men singers.

That these four excellent singers are very enthusiastically received by the critics shown from the citation by Thurlow Lieurance, the well-known composer of "By the Waters of Minnetonka." Mr. Lieurance has said, "I frankly say this (the National Male Quartet) is undoubtedly one of America's best quartets, if not the best."

Educational Problems Discussed by Girls

Industrial and College Representatives Hold Y. W. C. A. Conference at Hulings

Over twenty girls met at Allegheny on last Saturday and Sunday for a Student and Industrial Conference. This was the first Student and Industrial Conference of the East Central Field of the Y. W. C. A. to be held in a college dormitory. It was the second conference of such a nature, which has ever been in this field; the other one was held at Reading last year. Girls from the Erie and Meadville Industrial Clubs, from Westminster, Grove City and Thiel Colleges, and from Slippery Rock Normal were present. The conference was in charge of Miss Katherine L. Richards, student secretary of the East Central Field. The subjects were "General Education," and "Workers' Education."

The first meeting was held in the Y. W. C. A. lounging rooms of Hulings Hall. Miss Richards led a discussion on Education, asking what it is, why it is valuable, where it is obtained, and why there is special interest in it at this time. It was agreed that some of the things which make it difficult to obtain an education are long working hours, inadequate wages, child labor, and over-crowded schools. Education was linked up with Christianity.

Miss Dolores Segelbaum, the Industrial Secretary from Erie, led the second session at 9 o'clock on Sunday morning. She made it clear that workers' education is still very much in the experimental stage and as such it represents, not the rank and file of the workers, but a small proportion of them. It aims to prepare them to become leaders in the labor movement, not to better their own position, but to enable them to make a bigger contribution to their own group and to the world at large. It is difficult to secure the interest of all workers because of their lack of financial equipment, the fatigue of long hours which results in a need for a different kind of recreation, and because of the state of inertia into which many of them have fallen. However, industrial schools have been formed by the workers which meet for two hours each week. Here they study such subjects as economics, labor movements of the past and present, psychology, hygiene, public speaking, parliamentary procedure, and literature. Experiments in workers' education have also been carried on at Amherst and Bryn Mawr.

The closing of the conference, which was in charge of Alice Grenelle, was held in the parlors of the town Y. W. C. A. At this time a report of the findings of the conference was given. While immediate and tangible results from such a conference are hard to find, every one agreed that there had come to the different groups of girls a better understanding of each other and of the desire of each individual to become a part of the social community.

A "Get-Acquainted" party was given by the Y. W. cabinet girls on Saturday afternoon and in the evening every one had a good time in the gym. After the first session, which lasted from 8 to 10, there was one of those spreads of which everyone hears before she comes to college. After the Sunday morning meeting the girls were invited to the town Y. W. for dinner.

QUESTION OF "FRIENDSHIP" WAS DISCUSSED BY STUDENT SECRETARY

On Saturday night at six o'clock, the Vesper Service of the Y. W. C. A. brought to a close the Y. W. C. A. Student and Industrial Conference which was held at Allegheny on March 4th and 5th.

Miss Richards, Student Secretary of the East Central Field, talked about the value of friendship. She said that although the world generally judges the success of any movement by the number of people who partake in it, yet great results may be obtained from small beginnings. Although a very few persons may be effected by a particular movement in its origin, they, through their influence on their friends may cause a deepening and a widening of the movement. So it is important that we all have as many friends as possible, in order that we may help advance the world. There is a certain amount of risk in making friendships, but the world needs and admires people who are willing to take risks in order to further the cause of Christ.

STUDENT ACTIVITIES REGULATED AT TECH

ACTIVITIES ARE DISTRIBUTED BY ALLOWING EACH STUDENT TWENTY POINTS

At Carnegie Institute of Technology, Pittsburgh, a point system has been established for the purpose of regulating the activities of the school. Each activity is accredited with a certain number of points and the different branches are in this way distributed among a large number of students.

No student shall acquire more than twenty points during the course of the year, unless his application made to the Student Council, in writing, is approved. If a student at any time does exceed the maximum of twenty points, without the consent of the Student Council, he shall be required to resign such offices and positions sufficiently to lower his points to the maximum twenty.

