Dear Rutgers:

I have just received from Jane Adams a note in which she says:

"I thank you very much for your letter in regard to André Maurois. I do not believe however, that Hull-House would be the best place for him to visit during the summer months, but I shall hope to do everything possible for him in the way of putting him in line with what he wants to see. He always seems to me one of the most intelligent and able of the many people who write about America and I am most grateful to you for telling me about his coming."

She adds that two of the groups to which she has spoken are enthusiastic about his coming. I am sure that everything possible will be done for Mr. Maurois.

I am leaving town the end of next week - not to be back before ten days or so. If A. M. comes and you wish to start him at the Henry Street Settlement which I am pretty sure is as good a place as he could go if he wants to get actual happenings, call up Mrs. Bird Carter there and she will do everything in her power.

I think I spoke to you about a colored preacher in Harlem that seemed to me intelligent and who would really understand Mr. Maurois' visit. His address is:
