Ernest A. Gross To Speak April 28 On "U.S. Leadership In Cold War"

Ambassador Ernest A. Gross, United States Representative to the Seventh Regular Session of the United Nations General Assembly will speak to a Ford Chapel audience at 8:15 p.m. Tuesday, April 28, on the topic, "United States Leadership in the Cold War." The address will be followed by a coffee hour in Brooks Hall. After his arrival on campus Tuesday morning, he will appear in G-8 classes on Tuesday and Wednesday morning and plans to leave on Wednesday afternoon. Tentative plans are being made for a public question and answer session Wednesday morning in the Playshop.

From October 1949 to February 1953, Ambassador Gross served as Deputy United States Representative to the United Nations. During this period he represented the United States in the Security Council, the Committee on Additional Measures, and in the Peace Observation Commission, serving under both Senator Warren Austin and Senator Henry Cabot Lodge, Jr.

Assistant Secretary of State

Ambassador Gross also served as United States Representative during the first part of the Seventh Session of the United Nations General Assembly, as well as during the third, fifth and sixth sessions. Before his appointment as Deputy United States Representative, he was Assistant Secretary of State for Congressional Relations, a post which he acquired after serving as legal adviser to the Department of State. As legal adviser, he served as the chief legal officer of the department, and as assistant Secretary of State, he administered the department's legislative program and maintained liaison with the Congress and the Bureau of the Budget in connection with the development and implementation of United States foreign policy.

Ambassador Gross has presented the American side in Red charges of Korean bacteriological warfare and on disarmament and control of

The Playshop production "Beggars in Paradise", with a cast of over 50 Allegheny students, will open Tuesday, April 28, and run through May 2.

The story, written by Gaston-Marie Martens, centers around two Flemish beggars, Boule (Steve Wolfson) and Rietje (Ed Bordo). While delivering presents to the children of the village, the beggars are accidentally killed and find themselves in the realm of Lucifer (Ted Werner).

Terrified by the imps and devils, the beggars finally escape to heaven, where they encounter St. Peter (Dick Overmyer), St. Nicholas (Leonard Nadel), and St. Nicodemus (Charles Parlette). Conscious of their sins, the beggars persuade St. Mary (Abbie DeLellis) to plead for them before the throne of God (John Johnson). At last God's spokesmen, St. Michael (Ernest Schwarz) and St. Gabriel (David Ward), send the two beggars back to earth for a second chance to earn the reward of heaven.

Lois McConahy and Barbara Bodner are cast as the wives of the two beggars, and their children are played by Kent DeGraffenried and Sandra Moore.

Detectives are Pat Campbell, Frannie Price, Joan Spinning and Ann D. Clark, and newspaper reporters are Audrey Dickison, Martha Nicholson, and Barbara Brown. Others implicated in the "crime" are Nancy Engstrom, Ann Clark, Peggie Gizzie, Betty Fish, Blanche Vanis and Marilyn Hansen. The additional members of Terrapin not participating in the "Slaughter" routine are Miss Mack, Sue Black, and Joan Laden.

Other numbers deal with such newspaper departments as weather forecasts, obituaries, theatre, travel, fashion, classified ads, wedding, sports and comics. Featured in the latter section is a "Humphrey and Joe Falooka" sequence, including Bob Duncan, Britt Poulson, and Al Case. Nancy Fullerton does a solo routine in the fashion section.

Programs, in the form of a three-page newspaper, were designed by Joyce Carter. A mural backdrop was painted by Beverly Garbark, Barbara Cooper, Marcia Lambrecht and Marian Cooley.

Pa. Theater Conference To Meet Here May 1, 2; Two Plays Scheduled

The annual spring meeting of the Pennsylvania Theater Conference will be held Friday and Saturday, May 1 and 2, on the Allegheny campus. Hosts for the conference are Allegheny College, the Erie Playhouse, and the French Creek Valley Players of Meadville. All member organizations of the Conference are entitled to send two official voting delegates.

Attendance at the Conference is unrestricted and all people in the state interested in theater are invited. Registration fee is \$3. This admits one person to all sessions and to the two performances scheduled for Friday and Saturday nights, "Beggars in Paradise" by Allegheny College Students, and either "Medea" or "Apple of Your Eye" by the Erie Playhouse.

