In the past 150 years Allegheny College has attained a reputation for high scholastic standing through the efforts of the administration, faculty, and the students themselves. As Allegheny marks its 150th Anniversary, it is only appropriate that the 1965 Kaldron be dedicated to two men who have given their life's work to Allegheny—Morton J. Luvaas and John E. Cavelti.

In 1930 Allegheny College had no music department and two glee clubs with a resident of Meadville for director. In 1931 Allegheny had a music department, a new choral group called the Allegheny Singers and a new director, Morton J. Luvaas. The three were never to be the same again: Allegheny was to become a singing school deeply embedded with the spirit of music; the choral group, the Singers, was to become famous and to produce generations of students who would be united by the bond of achievement and pride in creating beauty; and the new professor, the unique director, was to become "Luvy."

The Singers singing a comparatively new style of music for college choral groups, A Cappella, became an immediate success and their fame grew rapidly. By the end of the decade they had already performed for SRO crowds in Pittsburgh's Carnegie Hall and New York's Town Hall, and sung over coast-to-coast radio. And the music is still being heard by grateful and inspired audiences in 1965.

Such music would not be possible without the man. It is he that Singers speak of when they recall their days at Allegheny and the hours in the Oratory. They speak of the desire for perfection, the perseverance, the simplicity, the dignity, the high ideals and the delight in living that Luvy represents.

The Singers and all who know him and his music are deeply indebted to Luvy for the memories and experiences in beauty he made possible, for the critical appreciation of choral music and what it can do for the human spirit, and for the love of music itself and its power to ennoble and sustain that which he taught.

Allegheny is deeply indebted to Luvy for the enduring tradition of music which he inspired.

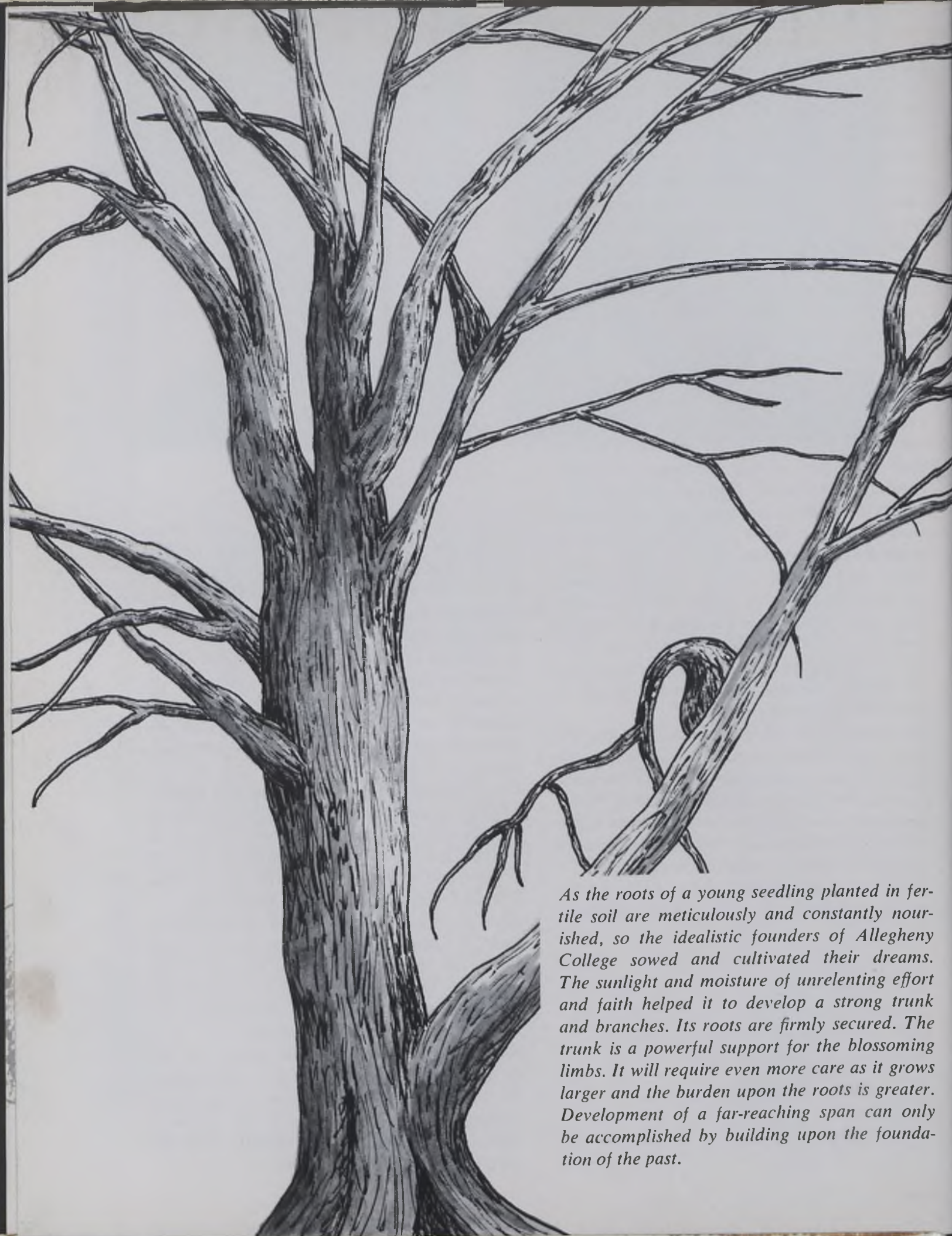
When Dr. John E. Cavelti was first interviewed for his position at Allegheny, he was asked what he thought Carnegie needed. This reply was, "Two sticks of dynamite." Maybe people laughed then, but today, up on the top of the hill stands Carr Hall of Science.

