In connection with our discussion on Wednesday of the importance of the savings program for industrial employees, I am enclosing copy of the annual report of the G.E. Employees Securities Corporation for 1932, which gives in Mr. Swope's statement on the inside of the folder the figures to which I referred, i.e., that there were payments under the unemployment plan of the Company for that year of \$1,500,000, and that the amount received by employees for their own use in interest and principal of bonds redeemed in 1932 amounted to \$12,500,000.

I was sorry that I could not stay for dinner Wednesday evening, and thereby missed a very enjoyable occasion.
