THE NEW COACH

Fred Heckel Formerly of State University is the Man.

Fred Heckel has been secured as a foot ball coach and comes with a long record of successes on the gridiron. He played halfback and was captain of his high school team at Bradford. On entering the preparatory school at State, in '94, foot ball still had its attractive features for him and he took a position on a scrub team. But this team could not hold him the next year, for his snappy work gave him an opportunity to take a step higher. He was put on the 'varsity eleven at half-back, his regular position, which he held during that entire season.

In '96 Heckel was tried at quarter at which position he made his usual good showing. So satisfactory was his playing that he had no trouble in retaining the same place in '97 and again in the championship team of '98. Mr. Heckel is undoubtedly the best quarterback that State has ever had in the game. The simple fact that he was a regular member of the State's 'Varsity team for four consecutive years is enough to show that he is one of the best foot ball men in Western Pennsylvania, and all know that this territory has turned out some of the best material, the country has seen. Mr. Heckel served his time at quarter in '98 when State won the championship of the state. The strength of the 1900 team was estimated by the following victories: Over W. & J. 11-0, Dickerson 34-0, Bucknell 10-0, Lafayette 5-0 and by two defeats by Princeton 0-5 and D. C. & A. C. 5-18. State was the only team who scored against Duquesne.

Mr. Heckel has certainly had the advantage of some of the foremost coaching. While at State University, he served under such men as Hoskins, who was physical director there; he is recognized as a most efficient trainer and is now a member of P. A. C. Later Dr. Arthur Knipe was secured as a coach; he played half and quarter in '94 at University of Pennsylvania. Special work was given States quarter during his stay. Another U. of P. man, Doc. Newton, who played end and managed the 'Varsity in '94, then took up the coaching and carried States team on to more brilliant successes. For three years Heckel has coached at the Pennsylvania style, the guards back play, combined with the Princeton style with ends back.

Under such able coaches as these he has been developed into not only a fine player in the game but a first-class coach who is careful to note all the most valuable points of foot ball and who is unusually watchful over his candidates.

Mr. Heckel is five foot seven inches in height and weighs one hundred and fifty pounds. The strongest feature of his work is that he insists on fast play. He is very active himself and almost instills activity into his men. He has a thorough knowledge of the game and his unusual ability to impart it makes him a general favorite on the field. The control which is manifested over the candidates is complete; every man is not only expected to work but is given to understand that work is the main thing and other things cannot be tolerated. Pennsylvania style of play combined with the Princeton is being used. The team is practicing two hours a day, one hour on the gridiron

and one hour at signal work. The Coach is greatly pleased with the prospects and feels confident that he can bring out a winning team.

Mr. Heckel graduated at State University in '99 and since then has been employed as a chemist in Bradford.

MARCHING CLUB.

The Republican Students of the College Have Organized.

While Billie Bryan was touring Nebraska in an automobile, shouting "down with the capitalists, sound money, imperialism, etc!" while Teddy Roosevelt was bearding the lion in his den in Colorado, and incidentally getting chased by the lion; while Mark Hanna from his golden throne, dictated letters of instruction to McKinley; while all this was taking place in the West, an event of far greater importance had transpired in the East. We refer to no other than the organization, on Friday last, of the "William McKinley-Teddy Roosevelt Republican Marching Club of Meadville."

After Dr. Montgomery had dismissed the girls from chapel the meeting was called to order by Masters and in a "Czar" Reed tone of voice he requested that every one, except those of the Republican persuasion retire from the hall. This at first seemed a blundering way of calling the McKinleyites together, but when the few Republicans and Popocrats arose to leave, it was evident that the committee's intention was to give the organization a stimulus by showing the weakness and condition of the other parties. The supporters of "Otherisms" retired in confusion amid the shouts and yells of the Republicans.

Charles Hatch was called upon to state the nature of the meeting and something of the proposed organization; (Hatch, who is an emulator of Teddy Roosevelt's style of oratory), told in a few words the object of the meeting and the nature of the new club. It is to be organized in connection with the Meadville Republican Club.