Registration for the seniors will be held from 8:30 to 10 a.m. Saturday in Brooks lobby. Room assignments, name tags and a general program for the weekend will be given to the students. A coffee hour will be held in the Pine Room for parents, with Junior Advisers and student counselors acting as hosts and hostesses. Students having free periods at this time have been requested to stop at the registration desk to assist as guides and to supply information regarding the location of classrooms and buildings. Joan Laden is chairman of the personnel committee, and Eleanor Leslie and Joe DeVittorio are registration hostess and host.

Liberal Arts Discussion

All prospective students will meet in the Playshop at 10 a.m. to hear a discussion of the objectives of the G-courses and the purpose of a liberal arts education. Dr. John Cavelti of the chemistry department, Mr. Alfred Kern of the English department and Dr. Wayne Merrick of the political science department will be the speakers, with Pax Hart acting as moderator. Following the discussion, Col. George F. Brodie of the Air Force Reserve Officers Training Corps will meet with the men students to explain and answer questions on ROTC and its role in the Allegheny program.

At 11 o'clock the students will divide into interest groups relative to major fields. They will meet with faculty members for discussions of course set-ups, procedures and courses available.

Lunch will be served cafeteria style in Brooks Hall from 12:15 to 1 p.m. At 1:15 p.m. students will meet in the College Union at Cochran Hall for announcements and program notes. Following the meeting tours of the campus will be conducted by the Cwens.

Chapel Discussion

A panel discussion will be held at 2:30 p.m. in Ford Chapel. Allegheny students will discuss and answer questions on what the college freshman can expect and find in college. Bill Oehmler is chairman of the discussion group which includes Emily Engle, Bill Foley, Sue Gallatin, and Bill McCartney.

At 4 p.m. a preview showing of the drama department's spring production, "Beggars in Paradise," will be given in the Playshop.

Supper will be served in Brooks Hall at 6 p.m., with Frank Desko in charge of arrangements. In the evening the Allegheny Singers will present the final concert of their 1953 Spring Tour in Ford Chapel at 8:15 o'clock. This concert is open to all Alleghenians as well as to prospective students and it is

The real issues at stake are the questions of "progressive parties" at the fraternity houses, the dismissal of Saturday morning classes, and a float-building contest Saturday morning.

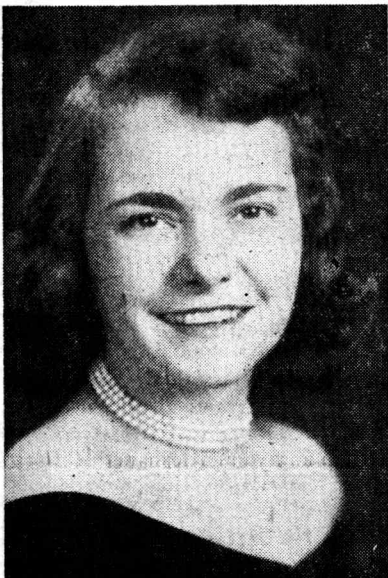
The Campus believes that progressive parties and the holding of a float-making contest are activities which would contribute to college unity. We hope that some means can be found to include these activities in the May Day program of events.

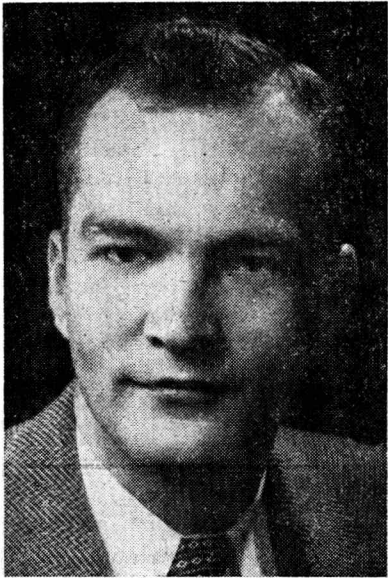
We hope that this year's May Day weekend will be an "all-college" weekend in spirit if not in name.

