FRATERNITY INSTALLED

Allegheny Chapter of Delta Sigma Rho Installed Last Week.

On last Tuesday afternoon the Allegheny College chapter of Delta Sigma Rho, the national intercollegiate debating and oratorical society, was formally installed with eight charter members: H. J. Weiler, '13, J. R. MacGowan, '14, O. C. McLean, '13, Clyde V. Sparling, '13, E. J. Hall, '13, W. J. Armstrong, '16, D. J. Blasdel, '13, and C. L. Nevins, '13. The granting of a Delta Sigma Rho charter to the local forensic fraternity of Alpha Kappa Lambda is one of the signal honors that have come to Allegheny College this past year. Application for admission to the national society was first made in 1911, largely through the efforts of Mr. S. S. Swartley and H. R. Hunt, '12. This first petition was not granted, but a second one drawn up and sent out in the fall of 1912 by Mr. Swartley and J. R. MacGowan, '14, was favorably considered, and the charter was granted at the biennial meeting of the General Council, held in Columbus, Ohio, April 24-26, 1913.

Delta Sigma Rho is the only national society of this character in the United States. It comprises now between forty and fifty chapters in the universities and larger colleges of the country. No institution will be granted a charter "unless it has for at least five consecutive years preceding participated in at least one intercollegiate contest, in which it shall have displayed a high grade of efficiency in public speaking, and whose forensic contests are under faculty supervision;" the institution's standard of scholarship must also be "of sufficiently high grade to have its degrees fully accredited at any of the standard post-graduate schools." No one can be admitted to membership in the society unless he has been "an authorized and fully participating representative of his university or college in an intercollegiate contest in debate or oratory."

Mr. G. V. Geesey, of the Ohio Wesleyan chapter, was authorized by the General Council to install the chapter at Allegheny. The ceremony was held at the Phi Delta Theta house at four o'clock and immediately afterward the members adjourned to Cochran Hall, where an informal banquet was held in honor of Mr. Geesey. Besides Mr. Swartley there were invited from the faculty Dr. Crawford, the three judges in the debating try-outs, Professors Akers, Benjamin and Lockwood; Prof. Ross, who was one of the judges in the Wakefield contest; and Dr. Elliott, who was delegated by the Alpha Kappa Lambda society to represent them at Columbus. At the close of the dinner speeches were called for from the Faculty members present, from Mr. Geesey, and from J. R. MacGowan, '14, the president of Alpha Kappa Lambda.

Mr. Geesey left Wednesday morning for Washington and Lee University, where he installed another chapter of Delta Sigma Rho last Thursday.

Mates Wins Cup

Defeated Cox in Close Match on Wednesday.

The final match for the trophy cup, awarded by Spalding's to the winner of the annual college tennis tournament, was played off on last Wednesday afternoon on the Delta Tau Delta court. The cup goes to J. W. Mates, '13, who defeated Cox, '16, the other final contestant. The players were evenly matched and the result was doubtful until near the close of the last set. The scores were: Mates, 2-6; 8-6; 6-3.

Tennis Team Wins

Easily Defeats Westminster—Visitors Take but One Set in Meet.

The Allegheny tennis team, composed of Mates, '13, Cox, '16, H. Brownell, '15, and W. Brownell, '16, defeated the Westminster team on last Tuesday afternoon, the local team taking every match and losing but a single set in the meet. W. and J. was scheduled for the meet but cancelled at a late hour on last Monday night so that Westminster was secured.

The visiting team put up a good exhibition of tennis but were unable to defeat any of the Allegheny representatives. The meet began with four matches of singles followed by two separate matches of doubles. The singles were won rather easily, Cox defeating Cummings, Westminster's star, with little difficulty. In the doubles, Cummings and Moore started off the set with a rush and took the first four games of the set. Mates and Cox came back in time, however, to take the set 9-7 and the next set went 6-2. ANNUAL MOVING-UP DAY

EXERCISES LAST WEEK

Usual Chapel Ceremony Followed by Parade Through Town.

The annual Moving-Up Day exercises were held in Ford Memorial Chapel on last Wednesday morning at 9 o'clock, commencing with the regular Chapel service, which was led by Dr. R. S. Breed, this being his last regular Chapel service as a professor in Allegheny College. After the ritual, the track men were called forward by LeRoy Ramsey, '14, president of the Athletic Association, while President Crawford in a few appropriate remarks presented the letters to eight men who had been successful on the cinder path this year. Those men who received the emblem of the college were Captain P. E. Thomas, '14, E. Doran, '15, H. H. Fahr, '15, C. M. Dotterrer, '14, M. H. Metcalf, '15, L. Wells, '15, J. D. VanHorn, '13, and Manager B. H. Ball, '13.