The point most emphasized by Hatch was that there would be no expense connected with the organization, the town club furnishing suits and funds, the only requirement of the college organization being enthusiasm and patriotism.

Dull, the most noted expansionist in the college, nominated Hatch for chairman of the club. His nomination was seconded by Paul, another expansionist. Hatch's majority was the same as that given McKinley at Philadelphia. Frazier was nominated for vice-president and blushed like a High School girl at commencement when he arose to acknowledge the applause that greeted the mention of his name.

Freeman was the only nominee for secretary, he took charge of the meeting at once. A dispute arose as to the advisability of electing a treasurer when there were no funds, but as there were more men than offices it was decided that some one who needed a "jolly" to keep him in the organization should be elected; forthwith Douglass received the position. Bird declined the nomination of captain on the grounds that business took him from town every Saturday evening. Some one who had probably heard of Bird's Saturday evening employment yelled "Chickens" and Bird retired in

confusion. Masters was elected in his place and as lieutenants, Harper and M. Cartney were elected. The meeting then adjourned, and the first march of the "McKinley-Roosevelt Republican Club" was from chapel to Bentley. Cheers were given for the Club, for McKinley, Roosevelt and the full dinner pail.

Annual Reception for the New Students.

On Monday evening, Sept. 24, the Young Men's Christian Association held their annual reception in the college gymnasium in honor of the new students. The gymnasium was tastefully decorated with the college and national colors, together with palms and golden rods, the national flower. After the formalities of introductions a pleasant hour of social chat and conversation was spent during which time the punch bowl served as the center of a continually changing group.

The programme of the evening was begun by a brief address of welcome from Mr. Herbert Morris, president of the association. President Morris introduced Dr. Thomas as the speaker of the evening. The Doctor made one of his characteristic speeches, full of wit and humor, which called forth frequent bursts of applause and laughter in accordance with the nature of his remarks. His talk was directed at the new students and after congratulating them upon their first work's triumph at college he gave them some advice.

The Doctor said the first triumph of college life was the completion of the first week of the college term, the hardest week of a student's college life. He related incidents of despondency and homesickness. He told how the home-sick girls at the Hall "sat thinking of home while the bitter and scalding tears coursed down their fevered cheeks." "One occupant of Hulings had been found in the corridor lying over a trunk, 'boo-hooing' fit to break the heart of a savage." It was shown that the malady of homesickness never entirely leaves some of the students—"for only last summer young men were known to travel forty and sixty miles to a nearby town for consolation for the loss of college."

"My first piece of advice to the new student is, 'Don't believe all you see in the Kalendar.' I resolved to thrash that editor last summer but I could never get hold of him." During these remarks Pew was seen hiding behind the punch bowl.

The Doctor's second piece of advice was, "Don't be a social stick." After relating a few instances of the men who neglected their social advantages while at college, the Doctor surprised everyone by saying, "Don't go with a young lady all of your college course and never take her out. I knew a girl once who said in my hearing, 'I am going to shake that fellow, he has been keeping company with me for six months and has never taken me any place.'" The Doctor evidently sympathized with the young lady for he added, "She was right, too; but she didn't shake him, for three years after I received announcement of their marriage."

His concluding piece of advice was to the girls, "Don't judge a man by the clothes he wears." "I knew a student once," said the Doctor, "whose trousers lacked three inches of meeting his shoes. The ladies would have

nothing to do with him while at school, but now any one of them would take him, for he is a practicing physician in Cleveland with a salary of twenty thousand a year."

At the conclusion of Dr. Thomas' remarks, A. C. Culbertson sang a solo, "Happy Days" and in response to the applause he sang "Past and Future." Alta Moyer's solo, "The Lass With the Sentimental Air," as she refused to respond to the applause, concluded the programme. By 10:30 the last ones had left the hall and Y. M. C. A. reception was a thing of the past.

Y. M. C. A.

Its Work and Position Outlined by President Morris.

