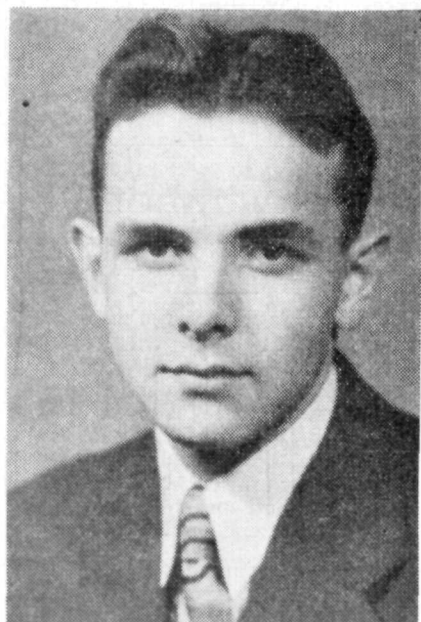
Judges for the competition will be George Ross, Miss Blair Hanson and Allen B. Edwards of the Allegheny faculty.

Converted Slowly

One in every five veterans holding service insurance policies has converted to one of the available permanent plans, the national Veterans Administration said.

These policies, if issued before January 1, 1946, may be continued for eight years at the original rates; if issued after that date, the policies may be continued for five years.

Many veterans who would like to attend larger colleges but cannot due to heavy enrollment, plan to take two years work in smaller schools and transfer to larger schools for their last two years of study.

Since the V. A. must approve any change of institution, a trainee's advance declaration of intent to transfer will facilitate V. A. permission when such transfer is requested.

Scouting Fraternity
Forming on Campus

"Be a leader, be a friend, be of service," is the motto of Alpha Phi Omega, a national Scouting service fraternity which is being started on Allegheny's campus under the direction of Harold S. State of the chemistry department.

This fraternity is composed of college men who are, or have been, previously affiliated with the Boy Scouts, and its purpose is to take part in a program of fellowship and service on the campus, including projects for the benefit of the student body and faculty, the local community, and the nation.

There is an opportunity in this fraternity for every member to take an active part in this service program, officials said.

Alpha Phi Omega was founded in 1925 at Lafayette College, Easton, Pa., by a group of former Scouts who recognized the desirability of

carrying over the ideals of the Scouts into their campus life. The number of chapters of this fraternity has increased steadily throughout the past 20 years, and at present there are 132 chartered chapters throughout the country.

The national initiation fee of Alpha Phi Omega is \$10, of which \$2 is a pledge fee and \$8 is an active initiation fee. The funds derived from these fees are used in the national budget to pay all expenses of the entire undergraduate membership of each member in the fraternity.

All those interested in this scouting fraternity are asked to fill out questionnaires which may be obtained at Brooks desk today. There will be a meeting tomorrow at 7 p. m. in Carnegie, Room 1, for all those interested in establishing this fraternity on our campus.

Gators, Mount Union, Clash In Grid Game

The Blue and Gold-clad football team of Allegheny College takes to the highway again in search of victory No. 2, as the grid season draws relentlessly to a close. First stop on the program calls for a meeting with Mount Union College at Alliance, Ohio, this Saturday, followed, in a week, by a jaunt to Selinsgrove, Pa., where Susquehanna will be host to Coach Bill Daddio's weakened, but valiant, eleven.

In closing their home season last week-end with a 20-0 loss to Greenville's Thiel College, the Gators suffered injuries to several key figures most of whom are believed to be able for participation against the Ohioans. Bob Carman, Bill Rylander, Dick Scibetta, Don Stevenson, Norm Baker and Rick Meyer, all backs; linemen Chuck Wright, Don Hamilton, Dave Zurbrick, Dan Morse and Ray Lysowski, are all nursing injuries of one type or another, but the greater part of these men expect to work out the bruises and stiffness and be on hand for Mount Union.

The Ohioans carry a large-sized squad that plays a hard game, and is deep in reserves. Last week they received a 13-6 buffing from Ohio Wesleyan to make it two defeats this year, the other coming at the hands of Akron, 19-14.

THIEL SHOWS POWER

Although they recorded only six first downs as compared to the Gator's 12, Thiel's Tomcats made every one count for long gains and 20 points to blank the Hilltoppers last Saturday at North Street stadium. Two long goal-ward aeriels, pulled down from the ozone by tall Ed Kochis, Thiel end, and a plunge by Fullback John Boliver accounted for three touchdowns for the Tomcats, as Will Borcicky converted twice.

