Appoint Prof. Henke
Chairman Of County
Education Program

Prof. F. G. Henke has been appointed Chairman of the Council of Emergency Education for Crawford County. This is a unit in the nation-wide Emergency Education program instituted last summer by President Roosevelt.

The object of this program is to make possible for adults an education in academic subjects, trade and industry, home economics, citizenship, and commercial studies. It is the plan of the Council to put back to work ten or more unemployed teachers in this county.

The Council has twenty-one members. It is headed by an executive committee composed of three men: Superintendent Blair of Crawford County, Superintendent Norton of Meadville, and Superintendent Stetson of Titusville. The project is under the administration of Mr. George L. Maxwell of the Works Division of the Relief Organization.

It is expected that classes will soon be organized in Meadville, Titusville, and other civic centers of Crawford County.

President Of Chinese
University Addresses
College Vespers

Addressing a record crowd, Dr. J. C. Lin, President of the Fukien Christian University, China, presented one of the most interesting college Vesper services of the year last Sunday. He spoke on the subject, "How the Chinese College Students Are Facing Chinese Problems."

Dr. Lin emphasized the fact that these present problems arise from too hurried a progress, and that they can only be solved by Christian efforts and ideals.

"The young Christian men and women are willing to give their lives to go out and work among the common people, to meet the great Challenge, and to solve it with love and sacrifice instead of hatred and exploitation."

"It is also my hope that the youth of the world will be able to catch the vision of Jesus for a new day in a new world," concluded the speaker. Then he proceeded to present moving pictures of China and of Chinese college life in Fukien University.

The service was closed after the audience had asked the lecturer many questions relating to the character of his work.

Dr. Lin has studied at Oberlin, Harvard, Columbia, and Drew University. He has been president of the Christian University in China for eight years, and is today one of the youngest college presidents, at 36 years of age. He appeared in native costume for his address.

In conjunction with the program Eleanor Ruth sang "Coming Home" and "The Rose in the Garden". Delbert Jolley introduced the speaker.

Dr. R. E. Lee Speaks
At Teachers Convention
At Buffalo, N. Y.

Dr. Richard E. Lee spoke before the sectional group on science of the New York Teachers' Association in Buffalo on Thursday, November 1.

His subject was "A New Type of Integration Course in the Natural Sciences". In his address, Doctor Lee explained the purpose and the methods of the Natural Science Survey which was instituted at Allegheny three years ago as a freshman requirement.

He was invited to speak before the Association along with representatives from six other colleges and universities: Harvard, Yale, Princeton, Columbia, Wisconsin, and Rochester.

The Sturtevant Foundation is a fund of five thousand dollars, a gift of Mr. Paul Sturtevant, '99, and Mr. Watkin P. Sturtevant, '06, in memory of their father, the Honorable John C. Sturtevant. The income of this fund is used in providing lectures.

BOTH MEN HAVE GREAT
EXPERIENCE IN VAR-
SITY DEBATE.

Edward Stainbrook and Earl Green have been selected to represent Allegheny College in the Oxford-Allegheny Debate, to be held in the Playshop Theatre, Friday evening, at 8 o'clock.

Upholding the negative of the proposition, "Resolved: That the abandonment of an isolationist policy is essential to the return of American recovery", Stainbrook will give the first speech for Allegheny. Preceding the first negative argument, a member of the Cripps-Foot team will give the opening speech of the evening for Oxford; following Stainbrook's speech, the affirmative will conclude its case. Green will then complete the case for the negative in the last main speech on the program.

A refutation speech for the negative will be given by Stainbrook, culminating the Allegheny contention; the program will be concluded with a final rebuttal by a member of the English team.

Stainbrook is well known for his impressive oratory. He has participated in numerous speaking contests and debates during the past two years. He represented Allegheny College in the annual Civic Oratorical Contest for 1934.

Active in dramatics, he recently directed the production of Goldoni's "The Fan" for public performance to the benefit of a local organization. He is also an Assistant Dramatics Coach in the Meadville High School. Stainbrook is vice-president of Kappa Phi Kappa, educational fraternity.

An outstanding student, Earl Green has won first honors in scholastic standing for two consecutive years; he has participated in numerous debates and speaking contests, winning the Philo-Franklin Oratorical Contest in his Freshman year and competing in the Wakefield Oration contest twice.

Green is President of Phi Beta Phi, honorary biological fraternity; and President of Omicron Delta Kappa, men's activities fraternity.

He is Coach of Debating in the Meadville High School.

