AKRON GAME BRINGS SECOND VICTORY

One Touchdown and a Place Kick Give Allegheny 10-0 Victory Over Ohio Team

The foot ball team representing the University of Akron proved to be a far stronger aggregation than was anticipated, and Coach Hammett's proteges experienced considerable difficulty in besting it at Akron last Saturday, the final score being 10-0. It cannot be denied that the eleven was over-confident when it went on the field, a false idea of the strength of the outfit being held as a result of the easy victory over St. Bonaventure in the opening contest. On the other hand, the fact that Akron had suffered defeats at the hands of Case and Miami made it appear that the opponent of the day was not particularly formidable. Coach Hammett was informed before the beginning of the fray that the Akron team of October 9th was not the Akron team of October 2d, for it was stated that more foot ball had been learned in the intervening week of practice than was known before. It soon developed that not only had the type of playing advanced, but that the athletes were imbued with an excess of fighting spirit, which for a time threatened to carry all before it.

The strength of the Ohioans lay in their line. This division of the team outplayed their opponents throughout, this being partially accounted for by the fact that from tackle to tackle it outweighed Allegheny's forwards by at least twelve pounds to the man. The outstanding star was T. Crisp, the 205-pound center, who appeared to find it an easy matter to break through. Yackee, although the lightest of the Akron linemen, was a very effective player, and introduced some features not sanctioned by the official rules, his leading accomplishment consisting of delivering some killing uppercuts in the scrimmages. Allegheny's line was slow on the charge, and did not follow up advantages by enlarging holes after they were made. However, good work was done on the defensive, and at times fine holes were made.

Akron's backfield was not manned by as heavy men as was the offensive quartet of the invaders, and although decidedly faster, was unable to gain as much ground. Rogers, the full back, was a plunger of ability, and was the principal luminary in Akron's great march down the field in the third period. For Allegheny, Arnold, '15, featured by several long runs. Bash was handicapped by an injury received in practice, and McKay, '16, who took his place, was handicapped because of the fact that he was unfamiliar with the varsity signals. Kinney, '18, tore off two good gains on 'round-tackle plays.

Kramer, '16, and Cox, '16, attended to the punting, and were in fair form, breaking even with the opposition in this department.

On the whole, straight foot ball was the rule for both sides, line plunging being the most successful form of attack. Each eleven executed one successful forward pass, but both were equally unfortunate in attempts to circle the ends. Team for team, Akron was the faster, putting more fire

and snap into the play. They showed the effects of earlier games, being apparently in better physical condition.

Tyler, the referee, proved himself an excellent official, but Smith, the umpire, is deserving of condemnation for the way in which he overlooked the rough tactics frequently employed. Slugging was common, while "piling" on a tackled man occurred at several times.

Allegheny had the ball in her enemy's territory during the greater part of the first half, but was unable to gain consistently, and Akron, when on the offensive, was equally unsuccessful. Both teams appeared to be stronger on the defensive than on the offensive.

In the third quarter the home team took the ball on their own 25-yard line and carried the ball with alarming rapidity to Allegheny's 2-yard mark. One forward pass figured in this sensational advance, but the major portion of the attack was by line bucking. A touchdown seemed certain, but on the fourth down Munhall, '16, dashed through the line and striking the ball before the quarter back could pass it, followed it to the 17-yard line and recovered it. This was the only time at which a score by Akron appeared imminent.

Allegheny was not to be denied in the final period, and forging down the field, Munhall tried two goals from placement, the second, from the 25-yard line, being successful. After a few minutes of play a 35-yard gain by a forward pass brought a touchdown, and Munhall kicked goal. Another touchdown after a thrilling 45-yard run by Cox was disallowed because of the fact that one of the visiting linemen was found guilty of holding.

The game in detail:

First quarter. Akron kicked off, Kinney receiving the ball. Allegheny was held and Kramer punted. Akron was held on her own 35-yard line and Allegheny took the ball. Arnold gained 10 yards on the right side of the line, but Cox lost when attempting a wide end run. After some hard playing, Akron took the ball on her own 20-yard line, where the quarter ended. Score: Allegheny, 0; Akron, 0.