In 1936 he came to Allegheny as head of the Chemistry department. Taking a year off to do research work for a rubber company, he is known as a "trouble shooter" in research. He also went to Hawaii for a year as a visiting professor.

Dr. Cavelti belongs to the American Chemical Society and bought its Student Chapter to Allegheny, which is known on campus as Chemii. He is included in American Men of Science and as an evaluator for the National Science Foundation, he visits NSF lab sites.

Since Dr. Cavelti became head of the department of Chemistry, he has increased the number of the permanent faculty to five. Over fifty graduates have received Ph.D.'s in Chemistry and fourteen are teaching at the college level. Eleven Ph.D.'s are in progress now.

Those who know him are aware of the Cavelti touch—his humor—and his wisdom. He possesses that unique power of generating enthusiasm and dedication in his students. THIS THEY WILL REMEMBER, AND SO THEY WILL BE—better men.



As the roots of a young seedling planted in fertile soil are meticulously and constantly nourished, so the idealistic founders of Allegheny College sowed and cultivated their dreams. The sunlight and moisture of unrelenting effort and faith helped it to develop a strong trunk and branches. Its roots are firmly secured. The trunk is a powerful support for the blossoming limbs. It will require even more care as it grows larger and the burden upon the roots is greater. Development of a far-reaching span can only be accomplished by building upon the foundation of the past.