Following this ceremony, Dr. Crawford gave a short speech charging the outgoing Senior class with the responsibilities of alumni, especially emphasizing the fact that co-operation is necessary in relation to the members of the class itself, to other classes, and to the activities of the college. Dr. Crawford also urged that the scholarship standard of Allegheny should be so raised that its graduates would be given even more honors than they have in the past, from the larger universities of our country. In his concluding remarks he made special mention of the fact that the spirit of co-operation is necessary as a step towards a stronger and more fruitful Allegheny.

After this address, the program of the day was given over to the student body and was carried out in its usual unique style. Miss Helen Thomas, of the Junior class, was the first speaker and petitioned the Seniors for their seats, her speech being replete with many of the happy incidents which occurred between the Juniors and Seniors this year. C. A. Eckles, having expounded at some length the accomplishments of the outgoing class, and charging the Juniors to strive faithfully, though necessarily in vain, to fill adequately the vacant places, finally condescended to give the Senior seats to the class of 1914.

Miss Janet Ellis, in turn, petitioned for the Junior seats, setting forth the wonderful exploits of the far-famed Centennial class, while at the same time she completely humbled the Freshman class. She recounted with great vividness the numerous victories of the Sophomores over their rivals and deplored that the necessity arose for such a class to petition 1914. John T. Taylor, in probably the most witty speech of the morning deplored the utter unfitness of the Sophomore class to take the place of the worthy Juniors. After urging them to "corporate," he finally consented to grant their request, although at the same time he mentioned the fact that the famous "Centennials" were 100 years behind the time.

W. J. Armstrong, Jr., the solitary representative of the Freshman class stated that he had been waiting for some time until the Sophomore gas would blow off, so that he could assert the absolute right of the class of 1916 to occupy the Sophomore position. Here again the victories in battle between the two under classes were recounted by the Freshman speaker, as well as the achievements in the many college activities. Donald Dunbar, for the class of 1915, concluded the speeches of the morning by representing himself to be an alumnus who had traveled about the various colleges of the United States, where he had seen nothing like the achievements of the class of 1915. After a few remarks about the unfitness of the Freshmen to take the higher seats, they were granted on the one condition that they be mindful of the stupendous greatness of the class whose places they were about to fill. Immediately after the exercises in Chapel preparations were begun for the annual parade. Although the

Owing to examinations, The Campus Board has been unable to complete their work for this issue. The new board will probably be announced about Wednesday.

About this time in the college year, there is a sort of "spirit in the air" which looks toward the better development of Word on college affairs and of Cooperation. those things that count for the most in college.

However, the majority of the talking is only talk and it is soon forgotten in the hurry of closing up the school year. The one thing lacking—cooperation—in a number of the more vital college affairs is the real reason why a number of good suggestions that various students mention within their circle of select friends are never brought to the place where they will help in the betterment of the college life.

President Crawford touched the vital point in his talk on cooperation at the Moving-Up Day exercises. The fact that nothing is accomplished as alumni or as a class of graduates is self-evident. And the same is equally true of present college affairs. There are things that are unsatisfactory, but the persons who advance a remedy are looked upon as "would-be reformers" who are endeavoring to further their own ends. There are few who are in a position to know that will not say that the present system of electing managers for athletic teams is impracticable, but the "millennium" of the change in the system seems a long way off—because of a lack of willingness of all students to cooperate. There are a thousand and one things where student activities could be brought to a more business-like basis but only after the germ of cooperation is allowed to gain some headway. The three under classes can nourish that germ as a pet if necessary during the coming vacation and reenter Allegheny next fall with the thing fully developed. That in itself would be a good summer's work.

Our last issue for the present college year will appear on next Wednesday (commencement morning) and Next Issue. will contain a full report of the exercises of commencement week. On account of the late date of the issue, it will be impossible to forward this number to persons leaving before commencement unless special provision is made for mailing. The difficulty of securing news at that date will make it necessary that all notices or items be handed to the editor not later than Saturday night of this week.

Extra copies of the Commencement issue will be on sale on the campus immediately after the Commencement exercises, the price being five cents per copy. All regular subscribers must secure their papers from Sparling or Blasdel.

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ORATORICAL HISTORY.

Allegheny's intercollegiate debating history reaches back to 1898, when the first debate was held in the Court House under the auspices of the Baraca Society of the Baptist Church. The contest was held April 21, the opponent being Bucknell. The question was: "Resolved, that Hawaii should be annexed to the United States." The negative of this question was supported, and won, for Allegheny by G. G. Cowell, ex-'99, and J. J. Wright, '00.

