BASKET BALL.

CLOSING CONTEST OF THE SEASON

At Warren—Great Victory for Allegheny.

Allegheny played her last game of basket ball of the season on Friday, March 25, the day after the close of college. It was played at Warren and the Y. M. C. A. team of that place were the opponents. Although the Warren gymnasium is quite small, yet the game was a pretty one and contained no unpleasant features. The official work was strict and as a result ten fouls were called, eight on Allegheny and two on Warren. Coates scored five out of his eight chances from foul, while Borland scored on both chances for Allegheny.

The game was a close one throughout, Allegheny taking the lead at the start and retaining it through the contest. The game started with a few wild shots by Allegheny and after carrying the ball from one end of the gymnasium to the other several times, Borland landed the first goal of the game. Allegheny was penalized twice for fouling while Coates threw both goals. Lampe la Allegheny in the again by om th

throws and the score was a tie once more. Frazier at this point of the game made one of his phenomenal plays, for which he is becoming celebrated. The ball was at Warren's basket when Bill secured it and began rolling it up the floor while several of his opponents were swung from one side to the other trying to get the ball from him. A neat pass near the basket to Wolstoncroft gave Allegheny two more points and placed her in the lead again. The next two goals were made by Lampe; Bogart now secured two for Warren from the field and when a few minutes later he secured another goal, it looked as though Allegheny would have some difficulty in winning the game. But at this point Taylor landed Allegheny in the lead by a long shot. Borland's foul goal ended the scoring for the first half, the score being 13 to 10 in Allegheny's favor.

The second half was a repetition of the first, Allegheny always retained her lead but always by a small number of points.

Borland opened this half by a goal made under close guard, this was followed by one by Wolstoncroft. The next two were Warren's and at this point Allegheny was given a free throw; Borland scored the foul and Allegheny was four points in the lead. The play now became more loose and the scores were made with greater frequency. The final score was Allegheny 30, Warren 25.

BASE BALL.

Outlook for a Successful Season—Excellent Schedule Partially Arranged.

Indications all point to an especially successful base ball season. Practice is going on actively. Of last year's players Baker, Borland, Fitzgerald, Hammon and Taylor are in school this term. Cota and Finnegan have come to us with excellent reputations, and a large number of other men have presented themselves for practice. There will be little difficulty in filling all the positions with good men, and the team should be a winner.

Mr. Guy J. Hecker, of Oil City, Pa., has been secured to coach the team. Mr. Hecker coached the Lehigh team at Bethlehem, Pa., last year, and was very successful. He is an old National League player of reputation, and for several years has been captain and manager of the Oil City base ball team. We are fortunate in securing a coach who promises to be so able.

Manager Secrist has nearly completed his schedule of games which we present to our readers as it is now arranged. The team will take one trip among the colleges in and around Pittsburg, playing six games, and will play all the leading colleges in our own vicinity. About a dozen

Proposed Amendments to the Constitution of the Athletic Association.

The following amendments to the constitution of the Athletic Association have been proposed and posted: Article 4. To amend Section 1. to read: This Association shall meet regularly three times per year on Saturday of the third week of each term.

Article 5. To amend Section 2, 3 and 4, so as to read:

Section 2. The President, the Secretary and Treasurer and the Delegate from the Athletic Association to the Athletic Advisory Board shall be elected from the whole number of nominations made by members of the Athletic Association. The managers of the various teams shall be elected in the following manner: From the whole number of nominations presented for each office, the Athletic Board shall select two persons who shall be the official nominees for said office and shall be elected according to Article 3, Section 2.

Section 3. In the fall term the President of the Athletic Association, the manager and the assistant manager of the base ball team shall be elected. In the winter term the delegate-at-large from the Athletic Association to the Athletic Advisory Board, the manager and assistant manager of the football team and the manager of the track team shall be elected. In the spring term the manager and assistant manager of the men's basket ball team, the manager of the ladies' basket ball team, and the secretary and treasurer of the Association shall be elected.

Article 10. To amend Section 1 so as to read:

An annual field day shall be held during the spring term at a time designated by the Athletic Board.