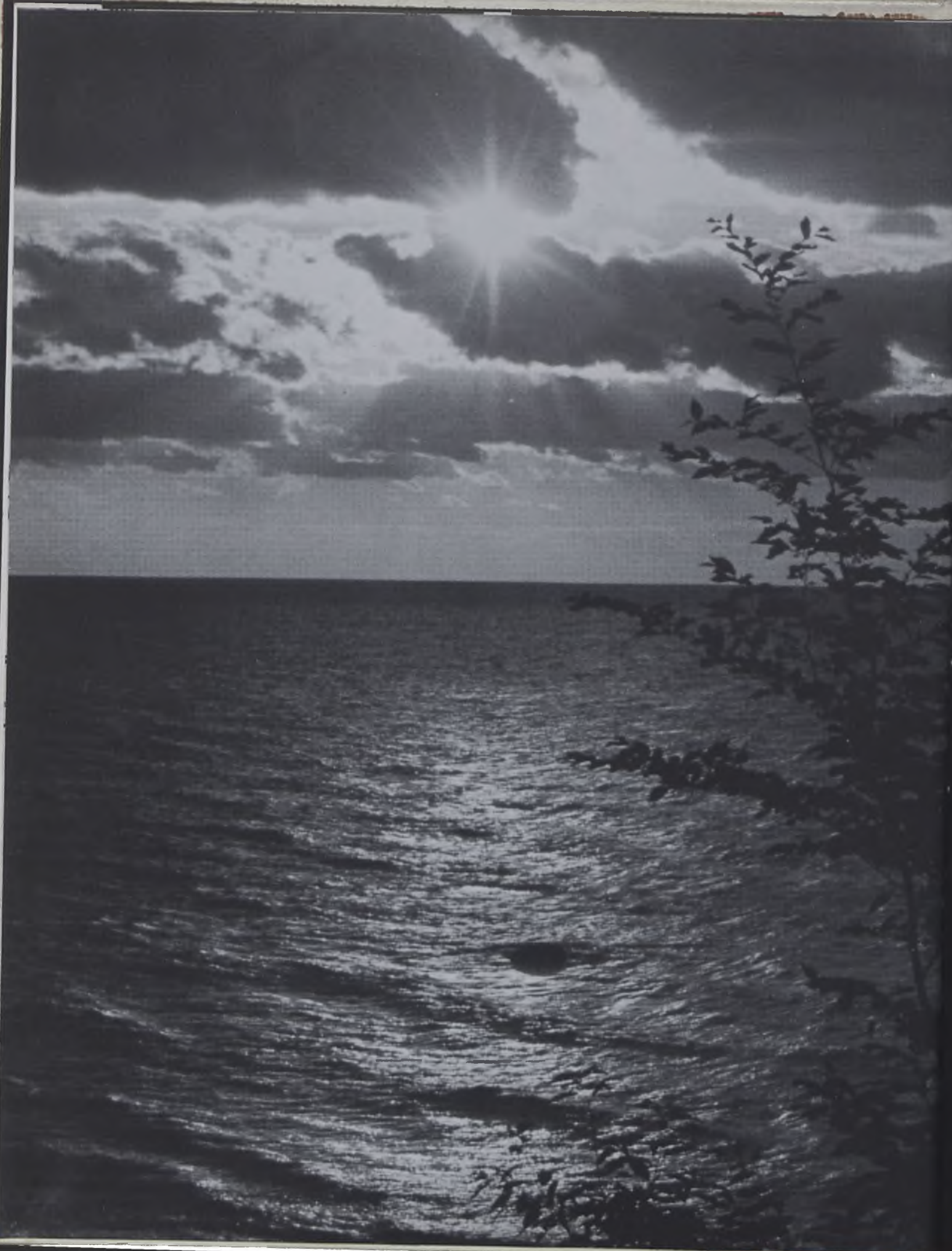


THE EXPERIENCE OF THE PAST IS

In 1815 when the inhabitants of the frontier community of Meadville dreamed of having a college in their community, the most difficult problem was how to establish an institution of higher learning. The suggestion of Major Roger Alden to invite his cousin, the Reverend Timothy Alden, to help them in this task was a happy one. On April 24, 1815, Timothy Alden arrived with his family in Meadville. On June 20, 1815, Allegheny College was founded, and Timothy Alden was chosen its first president. Alden proved to be a fortunate choice. He raised money to support the college among his New England friends; acquired the fine private libraries of Dr. William Bentley, Judge James Winthrop, and Isaiah Thomas to give the young college a magnificent collection for its early library; designed and struggled over the construction of Allegheny's first building, Bentley Hall. In 1833 Allegheny College became affiliated with the Methodist Church. It was recognized at this time that although this connection existed, no person would have any advantage or suffer any disadvantages on account

of his religious views.

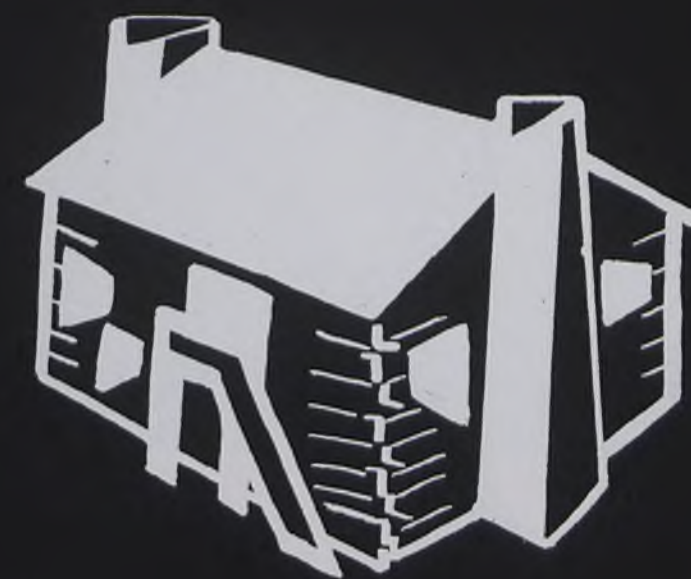
Two significant changes occurred during the 1870's. In 1870 Allegheny admitted women students for the first time. Among the earliest women was one of Allegheny's most distinguished alumnae, Ida M. Tarbell. In 1876, The Campus first was published, followed by the Kaldron in 1889, and the Literary Magazine in 1896. The year 1893 saw the completion of Montgomery Gymnasium, and Allegheny's participation in its first football game. In 1896, only 5 years after the game was invented, Allegheny participated in its first basketball contest. Between 1893 and the time Allegheny celebrated its hundredth anniversary, the college had experienced a period of unprecedented growth in plant, faculty and student body. In 1902, the scholastic excellence of Allegheny was recognized by the establishment of a chapter of Phi Beta Kappa. Beginning with Phi Kappa Psi in 1859, national social fraternities found a home on Allegheny's campus. Subsequently, six other national fraternities and five national sororities were established.



