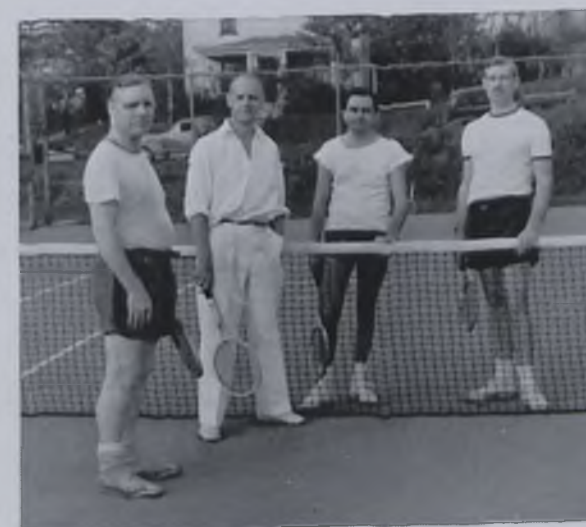

Once established, Alpha Chi Omega took great interest in altruistic work, and had soon set up five scholarship funds and enjoyed the annual observance of Hera Day. The latter is celebrated by the chapter at Allegheny on March 1, by inviting children from the Bethesda Home to a movie and the nearest confectionary store. In parting at evening, each member presents her charge with a gift which the little one has chosen earlier in the day. Social activities of the year begin with the pledge dance followed by the fall formal, and in April or May, by the spring formal and Mother's Week-End. These affairs are supplemented by dinners and breakfasts in the rooms and socials with the other sororities. Having reached a happy medium altruistic and social purpose, Delta Chapter of Alpha Chi Omega has completed its aim and is content to find itself a vital part of the many activities on the Allegheny Campus.

SINCE its founding at Allegheny in May, 1914, Phi Iota Chapter of Alpha Chi Rho has achieved a position of increasing significance in the social, athletic, and intellectual life of the College. In common with other fraternities on the hill Alpha Chi Rho offers assistance to the new student in becoming acclimated; responsible group life; opportunity to form close friendships; and a chance to learn through association with companions from different environments, how to adjust one's self to life after college. But Alpha Chi Rho has gained its particular significance at Allegheny largely through its adherence to certain well-established principles: membership from among Christians only; insistence on a high and clean moral standard; paramount duty of brotherly love between members; and insistence on manliness as the essential requirement of members. Phi Iota's numerically restricted membership makes for greater group unity than is possible to groups of larger size. The chapter house has about it none of the impersonal atmosphere of the dormitory, for it is not a dormitory, but a home. During the past year the men of Alpha Chi captured the intramural volleyball and handball championships and played a prominent part in the rest of the intramural sports program. Alpha Chi Rho was also represented in varsity sports, in Singers and on THE CAMPUS and LITERARY MAGAZINE.

Students mobilized at battle stations by radios. Day and night for the next 72 hours there were tight little groups intent on the ridiculous effort of trying to tune in on history.

Some were tragic and some were enthusiastic; some were scared and some were brave. Everyone was shaken pretty much down to the marrow. Most serious pursuits were suspended in mid-air for a time.

Finally President Tolley did some reassuring in chapel. "Stay at your posts and work harder than you've ever worked before," he said. Not everyone stayed at posts and surely not everyone worked harder than before, but things quieted down a bit. And the tumult was over. Some things became the same as before, and some things became different.

*Double, double, toil and trouble,
Fire burn, and kaldron bubble.*

The Singers' annual Christmas concert this year was even more beautiful than usual. In addition to the traditional Christmas carols, the selections contained a number of brief Christmas hymns composed by Mr. Luvaas. And even the unfamiliarity of the music did not detract from its beauty.

After an inauspicious start, the Gator basketball team picked up enough to subdue urban Fenn. Luck deserted the squad entirely after this.

After almost four months of searching for copy, the *Literary Magazine* finally appeared. Rapidly developing that harassed look which is peculiar to all editors of the "Lit," Johnny Donahy had put out a magazine which, in spite of its many difficulties, was a fitting example of Allegheny literary ability. A new cover designed by Jimmy Valone was a decided improvement.