From 1899 to 1903 no intercollegiate debating contests were held, but from 1904 on, there has been at least one debate with another college every year. The following is a detailed record of Allegheny College debating from that time to the present, the information being given in this order: date, opponent, result for Allegheny, Allegheny's debaters, side supported, question.

June 5, 1904; Syracuse; won; R. G. Freeman, '04, W. P. Sturtevant, '06, H. J. Stockton, '04; negative; "Resolved, that trade unions are injurious to industrial welfare."

May 5, 1905; Washington and Jefferson; lost; L. W. Swanson, '06, W. P. Sturtevant, '06, O. C. Jones, '07; affirmative; "Assuming the adoption of adequate constitutional amendments: Resolved, that courts should be established in the United States for the compulsory arbitration of disputes between employer and employee."

April 29, 1906; Albion; won; L. W. Swanson, '06, W. P. Sturtevant, '06, O. C. Jones, '07; "Resolved, that the United States government should appoint a commission with power to fix railroad rates."

May 11, 1906; Western University of Pennsylvania; won; Claude R. Dye, '06, H. H. Hull, '07, F. A. Shaffer, '06; affirmative; same question as preceding debate.

April 19, 1907; Albion; lost; F. T. Stockton, '07, W. F. Knoell, ex-'09, F. L. Knapp, '09; negative; "Resolved, that a progressive inheritance tax should be levied by the federal government, constitutionally conceded."

April 26, 1907; Washington and Jefferson; won; F. P. Miller, '07, H. H. Hull, '07, W. G. Fixel, '10; affirmative; "Resolved, that a graduated inheritance tax, uniform throughout the United States, is desirable."

April 24, 1908; Washington and Jefferson; won; L. W. Sherwin, '08, W. L. Stidger, ex-'10, W. G. Fixel, '10; negative; "Resolved, that all corporations engaged in interstate commerce should be required to take out Federal charters on such conditions as Congress may by law prescribe, constitutionality conceded."

April 24, 1908; Denison; won; R. B. Callahan, '08, R. J. George, '10, A. D. P. Miller, '08; affirmative; same question as preceding debate.

April 23, 1909; Kenyon; won; C. F. Lewis, '08, R. R. Yost, '10, H. R. Harper, '10; affirmative; "Resolved, that national bank deposits should be secured by a government guarantee fund."

May 7, 1909; Cornell Congress; won; W. L. Stidger, ex-'10, W. C. Cravner, '09, H. R. Hunt, '12; affirmative; same question as preceding debate.

May 6, 1910; University of Pittsburgh; won; W. G. Fixel, '10, H. R. Hunt, '12, W. E. Sheffer, '12; affirmative; "Resolved, that Congress should provide for the establishment of a central national bank of issue, constitutionality conceded."

May 6, 1910; Wooster; lost; R. R. Yost, '10; J. W. Barkley, '11, Paul M. Hillman, '11; negative; same question as preceding debate.

March 17, 1911; Wooster; won; J. W. Barkley, '11, H. R. Hunt, '12, W. E. Sheffer, '12; affirmative; "Resolved, that the federal government should impose an income tax not apportioned among the states according to population, constitutionality conceded."

March 17, 1911; University of Pittsburgh; lost; Paul M. Hillman, '11, R. W. Thomas, '12, J. R. MacGowan, '14; negative; same question as preceding debate.

March 15, 1912; University of Pittsburgh; lost; H. R. Hunt, '12, J. R. MacGowan, '14, W. M. Depp, ex-'15; E. Sheffer, '12; affirmative; "The Income Tax."

March 15, 1912; Wooster; lost; W. E. Sheffer, '12, Thomas Hughes, '12, C. L. Nevins, '13; negative; same question as preceding debate.

March 14, 1913; Wooster; lost; J. R. MacGowan, '14, Clyde V. Sparling, '13,

W. J. Armstrong, '16; affirmative; "Resolved, that the several states should adopt the principle of compulsory arbitration for the settlement of all labor disputes, constitutionality aside."

March 14, 1913; University of Pittsburgh; won; H. J. Wieler, '13, O. C. McLean, '13, E. J. Hall, '13; negative; same question as preceding debate.

Intercollegiate oratory began somewhat earlier than intercollegiate debate at Allegheny. The first recorded intercollegiate contest occurred July 27, 1888, when Frank A. Catterm, '89, won first place for Allegheny with his oration on "American Feudalism." The other colleges competing were Rochester University, Syracuse University, Adelbert, Wesleyan University, and Washington and Jefferson.

