

REVIEW OF 1917-18 BASKET BALL GAMES

Season is a Success—Allegheny Wins 6 Games, Loses 3—Scores 240 Points to Opponents' 213—Defeated in Post Season Game

Geneva established its supremacy over Allegheny in basketball last night at the Trees Gymn. when they met in a special game to decide which team shall be regarded as the Intercollegiate champion of Western Pennsylvania. The score was 27 to 18, and the disparity in the points amply tells the difference in the play of the two teams.

Westminster protests the claim of Geneva, and it is more than likely they will play also, at least that appeared to be the unofficial sentiment of the partisans last night.

The crowd was made up of adherents of the two teams, principally. A big mob came up from the Beaver valley. The Geneva co-eds were out in force and prior to the start they sang their college songs.

The sum of \$228 was taken in at the gate, and after paying the officials, Eyman and Buck Baird, who worked faultlessly, the two teams were given the balance to donate to the Red Cross of their respective sections. Karl E. Davis, Pitt graduate athletic manager, managed the finance for them.

Geneva won most all the way. Kerr started the scoring by tossing in a foul goal at the outset, then another and Geneva soon tied the count. They were deadlocked again at 6, but thereafter Geneva forged ahead and always stayed out in front, winning the first half, 11 to 8. And in the second period Geneva was always at least 5 points in the lead.

Geneva played a splendid all-around game, while Allegheny's play was faulty to a degree of slovenliness. The boys from Meadville could not hold the ball, and their passing was erratic. They did not make a field goal in the first half, and Volk and Kerr were the only members of the team to score from the floor in the second period, and in each instance by the medium of a long toss. Early in the second half Allegheny missed several apparently sure shots at the basket, but they were always hurried.

Harr, a six-foot-four center for Geneva, played a wonderfully clever game; in fact, he showed more versatility than has perhaps any other college center that appeared on the Pitt floor in years. He always out-jumped Meredith, putting Allegheny on the defense, and he had the ball more often than any man on either team. The work of Forbes and Stringer was almost equally as good. The fact that Allegheny was held to but two field goals attests to the efficiency of this pair.

Bianchi did fairly good, and had Meredith been opposed to a man of a lower caliber than Harr he might have stood out from his teammates. The lineup:

