PHI BETA KAPPA ANNOUNCES NEW MEMBERSHIPS

**FIRST AND SECOND
HONORS AWARDED
OTHER CLASSES**

Academic honors for students were announced for the year 1938-1939 in the chapel at Allegheny college Monday noon. In addition, the election of two junior members of Phi Beta Kappa was announced.

President William P. Tolley introduced the award of honors with a brief talk emphasizing the importance of scholastic attainment as the true criterion of success in college. He then proceeded to announce the awards while Dr. C. F. Ross distributed the certificates as the students came to the platform.

First honors, based upon an A average with no grade below B, went to six members of last year's junior class—this year's senior class: Ruth Baldwin, Elinor Kistler, William Mohny, and Velma Zwilling. Second honors, based upon an average with no grades below C, were awarded to the following: Robert Appleyard, Genevieve Gehrlein, Mary Graf, Richard Kuehner, and Robert Wright.

In this year's junior class, first honors were awarded to only one student: Robert Oberlin. Second honors were awarded to the following: Mary Brock, James Gettamy, Mary Kennedy, and Paul Fera.

In this year's sophomore class there was a record number of first honors awarded. Seven members of last

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AVIATION CLASS STILL OPEN: FEE REDUCED

Twenty students have already applied for the course in flight training in conjunction with the government program which is being offered this year by the college, it was announced yesterday by temporary faculty advisor F. F. Seely.

The committee on curriculum has decided to allow a minimum of 1 hour per semester credit on the course, but, after surveying the proposed syllabus of the work, may allow additional credit to the students participating.

It was also announced that Allegheny shall be allowed a quota of 20 taking the instruction. "But," Mr. Seely added, "There is a strong likelihood that some of the applications already received may be refused for some reason."

The fee for the course has been reduced from \$40 to \$30 as the latter sum was found to be sufficient to cover the cost of the compulsory insurance, the medical examination, and incident.

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Youth Conference Comes to a Conclusion On a "Design For Living"

Youth Speaks on Education for Living (Condensed from the article in October McCall's by Robert Maynard Hutchins.)

On a hot day last summer thirty-one products of American education met in St. Louis to reform the educational system of the country. The occasion was the sixth McCall's Youth Conference. The average age was twenty-six, and all the members had been to college. Each represented a different vocation.

They came to reform American education and remained to consider the ends of human life and to ask themselves what those ends were and what they have to do with education.

Almost unanimously it was agreed that it is possible and common for people to graduate from our colleges and universities without knowing how to read, write, or speak their own language. But what bothered the conferees more than anything else was the fact that education so frequently leaves them without any aims in life. "The greatest lack in our educational system," one man pointed out, "is its failure to establish goals."

The question discussed was: What is education for? The answers included, to teach you to take it, to make you optimistic about money and matrimony, to adjust you to your environment, to maladjust you to your

Selection of the winner will be in charge of a committee, composed of Miss Mildred Ludwig, Mr. Joseph Fisher, and Dr. J. R. Schults. The judges' decision will be final, with collecting of the ballots in charge of Mr. Hulbert. Robert Wright will officiate as timekeeper.

STUDENTS DRIVE TO RAISE FUNDS

NEW DONATIONS RECEIVED BY REIS LIBRARY

**Textbooks, Pictures,
Pottery, Records Donated
By Former Alleghenians**

According to a report by Miss Rowley, Reis library has been greatly aided by gifts from former Alleghenians and friends. Not only books have been added to the already collection, but pictures and several articles of pottery were also donated.

Mrs. Lewis Walker, Sr., wife of one of our former trustees Colonel Walker, gave a set of eleven volumes in memory of her husband.

Twenty-nine volumes were a gift from the estate of Mr. and Mrs. Lewis Tieste of Brooklyn. Mrs. Tieste sent two books many years ago at the time the library was opened, hoping they would be the first gift to the new institution.

The family of William Hammon, '81 donated 125 volumes, among which were several old and valuable textbooks. Other books pertaining to missions were given by the Hammon family several years ago.

Hon. Edward Lawrence, former judge of Meadville, made a unique gift in the form of a collection of Spanish records and a machine for reproduction. They are being used in the Spanish department at this time.

On display in the Craig Reading Room is a set of rockwood pottery bookends which came from the estate of Alice Church. The Lincoln item (a commission for one of her family with Lincoln's signature) also came from that estate several weeks ago. Miss Ida M. Taffell used her influence to get two beautiful engravings of Lincoln for the Lincoln room. Charles R. Tyler of the Boston law firm of Tyler, Eames, and Reynolds gave them to Miss Tarbell.

Students of Allegheny College are welding their efforts in a campaign continuing through next Thursday to raise \$2000 as their contribution to the 125th Anniversary Fund. Charles Miller, president of the Allegheny Undergraduate Council, unfolded the plans for the drive in a chapel program last Wednesday, disclosing at that time heads of various committees soliciting the students. Betty Spring, '40, will head the seniors; George Everett, '41, the juniors; Robert Welday, '42, the sophomores; David Robertson, '41, the freshman men; and Marjorie Wible, '41, the freshman women.

Various class committees will personally contact every member of their class, seeking voluntary contributions or pledges in an effort to reach the \$2000 goal.

