### M. U. C. Adopts New Rush Rules For Summer Frosh

John Petre was elected president of the Men's Undergraduate council at the regular meeting Monday noon. Russell Minnick, '44, was elected vice-president and Harold Newson, '44, will take over the office of secretary-treasurer. The new officers will assume their respective duties at the next regular meeting.

Petre, a junior and member of Phi Gamma Delta, is a varsity swimmer, treasurer of his class, and a member of Phi Beta Phi.

The meeting saw the end of M. U. C. activities for the year under the present administration with election of officers for 1942-43.

#### Open House Proposal Defeated

The Men's Undergraduate council proposed a new idea this year by suggesting Sunday open-house for fraternities. Basing their action on the idea that the fraternity house serves as a home for its members, the council submitted the plan for faculty action. Although the measure was defeated, it was a sincere proposal on the part of the council to improve social conditions of the fraternity man.

#### New Rushing Rules

Retiring president, Dale Byers, stated that rushing rules have been modified to accommodate new freshmen enrolled for summer sessions. The changes are as follows:

1. Fraternities may rush men during summer periods.
2. Formal pledging of first-year men may not take place until next fall.
3. There shall be a lapse of two months before a man who has deplored may be pledged by another fraternity.

Byers concluded by saying that fraternities will be subject to rushing penalties in cases where these rules are violated.

## Student Loans Made Available

All applications for student aid, beginning with the summer session and extending through the year, must be filed at the dean's offices on or before April 15.

The college will make loans up to one hundred dollars to summer school students.

A survey of job opportunities in various local industries is now being compiled by the college in order to aid students in obtaining situations during the summer. A file of such jobs will be kept in the registrar's office.

It is expected within the next few weeks that the federal government will make available cancellable loans up to three hundred dollars per student attending summer school. Pre-medical students, pre-dental students, pre-pharmaceutical students, pre-engineering students, physics students, chemistry students, and students specializing in plant and production management will be the only students to whom this plan will apply if passed. If the student is later called into service, his financial debt to the government will be canceled.

## Address System Gift of Seniors

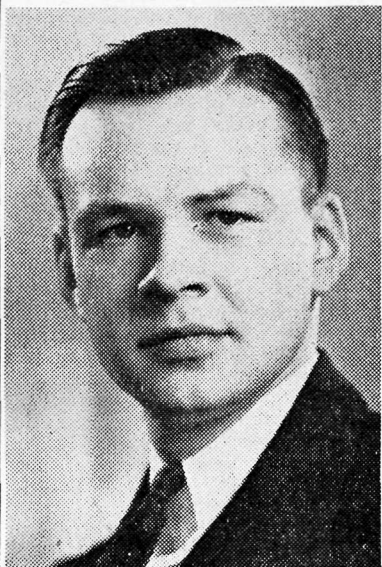
A complete public address system for Ford chapel, the gift of the senior class, will be installed in the next few weeks, according to Robert Welday, president of the class.

The system, which was recently purchased, will have a capacity for three microphones, so that panel discussions and other group programs may be held, in addition to regular presentations. A phonograph outlet is also included in the system.

A similar system for the women's dining room in Brooks hall has been given by the Allegheny Undergraduate council and will be installed at the same time as the chapel system.

A phonograph turn-table is also a part of the Brooks system so that all-college radio parties may be held and continuous dinner music provided during the evening meals.

## Singers Off On Busy Spring Concert Tour

Approximately fifty of the Allegheny Singers are leaving today to give a series of four concerts in various Ohio cities included in the annual spring itinerary, which was announced today by Edward H. Johe of the music department.

Their first appearance on the Ohio trip will be in the Edgewood high school of Ashtabula at 8 p. m. today. From there they will travel to Willoughby where they will give a concert tomorrow at 8 p. m. in the Methodist church, Saturday at 8:30 p. m. they will sing in Severance hall, Cleveland.

