FIRST TRYOUTS TO BE HELD IN
CHAPEL ON NOVEM-
BER 11.

Tryouts for the varsity debating team will be held next Wednesday afternoon, November 11, in Ford Chapel. The finals will be held on November 20. The main speeches will be of five minutes length while three minutes will be allowed for rebuttal.

Three varsity debaters from last year: Edwin J. Schruers, A. Hughes Bartlett, and John B. Gordon, will form the nucleus about which this year's team will be built. Several members of the freshman team of last year are out for varsity berths and it is thought that the fine records of former contestants will be upheld again this year.

Debates with Western Reserve, Oberlin and Wooster will be held during the winter on the question: Resolved, That the present policy of extension of governmental restriction of individual liberty should be condemned. Debates on other questions with Pitt, Penn State, and Bates are pending.

Doctor Church Gives Recital In Chapel For Music Day

Thursday, October 29, being Music Day throughout the nation, the chapel exercises were devoted to music. The program for the morning was turned over to Dr. H. W. Church.

Doctor Church in his opening words stated that Dr. Sigmund Spaeth, in his talk here on the "Common Sense of Music," had omitted discussing the one tone tune. He accompanied Mr. Eugene Harzell on the piano in the singing of the "Monotone," an illustration of music based on the one tone tune.

BAND MAKES PREPARATIONS FOR BIG GROVE CITY GAME

COLLEGE ORGANIZATION URGED
TO GIVE FINANCIAL AID TO
MUSICIANS.

Two important matters were decided by the governing board of the Band during the past week. One concerns the trip to Grove City for the game and the other pertains to a reward for faithful service.

Many college students are unaware of the extreme importance that the winning or losing of the Grove City game will have on the minor championship. Grove City has one of the strongest football teams of her career. For this reason it is almost imperative that the Band make the trip to instill spirit and keep it at high pitch until the game is finally Allegheny's. This week all the men's fraternities will be asked for a subscription, and a collection will be taken at Hulings and Cochran Halls. Last year the fraternities responded nobly, but the collections were not as large as had been hoped. The Band needs everybody's support.

Officials of the Band wish to state that the reason for the Band's non-appearance at the Waynesburg game was due to the varying weather conditions, which hinders the work of the reed and valve instruments and ruins the drum heads.

The decision was made to reward all players for faithful service—regular and punctual attendance at rehearsals in the Chapel at 4 o'clock on Monday and 4:30 on Thursday—in the Band. A gold felt lyre decorated with the letters AC will be the reward.

Forum Coal Mine Ownership Debate Won By Affirmative

Philo-Franklin Forum held its regular meeting Friday afternoon, October 30, in the Forum room of Bentley Hall. The business of the afternoon was the initiation of two new freshman members, M. L. Himmler and R. A. Kendig.

There is to be no meeting next week because of the preliminary freshman tryouts for the annual Freshman-Sophomore debate. The tryouts are to be held in the Forum room next Friday afternoon. There will be a meeting the following week, to be taken up with a discussion of "Parliamentary Procedure in Oratory and Debate," which is the book that has been adopted for study by the Forum for this year.

After the completion of business, an interesting debate on "Resolved, That the operation of the coal mines should be under the control of the United States Government," occupied the rest of the afternoon. Joe Lopushansky and T. Averbach upheld the affirmative side of the question, while Robert Allen and James Meadowcroft argued the negative side. The debate was won by the affirmative. After the debate, a short discussion was held on some of the conditions that exist in the coal field as a result of the recent strike.

MEN'S SENATE ADOPTS RESOLU- TION TO ABOLISH PARTY FAVORS.

At a meeting held in Carnegie Hall last Wednesday afternoon, October 28, the Student Senate made a resolution that favors should not be given at the men's fraternity parties and that the programs should not cost more than one dollar per couple.

