Dear Mr. Case:

I shall be no end-grateful if you will read the enclosed and give me your suggestions and criticisms by Tuesday afternoon or Wednesday morning.

Mr. Blossom has changed his plans slightly. He will make an editorial introduction to the series, covering briefly the point of emergence which you remember is the theme of the paper that you read. I shall begin with this article.

you There are two or three points which I should like/particularly to notice:- Page 14 - The handling of the milk certificates. Is what I say correct? It is what I understood from talking with J. Hagen.

Page 16 - Please read what I say of electrification with care. I am going to talk with Rex Cole the first of the week I hope. I have missed him so far. It was he, I understand, who put in the wires.

Page 28 - "Million dollars". I suppose Mr. Young is spending at least that on the school. Is he not? Not that I am set on saying anything about it myself, but it does impress the money-minded public.

Mr. Blossom wants me to dramatize the reference to Mr. Young's out-guessing the Arizona cow boy - the weight of a steer. Now I was not present but I heard a lot about it. I can write something, of course, reconstructing the scene, but I would like a little help. As I suppose there is no chance of my seeing Mr. Young myself, would you not if you have the chance and if you deem it proper, ask him about it so that I can make a paragraph - not too highly fictionalized.