Two concerts are scheduled for this Sunday—the first at 10:45 a. m. in the Methodist church of Lakewood and the final concert of the tour will be in Cleveland's Church of the Covenant at 4:30 p. m.

The scheduled program includes two of Mr. Luvaas' latest compositions, "Spring Longing" and "O Sing Unto Him." The latter and another composition of Mr. Luvaas', "Hymn of Praise" were sung by a massed choir of 1500 voices at the St. Olaf Festival in 1940.

The Singers, noted for their purity of tone and smooth balance, have made previous outstanding experiences in Philadelphia, Atlantic City, Pittsburgh, Cleveland, and Buffalo.

Several local and one-day trips have been scheduled, among them a hospital benefit concert to be given in Meadville high school next Thursday at 8:15 p. m. Tickets are \$5.50 and may be obtained at the treasurer's office.

The Singers will provide the chorale for the Palm Sunday services in the Allegheny chapel, March 29. They plan another presentation that afternoon at the First Methodist church of Franklin.

To commemorate the community holy week service in Titusville, the Singers will present a concert April 1, at 8:15 p. m. in the Presbyterian church there.

The group, which is under the direction of Morten J. Luvaas, will make two appearances April 19: at Greensburg, at 4 p. m. and in the Emory church, Pittsburgh at 8 p. m.

## New Courses In Short Session

Courses offered in the pre-summer school session from May 18 to June 6 include seven new reading courses in addition to seven regular courses, according to an announcement Monday by Hurst R. Anderson, registrar of the college. Pre-registration for the session will be held from next Monday, March 23, to

Easter vacation, April 3.

Courses already in the curriculum which will be continued through the three-week session include the following:

Mathematics P-S1 (a)—college algebra, or  
Mathematics P-S1 (b)—trigonometry. Mr. Beisel.

Secretarial studies P-S1 (a)—beginning typewriting. Miss Booth.

Secretarial studies P-S3 (a)—beginning shorthand. Miss Booth.

Biology PS17—first aid. Mr. Glover.

Introduction to social science P-S1. Mr. Roberts.

Introduction to religion P-S1. Mr. Lavelly.

New reading courses which will be given during the pre-summer period include the following:

Readings in English literature. An intensive reading course in some field of English literature, to be determined upon consultation with the instructor. Suggested fields are of either individual authors or literary types. Mr. Benjamin.

Readings in American literature. Same as above except in field of American literature. Mr. Schultz.

Readings in economics. Intensive reading on a special problem in the field of economics. Mr. McMahan.

Readings in history. Intensive or extensive reading in some field, such as the Far East, Europe 1870-1920, Europe since 1920, the British empire, and the Renaissance and Reformation. Mr. Cares, Mr. Yarrow.

Readings in political science. Intensive or extensive reading in some subject, such as European governments in wartime, international law, international government, political theory, and municipal government.

Readings in psychology. Reading program on selected problems in the field of psychology. Mr. Dyer.

Readings in French literature. Offered to advanced students in French. Student and instructor will determine the literary period or author to be studied. Miss Ludwig.

As can be seen, the additional courses consist of readings in various fields, under the guidance of the instructor. The individual program will be arranged by the student and the instructor. Admission to each course is by consent of the instructor only.

Each course offered in the pre-summer school session counts three hours of credit. Students are limited to one course during the session.

Tuition for the pre-summer session is ten dollars for each credit hour. Board and room will amount to eleven dollars per week.

### Pre-Registration

Pre-registration for the pre-summer school session, the summer session, and the first semester of the regular session begins Monday, March 23, and must be finished by Easter vacation, April 3.

All students must plan their schedules with their advisers during this period.

## Old Prof. Visits As Debate Coach

Twenty years ago he helped the Allegheny debate squad through several seasons of favorable decisions; now his position is reversed, for Clair F. Littell, former local history professor, coaches the Allegheny debate team's next opponents—Cornell college, Iowa.