ALLEGHE DEFEATS WAYNESBURG ON RAIN-SOAKED GRIDIRON 6-0

Game is Featured By Beautiful Drive For Touch-
down—Brace and Hanlon Star

Using a defensive game most of the way Allegheny completed another step in its march for championship honors when the Yellow Jackets of Waynesburg were subdued on Saturday, October 31, by a 6-0 score. Coach Davies was forced to save his crippled forces as much as possible and the team that started the game was minus four of the regular players—two from the backfield and two from the line. The game was played in bitter cold and a sea of mud. Towels had to be called for repeatedly in order to wipe the mud from the players' eyes.

The game had not progressed far until it could be seen that both teams were employing the defensive style of play. Waynesburg had the ball in Allegheny's territory most of the half but their offense was making no headway against the stubborn resistance of the Blue and Gold forwards. Late in the second quarter Coach Davies sent three of his veterans into the game—Dolde and Brace in the backfield and Wolz in the line. A noticeable difference was instantly observed and from

FRESHMEN HEAR ADDRESS BY S. L. MAXWELL, '10

TALK BY ALUMNUS IS PART OF IN-
TRODUCTION TO COLLEGE
LIFE COURSE.

Dr. S. L. Maxwell, '10, addressed the Freshman Class in a lecture in the Introduction to College Life course of "College Ethics," Tuesday afternoon, October 27, in Ford Memorial Chapel. Doctor Maxwell explained the necessity of knowing "yourself."

Doctor Maxwell's talk was on two main topics, (1) evolutionary development of ethics, and (2) the creative development of ethics. He believes that environment develops one's personality to a great extent, but that one's self is the main factor in the development of ideals and character. To do this one must realize thoroughly just what these problems are.

The first problem is the relation of a student to the college. Doctor Maxwell says that there is a great temptation to follow any group and accept their moral and ethical customs. One very interesting explanation which Doctor Maxwell gave at this point was that of college customs. He said that the "dink" was a stamp which Allegheny puts on the freshmen to let the student body, the faculty, and the people of Meadville know the new students of the college. The cap, according to Dr. Maxwell, is a symbol of the acceptance of the wearers of Allegheny customs and traditions. However, "activities and customs take so much time that individuality is crowded out," Doctor Maxwell warned the students, "Do not make the mistake of thinking that all things must be conformed to." He said that one must discriminate in the matter of conformance.

The relation of the student to the world was the next point which Doctor Maxwell stressed. A college is largely a world in itself, but there are relations of ethics and morals which must be kept up with the outside world. The period of college life is the most formative time in one's life and one must shape his morals and ethics to fit into the life after college. Honesty in work and politics must be learned while one is in college.

Doctor Maxwell's next point was the relation of student to student. He made the statement that one's friends in college influenced his after life to a very great degree. Doctor Maxwell, in closing, advised all students to drop the childish things to which they had clung during their school life and to become men and women.

this point on the superiority of the Blue and Gold was certain. The Hurricane swept down the field under the generalship of Dolde, but the half was too far advanced and the score was not made until the third quarter when a touchdown was made in such quick order that it took even the fans by surprise.

Waynesburg made a poor kickoff to start the second half and the ball was Allegheny's on the 50-yard line. Johnny Brace took the ball on the first play and went wide around right end for a 25-yard gain; Captain Jimmy Hanlon carrying the ball then went off left tackle on a double pass to the 12-yard line. The same play was repeated on the opposite side with Brace totting the pigskin and he took it to the 4-yard line where Dahl plunged it over in two attempts. Brace failed to kick goal.

The team was content to rest on this margin and kicked continually until the end of the game. The score therefore does not indicate the superiority of Allegheny. Coach Davies was taking no chances in having any of his men injured and Brace kicked usually on the second or third down. On one occasion Allegheny had the ball on the enemy's 40-yard line after an exchange of punts but no effort was made to open up, even though the first thrust at the Yellow Jackets line netted good gains.

Waynesburg made a vain attempt to score in the last quarter on forward passes. Although many of their attempts were completed none went for more than a gain of 5 yards and as a whole they were smothered in all their offensive attempts.

CODIFICATION OF POWERS AND
DUTIES OF MEMBERS IS GREAT
STEP FORWARD.

On Thursday afternoon, October 29, the Publications Board held a meeting in Alden Hall. All members of the Board were present.

