My dear Miss Tarbell:

It gives me very great pleasure to be of assistance to you in the matter about which you write, and I beg your acceptance of the two prints enclosed. I have duplicates and the negatives.

I also send you a page from a scrap-book and my letter to the N.Y. Times referring to the two "discoveries." Writing the letter in Chicago, while on a lecture tour, and not having the Lincoln "discovery" with me, I confused my statements, and said that the person had found the "moderator" signature

and I did not recall that he mentioned the page containing the entries of the church admissions. You see it is just the other way about. I must ask you to return the newspaper matter at your convenience (not the slightest hurry).

In my lecture I speak of only one book, and that in this book are the two pages. Of this I am not absolutely certain at this interval, - there may have been two books but I am almost certain that there was only one. How I got on track of it I do not remember, but the clerk of the church at the time (1908) had the photographing done for me.