The Y. M. C. A. has for some years been a quiet, nevertheless, potent factor in college life. This year we are desirous that its influence shall be even more than ever far reaching. To that end we invite the co-operation of every christian man in college.

While the weekly Saturday evening meetings are of great value, and are the centers about which Association life ebbs and flows, nevertheless, the Y. M. C. A. aims to be much more than a prayer meeting. It aims to be a Christian fellowship, with a friendly greeting and a hearty hand clasp for every college man.

It aims to develop in each member a deeper spiritual life and a truer Christian manhood. The courses of Bible study outlined by the International committee of the Y. M. C. A. are proving great aids in this work. Last year we took up the first year of the course, and the work was pursued with much profit by about 15 men with Prof. Elliott as teacher. This year the two first years of the cycle will be taught.

This year we shall have two classes in the first course, which consists of a study of the Life of Christ arranged in a very practical and helpful way by Prof. Sharnan, and based upon the harmony of the Gospels by Stevens and Barton, and one class in the second course, which is based upon the Acts of the Apostles and the Epistles of Paul.

These courses are very helpful and as every Christian student expects to spend a certain amount of time in Devotional Bible study, there are great advantages in spending this time along the definite lines of our Bible courses. We expect at least 50 men in these classes, 25 of whom are already enrolled. These classes are open to all young men in the college, and Mr. Squire, chairman of the Bible Study committee, will gladly explain either course to any one desiring information.

Many men in college have not yet decided upon their life work. There are broad avenues for life work along the line of Christian activities. We purpose, during the year, to present the most important of these.

ATHLETICS.

The foot-ball team has been at work all week practicing formations, punting, tackling and falling on the ball. The men are slowly getting into condition and by the end of the week should be able to play in their old time form. Coach Heckel is teaching the "guards-back" formation and as this style is entirely new to Allegheny players much time has been spent in practicing the formations.

On Saturday however enough players were secured to line up with two teams and an hour's hard work was the result. After practice Coach Heckel expressed himself as highly pleased with the work of the men, and expects a team that will be able to defeat any of its weight in the country. Capt. Frazier in speaking of the team said that it would be lighter but faster than last year's team and should equal the '99 team's record.

Manager Griffin has had trouble in completing his schedule, three teams have already cancelled their dates and their places cannot be filled. Corry set out for Sept. 28, Franklin for Oct. 6 and Waynesborough for Nov. 13, have all cancelled their dates.

THE CONDITIONS AT PENNSY.

The one bar to the success of the University of Pennsylvania foot ball team on the gridiron this year is, it seems to be scholarship. Penn has the opportunity of developing the strongest team in her history this fall, if all the foot ball men succeed in passing their fall examinations.

In the past decade there has never been a period when so many heavy and active men have been candidates for the eleven. The guards back play requires heavy men who can stand the drive of so powerful a system and at the same time men who have activity enough to be in all places at once. This year Penn has at least eight of these men, and if all are eligible, she will have the heaviest and at the same time as active a line as she has ever had.

The natural difficulties presented are serious. In the first place it is necessary to find a quarter back. Some one must be developed for full back. And a new center must also be found. All these positions must be occupied by new men. In addition to this there are no good ends to take up that important branch of the game, while the half backs have had little experience.

In the matter of the line the five central positions, except the actual snap-back, will be occupied by old men.

Hare and Teas will again play guards. Wallace and Zimmerman will again play tackles, and with a good man in the center of the line the bulwark of a team's strength would be established. There is such a man at hand in Horner, a new candidate, who shows every indication of ability to more than fill the bill. He is big and strong, weighing 195 pounds, and has as great activity as Hare.—Pittsburg Dispatch.

Yale's Rosy Outlook.