After considering several articles appropriate as rewards for publications competitors, a charm was more or less agreed upon, although a definite decision was not made.

The primary business before the Publications Board at present is the matter of drawing up a set of by-laws to the constitution, carefully defining the work and scope of the general manager and editors of the four different publications. The present general manager and editors have been at work on the by-laws since last spring and hope to have them completed at an early date.

Such a proposed addition to the constitution will prove very beneficial, as there will be an entire elimination of the disagreement and misunderstanding of former years.

FRESHMEN PARADE THEIR SHORT- COMINGS AT FOOTBALL GAME SATURDAY.

Due to the cold weather last Saturday, the band was unable to provide the music at the game, but the spectators were entertained throughout the game and between the halves by the antics of various freshmen who had thought it wise to disregard the rules.

Parading before the stands and bleachers, many of the first year men were dressed in skirts, as a warning to obey all rules before some punishment will be inflicted upon them. Others had to carry some object in remembrance of some rule that they had failed to obey while on the Campus. Some were requested to say their "speech" to upperclassmen, and nearly every Freshman was subjected to some form of razzing.

On Tuesday evening, December 8, plans are being arranged to bring the well known Penn State Glee Club to Allegheny for a combined concert with the home organization. Several out-of-town trips are being arranged for the clubs, although no definite dates have been secured.

PI DELTA EPSILON SMOKER HELD WEDNESDAY EVENING

MANY GUESTS ROYALLY ENTER-
TAINED BY JOURNALISM
FRATERNITY.

Wednesday evening, October 28, the local chapter of Pi Delta Epsilon, national honorary journalism fraternity, held a smoker in the Phi Gamma Delta house. The meeting was open to all college students interested in journalism, whether or not a member of the fraternity.

One of the largest and most enthusiastic group of writers and would-be writers in the history of the local chapter attended the smoker. Special guests from the faculty included Doctor Swartley and Professor Reynolds.

The early part of the evening was spent informally discussing various topics and in the "smokes." Later, G. Alfred Palmer, president of the chapter, introduced Doctor Swartley who gave a very interesting and instructive talk on the value of journalism. Following Doctor Swartley, Professor Reynolds spoke on his work as a journalist at Iowa State, and gave some good pointers to the new writers.

After these more or less serious talks, the fun began. The four pledges of the fraternity, C. E. Ross, R. K. Evans, R. O. Barber, and K. P. Williams gave some lantern projections, and criticisms of various campus celebrities, which were greatly enjoyed by all.

At a later hour refreshments, consisting of cider and doughnuts, were served.

Talk Given By Dean Beebe During Visit At College

Doctor Beebe, dean of the Boston Theological School, was the speaker in Chapel yesterday morning. Dean Beebe read a few verses from the 12th chapter of 1st Corinthians for a Scripture lesson.

During the course of his talk, Doctor Beebe said: "The Church is one of several groups constituting the social order of the world. With what is the Church expected to concern itself? Society's viewpoint is that the Church must be sensitive to all rights and wrongs."

"The Church is often thought of in relation to what it would like to do instead of what it really does," Dean Beebe then read an editorial from a secular daily in which the editor thinks of the minister as a direct organizer. "In the former days the pulpit gave all of the general information instead of newspapers and libraries. The Church also gave amusement to the people, because of the lack of any other form. But now the minister finds himself treading on unfavorable and undesirable ground in order to continue giving his people amusement. There is too much commercialized amusement in the field for people to indulge in, rather than the wholesome good times that a Church provides."

Grace Thomas, '09, of Union City, Pa., has been placed on the staff of the Central Presbyterian Conference Board of Church Schools. Miss Thomas is well prepared for her new duties. She received her master's degree at Allegheny College, and she has also taken two years of graduate work in the School of Religious Education at Boston University.

SOPHOMORES MAKE PLANS TO RAZZ FRESHMEN MORE

COMMITTEE APPOINTED TO SEE
THAT ALL RULES ARE
OBEYED.

