As I think I told you I would do I wrote to Gilbert Grosvenor telling him how Dr. Pritchett and I felt about taking a hand in helping you straighten out your affairs. Your letter of Thursday has just come. At the moment I am too busy even to read it - shall do so before night and write you as soon as I have talked with Dr. Pritchett.

You must not feel in any way disturbed about all this. Just as Gilbert Grosvenor writes, "he welcomes the opportunity." That is the way we all feel. And then you are so brave and cheerful about it - perfectly fine.