Letter From Dr. Crawford

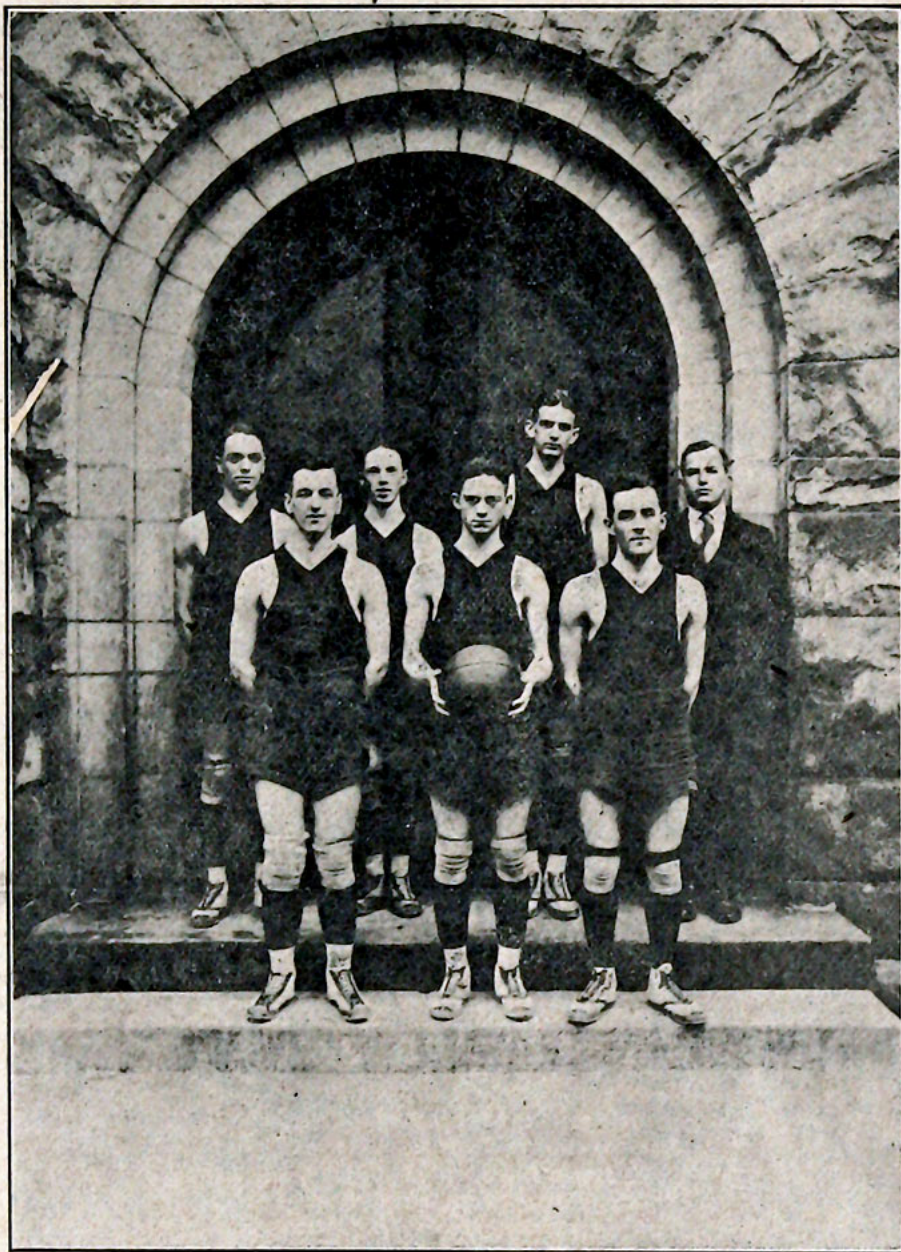
GOES CLOSE TO THE FRONT, IN VERDUN REGION. HAS EXCITING EXPERIENCES.

The following letter from President Crawford was received by his son, Dr. John R. Crawford:

Somewhere in France,
March 13, 1918.

Since last Thursday I have been pretty well up towards the line. Yesterday was up too close for comfort. From Saturday to Monday I was in the Verdun region with a lot of good American engineers—they were a good lot, too, and I had a mighty fine time with them. The Y. M. C. A. Sec-

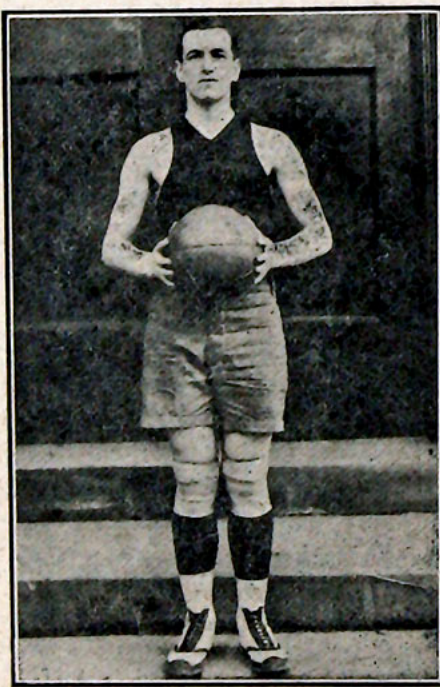
BASKET BALL TEAM, 1917-1918.

Front row—Volk, Bianchi, (Captain), Lane.

