MEMORIES OF COLLEGE DAYS

Dr. Crawford Present and Gives Toast—Officers Elected.

Allegheny stock in Pittsburg is above par and rising, if the banquet of the Alumni Club last Friday evening is an indication. A hundred loyal alumni and friends of "Old Allegheny" met at the Union Club rooms, which Dr. Crawford describes as the finest in Pittsburg. James W. Kinneer, A. M., '82, presided and Solomon Schoyer, A. M., '50, was toastmaster.

The first toast "Looking Backward" was responded to by Rev. N. H. Holmes, D. D., '70, of Bellevue. In his remarks Dr. Holmes related many interesting reminiscences concerning the early history of the college. "Misfits" was responded to by E. L. Mattern, A. M., '90. He kept the banqueters in a constant state of laughter as he spoke of various misfits in and out of college. The relation between "Allegheny College and Pittsburg" was very admirably treated by Mrs. Mae Goff Smith, A. M., '86. In her toast she referred to the loyalty of the late James A. Ballantine, D. D., '32, who was so largely instrumental in securing Ford chapel. Hon. J. Lee responded to the toast, "Prospects." "The Faculty" was thoroughly treated by Rev. Weyand, '98, of Knoxville. The Pittsburg Times quotes the following from his toast. "In these days when we hear of nothing but stocks and bonds and tickers it seems to me it is the man at the college who is doing the great work of the country. It seems to me the teacher with his opportunity is doing the work worth while. In Allegheny college there have been teachers who have made a suggestion to this one and brought another one to think. At the head of these teachers stand Dr. Crawford who is full of schemes for the advancement of the college, and with him stand members of the faculty whom we should endeavor to prevent other institutions of learning taking away from us. Allegheny college with its faculty has a bright future before it."

It is getting to be quite the thing at Allegheny banquets for Dr. Crawford to have the closing toast. Whether it is on the principle of keeping the good wine to the last we will not say. The Pittsburg Alumni fell in with the custom and the closing toast was "What Allegheny Stands For," by President W. H. Crawford. It is said that Dr. Crawford gave his audience some of his cherished plans for the future of "Old Allegheny" and that every one met with unanimous approval. That can only mean one thing and that is that something good is coming our way, for the Pittsburg Alumni can carry out those plans if anyone can.

About a minute and a half after the close of the banquet the telegram announcing Allegheny's victory over Geneva came. Many of the guests had gone into the other rooms but Dr. Crawford had them called together and read the telegram. The news was received with great enthusiasm which repeatedly found vent in the college yell.

One of the features of the banquet was the excellent orchestra which played anything called for. This helped to make another good feature found in the college songs. One of the most popular of these was entitled, "Mister Crawford."

In describing the banquet Dr. Crawford said: "Although the dinners of the Pittsburg Alumni Club have al-

THE COLLEGE CATALOGUE.

Book Makes Its Appearance With Several Material Changes—Civil Engineering to be Elective for All. The college catalogue is issued this week. It appears in its usual demure Quaker gray dress and on the exterior shows little change from its predecessors. An examination of the contents will show, however, that it is not a mere reprint. A much finer grade of paper both in the body and in the cover has been used. It is hard to see how the mechanical work could have been improved. The book is exceedingly creditable to the printers, McCoy & Calvin, of this city.

Besides numerous minor changes in arrangement and phraseology some of the details of the courses of instruction have been entirely rewritten, being amplified and made more specific. A new course in Chemistry, Course III., Quantitative Analysis, three hours weekly, is announced. English Bible III. is to run throughout the year instead of for two terms only. The course in Municipal Politics is dropped and a new course in Economics, Course III., Transportation, will be given the Spring term, two hours weekly. Engineering I., Surveying, has been made a general elective and may be taken by students not in the Civil Engineering Course. Perhaps the most important announcement is that beginning with the fall of 1905 two additional years in foreign language work will be required for entrance to the Civil Engineering Course, making the requirements for this course but one term's work less than for the other courses.

The summary of attendance shows that 228 have been enrolled the first two terms of this year. This number will probably be increased by four or five next term. We understand the total attendance in the Preparatory School will reach one hundred sixty this year. Thus the total attendance will be very close to four hundred and may slightly exceed that number.

A Literary Treat.

Unique Evening of Shakespearian Study Given by Allegheny Instructors.