The Allegheny Debate will be the tenth successive debate for the English team in this country. Today they are debating Western Reserve University at Cleveland; tomorrow, the Cripps- (Continued on page 6)

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SOLUTION

Great numbers of townspeople were forced to watch last Saturday's game through the gate of Montgomery Field. Unfortunately, this was not due to lack of room in the stadium; about one-third of the concrete stands and most of the wooden bleachers were empty. The townspeople were mostly under twelve years of age.

From the appearance of the stands so far this year, most of the townspeople have stopped patronizing the Allegheny College games. Furthermore, a fair sized portion of the student body has apparently lost interest in attending games. Among the few supporters are these Meadville grade school children.

Why does the athletic administration not take cognizance of this situation and admit the boys for a small charge of perhaps ten cents? Such a policy has been adopted by some universities and by several major league baseball teams. The children cannot be expected to pay forty cents, the

price of four movies to them, but they might part with the price of one movie in order to see an Allegheny football game from inside the stadium. There is certainly plenty of room for them.

Such a policy would not only please the youngsters and provide a source of income now untapped by the College, but it would also have a moralizing effect on the cheering. There is no need to mention how disgraceful last week's cheering was. As it was, most of it was provided by the small boys who somehow managed to get in. It is a good guess that if the large vacant spaces in the far end of the stadium were filled with children, the cheering from those sections would put the student cheering section to shame. Perhaps, but of course this is only conjectural, the act of being "shown up" would accomplish what nothing else has succeeded in doing, instill a little life into Allegheny students' cheering.

The townspeople were heard last Saturday making some caustic remarks about the lack of a scoreboard on Montgomery Field, and the student body has not overlooked this deficiency either.

The majority of the people who attend these games do not have a great deal of technical knowledge about the game, and an ably operated and easily seen board is a great help to them in understanding the events.

The school seems to have money for the new dormitories, new paint jobs all over the campus, grass seed, and the like. Why no money for a scoreboard?

If there is money for a scoreboard, why isn't there one up? The absence of one for the Clarion game can be excused as an oversight, but the lack of one for the last two games—one of them on Homecoming Day, when the school should look its best—is hard to account for.

Let's have a scoreboard for the Ithaca game!

"Endocrine Glands" Subject Of Professor Ogilvie's Talk Before Biological Fraternity

To the Editor:—

Upon entering Allegheny a year ago I fell in line with the popular concept that school spirit was non-existent at Allegheny. In the course of events of my Freshman year and certain happenings which have occurred during the present semester I have been forced to change my views concerning school spirit to no small degree.

After witnessing Saturday's football game, it would seem to me that the prevailing idea of the non-existence of school spirit is due chiefly to the inactivity of those who are responsible for the securing of the proper manifestation of school spirit at athletic contests.

To one attending the Oberlin game Saturday, the lack of activity on the part of the cheerleaders was self-evident. It is no difficult matter to maintain interest in the activities of an aggressive team, for interest is practically spontaneous. However, under adverse conditions, maintaining the interest of the spectators in the actions of the team, is no easy matter. It would seem that maintaining interest in under such circumstances would be the lot of the cheerleaders. One in attendance at the game could not help but notice the lack of consistent and unified activity on the part of the cheerleaders which became more pronounced as the game continued.

Perhaps I have written indiscriminately and should such be the case I trust those who may read this will make due allowance for the immaturity of a sophomore mind. However, I do not aim to assume a critical attitude but rather I have written this in an effort to bring attention to the above mentioned deficiencies so that our cheerleaders in the future may be alert and thus be able to more efficiently cope with the problem of obtaining the proper manifestation of school spirit, to the end that our athletic teams are aware of the support of the student body to such an extent, that their morale may be buoyed up to a degree that it may play an important part in the winning of athletic contests.

somely in support of the team in the Grove City fracas sat in their seats at the Oberlin game like dead men; the head cheer leader didn't even show up. A great deal that is said about the team needing support from the stands is of course untrue, but the general feeling or attitude they show does have some effect on the players.

When a person goes to a football game feeling that he would like to see his team win, see them fight it out as football players are supposed to do, and then hears behind him instead of some red blooded support a lot of would-be wise cracks about a "lousy" team or some clever conversation that should be heard only around sewing circles; he naturally has no sympathy with headlines bawling the team's lack of punch. I very vividly remember the girl behind me making such remarks as "isn't that runner just too stupid," or "those linemen are so dumb running around in that mud". To conclude there is only one way for Allegheny to have winning teams, since all athletics are run on an amateur basis, that is the students should enter into the spirit of sport and not by wise cracks and lack of interest discourage those who are actually participating. Let's take the Grove City football game as a basis for enthusiasm for future sports events.