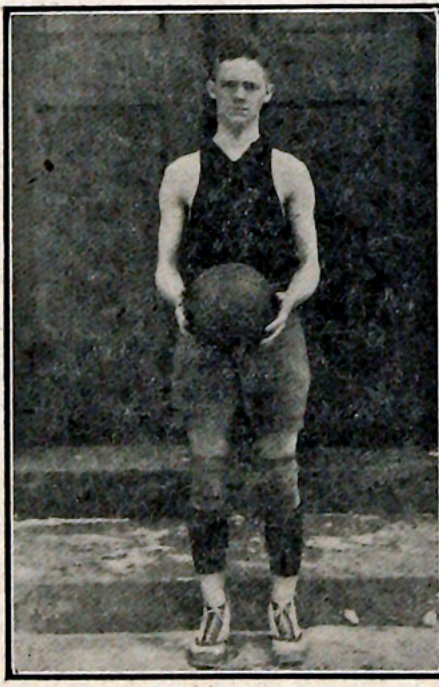

INDIVIDUAL WRITEUPS OF PLAYERS

Splendid Record Made by Men of Basket Ball Team—Team Will Lose Capt. Bianchi and Lane—Kerr, Volk and Meredith Remain

CAPTAIN BIANCHI.

For four years of Allegheny's basketball history Bianchi's name has occupied a large and important place in the record of every game in which he played. Two seasons he has piloted the team in the capacity of captain, having been re-elected in the Spring of 1917 due to his brilliant work during the season then concluded. The marked success of the team this year has been largely due to the consistent, high class brand of basket ball played by this veteran of four seasons with the Blue and Gold. In his Freshman year Bianchi played opposite Cox in the forward position and acquitted himself so well that there was no doubt as to his status as a varsity man. The following year he was shifted to right guard to fill the place left vacant by Captain Graham, '15. Here he proved to be the right man in the right place and so excelled in his work both on the offensive and defensive that he was elected to the captaincy for the following year. His Junior year, Captain Bianchi built up a team and then played the best game of his career to that time, instilling into the inexperienced team the confidence that brought to a successful end a season that started with discouraging results. His wonderful work in this difficult year was responsible for his re-election as captain at the end of the season. This year he developed a near-champion team, losing but three games in a most difficult season, and establishing a record of victories to be proud of. Accurate shooting, a sure guard, ever on the alert to take advantage of a hole or to cover up a team mate's error, he has been responsible to a great degree for the maintenance of Allegheny's basketball record during the four years of his career with the team. His loss will be sorely felt by Alleghenians and his place a hard one to fill.

LANE.

His Freshman year, Lane played on his champion class team; his Sophomore year he proved his worth by holding down a place on the second team; his Junior year he occupied the unusual position of a medium height man at center on the varsity; and this, his Senior year, he has played a stellar game at guard. Last year in the center position, after a few weeks in getting accustomed to the new position, he settled down to make a record for himself and succeeded exceptionally well. His guarding and floor work were of the best, and during the last four games of the season he easily out-scored his man. This year, in his more natural element at guard, Lane has played a consistent, steady game, forming part of the defense that has done so much to make the team's showing so good. His shooting has been another valuable element which he has contributed to the team and many a basket was due to his quick eye. In floor work and support at the right moment, he excelled, always being dependable. In Lane another valuable varsity man graduates, and another place is left vacant, difficult to fill.

VOLK.

Three years with the varsity and still going stronger is Volk's record with the Blue and Gold team. A veteran of two years of Allegheny basketball, Volk started in this year to do even better than in the past and succeeded. In the past at the position of guard, Volk was ever a strong point getter and could be depended upon to ring several baskets in every game in addition to holding his man. This year upon Lane's return to the guard position and Meredith's making good at center, Volk was moved up to forward where he was enabled to demonstrate his basket tossing ability to the utmost advantage. Many an opposing guard will recall with vividness his game against Volk and the way that ball seemed unerringly attracted to the ring from the hand of this whirlwind forward. Consistent scoring was his specialty, while his old experience at guard proved invaluable when the play was on the defensive for a time. Aggressive attack and good support characterized his play throughout the entire season and it is with confidence that we look forward

to his ability as a basis for next year's team.

