"After the war, what is wanted in industrial matters is not only a reconstruction of pre-war conditions and labor constitutions, but a reconstruction of ideas. Capital and labor have got to meet together and the human beings on the Works Committees have got to agree together as man to man that in the future they will run their industry on the principle that they must be ready to reject all prospects of gain which involve loss to others.

This is not Utopian - it is not an idle dream. We have seen our men of all classes laying down their lives for their country in unselfish fellowship for the peace of the world, - shall it be said that we at home are not ready to follow their example and make some small sacrifices in the cause of industrial peace?"

Dispatch from Constantinople, Oct. 19. "Day before yesterday, before receiving the German colony at the German Embassy the Kaiser gave an audience to the members of the Central Committee of the Ladies of the Red Crescent, who were presented by the Countess Bernstorff. The Kaiser said that he had already made the acquaintance of Turkish ladies on his previous visit, and that the progress which had taken place in the world of Musselman women meantime was noteworthy and foreshadowed weighty consequences in the future. He congratulated the ladies especially on their activity they had displayed during the war."
