Base Ball.

The First Game to be Played on Saturday.—The Team Will be Chosen Soon—List of Candidates.

Before the next edition of The Campus the first base ball game will have been played and the season of 1901 will no longer be a matter of speculation and surmise, but a reality. The opening game is to be played on Saturday, May 4, and the opponents of our team will be the Erie High School.

This is the team that gave Allegheny such a close game last year, the local boys winning only after a hard fought contest, which was not decided until the last inning.

As yet the men that are to represent Allegheny on the diamond this year are entirely unknown material and this game will be the first opportunity the lover of ball will have to get an idea of the strength of the nine. Only two of last year's team are in college this year—Herbert Taylor, for two years pitcher, and Captain Endean, right fielder. However, there is plenty of new material from which to select. Almost 20 men have reported for practice every day when it was possible to do out-door work and from this squad Captain Endean expects to select nine men who will represent Allegheny creditably on the field.

The candidates who are making the best showing are as follows: Mook and Crawford, catchers; Taylor, Bunce, Rickard, Griffith, pitchers; Berkhouse and Lewis, first base; Mellon, Van Orsdale, second base; Drum, Pentz, McConnell, short stop; Hamilton, Pentz, third base; Endean, right field; Turner, Van Slyke, left field; Allen, Leffingwell, middle field.

From this large squad there should be but little difficulty experienced in selecting nine men who shall represent Allegheny on the diamond.

Since the mass meeting last Tuesday, when it was clearly shown that the students and faculty are anxious for a team, there has been a renewed activity among the players and every one is showing an interest that is commendable. Manager Travis, who has worked hard and accomplished much

under most discouraging circumstances, should be encouraged by the patronage of the student body at the games. His schedule, which includes the best teams in this vicinity, is as follows:

College Journals and Their Management.

The Literary Digest recently sent inquiries to a number of representative college journals, East and West, asking for information as to some of the practical details of their editorial management. Replies have thus far been received from nineteen papers, including the Amherst Student, the University of Chicago Weekly, the Columbia Spectator and Morningside, the Cornell Daily Sun and Widow, the Harvard Lampoon, the Princeton Tiger, the Williams Lit., the Vassar Miscellany and the Yale Daily News. Judging from the replies received college faculties nowadays have almost nothing to do with the conduct of college journalism, and the process of filling staff positions through election by the editorial board seems well nigh universal. Of these nineteen college papers, only two, the University of Pennsylvania Red and Blue, and the Wesleyan Literary Magazine, consult the faculty in filling their editorial boards. In almost all cases the editors are chosen chiefly from the upper classes, after various competitive tests; and this system seems to give general satisfaction. So far as reported, the method of competition adopted by the University of Chicago Weekly is the most stringent, and in effect, though not altogether in detail, approaches the nearest to the methods of daily journalism. Appointments are made on the basis of merit as shown in a six months' competition among the reporters, to which position any student is eligible. Twice each year, in June and September, a valuation is made of the amount and quality of work done by each reporter and each editor. The seven whose work is most satisfactory become the editorial board for the ensuing six months, and the others are given places on the waiting list. The decision rests with a merit board made up of the managing and assistant managing editors, and a member of the English faculty of the university. Since the inauguration of this method, a little over a year ago, great improvement is said to have taken place in the paper.—Literary Digest.

RECENT EXCAVATIONS

In the Roman Forum—A Lecture by Dr. S. B. Platner, of Western Reserve University.

Last night a very interesting lecture was given under the auspices of the Classical club of Allegheny college. Dr. S. B. Platner, of Western Reserve university, was the speaker, and the subject, "The Recent Excavations in the Roman Forum."

The classical students were very fortunate in securing a man who has the practical knowledge of the subject. He has been for the past two years the professor of the Latin language and literature in the American school in Rome. Since his return he has given lectures on the work done there, at the University of Michigan, Harvard, Columbia, Wellesley and several other colleges.

The excavations in Rome were begun about two years ago for the purpose of clearing up a few important theories in the classics. The work was headed by Signor Boni, a young Italian architect. It was so successful and so much of interest was revealed that the excavations were continued.