Our next intercollegiate oratorical venture also resulted in success, when, on May 29, 1891, W. W. Youngson, '91, secured first place with his oration on "The Philosophy of History." The contest was held at Beaver Falls, Pa., the competing colleges being Bethany, Waynesburg, Westminster, Western University of Pennsylvania, West Virginia Wesleyan University, Geneva, Thiel, and Allegheny.

During the years 1892-1894 nothing was done in this line, but in 1895 the old Tri-State League was formed and the first contest held at Meadville on May 31. It has been impossible to find out the name of Allegheny's representative, nor the place he secured, except that he was ranked below third. The colleges competing were the same as those in the contest of 1891. From this time on Allegheny has had an intercollegiate oratorical contest nearly every year. The following is the record, the information being given in this order: date, place held, Allegheny's orator, position won, subject, competing colleges.

tour of the United States. In 39 games
played with the best college teams of
the country, the foreigners have been
successful in 38 contests. Both in the
field and at bat, the visitors showed
a marked ability in playing the Am-
erican national pastime, even having
the finest points of the game mas-
tered to a wonderful degree. This
was the last game on the schedule
for the gold and blue.

In the first inning the Chinamen
scored four runs right off the bat
when C. Gilbert missed Ayan's hard
bouncer, after which Ensue struck
out, but Kan Yin knocked a two-bag-
ger to left field and scored the man
from second. After Lai made out via
the short stop route, three singles in
quick succession brought the remain-
ing three runs across the plate. In
the second inning the University team
scored two more runs, which were
largely the result of errors, but in the
fourth Allegheny came back with one
run as the result of Campman's two-
base hit down the third base line, fol-
lowed quickly by a steal of third base
and Hawk's sacrifice fly. This ended
the scoring for Allegheny until the
seventh when two well placed hits by
Thoburn and Croasmun brought Bash
home from first base, where he had
advanced on account of the visitors'
errors. In the meantime the China-
men scored two more runs in the
fourth, two more in the sixth, three
in the seventh, and one in the ninth.
The larger part of these scores were
the result of the ragged fielding on
the part of the gold and blue. The
visitors could place their hits well,
especially their diminutive short stop,
Ayan, who made three hits out of five
times at bat, one of them being a
home run to the left field fence. Every
member of their team hit the
ball hard and timely, while in the
field their work was far better than
that of any other team that has play-
ed here this year.

For Allegheny Robinson pitched
good ball, striking out nine men, one
less than Luck of the Hawaiians, but
his support in the field was weak in
comparison with the snappy work of
the speedy Orientals. Croasmun at
third made his last appearance on
the Allegheny baseball diamond and
played an exceptional game, not only
in the field, but at bat where he made
three hits out of three times up.
Campman and Thoburn also did good

DR. COBERN AND J. G. LANE RETURN FROM LONG TRIP.

Professor Camden M. Cobern of Allegheny College arrived in Boston from Europe last Thursday on the steamer Canopic from the Mediterranean. He is accompanied by James G. Lane, ex-'14, who has been his traveling companion on his research trip through Egypt and through Palestine and Europe. Dr. Cobern arrived in Meadville on Sunday morning.

Dr. Cobern tells some very interesting experiences, one in which Arabs, whom the party met on the desert, sent bullets whistling over their heads and threatened to completely wipe out the expedition. The little party was encamped on the oasis El Bour and were awakened about two o'clock one morning by the gun-fire of several hundred Arabs who were on the warpath. Dr. Cobern said they could hear the bullets whistle over their heads. Several of the Arab leaders of the war party came into his tent and talked with him and Mr. Lane for several hours and they learned that the party comprised a tribe going to fight another tribe. The travelers were not molested and greatly, though somewhat apprehensively, enjoyed the spectacle of the Arab war dances in the light of bonfires built on encircling lines. At daylight the Arabs moved on.

Dr. Cobern spent most of his sabbatic year in research work in Egypt and at Abdo, in Egypt, he unearthed some pre-dynastic pottery which he estimated to be between 5,000 and 6,000 years old. In Palestine his party discovered a painted tomb of some ancient age, the fourth of its kind ever discovered. While on the route of the Israelites at Kadesh Barnea, which is between Palestine and Mt. Sinai, Dr. Cobern made some interesting discoveries with reference to the agricultural possibilities of the Jews while in the desert.

On July 4th, there will be opened in Washington a beautiful new institution of learning, the American University. At first the work will be all graduate work. A great deal of money has been spent to lay out beautiful grounds and to erect beautiful buildings. It will be a Methodist Episcopal institution.

Ex-President Taft will get a degree of Doctor of Civil Law at Hamilton College this year.

The Catholic University at Washington is preparing for the building of a chapel to cost \$50,000.

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