Second quarter. Akron punted to Cox and the visitors were held on their 10-yard line and forced to punt, Akron taking the ball on her own 25-yard line. Witter replaced Coulson at right guard. Akron made 5 yards by hitting the line, but was penalized 10 yards. McKay took Bash's place at right half. Akron punted to Arnold on Allegheny's 10-yard line, and he returned 10 yards. Allegheny netted 10 yards on line plunges, but Carmont was thrown for a loss and was forced to leave the game, Scannell taking his place at left end. Akron had possession of the ball at the end of the half. Score: Allegheny, 0; Akron, 0.

Third quarter. Burlington replaced Knowlton at right end for Akron and Carmont returned to the game. Allegheny kicked off to Rogers, who returned to Akron's 30-yard line. Driesbach executed Akron's best end run by tearing off 10 yards around the left flank. Akron was penalized 10 yards, but made up the lost ground by a line plunge and a forward pass. By line bucking Akron carried the ball from her 25-yard line to Allegheny's 2-yard line. On the fourth down Munhall broke through the line and knocked the ball from the quarter back's hands, sending it back 17 yards and recovering it for Allegheny. Erratic play now marked the work of both teams. Allegheny advanced to the middle of the field, but lost possession of the ball on a fumble. Akron followed with another fumble, Al-

Death of Dr. Theodore L. Flood Last June

CENTENNIAL WEEK FOLLOWED BY DEATH OF NOTED CHURCHMAN.

The end of the school year in June was marked by the death of one of the oldest and foremost trustees of Allegheny College, Rev. Theodore L. Flood, D. D., LL. D., of this city. His death took place June 23 after an illness of but a few weeks.

Dr. Flood was seventy-three years of age and had been a trustee of this institution for more than a quarter of a century. He was a figure of national prominence in the Methodist Episcopal Church for many years as a publisher of note and an author whose books and addresses were read from one end of the country to the other. He was also closely associated with Bishop Vincent in the founding of Chautauqua and later was the publisher of the Chautauquan and books of the Chautauqua.

Dr. Flood was born in Williamsburg, Pa., Feb. 20, 1842, and received his education at the academy of his native town and at Dickinson Seminary, afterwards studying theology at the Biblical Institute at Concord, N. H., now the School of Theology of Boston University. At the early age of eighteen he was licensed as an exhorter in the Methodist Episcopal Church, and at the age of twenty he was a local preacher. At the breaking out of the Civil War he answered his country's call and served as Orderly Sergeant and later as Lieutenant in the Pennsylvania Volunteers. From 1864 to 1874 he served as pastor in several churches in the State of New Hampshire, and at the age of thirty-two he was presiding elder in the Concord district of the New Hampshire Conference. He was also at this time president of the State Sunday School Convention. He was later transferred to the Erie Conference where he was stationed at Jamestown, N. Y., from which place he came to this city and served. In 1882 he retired from the ministry and since that time he had made his home in Meadville.

His whole life was marked by honors and honorary degrees conferred upon him by different colleges, lodges, and other fraternal organizations. He was a trustee in the Odd Fellows' Home, and very active in the affairs of this college up to the very time of his illness. He took a prominent part in the affairs of the city as well, and was recognized as a power for good in all civic improvements.

With his death, the college lost one of the hardest workers and best of friends that it ever possessed.

MEETING OF FORUM.

At the Forum meeting last Thursday afternoon, the first debate of the year was held. The question was one which is being discussed all over the country: "Should the United States materially increase the army and navy?" The affirmative was supported by R. F. Kahle, '17, and H. L. Castle, '18; and the negative of the question by R. A. Blasdel, '16, and R. E. McCreary, '18. The decision was rendered in favor of the affirmative.

The meeting was very well attended, the large majority of those present being Freshmen. Professor Swartley served notice that at the next regular meeting the question would be brought up whether or not the constitution of the society should be amended to provide for the election of officers every two weeks, instead of once each month. The purpose of the suggested amendment is to give a larger number of men the opportunity of serving as Speaker of the Forum, as this office offers a valuable opportunity for experience in parliamentary practice.

Carnegie Tech Next Saturday

COLD AND BLUE WILL MEET PITTSBURGH TEAM FOR THIRD GAME OF SEASON.