At the opening of the drive last Wednesday, Velma Zwilling, '40, emphasized the urgent need for better accommodations for the college women. The male viewpoint of the dormitory fund was expressed by Robert Wright, '40. He illustrated the debt that all students owe to Allegheny for the many pleasurable hours unaccounted for by the regular tuition. Because of this he feels the cause will need no "high pressure" to send it to a climax. He asserted that those who receive the benefits of the college, the students, should be more than willing to give their utmost.

NIGHT SESSION NOW STARTED AT ALLEGHENY

**Classes Open to Public;
Evening Division Movement
Directed by Dr. L. J. Long**

This year marks the opening of a new phase of education offered by Allegheny College, that of the evening division. This division is open to members of the student body, and also to local citizens. Two hours credit is given for each course, if the person taking the subject is working towards a degree. Persons working for a degree are required to present sufficient requirements to be eligible to take the course. If the person is taking the course for personal aid, and is not working for a degree, there are no other requirements than a high school diploma.

Of the one hundred and ten people enrolled in the evening division, only five are students of the college. Mr. John Reno, of Talon Incorporated, has aided in this movement, and Dr. L. J. Long is director of the group.

The course is offered at a comparatively small cost. An average sum for one course for a full year would be approximately twenty-seven dollars.

All classes meet on Tuesday and Thursday evenings. English 19, a course in Business English, meets in Arter 25 from seven to eight-thirty, and the instructor is Mr. F. F. Seely. Speech E1, which consists of oral and written English, and meets in Arter 15 under the direction of Mr. Irvin is held from seven-thirty to nine o'clock.

Economics E1 meets in Arter 23 from eight-thirty to nine-fifty, and is taught by Mr. J. L. Fisher. This is a course in business economics, and is recommended particularly to those people who intend to continue work in that field. A course in college algebra to be instructed by Prof. O. P. Akers has been dropped because of an insufficient demand. Advanced accounting meets in Bentley 15, and is under the direction of Dr. J. W. McMahan. A special room is being prepared for this course. The room will have tinted walls and indirect lighting, which will greatly aid to defer the eye strain incurred from artificial lighting.

If the success of this course increases an extension is planned in the near future.

THEY DO SAY

"Does the Arms Embargo Act or the Cash and Carry neutrality plan give the United States the best assurance of staying out of war?"

This question above has warranted a special session of Congress. President Roosevelt asked for the latter. Exponents of the former are loud voiced.

Perhaps by the time you read this Congress will have voted on the question. If so we sincerely hope they have chosen correctly.

Selected interviews have found the following sentiment at Allegheny.

ROBERT OBERLIN, Junior history major—In regard to the present neutrality controversy, there appear two interest groups who will be vitally affected by the final decision—the American people and American business. The American people want peace. I see no threat to that peace in making the "cash and carry" plan part of our neutrality law; by reestablishing the British navy as a vital force which will make possible the receiving of American war supplies by Britain, and Britain alone; by thus encouraging the allies to carry on against German ambition. American business wants production orders. Therefore, why export raw materials to be made into the finished product abroad, as we are doing now, when American labor might just as well do all the work. Finally, the "cash and carry" plan is a neutral plan in theory if not in fact; by such a plan the United States government will undertake no credit obligations; there will be no risk to our government in the matter of shipping abroad such war materials.

BARBARA BARNHART, Sophomore speech and drama major—It is most natural that we should oppose anything which might involve our country in a senseless war. The repeal of the present Neutrality Act would be a great step toward such a catastrophe. Let Europe stew in her own juice. We have had one war for democracy which brought us a load of war debts and the loss of millions of fine young Americans.

JOHN HARNEY, Junior, foreign service student—Whatever the U. S. does to make it an accomplished fact, the one thing for her to do is to stay out of the conflict, both materially and verbally. The only way she can hope to have her voice of any influence in settling the battle is to be careful whom she blames.

In South America the United States has been striving for some time to get a majority of the trade. With Germany and even Italy now out of the picture this is our chance.

Finally, whatever your attitude toward the "cash and carry" bill before Congress, remember one thing with pleasure, both sides want to do the thing, which in their minds will be of the most value in keeping us out of war.

ALLYN WHITE, History student and assistant in the athletic department—The proposed "cash and carry" system would be of immediate benefit to American industry, but whether it is wise to sacrifice American peace security for war profits is a questionable exchange.

Provided there is a way to insure non-involvement and yet engage in the "cash and carry" plan, I am definitely in favor of it. Too often armament trade is a sign post on the road to war.

ROBERT HOOVER, Junior, history major—Bernard M. Baruch has said that to deny a belligerent country with materials necessary to their existence is a vital declaration of war. On the basis of this statement it would be reasonable to conclude that we are gambling safely when we decide to remove the arms embargo."

From this you can see that there is no de-emphasis of athletics at Allegheny. On the contrary, there is more emphasis here than at any large university. The athletic department makes every effort to get Allegheny students out for some sport. They give everyone a chance and give the use of good facilities and equipment. So far they have done very well. Last year there were very few students who did not participate. They want to make it better this year. It's up to you freshmen. They give you every chance. Now go out and give it a try.

tribute to the economic security of the individual, and the best way it can do that is to teach the individual how to think in the situations which he is likely to confront later in life.

In the critical months and years ahead, our people are to know where they are going. We must reform education on the plan proposed by these young men and women who found themselves with college degrees and no education. If we are going to remain free, we must have minds free from passion and prejudice, free from an accumulation of unrelated and insignificant detail, free to analyze, understand, and, at the last, to solve the fundamental problems of man and of society.

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
