TEAM DEFEATS OLD RIVALS.

WESTMINSTER WALLOPED IN
TENTH INNING.

Allegheny Crossed the Plate for Eight Runs to Her Opponents Six in a Well-Played and Hard-Fought Game. Comfort and Horn the Stars.

The base ball team returned from New Wilmington Saturday night flushed with their victory over Westminster in the tenth inning by the score of 8 to 6. The team had every reason to be pleased, for they had played a good game and in every way earned the success they achieved. In fact, the locals played their best game of the season. The errors were few and not of a costly nature, and the playing snappy and full of go.

The defeat of Westminster is especially pleasing because of the rivalry which exists between the two colleges. The New Wilmington team won their game on the home field here and for that reason a victory was especially desired to blot out the defeat.

The game was played before a crowd of about the size of the average Meadville audience. There was little wrangling on either side, and the game progressed without any of the unpleasant incidents which have occasionally marred athletic contests between the two colleges in the past. It would appear that the hatchet is buried.

Mitinger pitched a game which was probably superior to any work he had done before this season. He had an assortment of benders at his command which were more than enough for the opposing batter. His support was all that could be desired. The team seemed in the best form it had been this season. If it were only the beginning instead of the end of the season, great things might be predicted of the team in its present form. Both sides scored a double play. Bob Russell easily carried off the batting honors for Westminster with four hits to his credit. Among the locals it would be difficult to pick any particular star but Comfort and Horn did especially good work with the stick.

REVIEW OF BASE

BALL SEASON.

COMPLETE SURVEY AND CRITICISM.

Team Has Shown Marked Improvement Toward End of Season—Work of Individual Players—The Season's Scores.

The base ball enthusiast looks back over the past season with much more equanimity than he looked forward to it in the first days of the spring term. At that time the outlook for a creditable showing was extremely dubious. Only two of last year's players were back and the new men out to practice were more or less unknown quantities. The pitching force was especially weak. Although the coach and squad knew under what a handicap they were working, they did not become disheartened by the prospect, but only worked the harder. As a result, out of the chaos of unknown and inexperienced players has developed the team which at the close of the season tied Oberlin and beat our old rival, Westminster. The team did not win a long series of victories; on the other hand it did not suffer dishonorable defeats. All things considered the college is proud of its ball team which by weeks of consistent effort has learned the arts of victory from the humilities of defeat. The only long slump the team experienced was on the trip away from home, and this is explained by the unfamiliar conditions under which the team played. The games on the home field have all been good games, whether defeats or victories.

Coach Rickey professes himself well satisfied with the work of the team, placing the results of the season.

The matter of college, or amateur, athletics seems endowed with more than its due perquisite of perplexing problems. One of these has recently been brought to the attention of those interested in local athletics in a manner demanding final decision and settlement. This problem may be briefly stated in the three following questions: Shall a member of any 'varsity athletic team play with any outside team during the college year? Shall a member of any athletic squad play with an outside team during the college year? Shall any student in the college play under similar conditions?

In forming our opinion concerning the solution of this matter two things must be taken into consideration. First, clean athletics—and, if possible, successful athletics—must be maintained. Second, the personal rights and liberties of any student, in so far as they do not interfere with the best good of college and athletic interests, must be respected.

Now, it is evident on the face of it that no member of a 'varsity team can conduct himself counter to the ruling in question without detriment to the team and to the reputation of the college. The athletic sentiment and spirit encouraged by the eastern schools, stands in confessed opposition to this course of action. Furthermore, considering the member of the athletic squad as liable to actual work on the 'varsity in case of the injury or disability of a regular player, his case might be looked upon in much the same light as that of the bona fide member of the team.

It is when we come, however, to discuss the ruling as applied to the ordinary student that we feel some hesitation in making our decision. It is true that in some cases unauthorized teams have

been reported by the press as representing Allegheny when in fact they were in no way connected with the college, except that varying percentages of students were included in the respective line-ups. But, after all, can the college hold itself responsible for such reports, beyond requiring such students to be careful in representing themselves as unauthorized players? Is the extent of this practice sufficiently large to actually damage the interests of clean athletics in the college? Does not the argument of personal privilege outweigh the occasional ill results coming from a moderate legislation?

