My dear Miss Tarbell:

Judge Gary read your letter dated May 7th, and made several comments, which he will be glad to supplement in conversation on the first convenient occasion. The comments I am quoting below.

(2) The visit to the Brazilian manganese mine. "Will talk with Miss Tarbell."

(3) Does he play golf? "No".

(4) Does he go to the races? "Very seldom".

(6) How has he done it in the past? "Habits have always been pretty good; born with strong constitution; early life on farm conducive to health and longevity."