OBERLIN SQUAD DOWNS ALLEGHENY 6-0

Yeomen Take Advantage Of Blocked Punts And Fumbles To Win Weak Contest

'GATOR OFFENSIVE STALLS IN EARLY MOMENTS.

Playing with a complete reversal of form than that displayed last week, Allegheny's gridiron representatives went down to a disappointing defeat, Saturday, when they fell before the Red and Orange of Oberlin, 6-0.

Going out on Montgomery Field, favored to win, the 'Gator machine stalled, and could not seem to work up to the proper pitch to win, in spite of the ability to click in the opening minutes of the game.

Starting out like the 'Gator team that was witnessed last week, the Blue and Gold marched the length of the field in a drive that seemed to indicate that they would have little trouble in downing the Yeomen, and breaking the jinx sign that Coach Butler's men seem to have over them.

Four first downs were rolled up in short order. McKim, Berger and Weber advanced the ball 11 yards, after receiving a punt on the 20. Berger then got loose again on a plunge through the line. The drive was temporarily stopped here, but on a return punt, the 'Gators got going again, making a beautiful march down the field. McKim passed to Horn, who ran several yards and then passed laterally to Berger, who was finally downed on the ten, although at the time, it seemed

that he would get away for a touchdown. Here success seemed to go to the player's heads, for the drive failed. Allegheny lost the ball on two passes over the goal and a fumble. Life then went out of the 'Gators, to return very little during the rest of the game.

Oberlin's touchdown drive then came, near the end of the first quarter. After Pfaff had punted back to the 45, Diaz went back to punt, but his low kick failed to clear the incoming swarm of Yeomen, and the punt was blocked. Wickenden scooped the ball up and ran for a touchdown, only to have it nullified when Barnes, Oberlin end, clipped an Allegheny man from behind as he was about to tackle the ball carrier. This did not deter the Yeomen from scoring however, because they came right back to tally.

After Weber intercepted a pass just inside the goal line, Diaz punted, but the ball carried only to the 31. Two passes put the Orange and Red on the two yard line, where Smith, plunging 210 pounder, took two tries to put it over. The point after touchdown failed when the 'Gator linesmen smeared an attempt at a pass. But the damage was done.

Fumbles were again largely responsible for the failure of Allegheny's scoring attempts. Even while making four first downs on the initial touch-

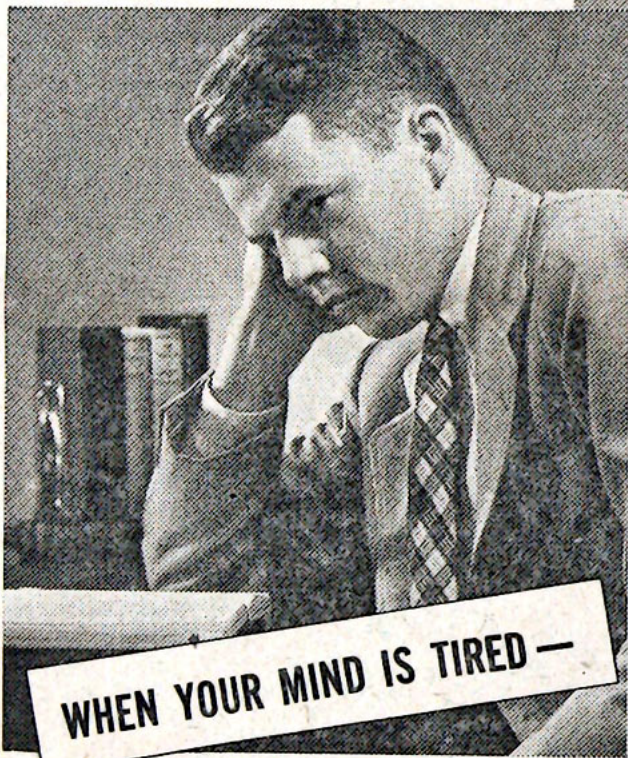

Allegheny To Meet Fast Thiel Squad This Week

Freshman Eleven Defeats Grovers In Opening Game

Journeying to Grove City last Friday the Allegheny Freshmen came back with Allegheny's second gridiron victory over the Grovers this year.

The effective power drives that enabled them to carry the ball from one end of the field to the other did not prove to be the winning force, the 'Gators lacking the necessary punch to put the ball over the line. It was not until the third period that the locals were able to score, and then on a break which gave them the 7-0 margin which they held until the end of the game.