The Cornell college team, accompanied by Littell, is coming here next Monday to discuss government suppression of labor unions with the local debaters.

Littell taught history at Allegheny 1920-1924, during which time he was faculty representative on the Oratorical society. Cornell college in Iowa is, like Allegheny, a liberal arts co-educational school.

## Student Army Training Course Offered To Allegheny Students In First World War

(Concluded in this issue)

On May 8, the school was brought to an immediate realization of the presence of war by the sudden departure of fourteen undergraduates and one alumnus for France. The men had enlisted in the Lakeside hospital unit of Cleveland and had returned to college to complete the year, when two days later the sudden call came to report for duty. Two weeks later they were on their way to France.

From this time, the list of men leaving for service grew steadily until on May 31 over one hundred men had left to enter some type of military service. Final examinations were omitted and commencement exercises much simplified.

Football remained as a strong sport the next fall, however. In six starts, Allegheny hung up five victories and one tie, Carnegie Tech being the only opponent to escape a beating. A post-season game with a team of soldiers from Camp Lee was also won, 7-6, by the blue and gold.

The war was again brought close home to the college with the departure of President Crawford for France to take up Y. M. C. A. work with the expeditionary force, where he met with many former Allegheny students. Letters were received from him and other men in the service and consequently published in the "Campus."

Bentley hall came very near being destroyed by fire in February, 1918, when a blaze broke out in the base-

ment. Prompt action by the student body and the Meadville fire department confined the fire to a small area.

Similar in nature to the campaign now being conducted was the book campaign for soldiers which was held in March, 1918, and which proved very successful.

The school year was brought to a dramatic close. Ceremonies honoring President Crawford, who had returned from France, on completion of his twenty-fifth year as head of the college were held. Ex-U. S. President William Howard Taft received the degree of doctor of laws from Allegheny and responded with a scholarly and eloquent speech concerning the legal and moral aspects of the war.

On October 1, 1918, the Student's Army Training corps was established on the Allegheny campus by the government in order to train candidates for commission in the army. During the months of October, November, and December the college was a military institution in every particular. Students marched to their classes in the uniform of the United States army, "firmly united to crush the military despotism of Germany and make Kaiser Bill take notice of Allegheny's military preparation," according to the December 10 issue of the "Campus."

The war department took full charge of the men who became eighteen or over on September 12. Five military instructors, selected by the war department, and assisted

by nine Allegheny men who had summer camp training, had the task of making soldiers out of the men students.

On October 1, Allegheny college was at the disposal of the government. Cochran hall and the six fraternity houses, which were converted into barracks, housed the student's army. A week later, Allegheny appeared like a typical United States cantonment. The students accustomed themselves to military life very quickly and in a short time every man lived the life of a private.

The S. A. T. C. men did not spend the whole of their time drilling and studying, however. When the daily routine was over, the fellows would gather three times a week in Ford chapel and participate in a "sing." The contagious ditty "K-K-K-Katy" was a worse spreading epidemic than the flu which threatened to spread throughout the college at one time.

The Students' Army Training corps was demobilized after the armistice, which was celebrated with appropriate exercises, and demobilization was completed by December 13. After the Christmas holidays, Allegheny witnessed the passing away of the military life and returned to its normal life.

Now another war has come and Allegheny is once more called on to do her bit for her country. Many steps such as these have already been taken and more may be necessary before we, too, can return to peacetime activities.