The Roman Forum was the center of interest. Though it had been thought that the former excavations were complete and correct, the recent work has revealed many mistakes. Stratum after stratum has been found below what had once been believed to be the real foundation of the Forum. Each brought to light something of interest and value.

Among the most important results are the excavations on the Black Stone which was believed to be the tomb of the Romulus, the founder of Rome; the Temple of Vesta, where the sacred fires were kept burning; the Basilica Aemilia and the tomb of Julius Caesar. Some parts of these ancient buildings are preserved in quite good condition but others are mere fragments. One of the principal methods is to put together the architectural fragments that lay around the Forum. Many valuable inscriptions have also been discovered that go a great way in proving the writings of the classical ages. As Dr. Platner proceeded, picture of the different buildings and excavations were thrown on the screen.

After the lecture, the Classical club and friends entertained the speaker of the evening with a reception in Association hall.

Presidents Meet in Conference at Gettysburg.

The presidents' conference of the Young Men's Christian Associations of the colleges of Pennsylvania was held at Gettysburg April 29-30. About 30 colleges, normal and preparatory schools were represented. The opening session was conducted by Mr. Soper, state secretary for the college organizations. Other speakers during the conference were Mr. Bard, state secretary; Mr. Jenkins, college secretary of New York; Mr. Evans, general secretary of the University of Pennsylvania; Mr. Gleason, secretary of central association of Philadelphia; Miss Selby, state secretary of the Y. M. C. A.; Mr. Miller, who is to succeed Mr. Soper next fall, and Mr. Hick, of the international committee of the Y. M. C. A.

Warning to College Players.

The alumni at large will be sorry to learn that this year's promising base ball team, just back from its unusually successful Easter trip, has begun the season with the same objectionable tactics which have, unfortunately, become a conspicuous characteristic of recent Princeton nine causing increasing comment as each season goes by. If a college tolerates what seems like unsportsmanlike play, the inference is that the college is no sportsmanlike; unpleasant but logical. It is rather astonishing, to be sure, when one stops to consider it, six or eight gentlemen players all shouting in the somewhat remarkable jargon of the professional base ball diamond. The object of intercollegiate athletics is not to furnish quiet amusement to graduates or their friends, but to benefit the college. This is not bridge-whist. So, that alone is not a valid reason for giving up this successful style of play.

"It is an evil tendency," says another, or rather, many others. It is hard enough to keep athletics pure in this country anyhow, but when you allow this sort of thing, see the inevitable consequence—and then it went on to cite several examples among others than of the players, with "Princeton" bloomed on his uniform who repeatedly shouted such things as "hit it!" after the ball left the pitcher's hand, just as the opposing batter's nerves were keyed up to strike. It is not necessary to quote the adjective applied to this sort of muckering. We all agree. So do undergraduates, who are sure, and most of the players. But that is only a tendency. There are bad tendencies in everything. One of the objects of athletics is to teach us to curb impulses. The player referred to has shown that he can curb his.

It is not good sportsmanship. The fact that other colleges are just as bad proves nothing about sportsmanship, except that other colleges are just as bad.

The adoption of a noiseless game at this particular time when so many other colleges are playing noisy baseball and so many people are talking about it, would do more good to Princeton than winning the championship. That is the sentiment of all the grown up alumni whose horizon is wider than that of the misguided undergraduate.—From The Princeton Alumni Weekly.

BASE BALL TEAM FOR 1901.

One Hundred and Fifty Dollars Raised for Base Ball.

The third mass meeting of the year for the purpose of raising money was held on Tuesday last and for the third time the students responded generously. This time it was in the interest of base ball and the money was easily gathered. The manner in which the students and faculty answered to the call for help should go a long way to prove how they look on this branch of sport.