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Phi Gamma Delta, Phi Delta Theta, Undefeated Sixes

As intramural volleyball league play started its third week yesterday, two teams, the Phi Gams and the Phi Deltas, were still undefeated. The Terrace Street Greeks have won their first two starts, while the Phi Gams boast a trio of victories. Both teams show an offensive punch, but the Phi Gams rate as the better defensive aggregation by a slight margin.

In the six games the Phi Gams have played, they have allowed only 36 points to be scored against them, which averages only a meager six counters a game. Phi Delta's defense, which has been tested in four goes, has yielded 25 points or an average roughly comparable to the Ridge House six.

Only one shut-out has been registered, and that was a Phi Gam-Chi Rho encounter in the opening week of play. The Sigs and the Phi Deltas each own a 15-2 decision, the league's second-best defensive score.

On the minus side of the ledger, the Theta Chi club still has to record a win, having absorbed beatings their three times out. Chi Rho is another group below the .500 mark, listing two out of three in red ink. The Sigs also are in the second division, having dropped three out of four.

Last week's tilts resulted in a 15-2, 15-8 count for Phi Delta over Theta Chi on Tuesday, and a 15-6, 15-3, Phi Gam victory against the Deltas the same day. Wednesday, the Phi Psis won over the Sigs, 15-6, 15-12, and Deltas took their set 15-12, 15-5 with Chi Rho. The Deltas scored their second league series on Thursday, by forfeit when the Sigs failed to show, and Phi Gams notched their third victory, 15-13, 15-10, in a spirited engagement with the Phi Psis.

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S'portraits: Two Grid Contests Left On List

Bill Daddio's gang are turning into the home stretch, having only two more games left to play. Both are road dates, and shape up as tough encounters. Mount Union College of Alliance, Ohio, is this Saturday's opponent and shows a roster full of big backs and large linemen. Last week they dropped a 13-6 contest to Ohio Wesleyan, which just goes to show that they can be beaten. Other Gator foes were about as fortunate last week, only two of them managing to come through victorious. Grove City and Susquehanna turned the trick against Slippery Rock and Hartwick respectively, while Geneva stopped Westminster 26-0; Swarthmore crowned Dickinson 20-7; Wooster made an identical score against Oberlin.

Strange are the ways of fate and football glories, which is evidenced by an ironic sports dispatch from Boston to the effect that Boston and Fordham Universities played a 26-6 match in Fenway Park before a gathering of some 2,700 persons. Rather a bitter season for the Rams, whose "seven blocks of granite" were the scourge of the East not too many years ago, and who set all kinds of attendance records in playing the finest teams of the country. De-emphasization, a long word meaning no pay-no play, has reduced the "seven blocks" to "stepping stones."

Allegheny's intramural system, rapidly recovering from its wartime inaction under the able guidance of Director Bob Garbark, will be broadened even more with the completion of the new Park Avenue athletic site in '48. This phase of college athletics had its biggest boom a decade ago when 13 sports were on the intramural calendar, comprising 310 games and matches. In 1935-36, for instance, 266 individuals participated in intramurals 940 times, which averages out to three and a half sports per man. Touch football and softball were the favorites, much as they are today.

Head Basketball Coach Karl Lawrence of Colgate University was back on campus last week end, renewing acquaintances with his many college and city friends. Coach Lawrence was Gator court mentor before going to the Red Raiders, and was responsible for building up the Blue and Gold cage reputation to a par equal to that of the district's best. In 1940 the Lawrencemen won twelve and lost only three in competition with schools of high athletic caliber. Outstanding was a 40-38 victory over a powerful Rochester University squad, snapping a 15-game win streak of the New Yorkers.

Carnegie Tech Final Soccer Foe Saturday

The luckless Allegheny College soccer team increased its losing streak to seven throughout the past week, bowing to Thiel, Buffalo State, and Oberlin. Weakness in the line was prevalent, since the Gators scored only once in three contests.

Yesterday the Hansonmen traveled to Edinboro, where they were favored, and Saturday they will conclude their season in Montgomery Field against Carnegie Tech. The Pittsburghers are expected to furnish stiff competition, though the two teams are very well-matched.

The Tomcats of Thiel squeezed out a lucky 2-1 victory when Roberto Gomes tapped in a rolling ball with less than a minute of play remaining. Outplaying the Greenville-

ites all the way, the Gators yielded a goal in the third period, then lacked the scoring punch to come back and win. The Blue and Gold aim was definitely off, since no less than fourteen shots at the goal were taken, including a penalty kick, and only one hit the mark. That occurred when Virg Sayre relayed Paul Leahy's corner kick into the goal on a powerful boot. Thiel's first goal came when a driving kick by Ralph Roberts hit the knee of Bill Dietrich, Tomcat forward, and caromed into the goal.