A most enjoyable and unique program was rendered last night in Ford chapel by Miss Spaulding, Dr. Montgomery and Dr. Lockwood jointly. The evening was given to the study of Shakespeare and was appreciated by a good sized audience. Dr. Lockwood gave an interesting lecture on the life of Shakespeare using several portraits of the great poet in the course of his remarks. Then views illustrating scenes from the plays were shown and the corresponding passages effectively recited by Miss Spaulding. The views were shown by Dr. Montgomery with whom the idea of the lecture originated. Although the idea was a new one the lecture was well received and was a thorough success.

INDOOR FIELD MEET.

Class Athletes Will Complete in Interesting Contests.

On Saturday afternoon at 3 o'clock the annual Inter-class Indoor Athletic Meet will be held in the gymnasium. Physical Director Lewis has been working hard to make the affair a success and the meet promises to be the most interesting one of its kind ever given at Allegheny. The entry list of the various events is large. The competitors have been training faithfully and the contests will afford plenty of excitement. It is expected that many local records will be broken especially those of the running high jump, shot put and spring-board jump. Below are the entries to the jump. The seven events to be contested are as follows:

15 yard dash, standing broad jump, running high jump, running broad jump, pole vault, Shot put, (12 lb); springboard jump.

GENEVA BRAVES DEFEATED

Thompson and His Happy Family Do Their Best to Win but are Disappointed—Joseph Makes His "Farewell" Appearance.

Last Friday afternoon "Joe" Thompson and his renowned band of warriors came to town with their colors flying gaily intent upon relieving the Allegheny boys of the burden of bearing the many honors which have been showered upon the basketball team this season; but instead of helping the team they placed the additional burden of another victory upon their shoulders. This great weight is beginning to tell upon the victorious five and it has been intimated that the "powers that be" will be called upon to cancel the next game.

That Allegheny should defeat their old time rivals by a score of 19-11 was a surprise to the most ardent supporters of the gold and blue. Geneva whose boast has long been that of athletic supremacy maintains that the basketball team of this season is the strongest ever sent out from that college. Undoubtedly the collegians of Beaver Falls have a team of unusual strength, a fact to which the many victories of the team will attest. Geneva has suffered previous to Friday evening's game but two defeats this season, both of which were received on foreign floors under very unfavorable circumstances.

The two games played last week by the Allegheny boys prove conclusively that the present team has never been excelled in the history of the college. Few indeed are the teams which could meet so successfully two such opponents as the Germans and the Geneva aggregation in the same week. The one has never been beaten on its own floor and rarely has it suffered defeat since its organization, while the other, although not so victorious, has not met defeat on its own floor this season or last season.

Friday evening's game was a battle royal from the moment the whistle blew, and excepting injuries sustained by several of the players during the evening, was greatly appreciated by the over-crowded house. While there were no particularly brilliant plays made in the game, the spectators witnessed a steady, close-guarding contest. Seldom were Geneva's players given an opportunity to shoot while in Allegheny's territory. All of Geneva's field goals were from long shots. Although Geneva guarded closely Allegheny had a number of chances at the basket at short range, but frequently the ball would roll about the mouth of the basket without dropping into the net.

The first half was one of close guarding and cautious playing which permitted but few shots at the basket. Allegheny secured her lead principally through the remarkable shooting of goals from fouls by McArthur. During this half Allegheny secured two field goals and Geneva one. Mitchell scored the first goal for Geneva. Haas soon balanced the score by a free shot on a false pass from East, of the visiting team. McArthur put his team in the lead by a pretty shot from beneath the basket. The score at the end of the half stood 8 to 5 in favor of the Allegheny boys.

The style of playing in the second half was changed somewhat. Instead of the close guarding which characterized the first part of the game, the local team started in to play Geneva off her feet. The game became fast and rough and resulted in the local team scoring four field goals and three points from fouls. Geneva was putting up a game fight but was unable to keep up with the killing pace set by the local boys. Two field goals by Patterson and two points from fouls by Thompson was all the Beaver Falls' boys could do.

The feature of the game was the

The muddle in basketball circles is known to every student. The faculty claims nothing but Basketball that its action in removing ball the manager was justified; Muddle, the manager, while admitting his technical wrong in not bringing the team home on time excuses it on the ground of solicitude for the team's welfare and because of the desire of it on the part of the players. The student-body is intensely partisan in the matter, and although no one will deny its inherent right to express its opinion as to the justice or injustice of the penalty, yet it would be going to extremes were it to saddle the whole responsibility of the action on any one member of the faculty. Whatever the justice of the case—and assuredly there are two sides to it—the retiring manager may know that the sentiment of the student-body is unanimous in declaring that he has given us the best team, and the best results in the history of local athletics. It is in no way unfair to Allegheny's successful managers of the past to say that he has made more money for the athletic association and inspired more enthusiasm for the cause than any other manager. Much of the phenomenal success of the season may be directly attributed to his efforts. Public sentiment cannot but regret that the faculty saw fit to take the action it did.