Letter to the Editor

To the Editor:

The Campus has done it again. For the second time in a row, they have gone off half-cocked in an editorial. We realize, of course, that editorials are the place for members of the editorial staff of the paper to bring important matters to the attention of the student body. However, their prerogative should not allow them to use the editorial column to air their own personal complaints. Furthermore, we would expect that the matters in questions be discussed in an intelligent manner. We are referring now to the very outrageous editorial about the recent election and the endorsement of one candidate for the presidency of the AUC by the out-going executive officer.

If we may, we would like to point out some considerations in connection with this biased vent of personal gripes. The first remark made in the article is an affirmation of confidence in the ability of the outgoing President to judge the demands of the office against the ability and experience of the two candidates. However, because it suits their fancy, the authors of the editorial would have this person keep his wisdom and judgment to himself.

Of course they say that this is not done just to stamp out the truth, but as they say, because of the "possibility of friction." We wonder if this statement and their definition as to what this friction is, hits you as it hits us. To us the remark shows very little confidence in the man making the endorsement. To us it is a slap in Steve Graffam's face that is both unfounded and inexcusable.

But let us not belabor this one point too much because there are other statements in the article that we would like to discuss. The next

one in question is the remark that the student body needs no formal instruction as to whom to vote for. Now this is a very neatly slanted remark. This is saying that the endorsement is wrong because it tells the students how to vote. However, this was not the point of the endorsement. The endorsement served to allow the man to state his views and to inform the freshmen women of some of the facts of the case. This is information that these students, on any number of occasions, said they wanted. These women themselves admitted early in the campaign that they had little knowledge of the qualifications of some of the candidates. We realize, of course, that by the time the actual endorsement took place, many of the women involved were informed. To them we apologize. But for those of them who had not seen clearly before the qualifications of some of the candidates, we hope we helped them to see more clearly.

Now to their final point. The endorsement, on Steve's part, so they say, showed little confidence from him in the candidates placed before the student body by the nominating committee. This is the most clearly unfounded and most easily refuted statement of all. The answer is simply that Steve did not endorse any candidate in opposition to a person nominated by the nominating committee. No endorsement was made until two out of the three persons nominated by the committee were eliminated. Then he endorsed the third student named by the committee. This endorsement, rather than showing a lack of confidence in the nominating committee, reaffirmed his trust in the students they nominated.

This brings us to the point where

atomic weapons. He is considered one of the most effective debaters against such people as Vishinsky that the United States has found. His resignation from his present post was submitted twice this year and twice President Eisenhower prevailed upon him to continue. His resignation was finally accepted in February, but he has remained as a U. S. representative in view of the recently launched Communist peace drive.

A native of New York City, he studied at Harvard College, Oxford University, and the Geneva School of International Studies. He is a member of the Middle Temple of the Inns of Court in London.

He entered government service in 1931 as an assistant legal adviser in the Department of State. Three years later he became general counsel to the Printing and Publishing Industries and in 1936 became associate general counsel of the National Association of Manufacturers.

Re-entering federal service in 1938 as associate general counsel of the National Labor Relations Board, he served in this capacity until 1943 when he was commissioned as Lieutenant Colonel in the Army and placed in charge of the Economics Section of the War Department Civil Affairs Division. In 1944 he served as adviser to the United States Delegation of the International Labor Organization and returned to civilian life in 1946. He then became Deputy Assistant Secretary of State for occupied areas.

In 1947 he was named legal adviser to the State Department, and in 1949 was designated as coordinator of Foreign Assistance Programs, with responsibility for the development of the first Military Assistance Program.

