Dear Mother

I received your letter today and was glad to hear from you I and all of the rest of the boys are well at present and hope these few lines will find you all the same the rose of Washington that I sent you has some of the Best Buildings on it that there is in Washington the White House in one of them Soldiers Home it there to called Military Assilum The 150th has marching orders all the rest of the companys has been notified but Com K and we have not yet I think we will stay while longer but if we have to go we are all ready at least I am for one you seem to be in trouble again about that old house I thought some time ago that the dam raskal would try to get the House get I would like to meet the lousy son of a B down here I would choke him to dath d soon You have some 50 dollars now of my money so push him through as long as it lasts I sent 80 cts in my last letter you think I take things hard but you are mistaken about what Bill wrote did not hurt my feelings so much as you think kick me out do you think he would. it has commenced raining again it is after 7 now and it is raining I am on guard today and are in out of the rain I go on at 9 it is dark as the D out at night Mrs. Lincoln just sent a lot of apples down for the boys tell Sim did not mean any sal I was thinking it over when I first put sals name in that sim would think I ment his Aunt sal but I did not you need not send my more stamps till I send for them I have seen sheets of stamps as big as a newspaper quartered tell George I hope he will let old kye a long give my love to Grand Mother and all the rest I must come to a close so good by from Willard A. Cutter I was to that teater counterley.