## Letters to the Editor:

Editor of the Campus:

One of the outward symbols of our high standard of living, one of the fine points of our civilization, is the fact that we cover the floors of our homes with rugs. Large or small, rag or Persian, every home has them. And so Allegheny College, a progressive institution of the first water, has rugs too. I suppose that the college has had rugs for quite some time. Probably Timothy Alden brought some with him as he came up French Creek in that little flat-bottomed boat with his two sons, three daughters, wife Elizabeth, and a pianoforte. But the latest acquisition of the college is the new set of rugs which grace the Green Room (so named because it contains more shades of green than any other room in existence.) Of course, these rugs are of a very light, practical shade which will show dirt easily. Now, let me point out that the shortest way from the front door of Brooks Hall to any part of Walker is through said Green Room containing said new rugs. "It is to be emphasized that a careful record of the effects of the tablets should be kept," states the dean, "since we are cooperating with one of the large chemical companies in helping them get evidence on the value of their vitamin products."

## Phi Deltas Grab First In Swim Meet

Scoring nearly half their points in three of the ten scheduled events, the Phi Deltas swam to victory in the annual intramural swimming meet held last Wednesday afternoon. The Terrace street natators garnered a total of 49 points in the meet and were followed by the Phi Psi with 25 counters and the Sigs with 24.

Two intramural swimming records were set in the meet, in the 100-yard freestyle and 120-yard backstroke events. Leroy Paul of the Phi Gams set a new time of 1:04.9 in the 100-yard freestyle, and Bud Cannon of the Phi Psi won the 120-yard backstroke in the record-breaking time of 1:45.4.

Victory in the 160-yard freestyle event and sweeps of both first and second places in the 120-yard breaststroke and 60-yard medley individual accounted for 24 of the winner's points.

Representatives of the Phi Psi tank team captured four first places, the largest number of winners of which any team could boast. Bud Cannon scored first places in both the 40-yard and 160-yard backstroke events; Doc August won a first in the 40-yard breaststroke event, and the Phi Psi medley relay team swam to victory in their race.

Others winners in the meet included Paul, Spiringer, Pierce, and Witter. Leroy Paul won both the 40-yard and 100-yard freestyle races. Spiringer came in first in the 220-yard freestyle contest, while Pierce and Witter won the 60-yard medley individual and 120-yard breaststroke events respectively.

By virtue of Paul's two wins the Phi Gams were credited with two firsts and the Sigs tallied one through Spiringer's performance.

The Sigs were credited with 18 points in the meet and the Alden Men, by placing third's in the 220-yard freestyle and 160-yard freestyle relay, got 6 points.

The Phi Delt superiority was gained by virtue of numerous second and third places and the fact that they were able to score points in every event. They had a total of seven seconds, three thirds, and one fourth place to bolster their race-winning points.

Despite the good times recorded in most events, the meet fell short in the field of establishing all-time marks of the record set at last year's meet, held in 1940.

Athletic Director H. P. Way announced this week that the faculty athletic committee had agreed to drop the prevailing freshman rule concerning intercollegiate sports competition.

First Gator squad to be affected by the decision will be the tennis squad which meets for the first time this spring next Monday afternoon at 4:00 p. m., in the gym.

The decision of the committee follows the course of action which has already been taken at a large number of eastern schools and locally by Carnegie Tech in Pittsburgh.

Mr. Way emphasized, in making the announcement, however, that the suspension was not extended to the rule governing participation of transfer students. As has been the case in previous years, transfers will not be allowed to compete on a varsity team during their first year here at Allegheny.

The welcome and necessary change came at an opportune time, for the resulting addition of strength to the spring teams will help to offset possible losses through early graduation or induction of students yet in school.

The nucleus of this year's net squad will be formed by veterans Blank, Caravacci, Brokas, Fauver, and Leuthner. In addition to these former varsity men the team should be able to find an adequate amount of talent in the sophomore and freshman classes to bolster the squad.

Varsity men lost from last year's squad include McEwen, number one singles man; McVey and Flint.

The team will begin its workouts next week indoors on the Montgomery boards and expects to hold its first outdoor practices in a couple of weeks in preparation for the opener here on April 18 with powerful Oberlin.

The schedule this year has been necessarily shortened to the games originally scheduled before the third week of May, but several of these later games may be moved up to enlarge on the present five-match schedule.