KERR.

Playing his second year of varsity basketball, Kerr proved a fine running mate for "Junts" Volk, who held down the other forward position. Kerr's playing was much improved over last year's, especially in the shooting line; in addition, he was a dependable foul shooter. There was no more tireless worker on the team, and his floor work was exceptionally first class at all times. Allegheny is fortunate in having two more years of "Snivy's" service available, provided war conditions do not necessitate his leaving school. It was due to Kerr's agility and quickness that we won the West Virginia game in the last minute of play. Besides skill, "Snivy" has a keen basketball sense which almost intuitively enables him to size up and meet any situation.

MEREDITH.

To tall George fell the task of leading the attack. Usually dependable at getting the jump, he thereby started Allegheny's attack in motion which invariably terminated with a defeat for the opposing five. Probably Meredith's best game was against Pitt. He was surely primed for the contest and aided materially in administering the worst defeat Pitt has received at the hands of Allegheny. George also showed up well in both Geneva games although he was pitted against Harr, one of the best basketball centers whom Allegheny has met this year. This was George's first year on the varsity—with two more years ahead of him the basketball outlook is very propitious for championship teams.

MANAGER BALDWIN.

The manager of the basketball team during the past season was none other than Ex-Capt. Baldwin, of last year's football team. Joe seems equally adept at handling coin as handling the pigskin. The team is loud in its praise of the satisfactory manner in which the team was taken care of on the trips. Joe took care that the best accommodations possible were obtained for the team. Ronald Reamer, ex-18, had been elected manager of the team, but his enlistment last Spring in the Hospital Unit now in France, left a vacancy. The schedule was practically complete when Baldwin took charge. He, however, tried to schedule additional games, but was unsuccessful due to existing conditions. However, he has planned a fine schedule for next year's team.

THE SCRUBS.

And now in passing let us pay our respects to those fellows who help to put the varsity in condition and who on the night of a contest, sat on the bench unwept, unhonored and unsung—fellows who uncomplainingly and willingly stuck out on the squad for four or five months with little, if any, hopes of breaking into a game. However, such is the type of athlete Allegheny puts out—when the ranks are thinned out by graduation then the worker reaps his reward by receiving the coveted position on the varsity; and so we mention Engstrom, '18, who played guard; Stephens, '20, center; Preston, '20, forward; Smith, '20, guard; Dunbar, '21, forward, and Russell, '21, forward. From these and next year's Freshmen will Coach Hammett mould next year's team with Volk, '19, Kerr, '20, and Meredith, '20, as a nucleus—Captain Bianchi, '18, Lane, '18, and Engstrom, '18, will be lost through graduation.

THOBURN CLUB.

The Thoburn Club held its fortnightly meeting in the Oratory last Tuesday evening. Reverend Traum, pastor of the local Christian Church, was the speaker for the evening. He spoke on the theme, "Soul Winning." He said, in general, that soul winning was brought about by contact of personality with personality. He said, also, that he who wins souls is wise, and he that is wise wins souls.

The meeting was very profitable for those who attended as Reverend Traum has had a very wide experience in ministerial work.

the early games, the teamwork was of a superior brand. With four of last year's veterans back in College, Coach Hammett had an excellent nucleus around which to build a team. The center position was the only problem that remained to be solved, and with Meredith and Dunbar as the candidates, it looked as though even the difficulty of that situation was apparent rather than real. Long before the season opened it was evident that Meredith's range was a factor decidedly in his favor, and that the team that would oppose Colgate would be composed of Captain Bianchi and Lane as guards, Meredith as center, and Kerr and Volk as forwards. It compared favorably, on paper, with the famous 1915 team when Graham and Dunbar were the guards, McKay the center, and Cox, Bash, and Bianchi, were the forwards.