On Friday morning after Chapel, a meeting was called of the men of the Sophomore Class to discuss freshman razzing. As was shown by the class president, Thomas Leffingwell, some of the freshmen have disobeyed every rule and tradition that they must abide by while a yearling at Allegheny. The Student Senate makes these rules to be obeyed by the freshmen, and the sophomores are supposed to see that these rules are enforced. If they are not enforced in the near future drastic measures will be taken.

A council was then appointed by Leffingwell, consisting of one man from each fraternity, who are to act as the student razzing committee. All names of freshmen who disobey the rules will be handed to this committee, who will then get the sanction of the Student Senate to inflict any sort of punishment they wish upon the culprits.

The staff of this year's Literary Monthly has been organized under the direction of Doctors Swartley and Shultz and the editor, R. O. Evans. Interest in literary efforts seems to be reviving in the college, judging from the number of articles received from the students. The "Lit" publishes only the literary efforts of the college—publishing the best short stories, poetry, essays, etc., that are turned in.

Ida Tarbell, '80, Publishes Book on Life of Judge Gary

Ida M. Tarbell, '80, author of the "Life of Abraham Lincoln" and "History of the Standard Oil Company," has invaded the territory of steel in her latest book, "The Life of Elbert H. Gary: The Story of Steel." Miss Tarbell portrays the life of the head of the steel industry in this country and pictures his quarrels and disagreements with other financiers over his labor and stock market policies. She explains and gives the causes of the various government suits and investigations over the formation of the steel trust.

A detailed account is also given of J. Pierpont Morgan's part in acquiring the steel plants offered him by Charles Schwab. Judge Gary's part in all the big steel transactions is vividly portrayed, and it shows him to be a mediator and peacemaker and not a militant enemy or foe of labor as is commonly imagined.

COCHRAN HALL FIRST YEAR MEN FRIGHTENED AT HALLOWE'EN PARTY.

With the dining hall tastefully decorated in keeping with the Halloween season, a Halloween dinner was served at Cochran Hall Saturday, October 31. 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A GOOD MOVE.

The resolution of the Men's Senate forbidding the giving of favors at any men's fraternity party and limiting the price of programs to one dollar per couple is a commendable piece of legislation. The various fraternities will have to accept the Senate's resolution to make the measure all-inclusive. Several groups have already adopted such a law and all fraternities are expected to fall in line this week. Of course, any fraternity that fails to accept the resolution not only repudiates its representative on the Senate but will be a rank outsider as well.

To return to the contents of the measure. The custom of giving favors in the past has resulted in cut-throat competition. Each fraternity wished to outdo the others, a condition which resulted in deflated pocketbooks and inflated bad feeling.

Furthermore, the giving of favors to the fair guests at a party seems to be somewhat inconsistent and somewhat of a paradox. Apparently the idea of a favor is to remind the owner of such and such a party. If a party be as it should be there need be no aid to the memory. A good party will be remembered, regardless of whether favors are given or not. A favor may also be an attempt to make up for what a party lacks in spontaneity and good feeling.

So the resolution of the Senate should meet the approval of both the men and the co-eds. The fraternities can now devote themselves to throwing a party based entirely on its own merits, and the co-eds are assured that a party sans favors will be augmented by increased pep, life, and personal attention and ingenuity.

MODERATION IN FRESHMAN HAZING.

Due to the somewhat disastrous results of the Freshman-Sophomore Poster Scrap in the Fall of 1923 considerable agitation against unnecessary freshman hazing was aroused, terminating in the abolition of the annual combat between the two under classes. The class of 1927, remembering its experience as freshmen, profited to the extent that the class of '28 was introduced into Allegheny in a much different manner.

The present second-year men have apparently forgotten the moderate treatment accorded them as freshmen; they have been overly aggressive, continually hazing and maltreating the yearlings, whether the punishment is deserved or not.

We of the Campus dislike to form a biased opinion on the matter; similarly we hesitate to assume that present conditions are indicative of the general attitude of the sophomores. But without arguing the desirability of hazing, we feel that the actions of the sophomores, aside from being unwarranted, have been carried to extremes.

THE ALUMNI AND THE PUBLICATIONS.

In the last two issues of The Campus have appeared subscription blanks for the college publications. The Publications Board, appreciating the benefits redounding to the college through the mailing of The Campus to the alumni, entered upon a campaign to interest the alumni and faculty-members in the other publications.