The financial statement of the basket ball season, found in another column, is eloquent. It tells us many things. First it says in unmistakable accents that the management of the team has been thorough, competent and careful; and we are glad to praise the 'oo manager most heartily. He has labored faithfully and well, and his only reward must be the appreciation of his friends and the knowledge that he turns over to his successor in base ball a handsome balance.

The statement speaks for enthusiasm and spirit, a willing co-operation on the part of students and town people, with the team and its manager. We can shake hands with each other that with each athletic season the college body and our town friends manifest an increased interest in Allegheny's contests. Time was when men hesitated to take the management of a team, for fear that the season would be a failure financially, through the lack of interest. Now we are approaching a condition in which we can say with confidence, "We have no fear that the season won't pay; all our games make money now."

Even if we did not see the scores, the figures alone would tell us that our team was a winner. Experience has taught us that no management can be financially a success if the team managed does not win the majority of its games.

So, as we look at it, all things, management, playing and attendance, seems to have worked together to make the basket ball season of '00 a memorable one. All honor then to the manager who held the purse-strings, to the players who did the work and to the enthusiastic friends who cheered them on.

EXCHANGES.

Syracuse University has established a chemical museum.

Sixty-five per cent. of the students at Yale are church members.

The number of candidates for the Harvard baseball team is 177.

Pennsylvania has changed the requirements for the degree of M. D. from a four year to a three year course.

President Eliot, of Harvard, announces in his last annual report that half of the graduates of that University are taking, or can take, its A. B. degree in three years.

The students of the University of Michigan have presented a petition to the faculty requesting that work for the intercollegiate debates be allowed to count toward a degree.

Krentzlein and Teuksbury, of Pennsylvania, Arvis of Princeton, and Duffy of Georgetown, four of the swiftest American college sprinters, will run in the 100 yard special, to be held in Philadelphia, April 28.

Smith College still continues to be the largest woman's college in the United States, and now numbers twelve hundred students, with a Freshman class of four hundred. In the curriculum, its latest innovation is a course in Italian.

Four hundred and eight members of the graduating class at Harvard have indicated their choice of a profession, 100 will study law, 29 medicine, and 12 for the ministry, 45 will teach, and about 100 will enter business; 12 are to be journalists, 11 architects, 3 literary men, 1 an artist, and 1 a musician.

The University of Michigan will establish a new course designed to fit college men to hold public positions of trust and honor, and in which the student will be required to obtain a thorough knowledge of the history of commerce with its bearing on international law; also the conditions of international trade and banking, and of the conditions of home products.

The University of California has been enrolled in a list of educational institutions, the purpose of which is to furnish a means by which farmers may obtain student labor during the summer months. This work is under the direction of the Division of Statistics of the Agricultural Department. About two hundred and sixty-five colleges and other educational institutions have been entered on this list.

One of our exchanges, treating of the origin of baseball, says: "The devil was the first coacher. He coached Eve when she stole first. Adam stole second. When Isaac met Rebekah at the well, she was walking with a pitcher. Samson struck out a good many times when he beat the Philistines. Moses made his first run when he slew the Egyptian. Cain made a base hit when he killed Able. Abraham made a sacrifice. The prodigal son made a home run. David was a long distance thrower, and Mosds shut out the Egyptians at the Red Sea."

A plan has been made by graduates connected with the musical interests of Harvard University to form a chorus of ten or fifteen men to go abroad this summer. The plan is being favorably considered by the faculty. The primary object of the trip is to secure for the men taken the exceptional musical and social advantages offered by such a trip. The chorus will give a few concerts on the trip, but only to pay expenses. The men who go will be selected in competition from all departments of the university, and when chosen will receive careful training under an experienced musical director.

The trustees of Lehigh University at a meeting recently decided to rebuild at once the Physical and Electrical Laboratory which was burned. President Drown says the new structure will be equipped and ready for occupancy by next September, and that in the meantime the students in the electrical course will continue their studies uninterruptedly in other class-rooms.—Ex.

A new bill to establish the University of the United States has been introduced in the Senate by Senator Chauncey M. Depew. It differs from the bills heretofore introduced and favorably reported in several ways. In terms as explicit as possible it limits the institution to work exclusively post graduate and special provides for particular attention to subjects which concern the government, vests the management in a single governing body—a Board of Regents, nearly all of whom are presidents of institutions of learning doing advanced work—and makes no appropriation of money. Like all the bills to establish a national university, it grants the twenty-acre tract of land in the city which President Washington, by authority of Congress, set apart, for this purpose.—Ex.