Some time ago the Athletic Board decided that unless \$150 was raised before the beginning of the season there would be no team this year. With little apparent interest shown by the faculty and students, and scarcely any by the Athletic Board, it seemed almost impossible to raise the amount. But Manager Travis is not a man that can be discouraged by a little amount like \$150. He at once began a personal canvass of the students and to further his cause he secured permission to use the chapel that he might exhort them in a body. Dr. Montgomery dismissed the faculty from the chapel on Tuesday with the promise that each member would give \$5 or underwards, and then Travis was given charge of the gathering. The only speakers were Taylor and Bird, both of whom spoke of the great need of a team to complete Allegheny's very successful year in athletics. Bird's closing statement, "There are lots of men in college that can hold down the bases if they have enough support," evidently made the students realize what was depending upon them and they gave accordingly. When the papers were collected that had been distributed it was found that almost enough had been gathered and the team for 1902 was assured. Manager Travis made a special request for \$5 donations, several having promised that amount if ten could be secured to give a like sum. Those to give \$5 were: Sleese, Fred Smith, Travis, Kelley, Drum, Cook, Dr. Crawford, Dr. Montgomery, Dr. Thomas and Singley. There was also \$5 received from an unknown source.

The fact that the money was raised and with such apparent ease shows the efficiency of our manager, and with such a man at the head of a team success is assured.

ATHLETICS.

The following resolutions were passed by the Athletic Board:

Be it resolved, That no man shall employ the doctor approved by the Athletic Board for injuries sustained in practice or in a regular game except by the written consent of the manager.

That, when in the opinion of the authorized physician the injury is of such a nature that a specialist must be employed, the Athletic Board will pay such a bill.

That no member of any team shall buy drugs, medicines, liniments, bandages and charge the same to the Athletic Board except by the order of the college doctor or the written order of the manager.

CLASSICAL CLUB.

A very interesting meeting of the Classical Club was held in the library last Tuesday evening. The meeting was devoted to a study of Greek and Roman games, and after news items had been given by Mr. Chase, the following program was rendered: "The Greek Athletic Festivals," Mr. Lefangwell; "The Athletic Events, The Races," Mr. Potter; "The Pentathlon and Boxing," Mr. Taylor; "Roman Chariot Races," Mr. Elliott, and "The Gladiators," Mr. Croxall.

COSTLY FUN.

Westminster Students Have to Whack-up Many Shekels.

The students who participated in the class fight at Westminster college a few weeks ago have been presented with a big bill for damages, and some of the most active in the affair have been threatened with expulsion. The faculty met and Rev. J. H. Veazy, registrar of the college, presented a number of bills against the boys. One was against the Sophs for larceny of a \$35 ladder from the village hose company. The ladder was stolen from the town hall for the purpose of getting up on the college building

where the Freshman flag had been placed. During the fight the ladder was broken. The damage done by a hole cut in the ceiling of the art gallery and the slate broken on the roof is estimated at \$150. The college had to keep six deputy constables on duty all night to protect the college property and the students will also be expected to stand this expense. What the outcome of the trouble will be is not definitely known. The students say the bill is exorbitant, and they will not pay it under any circumstances. Not since the flag rush of 1892 has so much property been damaged and the college authorities are determined to break up the practice of holding rushes.

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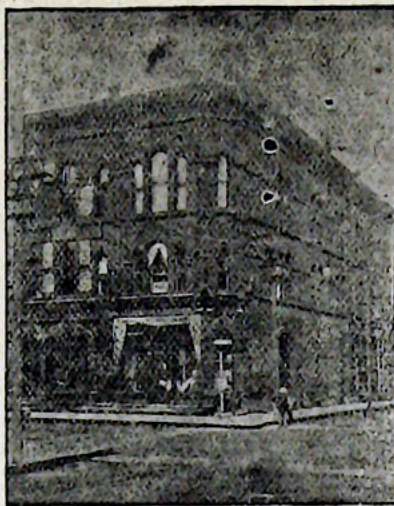
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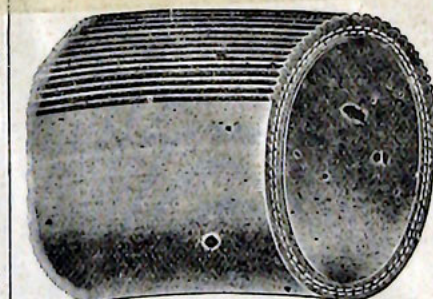