PEP MEETING PRECEDES FOOTBALL GAME WITH WAYNESBURG.

At the regular chapel hour on Friday morning, October 30, a pep meeting was held in anticipation of the big game on Saturday against Waynesburg.

Dr. Joseph W. Miles delivered a short address to the student body, his appearance calling for a loud outburst of applause from the undergraduates. Doctor Miles said he was convinced that the Waynesburg game would prove to be one of the toughest games of the year. The bad condition of the field rendered this encounter even more difficult.

Cy Hartmann, in a few words, urged the whole student body to attend the game, regardless of the weather conditions. He led in the singing of several songs, while Ted Averbach directed the cheering.

MRS. EDWARD MAC DOWELL, WIFE OF AMERICA'S FOREMOST COMPOSER, LECTURES HERE.

Last Monday evening, November 1, Mrs. Edward McDowell gave a musical lecture at the Park Avenue Congregational Church.

She interpreted her husband's compositions. Edward MacDowell was America's foremost composer, and his "To a Wild Rose" is one of our most loved works.

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BLUE AND GOLD MEETS THIEL IN LAST HOME GAME OF SEASON

Holleran-Coached Machine May Prove Real Opposition For Davies' Men

Next Saturday, November 7, will witness the clash of two rival elevens, when Allegheny takes the field against Thiel in the last home game of the season. This game always attracts a great deal of local attention, and in spite of the rumors of Thiel's weakness the largest crowd of the season is expected to view the fray.

In the past decade Allegheny has had much the better of the athletic argument between the two schools, but the Lutherans have generally managed to put up a stiff battle, and this year's contest promises to be very much on this order.

Last year the Blue and Gold came back from Greenville with a 14-0 victory safely stowed away, but those who saw the game will recall that it was not exactly a "walk-away." This year the Thiel students have high hopes of revenge. The local opinion seems to be that the Mercer Countians have a very slight chance of taking home the prize, but Coach Davies considers the Thiel game as much to be feared as the Grove City contest and is taking no chances on a slip-up in the championship play of his warriors.

A number of local fans who witnessed Thiel's pre-season workouts at

the Lake this summer, were not heavily impressed by the showing and were inclined at the time, to regard the Thiel game as a "set-up." Since then, Tommy Holleran has banded together 11 players who must be given real consideration. Their impressive showing of the first part of the season has changed the outlook considerably. That the Lutherans do not lack power is clearly indicated by their excellent showing in downing Duquesne University 19-0. This victory came close on the heels of a sensational win over Bethany by a 7-0 score, and a 7-6 decision from Broadus. Waynesburg's mighty "Yellow Jackets" and McMillan's highly touted "Covenanters" were both hard pressed to win their games, 7-0 and 12-0 respectively.

Coach Davies' men came through their test of last Saturday without any serious additional injuries, but the eleven that stacks up against Thiel will still be weakened by the injuries sustained in previous contests.

Since Greenville is only 28 miles from Meadville a crowd of fully 2000 fans is expected to accompany the Thiel team. One side of the field, as usual, will be given over to the visiting delegation who are bringing a band with them.

Harriers To Meet Thiel Team Preliminary To Football Game

With two week's intensive preparation after the Pitt meet, the Blue and Gold cross country team is in excellent shape for its third match of the season, to be run with Thiel at Montgomery Field Saturday, November 7, preliminary to the Thiel-Allegheny football game. Captain Rea, Jones, Bentley, Ellis, Bell, Richards, and Parker are the Allegheny men who will compete.

Last year's meet with Thiel was easily won by the Blue and Gold, although Wolfe, of Thiel, finished first, beating out Johnny Rea by a scant margin. Allegheny is not over-confident this season, however, for Wolfe is still in school, and advices from Greenville indicate that several new men are running equally well.

Allegheny's showing at Pitt was anything but disappointing. For the Blue and Gold scored on the Pitt champions, Jones finishing fifth, while Carnegie Tech. two weeks ago, was beaten completely, failing to get a man in any one of the first six places.