Allegheny's next opponent, Carnegie Tech, is justly feared, not only because of past reputation but also because of present quality. The Plaid school has been in action twice this year and two overwhelming victories are the result. Steffens' men began the year by trouncing Thiel 25-0, this being accomplished without the assistance of the brilliant quarter back, "Sunny" Kesner. On the following week Waynesburg furnished an afternoon's entertainment for the Skibos, losing by the rather decisive score of 88-0. After a heated argument over the eligibility of a player, the game scheduled for last Saturday with West Virginia University was cancelled. It is in this that Coach Hammett is laying his greatest claims for precedence. Tech has not yet had a hard game and with the added week of idleness, is not expected to be in as good condition as the Gold and Blue machine.

It should not be thought that the meeting will be an easy affair for Hammett's charges, for with seven of the men who gave Allegheny such a run last year again in the line-up, the hardest kind of a battle is sure to result. Captain Lauer and Levy, ends; Kesner and Marshall, backs; Hellstrom, center, and Kelly and Fletcher, line-men, form the nucleus of the team, and several new men of ability, in particular, Altdorffer at full back, complete the number.

One thing which came so near to crushing the local hopes in the Akron game, but a repetition of which need not be feared, is an over-supply of confidence. The fact that Akron defended her goal-line for three quarters has brought home the fact that the attack of the team is not irresistible, and the men will go into the next contest prepared to play at top speed from the start. Several glaring weaknesses became apparent at Akron and the coaches will make every endeavor to strengthen these this week. The absence of team play was appalling and the backs did not get under way fast. The line failed to open holes as often as would have been liked and was frequently outfought. Coach Hammett intends to give the squad the hardest work of the year during the ensuing week and expects to have the team in line shape for Carnegie. The playing of Witter, '17, who went into the Akron game without having scrimmaged this year, was of such a quality that he will be certain of a line position, but it is not yet known whose place he will fill.

A study of the records of former games with Carnegie brings to light the fact that Allegheny has a little on her technical opponent. Eight encounters in the past nine years have resulted in five victories for the Meadville institution and three defeats. Following are the scores:

Death of Former Allegheny Professor

DR. JEREMIAH TINGLEY PASSED AWAY LAST JUNE IN PITTSBURGH.

Because of the fact that the usual Commencement number was not published last June, there has been no announcement, to the students and alumni, of the death of Dr. Jeremiah Tingley, one of those splendid men who gave their lives for the Allegheny of the past and made possible the Allegheny of today.

Dr. Tingley was one of the most learned men who ever graced the academic halls of this state. He has been fittingly termed the "dean of Pennsylvania educators."

Dr. Tingley passed away early in June in his ninetieth year, at his home in Pittsburgh, but a few weeks after the celebration of his birthday.

He was born in Cadiz, Ohio, in 1826. After studying in the public schools, he entered De Pauw University, from which institution he received his degree of bachelor of arts in 1850. In 1865 he was called to the chair of science at Allegheny, which position he held for a quarter of a century. Through his efforts, the scientific department experienced a wonderful growth and attained a national fame.

In 1888, at the conclusion of his labors in this college, he accepted, in spite of his advancing age, the chair of chemistry in the medical department of the University of Western Pennsylvania. The next year he became identified with one of the high schools in Pittsburgh. During the past few years he has been devoting his time to study and research work.

Dr. Tingley spent several summers in research work with Professor Louis Agassiz, the greatest of American biologists. He received many honorary degrees. De Pauw University conferred upon Dr. Tingley the degree of Master of Arts; Wesleyan University made him a Doctor of Philosophy, and Allegheny College conferred upon him the degree of Doctor of Laws.

Through the death of Dr. Tingley, this college loses a staunch and devoted friend, who gave the best years of his life for Allegheny. As in the darker and more discouraging years of the old college he gave his best efforts and untiring devotion to the welfare of Allegheny, so in these days of success may we ever remember the services he rendered, and give to his memory the respect and honor and admiration which he so clearly merited.

This seems like a true college romance as Miss Kennard was for three years a student under Dr. Van Riper until her graduation last June. This scheme was a pet one of Commissioner Woods, and five Inspectors of Police were in charge. The administration work has been done by Mr. Peterson. His report on the success of the Police Relief in 1915 has been widely praised in both the New York and Brooklyn papers. The movement is heralded as one of the most important advances in the administration of Mayor Mitchell, being called the "Socialization of the Police Force of New York City."