The idea of a great university to be established by the government at Washington has been entirely discarded by the sub-committee of the National Educational Association that has been considering the subject. The committee, however, which is composed of President Harper of Chicago and Prof. Nicholas M. Butler of Columbia, recommends a feasible scheme of government assistance to students and graduates by the use of existing facilities. It has just completed a report giving detailed plans whereby students who have taken a baccalaureate degree, or who have "equivalent" training, may use the scientific and other collections of the government for investigation and research. So we shall probably hear no more at present of the National University scheme, at least as far as the government is concerned.—Ex.

D., appear on the list of the faculty of the newly established Cleveland Law School, the former as Professor of the Law of Bill and Notes, the latter as Professor of the Law of Corporations. Mr. Howe is also one of the trustees of the institution. The Cleveland College of Law and Baldwin University Law School have been consolidated and incorporated under the laws of Ohio. The school will be known hereafter as the Cleveland Law School of Baldwin University. The faculty is particularly strong and the enrollment of the school is already considerable.

The physical laboratory of Lehigh University, one of the largest and best equipped in the country, was burned to the ground on the morning of April 6, and all its scientific apparatus destroyed. The building was a four-story stone structure, erected in 1893 at a cost of \$150,000. The apparatus was valued at \$50,000, and included all modern improvements. There is only \$50,000 insurance.—Ex.

HUNTING WITH A CAMERA.

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There is a girl in Chicago who has hunted various kinds of game—bear, deer, partridge—this autumn with her camera, and has found life so delightful while thus occupied that she can hardly stop talking about it. Clad in true hunter's garb, and bearing a trusty camera instead of a rifle, the girl went forth to hunt bear. Tripods are of small service in the woods and swamps, so the camera was slung over the shoulder by a strap. For three days the regulation hunting party, of which the girl made one, hunted bear with much energy and persistence; then its members rested for their labors long enough to attend a rural wedding ceremony at a little forest church. Leaving the church, half an hour later they encountered a vociferous shout from some of their fellow-worshippers. A few yards down the road a huge black bear lumbered easily along, her cubs on either side. The guns of the more seasoned hunters were at their shoulders in an instant. But the camera, alas! was still under the church seat, where the instinct of conventionality had led the girl to slip it while the service was in progress. The only satisfaction which the girl got out of that meeting with the bear was a good cry over the moonings and lamentations of the little cubs left desolate by the prowess of the other hunters. And it was the only bear seen during the trip.

The hunting of the partridge is a keen joy to the nature lover. The photographing of the little brownies is quite another thing. They were by no means difficult to trace or come up with in the Canadian and Wisconsin woods this autumn, being so tame that one could easily get within 20 yards before they took alarm. But partridges at 20 yards are but small specks upon the finding glass of the ordinary camera, and when suddenly discovered either the soft light filtering down through the interlacing tree tops was insufficient for photographic purposes or the birds were too quick for even an instantaneous snapshot.

The single partridge picture obtained was that of a small covey crossing the open road in peace and security, and the birds looked altogether too much like a flock of little chickens to render this picture of much value. Besides, the knowledge that the gun hunters, whose "first turn" it was not at that moment, were fairly dancing with impatience and longing, was by no means conducive to steady nerves, and resulted in a wavy presentation of birds and roadway less satisfying than unique.

Deer hunting, she said, was "simply glorious"—until the other hunters killed the deer. Then the joy of it was dampened considerably, in more ways than one. Twice, also, the camera hunter had "buck fever," and simply gazed, spellbound, at the fine stag driven out into the open before her, until it had gracefully leaped a thicket and hastened away. The other hunters, who waited for her to cry "done," as their signal to shoot, had no chance at all. After this experience had been twice theirs, they restricted the camera hunter's chances to one in three instead of turn and turn about. Once and only once was a fine deer picture obtained, and then the camera was overturned shortly after and the picture spoiled, but the deer was a magnificent fellow. As he stood outlined against the sky line he looked noble, the camera hunter openly rejoiced that nobody else "got him."—Chicago Tribune.