Once again the inimitable Chamberlain walked off with the honors as she won the Wakefield Oration. She spoke feelingly on the subject "Can We Take It?" and made a telling condemnation of the selfishness of Americans in general and Allegheny in particular when confronted with a situation which demanded universal sacrifice.

The Allegheny Christian Council this year came forward with a definite and well-presented set of activities for the religious betterment of the students. Under the leadership of President Stuart Schaffner, the organization sponsored a Religious Emphasis Week the first week in December. Dr. Henry Hitt Crane, prominent minister of Detroit, visited the campus for discussions with students.



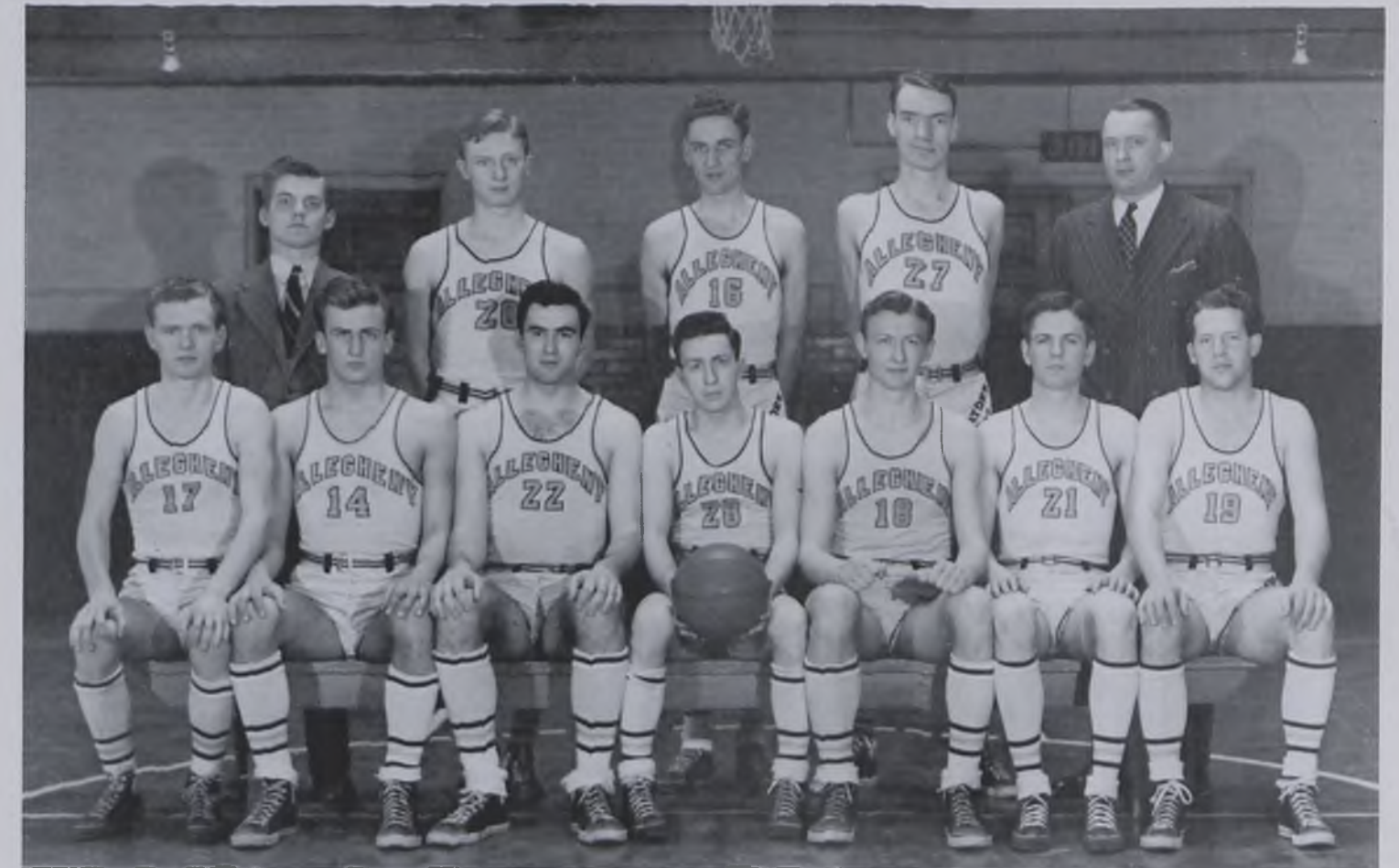

In passing we should like to say congratula-

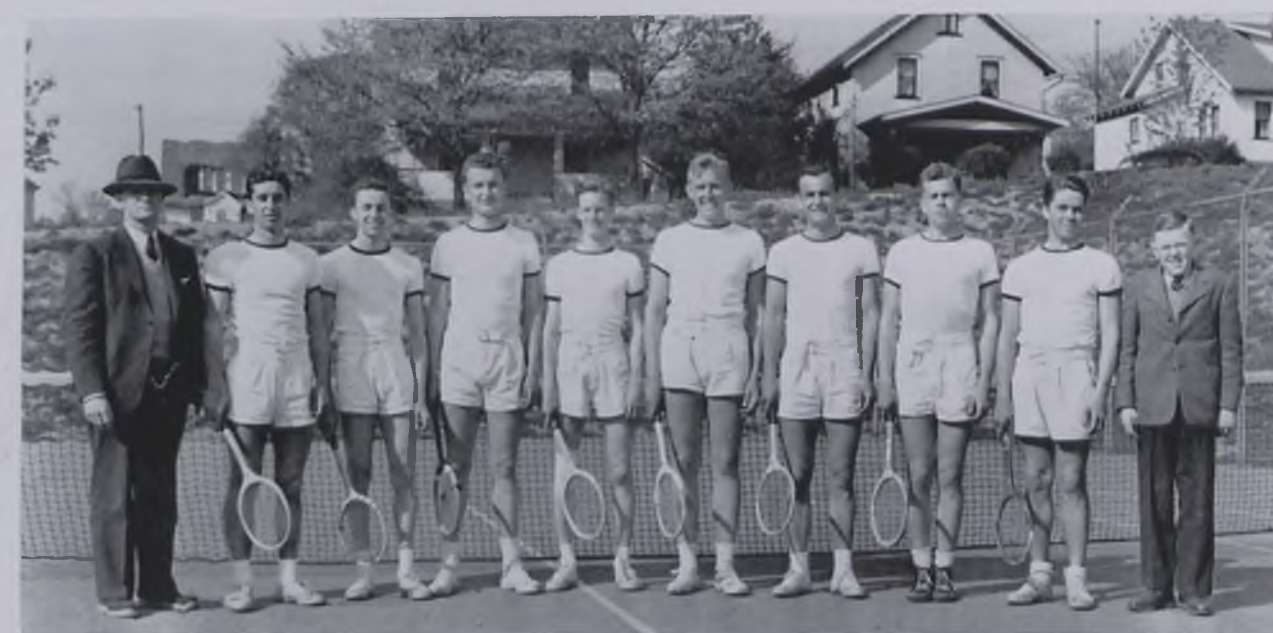

PENNSYLVANIA BETA Chapter of Phi Kappa Psi Fraternity was established at Allegheny College in 1855 by Thomas Ruskin Kennedy, a transfer student from Jefferson College, where the national organization had been founded three years earlier. Since that time the local chapter has enjoyed the longest uninterrupted existence of any chapter in Phi Kappa Psi. Due to administrative opposition to secret organizations, it was necessary for members to keep knowledge of their fraternal affiliations from public attention until a year later, when the fraternity badge was first openly displayed. In spite of faculty hostility this pioneer fraternal group at Allegheny managed to prove its worth, and eventually attracted many of the leading students to its membership. In 1902, after years of wandering from dwelling to dwelling, the site for the present chapter house was purchased, and five years later construction was begun. This was the first house to be built at the College for fraternity purposes. Pennsylvania Beta has known periods of feast and of famine, has weathered three previous wars when its membership dwindled to a mere handful, and has a full conception of the gravity of the present national crisis and its inevitable effect upon the youth of college age. But Pennsylvania Beta of Phi Kappa Psi is confident that come what may, the chapter will endure.