It might be argued that, under the less rigid ruling, a member of an athletic squad, becoming dissatisfied, would have power to leave the squad, indulge in the proscribed practice without risk to himself, and thus endanger athletic interests. But, although recognizing the validity of this argument, we feel that the case demands more restricted legislation than has been suggested. For instance, a ruling could be passed, prohibiting a man who once joins an athletic squad from leaving that squad till the end of the season. It is doubtful whether the rule, as it now stands, will prove either practicable or popular.

EVEN BREAK WITH OBERLIN.

FIVE-INNING GAME RESULTS IN A TIE.

Three Runs Apiece at End of Fifth, When Visitors Were Compelled to Leave for Train—Mitinger Pitches Nice Ball—Good Batting Was the Feature.

At Athletic Park Thursday Allegheny had as opponents the strong Oberlin College nine. The day was favorable to base ball and the field was in very fair condition. Good base ball was the result and the small crowd present was well entertained while the game lasted. It is to be regretted that Oberlin could not finish the game for from the appearance of things a close race was guaranteed. It being absolutely necessary, however, for the visitors to catch the 5:28 east, the game was called at the end of the fifth inning which saw Oberlin tie the score. In this respect Oberlin was very lucky, scoring on errors the necessary runs to tie.

Allegheny indulged in some excellent batting and base running in her part of the game. The work of the boys was excellent, when it is remembered that several of the team were out of the game from injuries and other causes. Fink was missed at his position on third, yet his place was filled reasonably well by Clark.

In the first inning Allegheny went to bat. Taylor and Todd were the batteries for Oberlin. Horn, the first man up in the new order of batting, singled and was advanced by sacrifices of Comfort and Wynn, scoring on a passed ball. By means of a hit, a steal and a balk Mitinger found himself on third. It looked as if Allegheny would score again, but the boys fell a victim to Taylor's curves until the fifth inning, when some hitting and lively base running earned two more runs. Comfort got first on being hit with the ball. Mitinger singled and advanced to second on the throw to third. Comfort was out on home in attempting to score on Nelson's single. Mitinger scored while Todd was endeavoring to catch Nelson stealing second. Davenport hit to short, who fielded to first. Waters fumbled and Nelson scored. This finished the scoring for Allegheny. This inning was notable for the excellent base running and hitting of the local team. Oberlin pulled out of two bad places in the third and fourth innings at which time Allegheny had three men on bases with excellent chances to score. By good work, however, no scores resulted.

Oberlin secured their first run in the fourth inning. Wilson, the first man up, was out by being hit with the ball on the third strike. Wiley was fielded out by Mitinger. Hoops singled over second and Nelson fumbled Rupp's

grounder to short. Hoops advanced to third on a passed ball and scored on a wild pitch.

Oberlin secured two more in their part of the fifth. Smith was thrown out by Mitinger. Taylor received a pass to first and scored on Ward's two-bagger. Todd was an easy out, but Wilson, the next man up, drove out a two-bagger and scored Ward from second on Clark's fumble. Wiley was out to Horn. This ended the game. With the exception of several errors both teams played excellent ball. Mitinger, for Allegheny, had several assists to his credit besides saving five strike-outs. Taylor had three strike-outs and several assists. Nearly all the team secured hits off of Taylor, nothing longer than a two-bagger being obtained however. The line up was as follows:

son even above his expectations.

The schedule was a hard one and included games with all the principle colleges of Western Pennsylvania, Eastern Ohio, and West Virginia. Oberlin made her first appearance on the local diamond, and we trust will continue to play us in succeeding years. Our victory over our old rival, Westminster, is gratifying in as much as it was accomplished without hard feeling on either side.

We have suffered more defeats than victories, but this reflects all the more credit on the hard work of the individual players, who have consistently sought to improve the team and themselves. Victory has been with us in some of the contests where we most desired it, and with this we should be content. Like many another walk in life the honor is not more to him who wins than to him who works and does his best. Whether winning or losing, let us be loyal to the team which is worthy of our loyalty.