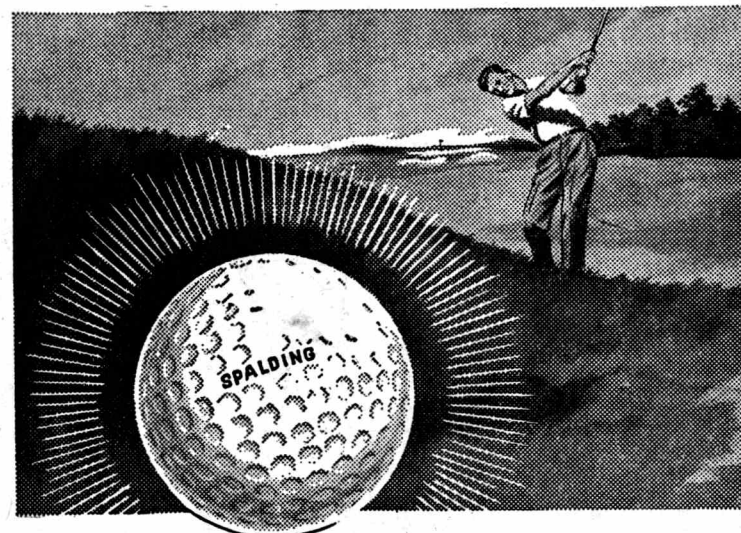

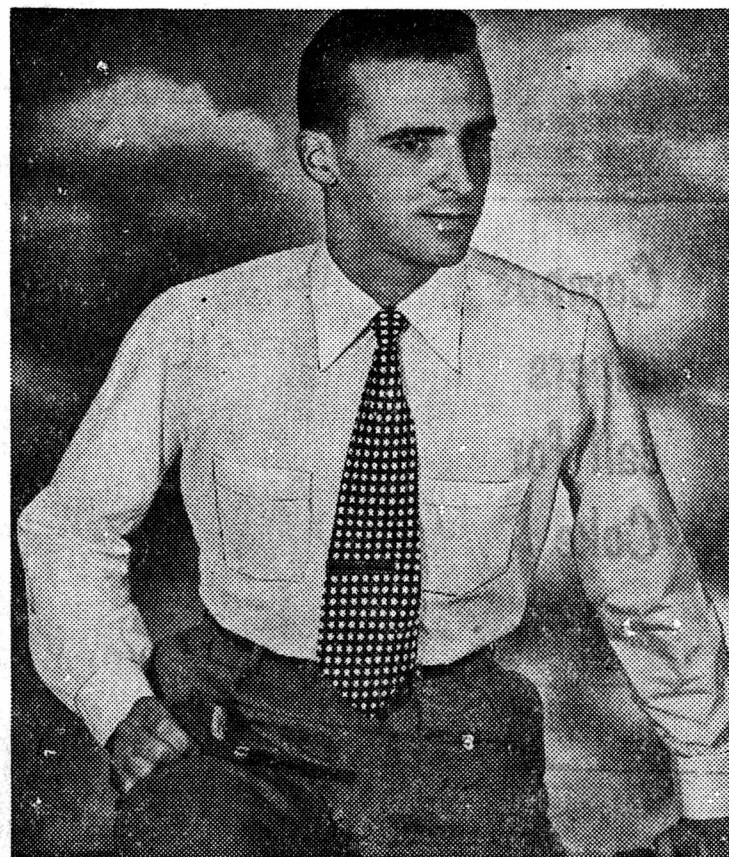

(Editor's Note: We should like, in our turn, to inquire of the writers of the above letter what is meant by "personal complaints" and "biased vent of personal gripes." As is pointed out the editorial column is the medium for expressing the opinions of the editorial staff—which is precisely what was done last week. May we ask whose opinions we are capable of presenting if not our own?

Whether or not the candidate endorsed by the out-going president was nominated by a committee or by student petition is not the basic issue. The basic issue is whether or not it is justifiable for a president to use his office to endorse one candidate. The president of the Allegheny Undergraduate Council can not address freshman women simply as a student, for the freshman women have known him only as the AUC president and cannot dissociate the office from the person. It is with the voice of this office that he addresses the freshmen, whatever his own intentions.

It is as unethical, we feel, to use such an office for the endorsement of one candidate as it would be for "The Campus" to devote its columns to one candidate.

It seems to us that the problem of educating the freshman women to the necessary qualifications could have been handled in a quieter manner than it was. We wonder how much and what kind of "education" is ordinarily achieved by a speech delivered amid fireworks and between selections by a brass band.

It is unfortunate that the treatment of an important issue has been lowered by the use of tactics of name-calling and indulging in personalities. We hope that in the future the question can be considered as one of ethics rather than of personalities.)