The second week of Yale's foot ball work for the season of 1900 closed Sept. 29. It has been a very satisfactory in many ways to Captain Brown, upon whose shoulders the coaching has fallen so far. Despite the fact that of the four half backs who played in the Princeton and Harvard games last fall three are still in college, Captain Brown has ignored this fact and tried a number of new men of greater weight in these places. For instance, Hale, who played center last year has been tried in McBride's old place at full back. Cook, who was in a fair way to make tackle last year, has also been played behind the line at half back. With Sharpe, of last year's eleven, who weighs 150 or thereabouts in his old place at half back and these other two heavyweights beside him, Yale would have one of the heaviest and most successful line bucking combinations possible. Moreover, Keane, who was one of Yale's star halves last year, has been tried at quarter back, making a still heavier quartet. These are very significant changes, inasmuch as half backs Keane, Chadwick and Sharpe are still here as well as Fincke, quarter back last year.

Little need be feared this year then for Yale's back field, for all in all it will undoubtedly be one of the best in the country. For the line the prospect is not quite as bright, but still promising enough to make the heart of any Yale captain pleased. Brown will have himself and Olcott as guards, Stillman tackle, and Gould end, and Coy of the '98 eleven as veteran material to build upon. Holt, a center on his class team a year ago, and Richardson, who occupied the same position on his class team three years ago, are the most likely men for center. Kunzig and Hooker, of the 1902 eleven are the tackles so far upon whom Brown calls for the vacant place on the opposite end from Stillman. Coy and Gould, two veterans, will try for the places at the two extremes. Hoppin, Wallace, Frew and Ferguson are the

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promising ones. Bloomer, who played such a brilliant game on Andover last fall, will enter Yale this year.—Pittsburg Dispatch.

Princeton Coaches are Said to be Disappointed Over the Poor Material at Hand.

Though the hardest kind of preliminary practice has been indulged in by Captain Pel and the candidates, yet the coaches and undergraduates are considerably discouraged over the prospects of the team. Among the missing members of last year's team, are the two famous ends, Pee and Palmer; Hillebrandt at tackle, Captain Edwards at guard, and Booth, last year's giant center. Back of the line the withdrawal of Hutchinson has left a bad hole at quarter; Lathrop and Beardsley, the halves, are gone, while Wheeler leaves a vacancy at full, which will be hard to fill.

There is a good number of promising new men, several of whom Yale strove hard to secure. Undoubtedly, some will be developed into first class material. Of the old men who are now back, the following are the most promising: Center, Bailey; guard, Mills and Dana; tackle, Pell and McCord; end, Roper and Montgomery; quarter, Duncan and Dugro; half, McClave and Levick; full back, Mattis and Hodgman.

By an innovation in the coaching system, which has been introduced at Princeton this season, there will be no head coach as heretofore; but at the close of each day's practice there will be a conference of coaches. Those now on the field are Nat Poe, Arthur Poe, Alex. Moffat, Pete Ballet, Tine and Tylor.

Trainer Jim Robinson, formerly of Yale, is now in town, and is rapidly gaining the confidence of the men.—Pittsburg Dispatch.

Hard Work at Harvard.

Of the men who joined the Harvard foot ball squad, Blagden, '02, is the only man of much importance. He was on the team last year in several of the minor games. He weighs 160 pounds, and is of good build. Jones, Campbell and Ellis were absent on account of examinations. Captain Daly and Coach Diblee are usual, coach the team.

The men are having the usual amount of dumb bell exercise, followed by practicing starts and falling on the ball. Then they are divided into squads and sent through the routine practice of starts, catching, kicking, and getting down the field after kicks. Hallowell, Sawin, Kendall and B. Taylor do most of the kicking. Most attention is given, however, to tackling the dummy. Diblee is very particular about this work, and both Diblee and McMasters watch every man and send them over and over at the dummy until they can tackle correctly. The training table will not be started until after college begins.

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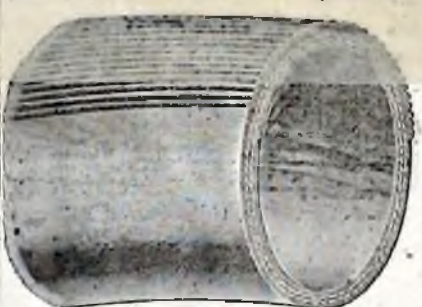