Colgate Game.

The season opened at home January 24, when Captain Bianchi led his followers against the fast Colgate five, the team that had taken their measure in 1917. The determination with which the entire quintet fought to the finish was evidence that men do not forget defeats within the period of a year. Bianchi and Volk were the leaders in the offense sharing honors by each caging six baskets. Lane was the chief factor in the guarding game, his work being sensational at times. Kerr was also good. Meredith, who played his first varsity game played in a manner becoming a veteran. The 41-34 victory over the New Yorkers presaged a very successful season.

Pitt Game.

Then came the game in which Allegheny followers are always particularly interested, that with the University of Pittsburgh. It had a little more interest attached to it this year on account of the fact that the Panthers had defeated practically the same team at Pittsburgh (the only basketball game that Pitt ever won from Allegheny) in the 1917 season. The 32-17 score is a fairly accurate barometer of the superiority of the locals over the Pittites. Allegheny probably displayed a better brand of teamwork in this contest than they did in any other game of the season. The team was heralded by sporting editors as one of the best that ever played in Trees gymnasium. In this game Volk and Meredith played the star roles. Volk caged four baskets, and Meredith held Nichols at bay while he was ringing up two counters. Allegheny outclassed Pitt in every round.

Tech Game.

After such a big victory over Coach Flint's crew, Coach Hammett led his men against the wearers of the Plaid the following evening. The Techites, having the advantage of knowing thoroughly Allegheny's style of play, kept the score down to 25-17. Abrams was the all-around star of the evening, scoring four baskets and five points from the foul line besides otherwise distinguishing himself. Volk was again the individual star for Allegheny, coming through with his usual quota of baskets. Allegheny showed a woeful weakness in the foul shooting department, getting only nine out of twenty attempts.

Buffalo University Game.

The next quintet of cagemen to fall before the onslaughts of the victorious Blue and Gold passers was that repre-

sented the University of Buffalo. This game was by no means an easy victory, and in all probability it was secured at the expense of the game with Rochester on the following night. Playing on a floor that was much larger than the local floor, Coach Hammett's passers were forced to use up every available resource to place victory securely on their side. In the opinion of Coach Hammett this was the best game that Allegheny played during the entire season. In this game Kerr and Volk led in the scoring department, each getting five baskets.

Rochester University Game.

The strenuousness of the Buffalo game proved too much for the locals when on the following evening they engaged the fast five of Rochester University. By a four-point margin Allegheny was forced to acknowledge defeat for the first time this season. The game was very even in every department except the foul-shooting department, and Allegheny's weakness here accounts for her defeat in a large measure. Both teams caged the same number of baskets, but while Harper was getting nine out of ten possible fouls for Rochester, Allegheny added only five in the same number of attempts.

West Virginia University.

Then followed the game that from the standpoint of the local spectators was the most interesting of the season. Playing in the home gymnasium, the locals regained all of the machine-like drive that had characterized their play in the early part of the season. The game was nip and tuck throughout, and not until the whistle blew, at which time Allegheny had the longer end of a 21-20 score, did either team have a safe advantage. With the score 20-19 in favor of the visitors and only ten seconds to play, Kerr made a wild heave at the basket and scored the two points that were needed to put victory on the side of the locals. Volk scored nine of Allegheny's 21 points and played his usual brilliant game. Dawson and Whitsell featured for West Virginia.

Geneva at Home.

The last home game of the season was that with Geneva, the co-aspirants for the Western Pennsylvania championship. Previous to this game the Beaver Falls team had met and defeated eleven big opponents, and

had placed herself in the limelight as Allegheny's biggest rival for Western Pennsylvania championship. By the score of 34-25 they bowed to the supremacy of the locals, but realized that the last word had not been said. There was a day of reckoning coming when the two teams were to line up in the Geneva gymnasium. In this game Kerr was easily the shining light both in offense and defense. He scored eighteen points out of Allegheny's 34 points. Thus far the championship belonged to the Blue and Gold.