Sister Institution Suffers.

Dickinson College has suffered a severe blow in the loss by fire of Deny Hall. The flames started on the third floor and in a short time the finest building on the Dickinson campus was in ruins. The loss will exceed \$45,000 partly covered by insurance. The college was founded in 1783 and is similar to Allegheny in that both are Methodist institutions.

University Day was observed at the University of Pennsylvania on February 22nd, at which time the honorary Degree of Laws was conferred upon the following: Baron Herman von Speck-Sternberg, German ambassador to the United States, Gov. Samuel W. Pennypacker, Hon. James T. Mitchell, chief justice of the Supreme court of Pennsylvania, and one or two others. The degree of Doctor of Literature was conferred upon James Whitcomb Riley.

remarkable foul shooting of McArthur, who secured seven goals from nine trials, a record which has seldom been equaled by any man. In this respect Thompson, the renowned foul shooter, was put in the shade. The work of the guards is worthy of the highest commendation. Haas put up his usual star game, breaking up the playing of the opponents repeatedly. Comfort at center put up a strong game and had his man under control the entire evening.

We are sorry that it is necessary for us to announce that Joseph Thompson in all probability made his final appearance before Meadville audiences and spectators last Friday evening. Mr. Thompson will be greatly missed by both young and old. The aged basketball enthusiast will regret to see this traditional figure leave our athletic fields, since no Geneva team will seem complete with his absence. The small boy will be compelled to sit back in glum silence, for "Joe" has passed on to other realms and the acquaintance of other players must be made before he can pour forth his youthful spirit in yells and taunting jests. Truly Friday evening's game marks the closing of an epoch in the basketball history of the two colleges.

Perhaps it would not be amiss to make a short review of the basketball relations of the two colleges since the appearance of this noted figure. Records at hand show that Thompson had already been ushered into the Geneva arena in '99. We have no records before us of an earlier date.

On March 18, 1899, Thompson played center against our "Father of Basketball" on the local gymnasium floor. It is also noted that both Patterson and Leech appeared in that game. The Geneva team being, as it is now supposed, young and inexperienced suffered defeat by a score of 24-21. On the 27th of January of the next year, the aforementioned team being more experienced administered a defeat to the Allegheny team by a score of 25-22. This took place in the days of Frazier, whom we note played a star game. In this contest "Joe" has been promoted to a forward. The next contest was held at Meadville, March 17 of the same year, which resulted in Geneva's defeat. Score 29-13.

A telegram filed in the office reads thus: Beaver Falls, Jan. 21, 1901—Allegheny defeated. Score 17-9. Floor slippery. Lampe absent.

On March 8, "Joe" appears at Meadville with his team. It was on this occasion that the famous words, "Shoot, Thompson, Shoot!" were uttered. The first half closed 8-8, but at the close of the next half the score stood 20-12 in favor of the local players.

The year 1902 marks the winning of both games with Geneva. The first took place at Meadville on the evening of January 24. Score 32-29. At one stage of the game the score stood 21-0 in favor of the local players. The score at close of first half stood 24-10. The next game was played at Beaver Falls, and was won by Allegheny by a score of 23-19. Geneva won out in the first half by a score of 10-8.

The next contest between the two teams was drawn off at Meadville, January 26 of last year. In this game Geneva was given but one field goal. The score of the first half was 5-4 and that of the game 18-7. The next contest was played at Beaver Falls, March 2, and was won by the home team and referee by a score of 13-11. It is with a feeling of pain that we speak of this occasion, but since it is part of the review it must be noted, however, with a sincere consideration for the feelings of some of the readers. It will be remembered that some hundred loyal supporters and rooters accompanied the team. As for the game, we do not find suitable words to express ourselves. It is sufficient that we say it was a very extravagant affair, as will be attested by the word of some who saw the game and by the bills presented to the

Athletic Board for repairs on injured players.

As it will be noted, eleven games have been played between these two teams in six years. Seven of the contests resulted in victories for Allegheny, against four for the opponents. In these eleven games Allegheny has scored 238 points against 179 of the opponents. This is a remarkable record when the strength of the opponent is considered, and would do honor to the score books of any college or university.

The chairman of the nominating committee, Rev. W. W. Youngson, '91, reported the following names for officers for the coming year and they were unanimously elected: Sion B. Smith, A. M., '86, president; W. H. Pratt, '96, secretary and treasurer; and John A. Wood, A. M., C. E., '86 and '91, chairman of the executive committee. With these men at the head and ably supported by the three hundred members of the club Allegheny may be sure that her fame and praise will not pass without notice around Pittsburgh.