THE DAWN OF THE FUTURE

Since 1930 Allegheny has grown steadily; from a faculty of forty-five in 1930 to a faculty of more than one hundred; from a student body of five hundred to a student body of more than fourteen hundred drawn from all parts of our country and from several foreign countries. New buildings have appeared on every side of the campus. Subsidized athletics were abolished in 1931 and were replaced by a program on a completely amateur basis. Curriculum changes have brought forth a program which allows the student a wider personal choice in his courses and a stronger major through the Junior-Senior Program. In 1962 Allegheny shifted from a semester program to a three term system which, by permitting a student to take fewer courses a term, allows greater emphasis to be placed on those taken. In scholarship Allegheny is rated in the highest group of colleges, and its graduates enter without restrictions the best graduate and professional schools. The success and loyalty of the alumni of Allegheny is the best proof of the quality of students who attend and the faculty who instruct.

orientation

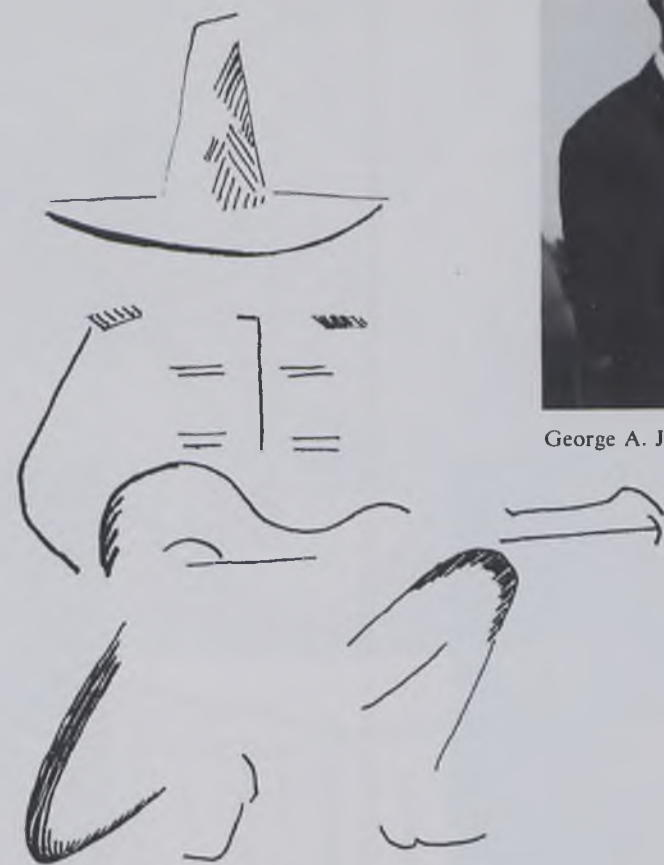

By such challenging it is hoped that the student will raise his levels of taste, of tolerance, and of criticism.





The spring term was made notable by the exciting concert given by the New Lost City Ramblers, the unique Antient Concert performing Elizabethan Music, and the exhibition of "Cathedrals and Churches of Medieval France." In the fall term a Chapel hour series on "The New Role of Women in Today's World" featured such speakers as Betty Freedan, Mme. G. Frolova, and Reverend Paul W. Rahmeier. The Pine Room of Brooks hosted several exhibits including "Five Centuries of Religious Prints" and the Moholy-Nagy Art Exhibit. Lectures included Dr. Harlow Shapley, O. Hobart Mower, Professor Ernest J. Simmons, and Jotham Johson. The winter term included two outstanding concert events, the Contemporary Chamber Ensemble performing Igor Stravinsky's "L'Histoire du Soldat" and the touring company of the off-Broadway success *In White America*. Two exhibits were displayed in the Pine Room; the one a "Church and Temple Art Exhibit" and the other "French Artist Exhibition Posters." Lectures during the winter term included Dr. Paul Ramsey, Alan Schneider, Paul Schweikher and Vincent Persichetti.

