Dear Mr. Burton:-

This is to tell you that finally I have the material for the Farm and Trade article which we discussed. I have been slow in getting out here to talk with Mr. Ford and to look over what he has done since I first talked with him but I have been here ten days now; have gone over the developments pretty carefully and had the interview with him. If you think it wise I could make it practically all Henry Ford instead of the more general discussion that I had in mind and for which I think our agreement calls. I would like to do that and call it Henry Ford - Truly American, but you must be the judge.

I shall be in New York the first of the week and I can give you the article in ten days. I will have pictures, too, with me.

Will you not have someone from your office call me up - say Tuesday morning and let me know whether you want more or less Ford. I'm for the "more" myself. He is the most interesting person in the United States today and the nearest to a natural, unspoiled creature --- that is as far as my experience with men of affairs goes.

I am of course working on the Woman series and want to talk with Miss Miller as soon as you can manage it - not until after the Farm and Trade paper is off my hands.
