I am leaving Wednesday noon, the 13th, for Boston-- will be in New York the 15th and sail on the Conte di Savoia for Europe at noon on the 16th.


My Assistant, Mr. C. H. Murray, has had charge of our industrial relations program under my direction for a number of years and knows my thoughts and ideas to the nth degree.