Allegheny clearly presents a program to challenge the active mind. It is a program that can significantly expand the students' cultural experience. The manner in which the student meets these challenges is a good measure of growth at Allegheny.

The outlook for next year is good, especially if the track ability of this year's freshman class makes itself known.

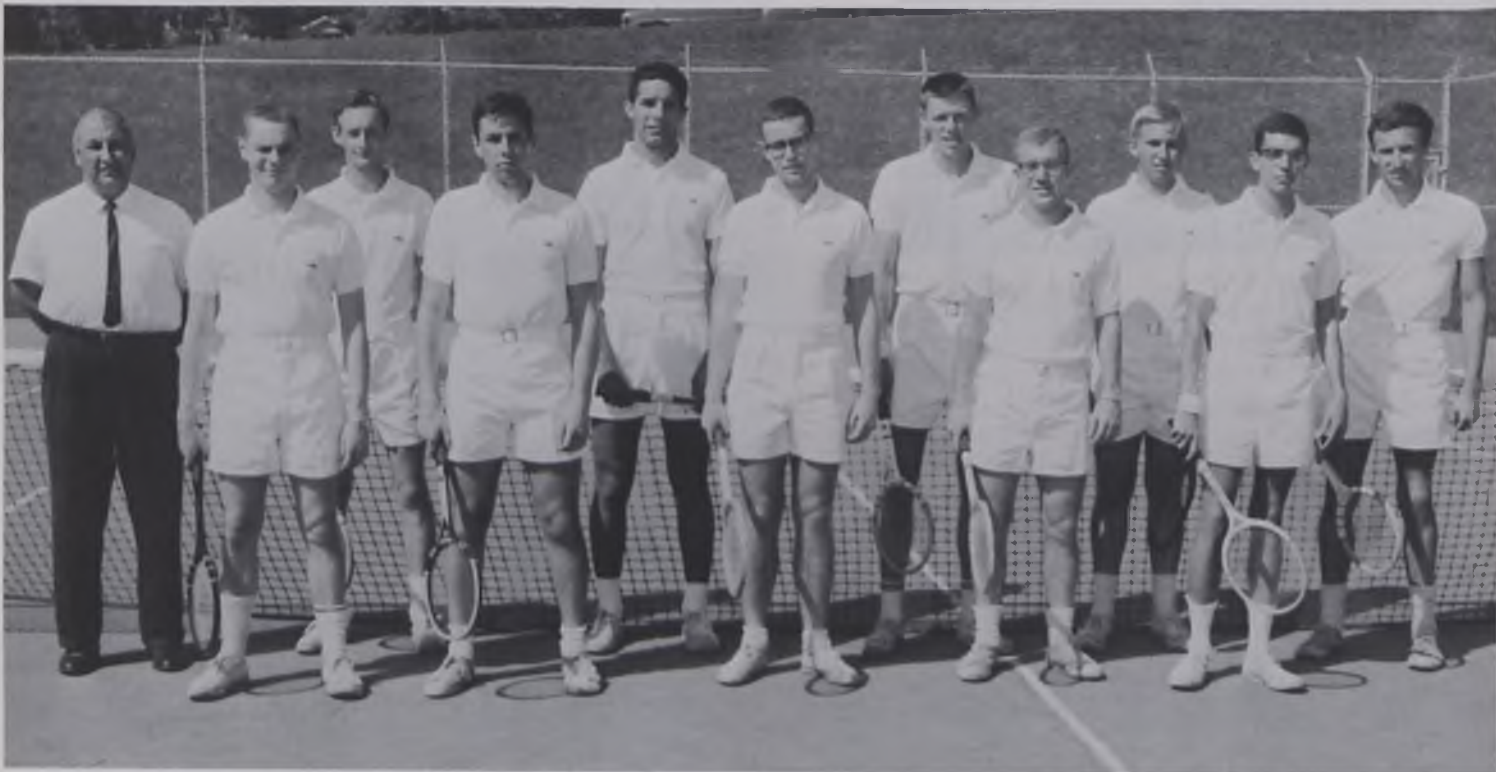

If we have not slept—if we have grasped what the college has offered us, we have the start. We have the roots—yes, and we have seen one man if we looked, who knew. John Kennedy knew the challenge. We might do well to heed his words . . . "In the long history of the world, only a few generations have been granted the role of defending freedom in its hour of maximum danger. I do not shrink from this responsibility; I welcome it. I do not believe that any of us would exchange places with any other people or any other generation. The energy, the faith, the devotion which we bring to this endeavor will light our country and all who serve it, and the glow from that fire can truly light the world."

Will we light that fire? We must try!