President Smith celebrated his election by an article on "The Alumni. What it Means to the College in General and Allegheny in Particular." This is the first of a series of articles by prominent Pittsburgh men on the various colleges which they represent. The papers are to appear as did Mr. Smith's in "The Index." Allegheny is fortunate to be the first college represented and is still more fortunate in being so well represented. The gist of the article is given in another column. The menu and toast lists were illustrated with cuts of the college buildings.

Allegheny Man Honored.

That Allegheny men are at the front wherever they are found is again illustrated in the following letter which came from Mr. Norman P. Champlin, '00, now completing his second year at Drew Theological Seminary, Madison, N. J.

"Dear Doctor Crawford.—You will be interested to know that "Old Allegheny" furnishes the man to occupy the Edward D. Easton scholarship in the seminary, again this year. H. L. Smith, has been selected and has accepted. You will remember that this scholarship is given to "that member of the Junior class who shall, in the judgment of the faculty rank highest as scholar, preacher, and man of affairs." Hurrah for Smith and "Old Allegheny!"

It is all the more honor to Allegheny in that this is the second year in succession that an Alleghenian has held that scholarship. Mr. Champlin occupied it during this present year. The scholarship is for \$150. Mr. Smith expects to come back to Allegheny next term and graduate with the present Senior class.

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THE ALUMNI.

What It Means to the College in General and to the Allegheny in Particular—Gist of Article by Sion B. Smith, President of Pittsburg Alumni Club.

In the Pittsburg Index of March 12 there is an interesting article entitled "The Alumni—What it Means to the College in General and to Allegheny in Particular," by Sion B. Smith, an alumnus of the college. The editor of the Index, Mr. Tensard De Wolfe, also claims Allegheny College as his alma mater. Mr. Smith's article is of much interest to the students and alumni of this college. He begins by contrasting college life with the joys of being an alumnus and his conclusion is rather to the disadvantage of the former. Then he continues:

"So give me the good, jolly alumni club as against all the delirious delights of the undergraduate. The pleasures of the chase increase in the telling, as the passing of time eliminates disagreeable features. Therefore, not only because it is the most valuable asset of a college, but because it affords the greatest quantity of solid enjoyment to the man himself, drink a bumper to the Alumni club. May she live long and prosper."

"One of the largest alumni organizations in Pittsburg is that of Allegheny College, which held its annual dinner last night at the Union Club. The college in a peculiar sense belongs to Pittsburg, and its development has to a very large extent been under Pittsburg influences. The Pittsburg conference of the Methodist Episcopal church is one of the three ecclesiastical bodies that control the institution. It is strictly a college, the curriculum being complicated by no university features whatever. This is not the place to discuss the merits of the small college as against the great university, and it will suffice to say that the small college has its champions as well as its illustrious exemplars. To mention a single instance, President McKinley, whose early college days were spent at Allegheny College, and who later was graduated from a smaller institution.

"The sentimental phrase, 'Old Allegheny,' has an especial appropriateness. Founded in 1815, at a time when Meadville was on the trail from Pittsburg leading up the Allegheny river to Franklin thence up French creek and over the divide to Erie, the great highway in French and Indian days between this country and the Great Lake region. In fact when the illustrious Lafayette traveled this same trail, he stopped at the tavern in Meadville whose lineal successor, Hotel Lafayette, still entertains the wayfarer.

"This old Erie and Waterford turnpike brought Timothy Alden from New York city to visit his cousin, one of the substantial citizens of the quite respectable settlement named for David Mead. On turning the crest of the hill, through some of the trees standing today on the old college campus he saw at his feet in the charming circle of hills the silver threads of the Venango, as the more musical tongue knew French creek. Within the circle were perhaps a hundred

frame or log houses, scattered along three or four streets, surrounded by cleared fields thickly dotted with stumps. But this was the goal of Timothy Alden, graduate of Harvard, lineal descendant of John Alden, of the Mayflower. He had conned his map and picked out this as the suitable location for the institution of higher learning of which he dreamed. And he named it Allegheny, after the river which then furnished the principal highway through the territory. The outcome of his visit was the historic meeting of citizens in the log Court House on the evening of June 20, 1815.