The following day the Gators met Buffalo State on Montgomery Field and lost, 2-0. Both teams performed well on a wet field, but the superior passing attack and defense of the New Yorkers proved decisive. Their goalie, Dick Hulton, was sensational despite a shoulder injury received in the first period. A goal by Bob Cramer was the only score until the last few minutes of the game, when Wally Poulton drove the ball into the corner of the net for the clincher. Allegheny's halfbacks, especially Red Ketcham, showed great improvement.

On Friday, Allegheny dropped another 2-0 decision to a superior Oberlin outfit. A foot of mud aided the Gators in keeping the score down, though the whole team played well. Steve Davis, Frank Steinle and Sam Barco starred for Allegheny, while "Shorty" Wiley and Bill Emery displayed terrific speed and trickery for the home team. During the entire game the Gators had only three shots, none of which proved dangerous to the superb Oberlin defense. The Ohiomen scored in the first and fourth periods for their fourth victory in five contests this season.

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Boliver started the show in the initial quarter when he carried the ball over in six tries from the Allegheny 34, where Thiel had recovered a Gator bobble.

The Daddiomens came right back with a long march from their own 20 to the Greenville 15, but could get no further. Pollard reeled off a 33-yard return of the kick-off, down to the opposition 47, where three plays later Stevenson shot a pass to Scibetta for a first down. Bill Rylander made ten more yards to the 21, and the picture brightened somewhat. Two plunges by Bob Carman and Rylander gained eight more three-footers, but a fourth down buck by Carman for a first was nullified by a penalty, which a run by Stevenson failed to regain. There the penetration ended, and Thiel punted up-field.

An exchange of punts occupied the teams in the second quarter until Quarterback Norm Baker's pass was snatched by Boliver on the Hilltopper 42, from where he got to the local's 20-yard marker before being struck down. Then big Ed Kochis raced goal-ward on the third down and met Alex Demeter's toss on the two and dragging defensive men, crossed into pay-dirt. Frank Pollard blocked the extra point try and the score was 13-0. Allegheny had control of the pigskin throughout the rest of the canto, but in spite of three first downs could get no closer than the enemy 45.

As the second half got underway the Daddio-coached combine filled the air with passes, but the alert Tomcat defense kept downfield receivers well-covered. The second

Gator scoring thrust came when Boliver fumbled on his own 21, and the Blue and Gold recovered. Carman and Pollard made a first down on the ten; Rick Meyer got to the four-yard line, but the next play lost three yards and a fourth down pass was wide of its mark.
The battle raged back and forth for the last of the third and the first of the fourth, both squads resorting to aerial warfare in an attempt to breach the opponent's line. Finally Thiel's offense started working and the Tomcats drove 68 yards to score again, culminating with a tricky lateral-and-forward pass play that let Kochis slip into the end zone undetected where he calmly waited, standing still, for the six-point toss from Burt Larson on fourth down.

McMAHON, BRINK PERFORM
A late drive by the Gators, spear-headed by reserves Ed Brink and Dave McMahon, the latter showing his wares for the first time this year, provided the Allegheny rooters with their biggest thrills of the game. Starting on their own 14, the Blue and Gold rolled all the way down to Thiel's 17 before being subdued. Eddie Brink made 13 yards on his first attempt, then McMahon picked up five more and Nate Edelblute made the second first-down on his own 37. Brink swept wide around his right end behind superb blocking and got off a 14-yard dash to Thiel's 49. Mac added a couple more yards, then blocking savagely, paved the way for a 22-yard sprint by the hard-working Brink. Then, with the oval resting on the 26-yard stripe, three passes were thrown, the last one being completed to McMahon who made a nice retrieve, but was inches shy of a first down. Three plays later, with the ball in Thiel's possession, the contest was over.

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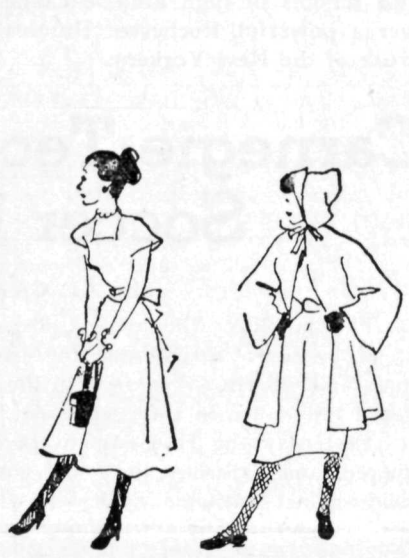