Geneva at Beaver Falls.

But the last word had not been said, as Geneva rooters at the Meadville game had expected. The game played at Beaver Falls resulted in the locals being humbled by the score of 23-22. In this game the team showed signs of aggressiveness but none of that old time drive was so conspicuous as to outshine the home team. With each team claiming a victory and each aspiring to the championship there was nothing to do but play a post season game on a neutral court. Pittsburgh was decided upon as the best place for such a contest, and accordingly arrangements were completed whereby the supremacy could be decided upon at Trees gymnasium.

Then came the game that spoiled the record of the locals and placed the championship beyond the reach of the Blue and Gold. In the Pittsburgh game there was not a sign of the teamwork that so distinguished their play in the first games of the season, and they were completely outclassed by the ambitious Geneva College team.

old couple who each had had an eye gouged out by the German devils. One of the men showed me a photograph of two little girls from a town near by—dead with spear gashes in their breasts. I have seen the plot thicken during these days—it has been war close up. On Sunday I think I saw at least ten thousand French soldiers.

The thing that pleases me most is their spirit. Many of them are tired and wish the war was over, but they have no thought of giving up. They look well, and have their toes in the ground. Their physical fitness is far beyond what I expected. This is true of both officers and men. Yesterday I stood alongside a lot of them who had been only ten minutes out of the trenches. Rode some sixty miles yesterday altogether. This is a great country—good farming land. The plowing here is done with four-horse teams, two horses and an ox, a horse and an ox, or any old way. My afternoon ride when I saw most of the farming was away from the front. I had some great views of the surrounding country. Saw many, many graves—most of them German. Each has a railing about it and a cross at the head with name or number of regiment, etc. In one small wheat field I counted fourteen graves. The way the trees round about are shot to pieces is a caution. My hat is off nearly all the time, in thought at least, to the women of France for what they are doing. I saw so many of them in the fields yesterday. They ought to have a secure place among the world's heroines. Don't be feeling, though, that France is being bled white. She is not. France is heroically determined, if not triumphant. There seems absolute confidence in this region that the line will hold. I think I have seen a thousand miles of trenches in the past ten days, and as much barbed wire entanglements. The Germans have nothing on us as to gas. It is commonly reported here that they want to give up the whole gas business. All yesterday forenoon I wore a steel helmet and had two gas masks with me—English and French. Was in one little town which had been gassed in the morning. Met a Y. M. C. A. man who came over with me on the boat who was in it. The night before the town was shelled and one shell went straight through the room next to his. In another town I saw a shell hole twelve feet by four deep, made the night before. One of our secretaries was standing not more than ten feet away, but escaped unhurt except for a slight shrapnel wound in his arm and two in his back.

This is thrilling business getting up as close as I have been. Last night I spoke in the Officers' Club here, and tomorrow night I am to speak to eight or nine hundred men in a large hall of an old chateau. Tell Billy I have a piece of shrapnel for him, and two or three other things. I have my German helmet all right. A whole lot of love to Polly, and I do not forget Billy.

The Federal and State Governments with that of agricultural colleges in their attempts at regulating the meat supply of the Nation. It is not clerical but practical work. He is to report to Washington, spend from four to six weeks in the bureau there, and then be sent to various points. Beyond that he knows little of what will be expected of him, but his thorough knowledge of politics and economic conditions will make him well fitted for any such work.

Professor Stemple received his A. B. degree at Roanoke College, his A. M. at Princeton University, a Diploma in Economics and Political Science from Oxford University, besides having had experience as a teacher in several colleges, before coming to Allegheny, where for three years he has been an able and popular instructor. That he will be successful in his new field of service we do not doubt, so can only assure him of our appreciation of his commendable work in Allegheny.

The nomination of candidates to be voted upon at the general election next Saturday has been under way during the past week in the various classes as per Article IV, Sections 2, and 3, of the Constitution.