"Progress in these wilds was slow. The first college commencement was held without a graduate. The program is still preserved among the archives. But they were men in those days. Four Latin orations and one in Hebrew attest the metal of the students. Indeed, in the first fifteen years of the existence of the institution there were only twelve graduates. So that the first building, Bentley Hall, still serving the college faithfully, is the storehouse of the romance and tradition of substantially every one of the thousands of graduates who call Allegheny alma mater.

"From such small beginnings and through such early hardships has arisen the college which has afforded the higher outlook for probably more Pittsburgers than any other one institution. The Alumni club now enrolls a few less than three hundred residing in what is known as the Pittsburg district. To most of them college meant much of labor and something of privation, with the result that they know the value of their acquisition and are enthusiastic to pass the good thing along. "As the Alumni Association has proved and is daily proving the most potent and permanent force in the up-building of 'Old Allegheny,' and as such organizations are always so highly prized by those charged with the immediate control and management of the college, it is a matter of congratulation that Pittsburg college men, almost without regard to college are so generally noted for their enthusiastic support and allegiance. Pittsburg men know how to do things in a whole-souled way, without caring whether all the frills and follies of public acclaim are in evidence or not, and that explains why college presidents always look forward to a visit to the Pittsburg alumni. It is a good thing, and deserves being pushed along by every college man."

A RELIC OF DAYS GONE BY.

A Quaint Advertisement Penned by the Hand of Timothy Alden Comes to Light.

The first advertisement of Allegheny College ever published has recently come to light and is interesting in more ways than one. Not only do we note the difference in circumstances between then and now such as in expense and the curriculum, but the quaintness of the wording charms us and we can feel the earnestness of purpose with which the new college was inaugurated.

This advertisement appeared in the Crawford Messenger in 1818 and it is to the records of the Morning Star that we are indebted for the following:

Allegheny College.

This institution having been duly organized, the subscriber, having been appointed President and Professor of the same, takes this method to inform the public of the terms on which students, desirous of a liberal education

and disposed to become members of it, can be accommodated.

1. Tuition six dollars and a quarter.

2. Boarding one dollar and fifty cents a week, or,

3. Boarding, washing, lodging and tuition at 130 dollars a year, payable quarterly, and no extra charges during the vacation, if any should find it for their convenience to spend them in Meadville.

Probationers are here instructed in Latin, Greek, &c., preparatory to admission into the collegiate classes.

The Freshman class is, at present, attending to Sallust, Horace, Xenophon's Anabasis, Homer's Iliad, the Hebrew, French & English Rhetoric &c.

Present rules of Lafayette College allow the student ten per cent. cuts.

There are but two universities in Ireland—the University of Dublin and the Royal University.

Amherst College is to have a new observatory, which will contain one of the finest telescopes in the world.

The co-eds of Ursinus have taken the initiative in the attempt to form a separate organization for the purpose of holding oratorical contests.

Beloit College does not permit marriage among the students. One of the students was married recently, and his diploma is to be withdrawn.

Ninety-eight Philippine students are enrolled in American colleges. They are to be educated at the expense of the United States and then to be sent back as teachers to their native brothers.

Two club houses to accommodate the civil, mechanical, electrical and mining engineering societies of America are to be erected in New York at a total cost of \$2,000,000. Mr. Carnegie gives \$1,000,000 toward their erection.

Fifty thousand students are enrolled in American colleges for men, while only 15,000 students are enrolled in woman's colleges. Some of the former schools date back more than two hundred years, while on the contrary, the great increase in the latter has occurred within the last twenty years.

Chicago University has plans for three new schools and twenty-two new buildings. This means the expenditure of more than \$3,000,000. All of the present buildings have been gifts to the university; four of them being from the generosity of Mr. Rockefeller. President Harper feels confident that all future plans and improvements will be sustained financially.

Although the contract between Glenn S. Warner and the Carlisle Indians expired on March 1, he has decided to remain in the government employ until the close of Carlisle's baseball season which ends June 22. Mr. Warner's agreement with the Cornell Athletic Council does not begin until September 1, and he will spend the summer formulating plans for the season on Percy field. He is working hard at the present to make his farewell season as baseball coach at Carlisle exceptionally successful, and he has a number of well known major league players at work in the cage with the Indians.

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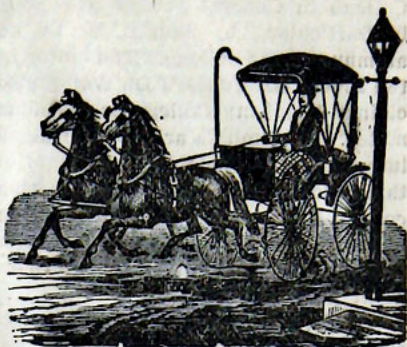
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