The outlook for next year is much better than it was for this year; and it is a perfectly safe prediction to say that barring unforeseen mishaps, the college will be represented by a strong team next year. The past is past; it is now the duty of all to prepare for a winning campaign next year.

A brief and at the best unsatisfactory summary of the work of the individual players is attempted in the following paragraphs:

The work of Captain Wynn has been gilt-edged throughout the entire season, and he has well demonstrated his ability to occupy an infield position with as great efficiency as in former years he played the outfield. One could count upon the fingers of a hand his errors for the season. Although his batting average may not be quite so high as last year, it is still a very creditable showing. After three years of excellent work, the college will sorely miss his skill next year. As a captain he has shown rare tact and good sense in managing the team.

Manager first-base-man Comfort is the second of the two players. "Ab" is the best all around athlete the college boasts today, and now, besides being a star performer on the diamond, gridiron and basket ball floor, he has added to his accomplishments the qualities of a good manager. His work in the field has been excellent and his batting average fair. His loss will be keenly felt by the local fans, if he should fail to be in college during next year's season.

Of the new men, Fink, formerly of Ohio Wesleyan, is the bright and particular star. His work at third has been the feature of almost every game. He has made few errors and has got into every game he played with spirit. His batting average is probably the highest in the team. He will be a very valuable man next year.

Mitinger, who has been the principal performer in the box, is also a new man. It might be said that the fate of the whole team has rested with this one man, and he has not had an off game. He has pitched consistently throughout the season good steady ball. If his support had been of the best, the locals beyond a doubt would have won a majority of the games played. In marked contrast to many pitchers he is a good man with the bat and stands well at the head of the batting list.

Davenport, when at his best, is an active, snappy catcher, but, unfortunately, he is not as steady a player as might be desired. Yet his work on the whole has been very good. Dunkle, as substitute catcher, has worked hard and made out good whenever tried. In the Westminster game he was especially effective, catching two men at second.

Kennedy has been playing a good, consistent game throughout the season as center fielder. His batting average is good, and in every way he bids fair to become a very efficient man on next year's team.

The left field has been carefully guarded by Horn, who bids well to be one of the best all-around fielders and batters the college has had in years.

For a man so unaccustomed to the game, Clark has played remarkable ball in right field. The coach has already included him among the brightest jewels of next year's team.

Nelson, at short, has played under an unlucky star all year. His work

in the Westminster game was much better than in many former games and seems to mark a permanent improvement. With good hard work the years hold much of promise for him.

McArthur has had a rather erratic career in the box, at one time pitching a shut-out and the next game, apparently forgetting his cunning. However, if he only had longer to stay with us we should not despair of his becoming steadier with practice and in the end developing into a strong pitcher.

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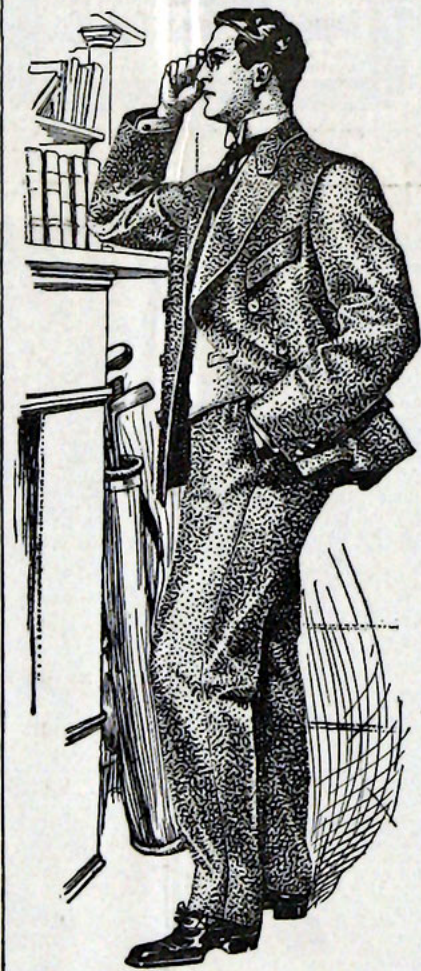