The break came in the third quarter after an Allegheny punt was downed on the five yard line. On Grove City's attempt to punt out of danger Lavelly blocked the punt and Bowman fell on the ball for the touchdown. Lavelly drop-kicked the extra point.

All through the game the 'Gators held a wide margin, advancing the ball into enemy territory repeatedly, only to be stopped within scoring distance. The first downs were 8 for Allegheny and 3 for Grove City. The glaring error of the Allegheny team was fumbling.

Grove City had only one real scoring chance. This came in the first period when Fassett fumbled on the Allegheny 28 yard line. The Grovers failed to gain any ground and kicked out-of-bounds on the two yard line. Instead of putting the 'Gators in a bad spot it proved to be the beginning of the longest sustained drive of the afternoon. Allegheny carried the ball to the Grover 15 yard line before Fassett fumbled again.

In the fourth period Allegheny's team once more made a threat. This time they blocked a punt on the Grover eight yard line and recovered on the five yard line. In two plays they carried the ball to the two yard line. Here Henniger fumbled, and thus another threat was ended. Later Byrne attempted a field goal, but the try went wide.

This game gave next year's material a chance to prove its worth, and several of the players gave notice that they are going to put up a fight for varsity positions next season.

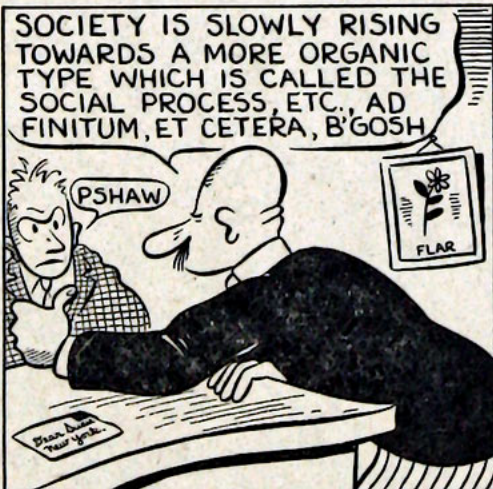
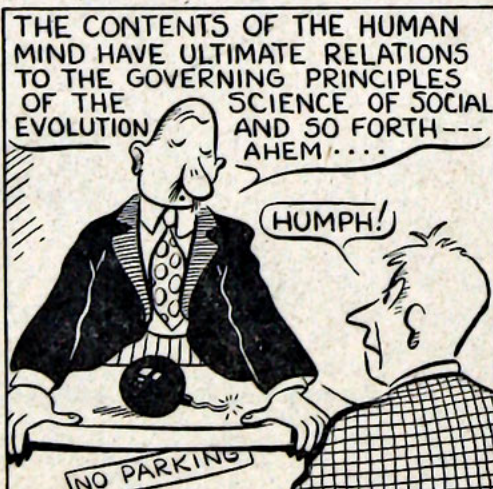
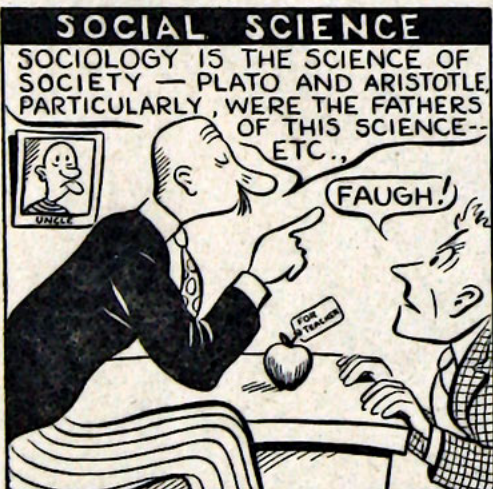

Joseph Harre, General Chairman for the event, will preside on Friday evening. William Hyde will act as House Manager aided by members of the Freshman debaters in the capacity of ushers. Final minor details will be arranged upon the arrival of the English debaters.

The Oxford Union Society members take their debating seriously, as was evidenced in February, 1933, when their resolution to "under no circumstances fight for King and country" focused world wide attention on them and earned them much abuse from an indignant English press and enraged anti-pacifists.

The 275 young pacifists (153 voted against the resolution) received white feathers, allegedly from a neighboring women's college; a band of opposing men broke up a meeting and ripped the offending page from the minute book; but undaunted, the Oxford Union agreed a week later, by a large vote to keep the resolution in the records.