Each organization secretary or manager must furnish the Point Committee with the names of all members in that organization.

These rules and regulations are amendable only by the action of the Student Council, and supersede any regulations made by the Student Council to date.

The following activities, with their points as applied at Tech, are found in Allegheny. It would be well if Allegheny could establish such a system.

Many Changes Appear In 1922 Catalogue

"C" Average Now Required for Graduation—Several New Courses Are Offered

Important changes in requirements for graduation and in courses of instruction are to be found in the Catalogue of Allegheny College, published in March, 1922. One hundred twenty term hours is still the requirement for graduation, but at the same time these must be of such character as to make one hundred twenty points. One term hour completed with grade A counts three points; with grade B, two points, and with grade C, one point. Grades below C do not count for points, and not more than thirty term hours with a grade of D will count toward graduation. So, in the future, it will be impossible for a "straight D" student to graduate.

Requirements for the courses leading to degrees of Bachelor of Arts and of Bachelor of Science, have been altered; also the former group system has been abandoned. The major subject must cover twenty-six term hours in the same department, and the minor subjects twenty-six term hours in two distinct departments. Not less than ten hours may be taken in any minor subject. A pre-engineering course, leading to a degree of Bachelor of Science is offered, as well as a pre-medical course of two years, which fulfills the requirements for entrance into most of the medical schools.

The Department of English has been divided into the Departments of Eng-

lish Language and of English Literature. Under the Department of English Language, Course II, Advanced Expository Writing, and Course IV, Advanced Narrative Writing, are divisions of English XVI, which covered both of these fields. Course IV, Argumentation and Debating, and Course V, Theory and Practice of Speech Composition are new courses. Under the Department of English Literature, a course in Literary Criticism is offered. This course deals with literary problems and appreciation. It is open to Seniors only.

No new courses are offered in the Department of Education, but in order to meet the requirements of the educational code of Pennsylvania for a Teachers' Provisional Certificate, some new courses will probably be described before the opening of the fall term in 1922.

Mathematics V, is a new course which will deal with the Mathematics of Finance. Philosophy V, Introduction to Philosophy, will come in introductory survey of the field of philosophy with specific reference to the great historic systems. Political Science IX will deal with the Development of Legal Institutions.

Aside from the changes noted, the catalogue contains the usual general information about the college, buildings, expenses and college organizations.

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Colgate Outplays Blue and Gold 31-23

Final Game of the Trip Was a Thriller for New Yorkers

With one day's rest, the Allegheny basketball team appeared in Hamilton, N. Y., Saturday night for the final game of the trip with Colgate University. This proved to be the best game of the three, with the conquerors of Pitt and Syracuse working to their utmost to defeat the Blue and Gold. After forty minutes of the fastest basketball seen on the Colgate court this season, the Maroon emerged victors by a 31-23 score.

The first period saw some rapid passwork by both teams and at half period the Hamiltonians led by four points, 18-14. However, with the opening of the second period, the attacks of both teams fell off noticeably, but the four-point lead proved a sufficient margin for the New York five, and they increased it by the same number of points in the latter half.

Parker, Kofford and Miller were the Blue and Gold mainstays. Kofford was especially successful from the foul line, with a total of eleven out of fourteen attempts. For Colgate,

the work of Dolan, Livermore and O'Connor was of the highest order.

Much credit is due Manager Booth for the efficient manner in which the details of this trip were carried out. The men were given splendid treatment and every means was employed to make them comfortable.

On the other hand, the Niagara men, taking advantage of the weakened condition of the visitors and displaying a lightning offensive, had soon gained a commanding lead, which was steadily increased. At the end of the first period Niagara led by five points, 20-15, but in the latter half the Blue and Gold scored but six points, while Niagara amassed a total of 26.

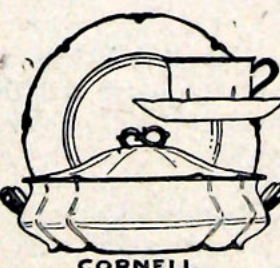