Article IV.

Section 3. Nominations from the classes.

(a) Four of the Junior nominees (to serve the following year as Seniors) shall be ex-officio nominees; these four being the editor of the Campus, the presidents of the Athletic Association and the Y. M. C. A., and the college cheer leader. (In case these offices are not held by Juniors, they shall not determine nominees.) In addition to these, the men of the class at a regular meeting shall make three other nominations. From these nominees three shall be chosen at the general election as representatives for the following year. The fourth representative shall be chosen by the out-going Senate as provided for in Article V, Section 2b.

(b) The men of the Sophomore class at a regular meeting shall make five nominations from their number, of whom two shall be chosen in the general election to serve the following year as Juniors.

(c) The men of the Freshman class at a regular meeting shall nominate three of their members, of whom one shall be chosen at the general election to serve the following year as a Sophomore.

As per the above article, the Senior class in the past week chose four nominees, G. R. Barr, R. F. Faulkner, J. O. Martin and F. L. Stewart. The ex-officio nominees are F. W. Morrow, President of the Athletic Association; G. A. Stetson, President of the Y. M. C. A., and G. D. Patterson, ex-officio, by special vote. From these seven nominees, three will be chosen for the Senate at the general election next Saturday.

The Sophomore Class chose the following nominees: J. F. Preston, P. K. Scheffer, E. P. Booth, G. L. Withey, and J. Y. Piper. From these, two will be chosen at the general election to serve on the Senate.

The Freshman Class chose the following nominees, of whom one will be chosen to represent the class in the Senate: P. H. Williams, M. W. Hartman, and F. W. McCluer.

The seventh member of the Senate will be chosen by the outgoing Senate, immediately after the general election next Saturday which will determine six of the Senate's seven members.

With regard to the right of suffrage, Article V, Section 4, reads as follows:

The eligible voters at the general election shall be those men upon the lists of voters furnished by the presidents of the classes to the secretary of the Senate at the same time that the lists of nominees are furnished, the requirements of eligibility being left to the discretion of the various classes. Payment of class dues is necessary to eligibility in all classes.

The candidates receiving the highest number of votes are declared elected.

Careful thought should be given to the selection of the Student Senate members by the voters, for the Senate is an institution of the utmost importance to the student body as a whole and to the welfare of the college.

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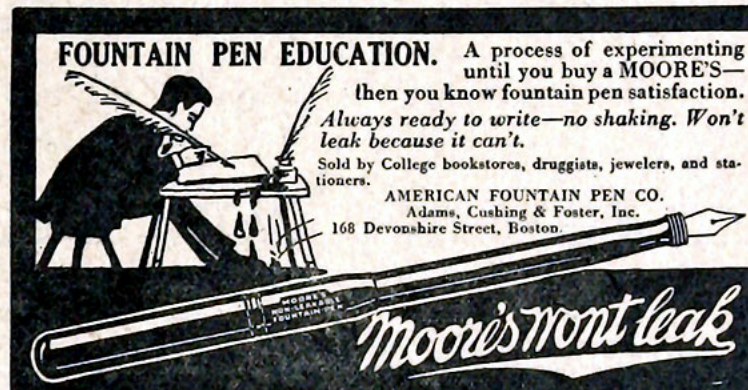
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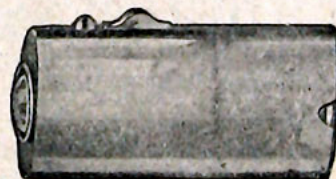

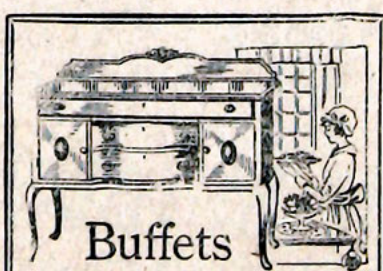
